Dover Police to hold 'Drug Take-Back Day' April 27

On Saturday, April 27, 2019, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., the Dover Police Department and the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) will give the public another opportunity to prevent prescription drug and opioid abuse and theft by ridding their homes of potentially dangerous expired, unused, and unwanted prescription drugs. Medications can be brought to the Dover Police Department at 46 Chestnut St. for disposal. The service is free, anonymous, and no questions will be asked.

Dover, like communities across the state, continues to see the impacts of the opioid epidemic. Just last year, Dover experienced 11 fatal opioid overdoses in the city in addition to dozens of non-fatal overdoses.

"We know there is a strong connection between prescription drug misuse and heroin use," said Police Chief William Breault. "If we can prevent prescription drug misuse we are in turn taking steps toward preventing overdoses. We urge all members of the public to safely dispose of the medications in their homes at the Drug Take Back."

According to the National Institute on Drug Abuse 80 percent of people who use heroin misused painkillers first. This initiative addresses a vital public safety and public health issue. Medicines that languish in home cabinets are highly susceptible to diversion, misuse, and abuse. Rates of prescription drug abuse in the U.S. are alarmingly high, as are the number of accidental poisonings and overdoses due to these drugs. Surveys show that one in five New Hampshire high school students have used a prescription drug that was not prescribed to them.

"Over half of teens report that prescription drugs are easy or very easy to get," said Dover Coalition for Youth coordinator, Vicki Hebert. "Seventy percent of teens who abuse prescription drugs obtained the medications from family and friends, including from the home medicine cabinet. We are holding this event to allow community members to dispose of their medications and remove the source of temptation from their home." Dover has participated in the take back initiative since the fall of 2010, hosting at least one event a year. During the last eight years Dover has collected over 2,800 pounds prescription drugs.

Americans are now advised that their usual methods for disposing of unused medicines-flushing them down the toilet or throwing them in the trash-pose potential safety and health hazards. The DEA states that unused prescription drugs thrown in the trash can be retrieved and abused or illegally sold. Unused drugs that are flushed contaminate the water supply.

If unable to attend a collection event during the national take back day, people can visit a permanent take-back box Wentworth-Douglass Hospital. This summer the hospital installed a disposal box in the main lobby of the hospital providing community members with an additional disposal option. The box is available for the disposal of prescription medications seven days a week.

Traveling abroad? Apply for a US Passport at the Library

The Dover Public Library is an official Passport Acceptance Facility for the U.S. Department of State. The service is for new adult passports, any child passport, and for expired passports issued more than 15 years ago. Per Department of State regulations, the service is not available for passport renewals. These may be completed online.

The passport application process takes from 20-60 minutes per applicant and it is recommended that all your application forms be filled out, legibly and completely, before your appointment. Remember to bring a regulation passport photo, required citizenship and ID documents photocopies, and your checkbook.

The execution fee for each passport, payable to the Dover Public Library, is \$25. Fees payable to the Department of State will vary, dependent on a variety of factors. <u>Click here</u> for more details on the cost of a passport.

The library offers passport processing services every day, including evenings and weekends, but appointments are required. No appointments are scheduled during the last 90 minutes before library closing.

Listening sessions for Route 108 improvements continue

The New Hampshire Department of Transportation (NHDOT) will hold a public listening session in Somersworth on Thursday, May 2, 2019 to discuss proposed improvements to New Hampshire Route 108 in Dover, Somersworth, and Rochester. The public is invited and encouraged to attend to provide input on potential improvements.

A listening session was previously held in Dover in March.

The May 2 public listening session will be held at Somersworth High School, 18 Cemetery Road, beginning at 7 p.m. and ending at 9 p.m. A short presentation will be followed by open discussion of ideas and dialogue between the public and the NHDOT project team.

This project involves the study of improvements to NH Route 108 from the intersection of NH Route 9/Indian Brook Drive in Dover to Innovation Drive in Rochester, a distance of approximately five miles. The objective of the project is to develop a design alternative that will improve the safety and mobility of all users by applying 'Complete Street' principles, with the central goal of achieving an appropriate balance between the needs of motorized, non-motorized, and transit users of the corridor.

