# School Board, City Council discuss tax cap, wage study

### School budget deliberations continue

The City Council and the School Board met in a joint workshop on Dec. 7 to receive preliminary budget estimates and a preliminary tax cap calculation.

The joint budget session occurs annually at the beginning of the budget season to help the School Board and City Council with budget planning.

In the workshop, Finance Director Daniel Lynch discussed the tax cap and how it is calculated. The tax cap will not be finalized until early 2024 when the Consumer Price Index for Boston-Cambridge-Newton MA-NH and the net construction/demolition permit value for Dover are finalized for 2022.

The School Board and City Council also discussed the recent findings of the teacher salary benchmark survey, which the City Council had requested during the fiscal year 2023 budget adoption process.

The School Board is in the process of creating a budget for fiscal year 2024. The School Board has met the last two Mondays for budget workshops and will continue budget discussions at its meeting on Monday, Dec. 12, followed by another budget

Tuesday, Thursday, Saturday: 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. workshop on Monday, Dec. 19. The School Board plans to adopt a budget at its Monday, Jan. 9, regular board meeting, with a fallback adoption date the following week.

# **State certifies Dover tax rate**

#### Tax bills to be mailed soon

The New Hampshire Department of Revenue Administration (DRA) certified the City of Dover's property tax rate for fiscal year 2023 (tax year 2022) Wednesday, Dec. 7, at \$19.84 per \$1,000 assessed valuation.

The Finance Department is preparing for tax bills to be mailed out Friday, Dec. 16, with the first half of the tax bill due Tuesday, Jan. 17, 2023. The second half of the tax bill would be due Thursday, June 1, 2023.

The tax rate set by the DRA represents a decrease of \$1.86 or an 8.6% decrease over the prior year.

"It should be noted that the overall tax rate would have been \$1.18 more than last year's rate if assessments had remained unchanged given solely the budgetary impacts of \$0.16 for the City portion of the tax bill, \$1.02 for the School portion and \$0.00 (no impact) for the County," City Manager J. Michael Joyal, Jr. said to the City Council in an email. "The certified rate for this year was instead significantly reduced due to the overall increase in assessed value of 14.3% realized from the combination of increased market value and the new construction value added within the community this past year."

The average residential property is now assessed at \$418,706 (\$368,141 last year), which includes all single-family, multi-family units, condos and manufactured housing, with a tax bill increase of \$318 or 4.0%. The average single-family residential property assessed at \$471,406 (\$413,518 last year) has a total tax bill of \$9,353, an increase of \$379 or 4.2%.

To calculate property tax for a specific parcel, multiply the tax rate (\$19.84) by the assessed value and divide by 1,000. Find assessed values for all property parcels in Dover at <a href="http://www.dover.nh.gov/government/city-operations/finance/tax-assessment/assessment-reports/">www.dover.nh.gov/government/city-operations/finance/tax-assessment/assessment-reports/</a>.

There are four components of the tax rate: the city portion, local education portion, state education, and Strafford County. The tax rate of \$19.84 is broken down as follows:

- City: \$7.22, a decrease of 80 cents over the previous year;
- Local education: \$9.66, a decrease of 27 cents over the previous year;
- County: \$1.94, a decrease of 19 cents over the previous year;
- State education: \$1.02, a decrease of 60 cents.

The tax rate for the city is typically set by mid-November but was delayed this year due to the School Department's submittal of required documents to the state. The city cannot produce and issue tax bills for the current tax year until the Department of Revenue Administration (DRA) certifies the city's tax rate; the DRA cannot set a tax rate until a municipality submits all required documents to the state.

# Chestnut Street bridge repairs, Community Trail expansion before City Council

### Budget guidance for FY2024 also on agenda

The City Council meets on Wednesday, Dec. 14, for its only regular meeting of the month.

Agenda items include a resolution to authorize the city to contract with New England Infrastructures, LLC. to make repairs to the Chestnut Street bridge for \$2.1 million.

