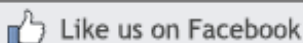

City of Dover cooling center open

Due to the weather, the City of Dover's cooling center, located in the McConnell Center cafeteria, is open today, Aug. 3, during regular McConnell Center hours, 7 a.m. to 9 p.m.

The cooling center can be accessed by using Door #3 at the McConnell Center and checking in at the Recreation Department front desk for directions.

A heat advisory is in effect for Dover until 7 p.m. today, according to the National Weather Service. A period of hot temperatures in the mid-90s is expected to continue into the evening. The combination of hot temperatures and high humidity will combine to create a situation in which heat illnesses are possible.

As the hot and humid weather continues, Fire Chief Eric Hagman reminds residents to check on elderly neighbors, stay indoors if possible during the hottest part of the day, wear light-colored clothing while outside, and stay hydrated by drinking plenty of fluids throughout the day. The combination of heat and high humidity can put people at risk of heat exhaustion and heat stroke.

People who work or exercise outside or in hot environments, and children attending summer camps or outdoor sports practices should take extra precautions.

To reduce risk during outdoor work, the Occupational Safety and Health Administration recommends scheduling frequent rest breaks in shaded or air conditioned environments. Anyone overcome by heat should be moved to a cool and shaded location. Heat stroke is an emergency: call 911.

Care of pets is also important throughout this weather. Make sure pets have plenty of water to drink and are not left unattended in vehicles, where the temperature can reach 120 degrees quickly.

Adopt-a-Trail helps keep Community Trail vibrant

The City of Dover and the Dover Community Trail Advisory Committee invite organizations, companies, and general trail lovers to participate in the new Adopt-a-Trail Section program. Volunteer adopters help maintain the beauty and function of the Dover Community Trail by removing litter, trimming overgrowth, and reporting maintenance concerns to the city. Adopters may be individuals, organizations, or civic groups and will be recognized with signage along the trail.

"The Community Trail is a gem in the City of Dover in large part due to the volunteers who assist in cleaning and maintaining the trail throughout the year," said Assistant City Planner Donna Benton.

The Dover Community Trail is a multi-use trail in Dover. It comprises of two sections: a paved urban section stretching three-quarters of a mile from the Transportation Center to Fisher Street, and a natural section two and a half miles long following the Cochecho River from Beckwith Ballfields to Watson Road. Opening in 2018 are further connections from Fisher Street to the corner of Central Avenue and Rutland Street, and from Fourth Street to the Beckwith Ballfields.

The Dover Community Trail Advisory Committee meets monthly at 5:30 p.m. in City Hall. The public is welcome to attend.

The network helps participating communities become great places for people of all ages by adopting features such as safe, walkable streets; better housing and transportation options; access to key services; and opportunities for residents to participate in civic and community activities.

"Well-designed, livable communities promote wellbeing, sustain economic growth, and make for happier, healthier residents of all ages, said AARP New Hampshire State Director Todd Fahey. "By becoming part of the network, Dover is making a commitment to do even more to improve livability in the city and involve older residents in the process."

"Dover is a community for all ages and appreciates the continuing contribution of our aging population segment that has made our city a great place to live and work," said Dover Mayor Karen Weston.

The AARP Network of Age-Friendly Communities targets improvements in eight domains that influence the health and quality of life for all as we age. Participating communities commit to improving their livability through an assessment of needs, development of an action plan, implementation of new projects and programs, and ongoing assessment.

The eight areas of focus for the age-friendly process are:

- Outdoor spaces and buildings: Availability of safe and accessible recreational facilities.
- Transportation: Safe and affordable models of private and public transportation.
- Housing: Availability of home modification programs for aging in place as well as a range of age-friendly housing options.
- Social participation: Access to leisure and cultural activities, including opportunities for older residents to socialize and engage with their peers as well as with younger people.
- Respect and social inclusion: Programs that promote ethnic and cultural diversity as well as

- multigenerational interaction and dialogue.
- Civic participation and employment: Paid work and volunteer activities for older residents and opportunities to engage in the formulation of policies relevant to their lives.
- Communication and information: Access to communications technology and other resources so older residents can connect with their community, friends and family.
- Community support and health services: Access to home-based care services, health clinics and programs that promote wellness and active aging.

The livability indicators are planned, implemented and progress assessed in three phases over a five-year period, with continued cycles of assessment and improvement thereafter.

Work begins to expand parking at Dover Public Library

Work is under way to add 11 public parking spaces at the Public Library. The new 30-minute spaces are intended to provide easier access for patrons making short visits to the Library and when parking can be difficult to find in the rear parking lot. The parking spaces will be located in front of the Library, directly across from the existing 30-minute parking spaces.

