School Board to continue budget deliberations Jan. 4

The School Board scheduled its fourth budget workshop for Wednesday, Jan. 4, 2023, to continue its deliberations as the board prepares to adopt its budget for fiscal year 2024.

The School Board held its third budget workshop on Dec. 19, reviewing enrollment data and considering reallocating staffing positions in its schools based on enrollment trends.

Storm continues to bear down with strong winds and heavy rain

A strong storm system that began Thursday night, bringing heavy rains and strong winds, continues today, Friday, Dec. 23. Today's warmer temperatures will be followed by subfreezing temperatures tonight.

Widespread flooding is possible given the combination of rainfall and snowmelt. The rain will fall on frozen ground which will increase runoff and could produce flash flooding. The snowpack along the coastal plains will be significantly reduced if not completely melted out.

The National Weather Service has issued a High Wind Warning for Dover, which remains in effect through 2 a.m. Saturday, Dec. 24. NWS forecasts southeast winds from 25 to 35 miles per hour, with wind gusts up to 70 mph. Much of the wind will occur during the day today. Damaging winds will blow down trees and power lines, with widespread power outages expected, according to the NWS. Travel will be difficult, especially for high-profile vehicles.

To report an outage to Eversource, call 1-800-662-7764.

As a reminder, do not touch downed power lines, and treat all lines as live. Call Dover Emergency Dispatch at 603-742-4646 to report downed lines within the city.

A Flood Watch is also in effect for Dover through 7 a.m. Saturday, Dec. 24. According to the NWS, flash, urban, and small stream flooding is expected from widespread heavy rain and snowmelt. Excessive runoff may result in flooding of rivers, streams, and other low-lying and flood-prone locations. Travel in and out of the region could be disrupted due to flooding.

Use caution with generators

Generators can be helpful when the power goes out; however, it is critical to know how to use them safely to prevent carbon monoxide poisoning and other hazards. Each year, an average of 430 people in the country die from unintentional carbon monoxide poisoning

"Always use generators outside, away from doors, windows, and vents," said Fire Chief McShane. "Never use generators inside buildings or partially enclosed areas, even with ventilation."

Other tips include:

- Make sure to install carbon monoxide alarms in your home. Follow manufacturer's instructions for correct placement and mounting height.
- Turn off generators and let them cool down before refueling. Never refuel a generator while it is hot.
- Store fuel for the generator in a container that is intended for the purpose and is correctly labeled as such. Store the containers outside of living areas.

Due to the weather, SOS Recovery Community Organization has opened its offices today to provide a warm and dry space throughout the day. SOS is located at 4 Broadway, Dover, and 14 Signal St., Rochester. SOS is operating the Warming Center.

Chestnut Street bridge to close Jan. 3

Bridge to reopen by May 19 at the latest

The Chestnut Street bridge will close to all traffic on Tuesday, Jan. 3, 2023, to allow a contractor to rehabilitate the 47-year-old bridge. The bridge will open to two lanes of traffic and at least one pedestrian sidewalk by Friday, May 19, 2023.

Chestnut Street vehicular traffic will be detoured via Washington Street, Third and Fourth streets, Central Avenue and Main Street. Any one-way side streets will retain their one-way travel.

The pedestrian path that travels underneath the Chestnut Street bridge is expected to remain open except for a few days at the beginning and end of the project as contractors mobilize.

The project consists of removing the pavement, membrane and sidewalks on the bridge, repairing deteriorated concrete in the bridge deck, reconstructing the bridge sidewalks, and installing a new bridge membrane, new bridge pavement and new wearing-course pavement.


Earlier this month, the City Council awarded a \$2.1 million bid for rehabilitating the Chestnut Street bridge to New England Infrastructures, LLC. The Transportation Advisory Commission reviewed and approved the bridge closure plan at its May 23, 2022, meeting.

Respiratory illnesses on the rise, including influenza and Covid-19

Wash hands and stay home when sick to slow the spread

Fire Chief Michael McShane, who serves as the city's Emergency Management Director, reminds the public that respiratory illnesses are rising, including influenza (flu), common colds,


and Covid-19. With the winter holidays, there are more public gatherings, providing more opportunities for these illnesses to spread with ease.

