City Council and School Board to hold joint fiscal meeting Wednesday

School Board meets Monday for third budget workshop

The City Council and School Board will meet jointly on Wednesday, Dec. 6, to discuss the development of the fiscal year 2025 budget and receive a preliminary calculation of the FY2025 tax cap.

The joint meeting begins at 7 p.m. in Room 305 at the McConnell Center. <u>Click here</u> for the complete agenda.

The School Board is in the process of creating its FY2025 budget, which is due to the City Manager by Jan. 15, 2024. The School Board met on Nov. 27 for its second budget workshop, where school principals and department directors discussed the changes to the non-wage portions of the School Department's proposed FY2025 budget. The School Board's budget discussions will continue on Monday, Dec. 4 at 6 p.m. in School Board Chambers, Room 306, of the McConnell Center.

Both meetings will be televised on Channel 22 and online at https://dovernh.viebit.com, where they will also be available for on-demand viewing.

Capital Improvements Program presented to City Council and Planning Board

First public hearing slated for Wednesday

City Manager J. Michael Joyal, Jr., presented the proposed Fiscal Year 2025-2030 Capital Improvements Program (CIP) during a joint session of the Dover City Council and Planning Board on Wednesday, Nov. 29. The CIP, a crucial element of Dover's community planning, aligns with the city's Master Plan, focusing on infrastructure investments reflective of Dover's goals and values.

The six-year CIP outlines significant capital expenditures over \$25,000 with a useful life of three years or more. This includes ongoing projects like street and sidewalk improvements, maintenance and upgrades to water and wastewater systems, procurement of police cruisers, and facility maintenance.

The detailed CIP document is <u>accessible online</u> and available in hard copy at City Hall and the Dover Public Library. Additionally, the joint workshop is <u>available for viewing online</u> and on Channel 22. An informational video, "Understanding the CIP," can also be found on the <u>CIP webpage</u>.

The CIP was the topic of the Nov. 28 episode of the Dover Download podcast, which can be found on the <u>CIP webpage</u> or most podcast services.

Public hearings are scheduled to ensure community participation and feedback. These will occur on Dec. 6 at 6:30 p.m. in Room 305 of the McConnell Center, and on Dec. 12 and Dec. 13 at 7 p.m. in Council Chambers. The Planning Board may vote on the CIP on Dec. 12, with recommendations forwarded to the City Council. The Council is expected to vote

on the CIP on Dec. 13, following the public hearing.

The adopted CIP's first year will be incorporated into the proposed citywide operating budget, presented to the City Council early next year.

City Council to hold public hearing, vote on proposed stormwater utility on Dec. 13

On Wednesday, Dec. 13, the City Council will hold a public hearing followed by a possible vote on a proposed ordinance to create a stormwater and flood resilience utility.

The City Council held a workshop on the proposed ordinance, entitled Municipal Stormwater Utility, on Nov. 15, where city staff and consultants reviewed all aspects of the stormwater utility, including the need for the ordinance, how it would work, the utility fee structure, and available credit options. The presentation also included the work and findings of the Council's ad-hoc stormwater funding committee.

The Council held a first reading of the proposed ordinance at its Nov. 8 meeting.

A video of the Nov. 15 workshop, presentation slides, the proposed ordinance, and all other stormwater-related documents are available on the city's Stormwater Management webpage. Information on this page includes but is not limited to how a stormwater utility would work and its need, a link to frequently asked questions, and prior presentation materials.

As currently proposed, the stormwater utility would begin on July 1, 2024, the beginning of the city's 2025 fiscal year.

The meeting will begin at 7 p.m. in City Hall's Council Chambers. It will be televised on Channel 22 and available for on-demand viewing at https://dovernh.viebit.com.

The 14th annual Dover Festival of Trees will take place tonight, on Friday, Dec. 1, from 4 to 8 p.m. at the Rivermill at Dover Landing. The event is free and open to the public.

