Waterfront contract before City Council on Wednesday

Additional waterfront bonding also on agenda

On the City Council's agenda at the April 26 meeting are two resolutions related to the waterfront development.

One is to authorize an additional \$6 million in bonding for public improvements at the waterfront; the other is to award the contract bid for the public improvements to the site. The additional bonding and appropriation is needed for the Council to award the bid as currently presented.

Waterfront bonding

If approved, the \$6 million in additional bonding would bring the

Tuesday, Thursday, Saturday: 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. grand total to \$24.6 million in bonding authorization, including \$4 million authorized in the adopted six-year FY2024-2029 Capital Improvements Program. The City Council also authorized bonding in waterfront projects in FY2017, 2018, 2021, 2022, and 2023 CIPs. Of the authorized bonding, \$4.8 million has been issued, with \$2.75 million issued in FY2020 and \$2.06 million issued in FY2022.

The Waterfront Tax Increment Finance Advisory Board voted unanimously to recommend the City Council approve the bonding and appropriation for the waterfront site improvements when it met on April 10 to review the proposal.

According to the City Council resolution background material and as presented to the Waterfront TIF Advisory Board, bonding would be issued as needed to meet the cash flow requirements of the public improvements and not be issued at once. The repayment of the bonds would be from the sale of the publicly-owned waterfront parcel to the developers for \$3,372,500 and tax increments collected by properties included in the 83-acre Waterfront Tax Increment Financing District. Part of the land development agreement for the sale of the waterfront property to the private developer includes guaranteed tax-assessed values.

The Waterfront TIF District <u>was authorized</u> by the City Council in February 2015, which includes the 29-acre city-owned property and nearby private properties. When a TIF district is authorized, the assessed values and property tax revenues within the TIF are essentially frozen. The property tax revenue from these assessed values continues to flow to the city's General Fund. However, the future incremental increases in property tax revenues realized through increased assessed values are captured in a dedicated fund used to pay for the infrastructure for improvements within the TIF. Once the improvements are paid for, the TIF is dissolved, and 100% of the property taxes generated go to the city's General Fund.

TIF Districts are authorized by state law RSA 162-K, "Municipal Economic Development and Revitalization Districts." It's meant to encourage commercial development in specific areas of the community that is not expected otherwise occur on a timely basis.

Awarding the waterfront construction bid

The Council will consider awarding the public improvements of the waterfront project to Northeast Earth Mechanics LLC, of Pittsfield, for \$19,532,250, one of two bids submitted for the work. Public improvements include constructing a new street system to provide site access and the utilities necessary to serve the proposed buildings. Other improvements include the construction of a new 3.4-acre public riverfront park, stabilizing the Cochecho River shoreline, grading the elevation to account for projected sea level rise, and installing a stormwater management system with green infrastructure.

Also on the agenda:

- Authorization to allow a weekly farmers market at Guppey Park. Seacoast Eat Local, Inc., seeks to move its weekly farmer's market from the Greater Dover Chamber of Commerce's parking lot.
- Authorize the reprogramming of unexpended proceeds from the sludge dewatering project to the aeration blower

- replacement project.
- Authorize an amendment to the upgrades of the River Street Pump Station.

Chestnut Street bridge rehabilitation work nears completion

The rehabilitation of the Chestnut Street bridge is nearing completion and is on schedule to reopen vehicular and pedestrian traffic by May 19, 2023. It's been closed to all traffic since Jan. 3.

The reconstruction of the sidewalks is now complete. This week, crews installed the bridge membrane to protect it against corrosion. Paving is scheduled to begin today and be completed next week, weather permitting. Once paved, the bridge will need to be line-striped before it can be reopened. The contractor will complete minor punch-list items once the bridge is opened, which may require intermittent lane shifts/closures to complete.

The project included removing the pavement, membrane, and sidewalks on the bridge, repairing deteriorated concrete in the bridge deck, reconstructing the bridge sidewalks, and installing a new bridge membrane, new bridge pavement, and new wearing-course pavement.

Come see friends and neighbors and meet new ones. Dover Pride Clean Up Day is a great opportunity to get out of the house and do something for our community. This civic volunteer effort is an important aspect of helping keep the downtown area clean and beautiful throughout the spring and summer and also provides cost savings to the City of Dover.

"The amount of work accomplished within four hours on Saturday is nothing short of amazing," said Community Services Director John Storer. "The pride shown by the community also helps our department deploy our scarce resources to other timely projects."

Community Services will have workers out with equipment, such as loaders and skid-steers, to help move mulch and collect trash and debris.

Individuals, groups, or families can volunteer for just an hour or come for the entire morning. Locations will be set up by Dover Main Street, but there are numerous spots around the city to lend a helping hand, such as Henry Law Park, the Community Trail, Joe Parks Riverwalk, Skate Park, and the Library and McConnell Center public spaces. Work will include raking, weeding, edging, sweeping, mulching, and picking up litter.