McShane urges the public to use common sense and remember that respiratory illnesses, such as colds, flu and Covid-19, spread the same way.

"Wash your hands," McShane said. "Cover your mouth when you cough. Stay home if you feel sick, and wear a mask if you must interact with others."

McShane said those who have had fevers should not return to a public setting until they've been without a fever for 24 hours without using fever-reducing medication.

"The more diligent we are in taking care of ourselves, the better we will come out of this flu season without taxing our health care system," McShane said.

The following events are from a variety of historical records, sources and texts about the history of Dover.

For more on the history of Dover, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street, and the Woodman Museum on Central Avenue. The Public Library also maintains an online collection of historical information <u>located here</u>.

Dec. 25, 1692 — "A doeful and tremendous noise was affirmed to be heard in the air nigh Capt. Gerrish's garrison, which continued with a little intermission near half an hour."

Dec. 23, 1757 — Samuel Heard of Dover, a soldier in the Crown Point Expedition, in Col. Nathaniel Meserve's regiment, having represented to the Assembly his indigent circumstances and his not being able to subsist himself by reason of the loss of his leg in May 1756, and the late grant made him by the government being spent, it was voted that he be allowed the sum of 30 pounds, to be delivered him as occasion may require, by Capt. Thomas Waldron.

Dec. 26, 1812 — John Wheeler notified the proprietors of the Dover Cotton Factory to meet at Mrs. Lydia Tibbetts' home on the 19th of January, 1813, at 5 p.m. for the purpose of organizing under their act of incorporation. The "Dover Cotton Factory," which was incorporated this year, with a capital of \$50,000, was the first attempt at manufacturing on an extensive scale in the town. As the lower falls were supposed to be fully occupied with the saw and grist mills, the first

Factory was built two miles up the river and was long known as the Upper Factory. Like most new enterprises it was but moderately successful to its projectors. John Williams was agent of the corporation.

Dec. 30, 1996 — A new million dollar traffic intersection in Dover, formerly the Weeks Traffic Circle, is completed this year and renamed Weeks Crossing.

Dec. 25, 2002 — A Christmas Day storm drops more than a foot of snow on Dover.

Demand for COAST service grows

Ridership on COAST's fixed route and advance reservation demand response services grew by 7.6% over their past fiscal year (October 2021 through September 2022). This despite providing significantly less fixed-route service due to ongoing service suspensions implemented earlier in 2022. This demonstrates that despite reduced service options demand is increasing. Luckily the tide is turning for COAST and they have been incrementally lifting suspensions through the fall.

During the final quarter of FY22, COAST's average weekday fixed route ridership was at its highest level since March 2020. This is a key ridership measure that has thus far continued into the first part of FY23. Over the past year fixed route ridership grew by 6.6%. It is hoped that when service suspensions are lifted, which has slowly been happening through the fall, ridership will grow proportionately but that may also take some time.

Ridership on COAST's demand response services, generally targeted to older adults and individuals living with disabilities, grew 21.4% over the previous year and has been hovering just below or at pre-pandemic ridership levels over the past few months. Prior to 2020, these services had been seeing the strongest ridership growth and it appears that trend is beginning again.

COAST's recently approved FY23 operating budget was developed with the goals of rebuilding their workforce and resuming more suspended services. The budget included notable wage increases that should significantly increase COAST's competitiveness in the highly competitive job market for bus operators, including the addition of a second shift pay differential.

"With significant improvements to bus operator wages and benefits, COAST expects to be able to rebuild our workforce on the timeline we have established. We have already seen a significant uptick in applicants through referrals from our own employees," said Rad Nichols, COAST Executive Director. "At this point we are planning on lifting more service suspensions in mid-January as in the last few weeks we have successfully hired and are now training a number of new staff."

Nichols commented, "We have done this for years, and always to the surprise of those who are generously donating these tickets to area nonprofits."



Trees can be placed in the brush pile.


