The School Board will hold its fourth budget workshop on Wednesday, Jan. 4, 2023, and continue deliberations as the board prepares to adopt a budget for fiscal year 2024.

The School Board's last budget workshop included a review of enrollment data and the possibility of reallocating staffing positions in the schools based on enrollment trends.

Barrington fourth grader gathers donations at school for Willand Warming Center

Benjamin Deely, a fourth-grader at Barrington Elementary School, recently delivered several boxes of donated goods to the Willand Warming Center, the result of a donation drive at his school.

According to Ben, the idea came to him over Thanksgiving dinner. He said his mom, Laura, asked everyone around the table, if they could only receive one gift this holiday season, what would it be?

"My grandma went first," Ben said. "She said she wanted donations for the warming shelter." Ben's grandmother, Wendy Whittle, is a volunteer at the Willand Warming Center.

Ben said he raced upstairs, grabbed a \$5 bill from his wallet and set it down on the table. When he returned to school after the Thanksgiving holiday, he said he asked to speak to Barrington Elementary School Principal Rich Boardman about starting a donation drive at the school.

According to Ben's mother, Laura Deely, Boardman is a strong proponent of empowering and engaging students, and quickly supported the idea. Boardman and Ben met several times to coordinate the project, which aimed to collect socks, hand warmers, hot chocolate packets and paper goods. Ben's friends helped decorate boxes that were displayed in the school lobby. It didn't take long for the boxes to fill up.

Ben and his family, including his grandmother, delivered the donations to the warming center on Friday, Dec. 23.

"We really appreciate Ben's donations," said Tory Jennison, Population Health Systems Chief for Strafford County. "His project showed his school community how one person can have a huge impact on the comfort and safety of others."

Jennison added that community support for the most vulnerable comes in many forms, including food and basic necessities.

"Ben's help is part of a wonderful family effort; we're grateful for the friendly kindness his grandmother Wendy brings every time she volunteers," Jennison said. "This donation drive was a great example of the power that each one of us has to make a positive difference. We thank Ben and his family for their giving spirit in support of our vulnerable folks this holiday season."

The Warming Center of Strafford County is located at 30 Willand Drive in Somersworth, and operates as needed through winter. Strafford County, through a partnership with the cities of Dover, Somersworth and Rochester, has contracted with SOS Community Recovery Organization to operate the warming center this season.

Master Plan panel seeks public feedback on their 'one wish for Dover's future'

Survey part of community outreach for updating the Master Plan's Vision Chapter

The Planning Board's Master Plan subcommittee is working on updating the Master Plan's Visioning Chapter and has a one question survey for the public: "What is your one wish for Dover's future?"

Survey feedback is part of community outreach the Vision Chapter Steering Committee will conduct over the coming months as it works to update the chapter. The steering committee, appointed by the Planning Board chair, selected "Distinctly Dover: A Community Vision for 2035" as the chapter's title.

The survey is <u>available here</u>. Your one wish for Dover's future could be a specific feature, event, or overall quality; anything that you feel would contribute to a future that is Distinctly Dover.

The city's Master Plan is its strategic plan and is used to shape city and policy decisions. It doesn't include rules and regulations; instead, it forms the basis for developing rules and regulations and providing direction for capital investment and long-term budget priorities. In Dover, every ten years or so, the Master Plan's chapters or elements have been reviewed and updated, usually with one chapter reviewed and updated each year.

The Vision Chapter is the plan's first chapter used to capture the long-term view of the city and serves as a foundation on which all of the remaining chapters of the Master Plan are created. Updates on the project, and opportunities to provide feedback, will be posted on the dedicated Distinctly Dover <u>project webpage</u>.

Chestnut Street bridge to close Tuesday

The Chestnut Street bridge will close to all traffic on Tuesday, Jan. 3, 2023, to allow a contractor to rehabilitate the 47-year-old bridge. The bridge will open to two lanes of traffic and at least one pedestrian sidewalk by Friday, May 19, 2023.

Chestnut Street vehicular traffic will be detoured via Washington Street, Third and Fourth streets, Central Avenue and Main Street. Any one-way side streets will retain their one-way travel.

The pedestrian path that travels underneath the Chestnut Street bridge is expected to remain open except for a few days at the beginning and end of the project as contractors mobilize.

