Public water supply upgrades topic of May 1 workshop

The City Council will hold a workshop on the city's public drinking water supply upgrades on Wednesday, May 1.

In one presentation, city staff will discuss how Dover is complying with federal lead service line regulations, and how the city is working to identify and address any possible leadbased service lines on private property that may be connected to the city's water system.

Another presentation will be from consultant Underwood Engineers staff, who provide Dover technical expertise with its water system infrastructure. Their presentation will provide an overview of the Pudding Hill Water Treatment Plant that will be online later this season, including how it works and complies with the new federal PFAS regulations. They will

Tuesday, Thursday, Saturday: 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. also discuss the new Smith Well Road water tank that is nearing completion, and the planned Garrison Hill water tank rehabilitation, slated to begin as early as this fall.

A third presentation is from Emery & Garrett Groundwater Investigations, a division of GZA. This city consultant provides technical expertise in monitoring and managing the city's drinking water aquifers. It also helps the city investigate new groundwater sources.

The workshop begins at 7 p.m. in City Hall's Council Chamber. It will be televised on Channel 22 and online at https://dovernh.viebit.com, where it will also be available for on-demand viewing.

Recreation Director Gary Bannon retires after 34 years with Dover

The City of Dover bids farewell to its long-time faithful servant, Recreation Director Gary Bannon, retiring at month's end after 34 years of service to the city and its citizens.

Colleagues, friends, and family joined Bannon on Thursday afternoon for a retirement sendoff at the McConnell Center, sharing laughs and stories, and reminiscing of Bannon's storied career with Dover.

Mayor Robert Carrier presented him with a key to the city and read a proclamation, recognizing Bannon "for his outstanding dedication, leadership, and contributions to the Dover Recreation Department and the community at large.

"We extend our deepest gratitude for his unwavering commitment to enriching the lives of Dover residents through recreational opportunities and congratulate him on his remarkable career achievements," Carrier said.

Bannon was hired in 1989 as Assistant Parks and Recreation Director. He arrived as a stranger, finding the job posting through the New Hampshire Union Leader classified section from where the Rhode Island native lived in Jaffrey, working for a Christian camp as a facilities manager.

"I didn't know anyone here," Bannon said recently. "But it didn't take long to be connected with people in the city."

Bannon found a city already steeped in recreation opportunities, with two pools, an ice area, a gym, and many public parks, and knew it was a place he could settle into with his young family. During his tenure, he oversaw the addition of a second ice rink, the creation of two Dover Skate Parks, Dover Disc Golf Course, and Dover Adventure Playground, among many others. Bannon also oversaw the creation of the Recreation Facilities at McConnell Center in 2004-2005, repurposing Dover's former middle school and high school into a center of recreation and a place for local non-profits agencies to help serve the community.

"We're all on the same team," Bannon said of the McConnell Center collaboration. "We all have the same mission: serving the public."

Bannon was promoted to Recreation Superintendent of the newly formed Recreation Division of Community Services Department in 1994 and became Recreation Director in 2005 when the Recreation Department was reestablished.

"The 34 years went by like a blink," Bannon said. "It wasn't a job – it was a life."

Bannon's overarching vision is that "recreation is for everybody," carrying on a longstanding city tradition. "The vision of what Dover Recreation is, started decades, decades before I first started," he noted during his recent interview on the Dover Download podcast.

While he helped shepherd numerous projects into reality.

Bannon credits the collaboration of the city's citizens for these project's success, such as the Dover Adventure Playground. With the help of the Cox family, David Bamford, and the New Hampshire Children's Museum, a project that would have been built in phases over many years due to budgetary constraints was completed in a season.


These projects are hallmarks of the city, Bannon said.

"Have a good idea, be patient, have faith that it can happen, and if it's a good idea, you'll find the people and the ways to make it happen," he said. "I've been fortunate in Recreation to see that over and over again."



Bannon's motto is simple. "Make the world a better place because you are there."

Dover CrimeLine seeks new board members

Dover CrimeLine is seeking volunteers to join its board of directors.

Arrive at your ward by 9:15 AM with a safety vest or bright clothing, gloves, and closed-toe, flat-heeled shoes. No sandals or flip-flops. If you have a litter tool and/or THANKS FOR HELPING a wagon, bring it. Turn in or complete a waiver. Sign in on clipboard, too, because the Ward with the most, second most and third most participants wins bragging rights and a group trophy.

Get your bag and pick up as much litter as possible in your Ward. Walk facing traffic. Respect private property. Do not go beyond "No Trespassing" or "Private Property" signs. Use caution when collecting. Do not attempt to collect litter that is in any location that may pose a danger. Do not touch or pick up needles/syringes.

Do not handle any hazardous or potentially hazardous materials. If you find appliances, televisions, furniture, or other large items, please make a note of the item and location and report to the site leader when

you return.

Keep an eye on the time and make sure to return to your Ward location by 10:30 AM with all the litter you collected for the group photo.

Note: Children under 12 years must be accompanied by an adult. Bags will be provided.





The following events are from various historical records, sources, and texts about the history of Dover.


April 30, 1731 — By a vote of the town, one and a half acres of land at Pine Hill, near the meeting house, were set apart as a public burying ground.

April 30, 1814 — Proposals were issued for building the Dover Cotton Factory and dam at the falls near Jonathon Kimball's — the building to be 100 feet in length, 32 feet wide, and three stories high.

April 28, 1825 — The Methodist meeting house, the first one of this denomination built in Dover, was dedicated this day.

May 2, 1854 — The "Dover Hotel," believed to be one of the oldest public houses in the State, was closed and converted into tenements.

April 26, 1999 — A Dover High School teacher, Sherrie Picardy, and student council president, Victoria Ervin, return to Dover after traveling to Littleton, Colo., after the Columbine High School massacre. They delivered condolence letters, posters, and maple syrup from Dover students to the memorials at Columbine. Picardy wanted to comfort the community and honor teacher Dave Sanders, who died protecting students. They attended a funeral service for victim Daniel Rohrbough. At Columbine, they placed Dover's tributes among thousands of others, feeling it was more meaningful to be part of the collective gesture of support for the grieving town.

Fifth and Grove Reconstruction Project neighborhood meeting Tuesday

City staff will hold a neighborhood meeting on the pending Fifth and Grove Reconstruction Project on Tuesday, April 30, at 6 p.m. at the Dover Police Station, 46 Chestnut St. The meeting will be held in the department's community room. Staff from the construction contractor, N. Granese & Sons., and the design engineering consultant, Woodard & Curran, will also be available to discuss the project and answer questions.

The project is scheduled to begin in May and continue through December, weather and other conditions permitting. Final paving will occur in 2025.

Part of the discussion will include the scope of the project, and how the project will impact the residents and businesses in the area. Most properties in the project area will be connected to a temporary water system to allow the replacement of the water main. There will be road closures (local traffic will retain access), and sections where on-street parking will be prohibited to allow excavation of the road to replace underground utilities.
