# Utility infrastructure installation continues at city's waterfront site

A city contractor continues the installation of utility infrastructure on the waterfront development site on River Street. The utility work includes stormwater, water and sewer utilities as well as duct banks for future electrical utilities.

Workers have also cleared shoreline vegetation in preparation for the shoreline stabilization work needed before the buildings and park can be constructed. With most of the waterfront site now cleared, crews can be seen grading the site according to the contract plans.

The first part of the project is public improvements, including constructing a new street system for site access and establishing necessary utilities for the upcoming buildings. The project includes a new 3.4-acre public riverfront park, shoreline stabilization, site grading for projected sea-level rise, and a new stormwater management system with green infrastructure.

One priority for the contractor is readying pad site C, where private developer Cathartes plans to begin its work next year. The development plan includes three mixed-use buildings, two multi-family buildings, and three clusters of townhouses. Approved by the Planning Board in June 2022, the waterfront

Thursday, Saturday: 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. development aims to revitalize the Dover waterfront and introduce approximately 26,000 square feet of commercial space and 418 residential units, comprising both rental and condominium units for sale.

# Public hearing, vote on CIP before City Council on Wednesday

#### Planning Board to also hold public hearing on CIP Tuesday

The City Council will consider adopting the FY2025-2030 Capital Improvements Program at Wednesday's Council meeting.

The CIP adoption includes three votes: one on the six-year plan itself, followed by authorization for appropriations for FY2025 CIP projects, including authorization for bonding and funding non-debt financed projects. The six-year CIP outlines significant capital expenditures over \$25,000 with a useful life of three years or more. This includes ongoing projects like street and sidewalk improvements, maintenance and upgrades to water and wastewater systems, procurement of police cruisers, and facility maintenance. The detailed CIP document is accessible online and available in hard copy at City Hall and the Dover Public Library. The Planning Board will also hold a public hearing on the CIP at its Tuesday, Dec. 12, meeting.

Also on the Council's agenda is public hearings followed by votes on whether the Council should accept and expend a \$120,000 InvestNH Municipal Per Unit Grant provided by the state, provide additional appropriation for the FY2024 fleet maintenance fund, and whether the City Council should enact a stormwater and flood resilience utility (see more about the utility in next article below).

Other items on the agenda include FY2025 budget guidance, awarding construction management service to the Dover Public Library for planned renovations, authorizing the replacement of the library's boilers, awarding the bid to a firm to help update the Conservation and Open Space Chapter of the Master Plan, and whether to recognize traditional foraging rights on the city's public conservation lands.

# Public hearing, possible vote on proposed stormwater utility on City Council Agenda

On Wednesday, Dec. 13, the City Council will hold a public hearing followed by a possible vote on a proposed ordinance to create a stormwater and flood resilience utility.

Currently, funding for stormwater infrastructure is through the city's general fund. Under the current funding approach, 55% of the property tax revenue used to fund the city's stormwater costs comes from residential property owners though these properties account for only 25% of the city's impervious cover area. If enacted, the proposed stormwater and flood resilience utility fee would be based on the amount



of impervious cover area per parcel, to more accurately reflect each parcel's impact or contribution to the municipal stormwater system maintenance, water quality protection and flood resilience needs. The stormwater utility would affect all properties within the city, including residential, commercial, government and non-profit-owned properties.

One key aspect of the utility is the fee credit system to encourage and financially incentivize property owners to implement various stormwater management practices on their property via various credit options which reduces the property owner's utility fee and reduces the stormwater management burden that Dover may have to do city-wide.

The City Council <u>held a workshop</u> on the proposed ordinance, entitled Municipal Stormwater Utility, on Nov. 15, where city staff and consultants reviewed all aspects of the stormwater utility, including the need for the ordinance, how it would work, the utility fee structure, and available credit options. The presentation also included the work and findings of the Council's ad-hoc stormwater funding committee. The Council held a first reading of the proposed ordinance at its Nov. 8 meeting. As currently proposed, the stormwater utility would begin on July 1, 2024, the beginning of the city's 2025 fiscal year.

# State certifies Dover's tax rate; tax bills to be mailed early next week

The New Hampshire Department of Revenue Administration (DRA) certified the City of Dover's property tax rate for fiscal year 2024 (tax year 2023) on Dec. 4, 2023, at \$18.70 per \$1,000 assessed valuation.

Tax bills are being prepared and will be in the mail to property owners by Tuesday, Dec. 12, 2023, with the first half of the tax bill due Friday, Jan. 12, 2024, and the second half of the tax bill due on Monday, June 3, 2024.

The tax rate set by the DRA represents a decrease of \$1.14 or a 5.75% decrease over the prior year.