Interested property owners, public officials, employers and roadway users are welcome and will be given the opportunity

to provide input on the project.

Any individuals needing assistance or auxiliary communication equipment due to sensory impairment or other disability should contact the Bureau of Right-of-Way, NHDOT, PO Box 483, Concord, NH 03302-0483 or call 603-271-3222. TDD access: Relay NH 1-800-735-2964. Notification of the need for assistance must be made at the earliest convenience.

Historic properties may be impacted by the project. Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act offers those that possess a direct interest in historical resources, including town officials, Historical Societies, and Historical Commissions, an opportunity to become more involved in an advisory role during project development as "Consulting Parties." DOVER HISTORY The following events are recorded in "Notable Events in the History of Dover, New Hampshire: From the First Settlemen

History of Dover, New Hampshire: From the First Settlement in 1623 to 1865," by George Wadleigh, and several other historical sources.

For more on the history of Dover, settled in 1623 and the oldest permanent settlement in New Hampshire and seventh oldest in the country, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street; and the Woodman Museum, Central Avenue. The Public Library also maintains an online collection of historical information, located here.



April 25, 1704 - Nathaniel Header of Dover was slain by the Indians at Oyster River, not far from the place where Nicholas Follet formerly dwelt.



April 22, 1852 - The paper-hanging manufacturing operation of Crawford & Busby on Fifth Street was lost to fire. The financial loss is reported to be about \$4,500.



April 19, 1856 - The salaries of City officers were established as follows: Mayor, \$200; City Clerk, \$200 and fees; City Marshal, \$100; Assistant, \$50; Treasurer, \$50. Voted to purchase the lot known as the "sand bank," adjoining Pine Hill, for \$300. Valuation of the city this year \$3,562,978. Rate of taxation is 88 cents on \$100.

April 20, 1862 - It is recorded as a matter worthy of remembrance that the farmers at this time were hauling wood on the top of the snow "across lots" without regard to roads and fences. In the same week (April 17 and 18) the thermometer rose to 77, its greatest altitude in April for 15 years.



April 19, 1865 - Bells were tolled throughout the day for President Abraham Lincoln, who was assassinated on April 15, 1865. Guns fired every 30 minutes from 10 a.m. until 6 p.m. Flags draped in mourning were displayed throughout the city. Services were held at the Unitarian, Congregational, Belknap, Episcopal and Calvin Baptist Churches.

Dover's 400th Anniversary Committee will host a public forum to ask Dover residents for input on activities to celebrate Dover's 400th birthday in 2023. The forum will be held on Thursday, May 2, 2019 at 7 p.m. in the auditorium at Dover High School.



Established in 1623, Dover is the first permanent settlement in New Hampshire. The 400th Anniversary Committee was formed to plan and organize the city's 400th birthday celebration which will include historical re-enactments, fireworks and parades, school involvement, souvenirs and more.

"We want to hear from the public about the events and programs they'd like to see shape our celebration," said Committee Chair Kevin McEneaney.

Feedback from the forum will be brought back to the committee and incorporated into event planning documents.

NH historic property records now available online

The New Hampshire Division of Historical Resources has launched a new online tool for historic resource records research. The Enhanced Mapping and Management Information Tool, EMMIT, provides more than 16,000 documents on file at the NHDHR related to the state's historic and archaeological resources, and uses Geographic Information System technology to pinpoint locations of historic resources.

EMMIT is an invaluable support tool for anyone interested in the state's history and its historic places. Researchers, local preservation commissions, cultural resource consultants, planners, public agencies, and engineering, environmental, land use and development firms can all benefit from EMMIT's online accessibility, via subscription, without taking a trip to DHR's Concord office.

"Today, history and technology go hand-in-hand," said NHDHR Director and State Historic Preservation Officer Elizabeth Muzzey. "The Division's dedicated staff members brought their many professional talents together to make this innovative and important project a reality. "We are proud to offer this new service to New Hampshire's preservation community and to anyone who is interested in the state's special historic places." Documents are available as downloadable PDFs and include both National and State Register of Historic Places nominations, historic districts, individual inventory surveys, project area forms and more. Archaeological site forms and survey reports are also available, but with limited access due to the sensitive nature of archaeological sites.