The project consists of removing the pavement, membrane and sidewalks on the bridge, repairing deteriorated concrete in the bridge deck, cold planning approach pavement, reconstructing the bridge sidewalks, and installing new bridge membrane, new bridge pavement and new wearing course pavement.

If the project receives authorization, work is expected to begin in the coming weeks, and the contractor will create a traffic control program as part of the work. The contractor is authorized to close the bridge to all pedestrian and vehicular traffic through mid-spring to complete the work, which was reviewed and approved by the Transportation Advisory Commission at its May 23, 2022, meeting.

The repair project was put out for bid in March 2022; however, it was not awarded due to higher bid pricing than planned. The bid was revised, and more funding was added to the Fiscal Years 2024-2029 Capital Improvements Program adopted by the City Council in October 2022. The project was rereleased for bid in October, with New England Infrastructures, LLC., of Hudson, Massachusetts as the sole responder.

Other agenda items include authorizing:

- An amendment to the contract with the design services consultant for the Community Trail Expansion Phase IV, for \$48,813, which would be used for an engineering study to create a Bellamy River crossing that will not impact the disc golf course.
- Fiscal Year 2024 budget guidance. The resolution states, "The City Manager and School Board shall submit their recommended budgets for Fiscal Year 2024 pursuant to State law and the Dover City Charter and in accordance with the City of Dover's adopted Financial Policies."
- An amendment to the contract with the services consultant for the Lower Central Avenue Improvement Project for \$29,800. Engineers have identified problems with the geometry at the intersection of Silver Street and Central Avenue. The goal is to look at possible modifications to improve vehicle flow and accommodate all modes of transportation. Another key task is to review drainage impacts to outlet stormwater flow down Union Street, which currently serves as the relief point for stormwater collected along a section of Central Avenue.

There will also be a public hearing on a proposed ordinance change to Chapter 105, "Peace and Good Order." The proposed change would add the Sullivan Field and Playground and surrounding city-owned property to the city-owned locations where hunting or target practice is prohibited.

The meeting begins at 7 p.m. in City Hall's Council Chambers. It will be televised on Channel 22 and online at <u>dovernh.viebit.com</u>, where it will also be available for on-demand viewing. City Council agendas and materials for this and previous meetings are <u>available here</u>.



# Thom Hindle donates book series to Dover public schools

Local historian and photographer Thom Hindle donated complete sets of his two-book series, "Dover, New Hampshire Through Time: Volumes I and II," to all of Dover's public schools this week.

Students of teacher Eric Salmonsen's advanced placement history class were on hand at the Dover High School library to receive the books on behalf of all public schools. In addition to Salmonsen and his class, Dover High School Librarian Kristin Whitworth was also on hand to accept the donation.

Salmonsen said the donation of books focusing on Dover history during the history class was fitting because students in his class are working with Dover400, the committee planning Dover's 400<sup>th</sup> anniversary celebration in 2023. Salmonsen said the students are working on a timeline of Dover's history for Dover400, and Hindle's books would be "indispensable."

"I hope the books will help students become interested in Dover's history and want to find out more about the past after seeing the early photographs," Hindle said. "Being able to actually see the past compliments what they may read or hear in class or from grandparents."

The second volume of Hindle's "Dover, New Hampshire Through Time" series was released in August. Both books feature hundreds of photographs and illustrations of Dover's past and present, as well as recognition and information on some of Dover's early photographers. Photos from the past are reproduced from original negatives printed in sepia tone and the present in full color. The books also include early invoices and trade cards. Many of the photographs in the books, some dating back to 1860, appear in print for the first time.

Hindle is a commercial photographer, local historian and former trustee-curator at the Woodman Museum. He has preserved over 100,000 original negatives taken by New England

photographers from early 1900s to present.

# Second public hearing on draft electric aggregation plan for Dover Community Power to be held Dec. 14

#### New video explains community power concept, plan

While many New Hampshire residents saw a dramatic spike in electric utility rates this fall, the City of Dover and Dover Energy Commission have been working towards providing all ratepayers the best possible rates with expanded choices that will include renewable energy.