The average residential property is now assessed at \$458,334 (\$418,706 last year), which includes all single-family, multi-family units, condos, and manufactured housing, with a tax bill averaging \$8,571, an increase of \$264 or 3.2%. The average single-family residential property assessed at \$513,892 (\$471,406 last year) has a total tax bill of \$9,610, an increase of \$257 or 2.8%.

"The certified rate represents a decrease of \$1.14 or a 5.8% decrease from last year," City Manager J. Michael Joyal, Jr. said in an email to the City Council about the tax rate. "It should be noted that the overall tax rate would have been \$0.94 more than last year's rate if assessments had remained unchanged given solely the budgetary impacts of \$0.39 for the City portion of the tax bill, \$0.55 for the School portion and \$0.00 (no impact) for the County.

"The certified rate for this year was instead significantly reduced due to the overall increase in assessed value of nearly \$750 million or a 14.4% increase realized from the combination of increased market value and the new construction value added within the community this past year," Joyal said.

To calculate property tax for a specific parcel, multiply the tax rate (\$18.70) by the assessed value and divide by 1,000. Find assessed values and gross tax amounts due for all property parcels in Dover at <a href="https://www.dover.nh.gov/government/city-operations/finance/tax-assessment/assessment-reports/">www.dover.nh.gov/government/city-operations/finance/tax-assessment-reports/</a>.

There are four components of the tax rate: the city portion, local education portion, state education, and Strafford County. The tax rate of \$18.70 is broken down as follows:

- City: \$6.69, a decrease of 53 cents over the previous year;
- Local education: \$8.97, a decrease of 69 cents over the previous year;
- County: \$1.78, a decrease of 16 cents over the previous year;
- State education: \$1.26, an increase of 24 cents.

### City Hall clock back in operation

The City Hall clock tower clock is back in operation as of Thursday morning.

David Graf of Tower Clock Repair & Restoration of Kittery, Maine, installed the rebuilt Bodine Synchronous electric motor that drives the clock mechanism, which seized on Oct. 31.

The E. Howard & Co. clock, made in Boston, is original to the 1935 City Hall building. It's located within the clock tower that, using gears, moves the hands on the four exterior clock faces that keep the time. Originally, the clockwork mechanism was driven by weights but was later upgraded to utilize an electric motor.





The following events are from various historical records, sources, and texts about the history of Dover.



**Dec. 15, 1712** — The town voted that a boom be erected over the Cochecho River and that bridges should be built over the Bellamy and Oyster rivers, and also voted 20 pounds towards the building of a boom over the Lamprey River "for passage of man and horse till further order."

**Dec. 13, 1790** — A committee was appointed to lobby against the division of the Strafford County by shifting Dover, Durham, Lee, Madbury and Somersworth to the Rockingham County.

**Dec. 8, 1811** — Samuel Bragg, Jr., editor and printer of the Dover Sun, died on this day. According to the Dover Sun at the time, "In the death of Mr. Bragg the town of Dover has experienced a great loss. He was a very industrious and enterprising man of steady habits and attention to his business. He had by his assiduity and great diligence acquired a very handsome property, when about twelve months since, while absent on a journey he was in a moment stripped of almost every dollar by the all-devouring element of fire. This disaster took such hold of his mind, as, after a while, to produce a dejection of spirits, and invite a complication of disorders which has thus early put a period to his mortal existence."

**Dec. 9, 1830** — The Dover Relief Society was organized on this day. The Hon. William Hale is named president, and Asa A. Tufts is named treasurer and secretary. The society was formed to investigate poverty and public health problems. The committee was also tasked with reporting on the potential dangers of manufacturing to "community norms," including the living and working conditions among local manufacturing employees, such as young workers leaving schools, overcrowded and unhealthful housing, and excessive hours of work.



# Dover residents invited to free workshop on private well water safety

The Seacoast Private Well Initiative invites residential private well users in Dover to a free workshop and water testing event. Aimed at educating homeowners on the health risks associated with common well water contaminants, this event is scheduled for Tuesday, Jan. 30, 2024, at 6 p.m. at the Dover City Hall Auditorium, located at 288 Central Ave.

Participants will learn about contaminants that may affect their well water, such as radon, arsenic, lead, and PFAS, and the importance of regular water testing. The workshop will


cover the types of contaminants to test for, reasons for testing, and the process of collecting water samples. In addition, attendees will receive guidance on selecting the appropriate water treatment solutions if contaminants are found.

The event is part of an ongoing effort to ensure the safety and health of the community's drinking water. Experts will be on hand to explain the testing process, and attendees will leave with a test kit and instructions for returning filled bottles for analysis.