Photographs, maps and other images associated with the documents available via EMMIT can also be downloaded from the online service.

Users can search for New Hampshire historical properties by defining specific historical data criteria such as property name, address or town, or by selecting specific locations on the map.


EMMIT is the only online, up-to-date, comprehensive inventory of the state's historic and archaeological resources. However, the identification of historic places in New Hampshire is an ongoing initiative, and many of the state's historic, architectural and archaeological resources have not yet been identified. Hundreds of new records are submitted to the DHR annually; EMMIT will be updated on a regular basis throughout year as new records are submitted.

EMMIT's subscription fees vary depending on the type of organization, number of user accounts and the length of the subscription.

EMMIT's development was funded in part by that National Park Service, Department of the Interior through the Emergency Supplemental Historic Preservation Fund and the State of New Hampshire's Conservation License Plate Fund.

Volunteers needed: Report reptile and amphibian sightings

While you're outdoors spending time in New Hampshire's woods and wetlands this year, keep an eye out for reptiles and amphibians. The New Hampshire Fish and Game Department collects information on these sightings to help monitor the state's reptile and amphibian populations.

Biologists are asking volunteers to help fill in gaps in the data for several seldom-seen species, including the eastern hognose snake, blue-spotted salamanders, spotted turtles, and several other species of salamanders, frogs, turtles, and snakes. Data for distribution maps is also needed and is focused on three rare frogs: northern leopard frogs, mink frogs, and Fowlers's toads. From May to June, these frogs can be most easily detected at night by their individual identifiable calls which volunteers can document during the call survey period in specific regions. Biologists are also encouraging citizens to report vernal pools, a necessary breeding habitat for species such as wood frogs, spotted salamanders, and many invertebrates. Vernal pools are often small, isolated wetlands that are full of water for only part of the year, making them easily overlooked. Protecting these important animal and habitat resources is a priority identified in New Hampshire's Wildlife Action Plan.

The New Hampshire Fish and Game Department has some outstanding visual assets to help you identify the frogs, salamanders, snakes, and turtles that exist in the state, and the important habitats they are reliant on. This includes the manual Identifying and Documenting Vernal Pools in New Hampshire and the Vernal Pool Reporting Form, available at <u>www.wildnh.com/nongame/vernal-pools.html</u>. Also on the NH Fish and Game website, you will find photographs, descriptions, and lots of detailed information on the state's 40 native reptiles and amphibians.

When the Nongame and Endangered Wildlife Program was established in 1988, there was little documented information about the distribution of frogs, snakes, salamanders, and turtles in New Hampshire. The Nongame Program worked with Dr. Jim Taylor at the University of New Hampshire to enlist volunteers to send in reports on amphibians and reptiles and published his book, Reptiles and Amphibians of New Hampshire. The Reptile and Amphibian Reporting Program (RAARP) was formally established in 1992, and volunteers soon had documented hundreds of new sightings.

"The RAARP program continues to grow," commented Melissa Doperalski a wildlife biologist at New Hampshire Fish and Game. "Every year we get more people submitting valuable information on species observations, many of them in locations where we never knew they existed before." Since the beginning of the program, over 1,000 volunteers have submitted over 10,000 wildlife records.

Although reptiles and amphibians are often the focus of reporting - especially during this time of year when they are coming out of hibernation and moving into wetlands biologists encourage your reports of other wildlife species as well. Several years ago, the Reptile and Amphibian Reporting Program was combined with the NH Wildlife Sightings reporting webpage <u>https://nhwildlifesightings.unh.edu/</u>, which allows additional wildlife species such as certain birds and mammals to be reported. On the website, mapping tools allow you to easily pinpoint the location of your wildlife observations, and digital photographs can be uploaded as part of your submissions. Detailed instructions are available on the website - it's fun and easy to use.