The following events are from a variety of historical records, sources, and texts about the history of Dover.

For more on the history of Dover, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street, and the Woodman Museum on Central Avenue. The Public Library also maintains an online collection of historical information located here.

April 25, **1729** — The inhabitants of the northeast of Dover (now Somersworth), petitioned the Assembly to be set off as a parish for the benefit of the ministry.


April 22, **1852** — The paper-hanging manufacturing operation of Crawford & Busby on Fifth Street was lost to fire on this day. The financial loss was reported to be about \$4,500.

April 23, 1895 — The agent overseeing the mills of the Cocheco Print Works announced on this day that mill workers would receive a wage increase of 5 percent. The raise restored wages to previous levels, which had been reduced several months earlier. It was reported that the mill workers rejoiced at the announcement. The mills at that time were running at full capacity.

April 23, 1895 — Dover's Marilla Ricker announced on this day she was running for governor of New Hampshire, the first woman to do so. Ricker at that time was already well known for her

advocacy for women's suffrage. She had already convinced the courts to allow women to take the bar exam, and was the first woman to attempt to vote. Although denied a ballot by the City Clerk in Dover, she persisted. Her work did finally pay off, even though she wouldn't live long enough to see it. Marilla Ricker died in 1920, just a few months after the 19th Amendment was ratified, which granted women the right to vote.

April 28, 1999 — New Hampshire Partners in Education announced that the Greater Dover of Chamber's School-to-Work initiative would receive an award for the program that helped prepare high school graduates for entry-level jobs. The program included a career development curriculum, beginning a business/teacher exchange program, having educators work with the chamber, and sending 22 business volunteers to the elementary schools.

McManus to share 'Dover: Stories of Our Past' at the Public Library

For years, Anthony McManus served as a Trustee for the Woodman Museum. Despite all of his time being around the history of Dover, he never really had a chance to explore it until 2018. That was the year he was approached by a friend at Foster's Daily Democrat who asked if he would be interested in writing a column for the newspaper focused on the yesteryears of the city.



On Thursday, April 27 at 6:30 p.m., McManus will share some of these tales in "Dover: Stories of Our Past" at the Dover Public Library. The event will take place in person, with an option to

watch virtually from home. Those wishing to view online will need to sign up through the library's website to access a link to the program.

McManus's column, titled "Historically Speaking," continues to this day. In honor of the 400th anniversary of Dover, a collection of three years' worth of his articles was published as a book. The book, which has the same title as the presentation, will be available for purchase and signing at the event.

McManus's column chronicles the day-to-day life, events, and families that shaped the Dover community. Much of his research was done by exploring Pine Hill Cemetery and exploring the shelves of the Dover Public Library's Historical Room.

McManus is a native of Dover, attending St. Mary Academy and Dover High School. He is a graduate of Georgetown University and received a degree from Boston College law before becoming a public defender in Boston. In 1966, he returned to Dover, eventually opening up his own office. From 1967 to 1973, he served as Dover's City Attorney.

He has long been involved in the government and community life of Dover including as a member of the city's Planning Board, Parking Commission, and City Council, and serving on the board of Dover Main Street. Throughout the 1970s, he served in the NH House of Representatives. He continued to practice law until 2001 when he was named Executive Secretary of the NH Judicial Conduct Committee, a position he held until 2008.

Tax bills in the mail next week

The City Clerk and Tax Collector's Office will mail tax bills to all property owners the week of April 24, with all tax bills arriving by Monday, May 1, 2023.

It's the second half of the annual tax bill, which is due Thursday, June 1, 2023. As calculated and certified by the New Hampshire Department of Revenue Administration, the City of Dover's property tax rate for fiscal year 2023 (tax year 2022) is \$19.84 per \$1,000 assessed valuation.

In addition to mail, property tax payments can be paid online by clicking the "Pay My Bill" button on the home page of the City's website at www.dover.nh.gov. Payment of property tax bills is only available for current year tax bills and is not available for properties with a prior year's tax lien. There are online payment transaction fees collected by the payment processing company.

Assistance available for past-due property taxes for financial hardship due to COVID-19

New Hampshire Homeowner Assistance Fund Program can provide up to \$40,000 per household for past-due property taxes due to financial hardship experienced because of the COVID-19 public health crisis. Assistance can also be used for mortgage reinstatement and/or utility payments; only past-due expenses are covered.

The program assists New Hampshire homeowners who have been affected in any way by an increase in expenses or a reduction in income due to COVID-19. It is federally funded through the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 and the New Hampshire Governor's Office for Emergency Relief and Recovery. New Hampshire Housing Finance Authority administers the program.

To be eligible, homeowners must:

- Have experienced a COVID-related reduction in income or increase in household expenses after January 21, 2020;
- Own and occupy the property as their primary residence;
- Have incomes of less than 125% of the area median income. According to the NH
 Homeowner Assistance Fund online calculator, the gross annual income limit for a family
 of four in Dover is \$145,500.