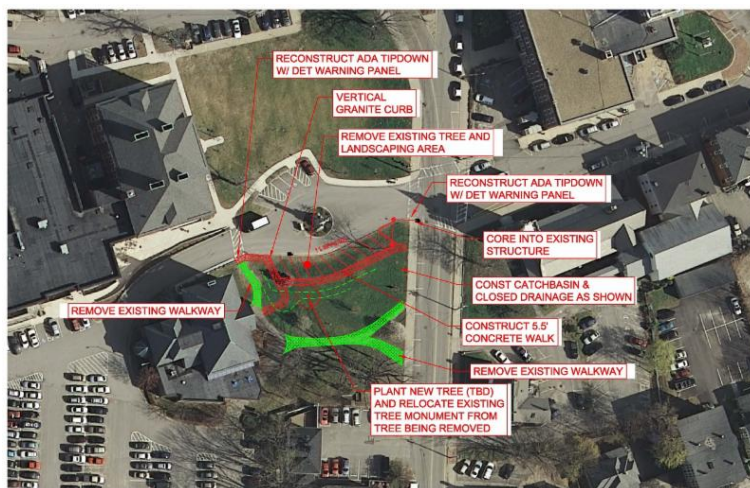
The work includes replacing and relocating the walkways in front of the Library, and new curbing to help manage drainage. The new walkway will also conform to Americans with Disabilities Act specifications.

Crews will repurpose much of the existing plants and landscaping. Because this work will remove existing pavement, useable space on the Library's front lawn is expected to increase, even with the additional parking.

The Parking Commission approved the plan for new parking spaces in June.

While the work continues in the coming weeks, pedestrian foot traffic may be diverted.

During this work, Glenwood Avenue will be closed to all through traffic, from Central Avenue to Whittier Street. Only local traffic to and from Smith Well Road, Plaza Drive, Northway Circle, and the Dover Center for Health and Rehabilitation will be permitted. All other traffic must seek alternate routes. Traffic diversions will be in effect utilizing Horne Street, Roosevelt Avenue, and Whittier Street.

THURSDAY, AUG. 9

- **Glenwood Avenue** (paving)

During this work, Glenwood Avenue will be closed to all through traffic, from Sixth Street to Whittier Street. Local traffic to and from Crestview Drive, Conifer Commons, Wilbrod Avenue and Alder Lane will be the only traffic permitted. All other traffic must seek alternate routes.

Expect traffic delays while paving operations are under way. See alternate routes, if possible.

Dover joins National Night Out on Tuesday, Aug. 7

Chief William M. Breault of the Dover Police Department is pleased to announce that the Dover Police Department will participate in National Night Out on Tuesday, Aug. 7, 2018 in Henry Law Park. The event will take place from 4:30 to 7:30 p.m. and is free to the public. National Night Out is a time for community members to meet with police officers, discuss issues, learn what the police do, and unite with the common goal of crime prevention.

The public will be able to see some of the specialized equipment and vehicles that the police use on a daily basis. These will include a police cruiser, the police motorcycle, the crime scene and mobile command vehicles along with our tactical rescue vehicle. Several officers including the mounted patrol and our K9 officer will be at the event and interacting with the public. National Night Out will also feature firefighters and fire apparatus

from the Dover Fire and Rescue Department.

"The Dover Police Department recognizes the importance of interacting with our community and the value of positive police-community partnerships," said Chief Breault.

"National Night Out is an excellent opportunity for police officers and community members to meet and interact so that on-going relationships can be formed allowing local residents to assist the police in solving community problems."

There will also be community organizations on hand to provide literature and other information related to health, safety, and wellness. Information on drug prevention, treatment and recovery resources, bike and seatbelt safety, violence prevention, and early childhood education will be available to the public through various booths at the event. There will also be food vendors on hand.

National Night Out is an annual community building campaign that promotes police-community partnerships to make our neighborhoods safer, better places to live. Dover's National Night Out is an opportunity for citizens to meet and engage with their first responders.

City of Dover seeks Ward 2 moderator

The City Clerk's Office is seeking a Ward 2 moderator. The moderator must be a registered voter of Ward 2.

The City Clerk's office provides training to all election workers.

The moderator is the chief election officer in charge of the polls at the ward level. The moderator is under the direction of the City Clerk, the city's chief election officer. The moderator is responsible for making certain that all the election officers are available on the day of the election and that each is familiar with their respective duties for the day. During the election day, the moderator is charged with maintaining order at the polling place. The City Clerk's Office provides technical and administrative assistance throughout the day.

Other duties during the election day process may include, but are not limited to, inspecting the checklists, inspecting the voting machines, aiding voters, maintaining order,

determining voter challenges, receiving and processing absentee ballots, closing the polls, processing the vote counts, determining legal ballots, reporting the voting results, securing the ballots, validating/signing documentation, and returning the materials, documentation and counted ballots to the City Clerk's office. The moderator may be asked to participate in any recount procedures that a candidate may request.

The next election is the State Primary on Tuesday, Sept. 11, 2018.

The goal of Hazardous Waste Collection Day is to allow for the proper disposal of household hazardous materials. Residents of the four communities can bring household hazardous waste to Community Services for safe disposal.