The festival will feature more than 35 elaborate trees sponsored and decorated by local businesses, all available to be taken home through silent and live auction or raffle drawings. The event also includes live choir performances, free goodie bags for kids (sponsored by Mr. Electric), a scavenger hunt for kids (sponsored by Breezeline), refreshments and holiday desserts (sponsored by Doyle & Coffin and Cleveland Waters & Bass, P.A.) and even a visit from Santa (sponsored by Hammond Lumber Company). Filing period for vacant Ward 4 state representative seat is next week

The filing period to fill the state representative seat representing Dover Ward 4, Lee, and Madbury is next week.

The filing period is from Monday, Dec. 4 through Friday, Dec. 8, 2023, with a Primary Election on Tuesday, Jan. 23, 2024, and a General Election on Tuesday, March 12, 2024, New Hampshire Secretary of State David M. Scanlan announced Thursday. The special election is to fill the seat of Stafford District 11 after the recent death of Rep. Hoy Robert

Menear of Lee.

Candidates may file to run for the election at the Secretary of State's office, located in Room 204 of the State House, 104 N. Main St., Concord. Candidates may file with their local clerk's office on Monday, Dec. 4, and Tuesday, Dec. 5. The Dover City Clerk's office is located in the Customer Service Center on the ground floor of Dover City Hall, 288 Central Ave. in Dover.

If only one candidate files for either of the recognized political parties, the Primary Election will not be held, and the General Election will be held on Tuesday, Jan. 23, 2024.



The following events are from various historical records, sources, and texts about the history of Dover.

For more on the history of Dover, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street, and the Woodman Museum on Central Avenue. The Public Library also maintains an online collection of historical information <u>located here</u>.

Dec. 4, 1656 — Mr. Valentine Hill and "one or two more" men appointed a committee to run the line between Dover and Exeter. Mr. Hill also had permission to turn part of the water of the Lamprey River into Oyster River for the supply of his mills.


Dec. 3, 1701 — Commissioners were appointed by the Council to run the lines between the several towns of the Province and to "make good and sufficient bound trees or bound marks" — the Dover commissioners consisting of Capt. John Tuttle, Lt. James Davis, and Lt. William Furber.

Dec. 2, **1860** — The First Congregational Chapel on Central Street was dedicated on this day.

Dec. 1, 1905 — A fire broke out in the basement at the Cochecho Mills on this day. Dover fire crews responded, extinguishing the stubborn blaze with significant water. The fire destroyed thousands of yards of cloth and caused smoke damage to some of the upper levels.

Dec. 5, 1996 — The Strafford County Commission unanimously voted on this day to create a 20-person committee to address overcrowding issues at the county jail. The jail, which then had a capacity of 150 inmates, was nearly double its maximum with almost 300 inmates, forcing officials to house maximum-security prisoners in medium-security cells. The bipartisan committee comprising legislators, police chiefs, judges, jail officials and community members would be tasked with studying trends in incarceration and sentencing as well as potential solutions like electronic monitoring, as well as estimating costs of any proposed fixes for the overcrowded jail. The Strafford County Delegation

rejected plans to expand the jail in 1999. A new plan to expand the jail was approved in 2001, which broke ground the following year and was completed in phases over the next three years.

Dover Chamber welcomes SEH Studios Art

SEH Studios Art is the gallery space of local New Hampshire artist Susan E. Hanna. The studio has recently moved to a larger location at 456 Central Ave. in Dover, with the new space featuring two galleries and classroom space.

Hanna is a self-taught artist who lives and works in New Hampshire, whose work has been exhibited widely in New Hampshire, with additional shows in Massachusetts and Maine. After working in other fields, Ms. Hanna decided to pursue her passion for painting full-time and pursue art as her career. She generally works with oil paints, specializing in depicting outdoor scenes. In addition to working on traditional canvas, Ms. Hanna is also known for painting on copper or aluminum panels.

"I see beauty in mundane scenes," explains Hanna. "In landscapes, ocean scenes, or holiday lights sparkling along a city street, I want viewers to see the serenity and beauty I experience when I paint."