The project consists of removing the pavement, membrane and sidewalks on the bridge, repairing deteriorated concrete in the bridge deck, reconstructing the bridge sidewalks, and installing a new bridge membrane, new bridge pavement and new wearing-course pavement.


Earlier this month, the City Council awarded a \$2.1 million bid for rehabilitating the Chestnut Street bridge to New England Infrastructures, LLC. The Transportation Advisory Commission reviewed and approved the bridge closure plan at its May 23, 2022, meeting.

All holiday wrapping paper must go into regular trash to avoid contaminating paper recycling, per the rules of the city's contracted waste provider, Waste Management. The contractor will not accept any holiday wrapping paper left at the curbside for recycling.

Many holiday gift-wrapping items are not recyclable; if they contaminate other recyclable items, it may cause the recycling bin contents to be disposed of in the landfill.

Tips for trash and recycling pickup

Community Services Director John Storer reminds the public of the following trash and recycling regulations:

- All trash for pickup is required to be wholly contained in Dover trash bags, secured and tied;
- 15-gallon bags have a 20-pound limit;
- 30-gallon bags have a 35-pound limit;
- All recycling is to be contained in Dover recycling bins;

- Cardboard must be broken down and flat;
- Recycling plastics are limited to #1, #2 and #5;
- Bulky waste, such as furniture, toilets, mattresses, box springs, couches, chairs, and other large, nonmetal items, must have a Dover bulky tag to be picked up. Bulky tags are available where Dover trash bags are sold;
- Owners are responsible for cleaning up any remaining debris from trash pickup.

The following events are from a variety of historical records, sources and texts about the history of Dover.

For more on the history of Dover, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street, and the Woodman Museum on Central Avenue. The Public Library also maintains an online collection of historical information located here.

- Jan. 4, 1835 The coldest morning observed for many years occurred on this day when the thermometer plummeted to 28 degrees below zero.
- Jan. 6, 1850 Jeremiah Stickney, aged 85, died this day. He was the first person to introduce the manufacturing of cotton and woolen hand cards in Dover, having established the business here as early as 1798. For years he employed many people, principally children, in the manufacturing of cards, the teeth of which were then set by hand. The manufacturing of cards by machinery, the invention of which was introduced about 1820, superseded the old process. and Stickney gave up the business.
- Jan. 6, 1862 Fire broke out in the wooden stores on Central Street, near Orchard Street, known as Marston's block. The fire originated in the D.N. Wendell Trunk and Harness shop, most likely from a stove. The weather was extremely cold, near zero, and several of the hand engines froze after a short time in operation. Tenants in the building had to be evacuated. They included Levi Brown's shoe store, a dentist, Dr. P.A. Stackpole, tailor and merchant Alexander Frazier, R. Palmers shoe shop, D. Lothrop & Co. druggists, Miss E.A. Horne, dressmaker, Mrs. Shepard's Boarding house, and Dr. Lindsey, amongst others. Frank Freeman's oyster house was the only one left in a condition to be occupied. (Dover Public Library)
- Jan. 8, 1863 Charles H. Flanders of Dover, a soldier in Co. K, 11th Regiment, who died of wounds received at the battle of Fredericksburg, was buried with military honors by the Strafford Guards.
- Jan. 3, 1932 Fire destroyed both Morrill blocks in Franklin Square. Twenty six businesses were destroyed. The blaze required fireman from as far away as Haverhill, Massachusetts, and burned so hotly that the sprinkler system in the Strand Theater was set off. Time to renew dog licenses

Dog licenses for 2023 are now available. All dogs must be licensed by April 30, 2023 to avoid a late fee. The cost for a male or female dog is \$10, a neutered male or spayed female dog is \$7.50 and puppies (3-7 months) are \$7.50 for first licensing.

Residents 65 years of age or older may license one dog for \$3, per household. Additional licenses require regular fees.

The City Clerk's office requires proof of rabies information and a certificate of spaying or neutering sent by email to s.mistretta@dover.nh.gov or by mail to City of Dover, City' Clerk's Office, 288 Central Ave., Dover, NH 03820.


Late fees of \$1 a month begin June 1, 2023.