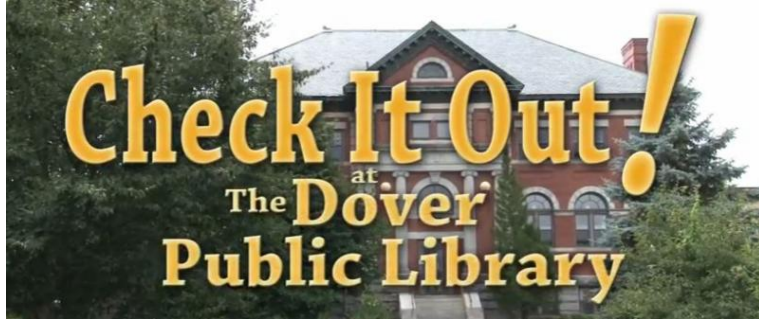
The following household waste will be accepted: fertilizer with acids; bathroom cleaners; brush cleaner; pesticides car waxes/polish; disinfectants; corrosives; fungicides; creosote; furniture polish paint/stain/finish; insect spray; driveway sealers/tar; metal polish (lead and oil based); lighter fluid; flea powder; mothballs; rust preventative; pest strips/traps; gasoline; oven cleaner; solvents; pesticides; radiator flush; photo chemicals; thinner/turpentine; poisons; roofing tar; rug cleaner; wood preservatives; pool chemicals; and wood strippers.

Empty containers are not hazardous. Please dispose of them in your regular trash.

Explosives, asbestos, latex paint, oil (new or used) and antifreeze will not be accepted.

Proof of residency is required.

The following events are recorded in "Notable Events in the History of Dover, New Hampshire: From the First Settlement in 1623 to 1865," by George Wadleigh, and several other historical sources.

For more on the history of Dover, settled in 1623 and the oldest permanent settlement in New Hampshire and seventh oldest in the country, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street; and the Woodman Museum, Central Avenue. Aug. 5, 1793 - Last Wednesday evening, at 8 o'clock a fiery meteor of uncommon size was seen in Dover. Its apparent diameter when first observed was small but increased until it appeared larger than the sun.



Aug. 7, 1826 - A very heavy thunder shower, during which the house of Moses Hodgdon, Esq. on Silver street, was struck by lightning. A beautiful sycamore tree in front of the house received the electric fluid, an immense body of which ran down the trunk, ripping off the bark, a portion of the lightning entering the house by a limb of the tree. The house of Mr. John Evans, about 50 rods distant, was struck at the same instant: a man was struck to the floor, but recovered in a few minutes. About the same time, a barn belonging to Mr. Benjamin Kielle, about 2 1/2 miles from the village, was struck and considerably injured.



Aug. 8, 1828 - "Dover Society for the promotion of Temperance" formed - the members pledging themselves to abstain entirely from the use of ardent spirits, except for medicinal purposes - the first Society of the kind in the town.



Aug. 3, 1829 - James G. Avery, a young man in the employ of the Cocheco Manufacturing Company, fell from the Dry House, a distance of about 40 feet, surviving the accident but a few hours.



Aug. 4, 1858 - The City Council appointed a committee to confer with the Cocheco Manufacturing Co. respecting a lease to the city of their land on Cochecho river, known as the "Grove," for a public park, the city to lay out walks and ornament it with shrubbery, etc.

located at 182 Central Ave. The Architectural Tour of historic buildings features information about construction, architectural techniques, and the historic significance of those who built or occupied these buildings, the earliest of which was constructed in 1785.

Dover's water quality reports available online

Each year, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) requires community water systems to deliver a Consumer Confidence Report -- also known as an Annual Drinking Water Quality Report -- to their customers. These reports, which are mailed out to water customers by July 1, provide information about their drinking water quality including a summary of detected contaminants from the previous year, compliance, and educational information.

Dover Fire and Rescue offering free smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors

The City of Dover Fire and Rescue is partnering with the New Hampshire Fire Marshal to provide free smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors to the city's most vulnerable populations. The program is possible through a FEMA Fire Prevention and Safety Grant.

The grant program, Get Alarmed New Hampshire, is a carbon monoxide and smoke alarm distribution, installation and education program. The program targets owner-occupied homes with children five years of age and under, adults 60 years of age and older, or people living with a hearing impairment or disability.

Carbon monoxide and smoke alarms save lives. On average, seven people die every day from a home fire. When a fire starts in a home, there may be as little as two minutes to escape. Carbon monoxide (CO) is the silent killer. It is a colorless, odorless, tasteless gas. Alarms are your best defense to keep you and your family safe.

Along with providing and installing free state-of-the-art detectors, fire and CO safety education will be provided to residents receiving these detectors. This education includes information about how an alarm works, how to test and maintain the alarms, what to do when they sound and general home safety, prevention and awareness.

Dover Fire and Rescue is committed to fire prevention, fire safety and fire education for all ages and demographics through a variety programs. The Get Alarmed NH program will help educate and protect the owner-occupied homes of our most vulnerable populations.

Program eligibility requirements:

- Single family owner-occupied homes
- Families with child/children under the age of five
- Adults over the age of 60
- Disability or hearing impaired