Dover became a charter member of the Community Power Coalition of New Hampshire (CPCNH) with the primary objectives of creating savings for customers, supporting local businesses, and reducing fossil fuel consumption while enhancing electricity grid reliability. CPCNH works like a cooperative, utilizing the combined purchasing power of participating customers within the active communities. Given that membership already includes 24 municipalities and one county, the Dover Energy Commission believes that very competitive rates are likely achievable.

The City Council has charged the Dover Energy Commission with overseeing the creation of the plan that will form a foundation for how the city interacts with CPCNH to purchase electric power on behalf of the municipality and participating customers citywide. The commission has approved a draft plan and is now soliciting public input during the second of two public hearings.

As a guide to assist the public, the Energy Commission and City of Dover Resilience Manager Jackson Kaspari have prepared a video that provides an overview of the objectives and plan deliverables which can be <u>viewed here</u>. ## Dover's Ray Vermette inducted into Water Environment Federation's Quarter Century Club

Ray Vermette, the city's Wastewater Treatment Facilities Supervisor, was recently inducted into the Water Environment Federation's (WEF) Quarter Century Operator Club. The Quarter Century Operator Club recognizes operators of wastewater treatment facilities for their service and dedication to their work in a challenging and dangerous profession. Vermette will be formally honored at a New England Water Environment Association's annual conference next month.

Vermette's tenure is much longer than a quarter century. He began his career as a laborer at the newly opened wastewater treatment facility on Middle Road in 1991. He has been there ever since, including between 1992 to 1999, when the city contracted its operations to a private firm.



Vermette, a member of the NEWEA Executive Committee, is a New Hampshire Grade IV Wastewater Operator, NEWEA Grade IV Collections Operator, New Hampshire Grade I Water Treatment Operator and a NEWEA Grade I Laboratory Analysis. Vermette has been a NEWEA member for over 20 years, serving as the 2019 President, NH State Director, and the Plant Operations Committee Chair. Before his involvement with NEWEA, Vermette served on many New Hampshire Water Pollution Control Association Committees and was the Past President of the Association's 40th year. He is a past recipient of the NEWEA Alfred E. Peloquin Award, Operator of the Year Award, and the WEF Hatfield Award. Vermette is also a member of the Select Society of Sanitary Sludge Shovelers.

The following events are from a variety of historical records, sources and texts about the history of Dover.

For more on the history of Dover, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street, and the Woodman Museum on Central Avenue. The Public Library also maintains an online collection of historical information <u>located here</u>.

**Dec. 13, 1790** — A committee was appointed to object to a plan to redraw Strafford County by moving Dover, Durham, Lee, Madbury and Somersworth to Rockingham County.

**Dec. 12, 1846** — The town voted to enlarge the burying ground on Pine Hill by purchasing adjoining lands.

**Dec. 12, 1853** — A pine tree, determined to be over 200 years old, and measuring 14 feet in circumference at the base and 78 feet in length, was cut on the land of Mr. Samuel Emerson at Back River.

**Dec. 12, 1923** — Mayor Waldron flatly refuses to allow the KKK to use City Hall's Opera House for a meeting.

**Dec. 12, 1952** — James Dawson, a former chair of the New Hampshire Athletic Association, and the managing editor of Foster's Daily Democrat, died on this day at age 69. During his time at the local newspaper, Dawson had worked his way up from reporter to sports editor, and eventually managing editor, a position he held for nearly 25 years.

**Dec. 9, 2003** — Attorneys, former mayors, a city councilor and a neighboring deputy police attended a hearing to praise the Dover Police Department. The hearing was held by a team from the Commission for Law Enforcement Agencies, Inc., as part of a review of the Dover Police Department's accreditation. In 1988, the Dover Police Department became the first department in New Hampshire to be accredited. The Commission on Law Enforcement, Inc. has continued to review the Dover Police Department to maintain accreditation. The department is one of 18 nationally accredited agencies in New Hampshire.




