

# NH Schoolyard Action Grant applications now being accepted

Are you an educator with a project idea that involves students in enhancing their schoolyard for wildlife habitat, connects them with the outdoors, and integrates nature into learning that aligns with curricula? The New Hampshire Partnership for Schoolyard Action is now accepting grant applications for schools with students from pre-kindergarten through grade twelve to help fund nature-based learning projects.

Schoolyard Action Grant applications are being accepted through Jan. 31, 2020. Grants are typically awarded in amounts of up to \$1,500. The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service New England Field Office, New Hampshire Project Learning Tree, the New Hampshire Fish and Game Department, and New Hampshire Audubon have partnered to support Granite State schools through the New Hampshire Partnership for Schoolyard Action Grants. This partnership was created to make it easier for educators to apply for a grant to enhance their school yards to support nature-based studies. The common grant application works for all four of the partner organizations and greatly simplifies the application process.

Examples of projects that have been funded by the partner organizations in the past include the establishment of pollinator gardens, the creation of outdoor learning areas, installing solar-powered bird baths, and replanting of school grounds with native plants that enhance wildlife habitat. Other types of projects eligible for support include trail or pond creation, citizen science activities, and bird feeding or watering stations.

Projects or items not eligible for funding include vegetable gardens, staff time, field trips, school grounds landscaping, or purchase of educational supplies unless they are directly related to the project.

This year recipients of awarded grants also have the opportunity to receive technical assistance from a NH Fish and Game wildlife biologist to find local seed and plant sources, learn planting techniques, and connect schools with national pollinator and monarch projects. Schools interested in planting common milkweed for monarchs will also be able to receive up to 20 free plants for their project. This technical assistance is made possible by the New England Forests and Rivers Fund at the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation.

Both student and community involvement in planning and on-

site work is strongly encouraged. Professional consultation is available for project planning.




# Dover High School qualifies for wild card spot on Granite State Challenge

The following events are recorded in "Notable Events in the History of Dover, New Hampshire: From the First Settlement in 1623 to 1865," by George Wadleigh, and several other historical sources.

For more on the history of Dover, settled in 1623 and the oldest permanent settlement in New Hampshire and seventh oldest in the country, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street; and the Woodman Museum, Central Avenue. The Public Library also maintains an online collection of historical information, located here.



**Dec. 15, 1712** - The town voted that a sufficient boom should be erected over Cochecho river, (above the lower falls, probably) and that bridges should be built over Bellamy and Oyster rivers, and also voted 20 pounds towards the building of

a boom over the Lamprey "for passage of man and horse till further order."



Dec. 15, 1729 - Capt. Paul Gerrish presented a petition signed by near three score of the principal men in Dover praying an order to rectify some abuses suffered by Dover Town Book of Records by the fault of the late Town Clerk, as they apprehend. Whereupon it was voted, "That the clerk of the said town of Dover for the time being be hereby prohibited entering any old Committee Grants that are suspected not to be legally obtained and to enter only such grants as have been or may be allowed by said Town or the selectmen thereof until the next sitting of the General Assembly and that there be a committee chosen by the General Assembly to go to the Town Clerk for the time being who is hereby required to show unto such Committee such entrys, matters and things as he or any of the said Town suppose to be done by ill practice, and the said Committee shall by virtue hereof summon before them all such persons that can give any light in explaining any matters or things which they may see occasion to examine into for discovering the truth and detecting such vile practices and to give such person or persons their oaths, and to make return of their doings therein to the General Assembly next session, and that Nathaniel Wear, Esq. and Theo. Atkinson, Esq. be a committee of this House to join such as shall be appointed above for that end and that the Petitioners pay the charges.




**Dec. 13, 1790** - A committee was appointed to remonstrate against the division of the County of Strafford, by the setting off of Dover, Durham, Lee, Madbury and Somersworth to the County of Rockingham, a plan which was agitated at this time.



**Dec. 17, 1803** - Notice is given of the organization of the Strafford Bank, the first established in town. Subscribers to the stock are notified by William King Atkinson, President, that one hundred dollars on each share will become due on the fourth Tuesday of January, and that "one fourth part at least, and as much more as may be convenient, will be expected in gold and silver, and the residue in bills of the banks of Massachusetts."



**Dec. 16, 1835** - The coldest day on record for many years. The thermometer at noon was 13 degrees below zero.

# Know what's "In the Bin": How to keep your your recycling clear of contamination

The City of Dover and Pinard Waste would like to remind residents that only the items listed below should go in your household recycling bin:

- **Metal:** Food and beverage cans.
- Glass: Bottles and jars.
- Plastic: Bottles, jars, jugs and tubs.
- Paper and Cardboard: Mixed paper, newspaper, magazines and boxes.

When we recycle properly, materials can get to their next best use, which helps protect the environment by conserving natural resources, saving energy and reducing greenhouse gas emissions. Placing



items in recycling bins that are not recyclable such as Styrofoam, light bulbs, plastic flower pots and bags, contaminates the entire load and sends it to a landfill. It's important to know when an item is not recyclable and to place it in the trash. Follow these simple recycling guidelines:

- 1. Recycle all bottles, cans and paper.
- 2. Keep items clean and dry.
- 3. No plastic bags of any kind.

Not sure if an item is recyclable? When in doubt, visit <a href="https://www.recyclesmartma.org/">https://www.recyclesmartma.org/</a>. Enter the item name and click search.

Knowing what's "In the Bin" can help avoid contaminated loads of recycling, which are being rejected at processing centers and disposed as trash. These contaminated loads of recycling result in additional charges to the city.
