

Winter is still here. Are you signed up for parking ban notifications?

Parking bans are now determined on a storm-by-storm basis. There are a number of ways for residents to stay informed about parking bans when declared:

Tune into **Channel 22**, where winter parking ban notifications will appear when declared.

Sign up for **text alerts**, which will be sent when a parking ban is declared, via the city's emergency notification system, CodeRed. Select "Parking Ban Notifications." You can access the sign-up page here: <u>https://public.coderedweb.com/CNE/en-</u> <u>US/BF3E3900491F</u>. Please note that to sign up for text alerts, you must create a managed account. Once created,

you'll see the option to select parking ban notifications.

Woodman Museum Speaker Series: Patricia Violette on Native-Colonial Treaty Relations

On Wednesday, Feb. 20, from 7 to 8:30 p.m., guest speaker Patricia Violette will deliver a talk on relations between colonists and indigenous tribes in the mid-18th century, exploring the ramifications of treaties forged between native groups in New England and colonial governments. Violette will recount the actions of Royal Governor William Shirley, who



served as Captain-General (Commander-in-Chief) of Massachusetts forces during two wars: King George's War, 1744 to 1748, and the French and Indian War, 1754 to 1763.

Though most of the fighting in both wars took place in Europe, each also resulted in Massachusetts declaring war on the Indian tribes on its Eastern frontier in Maine. European treaties ended the fighting on the continent, but Massachusetts also signed separate treaties with the Indians, either to end the hostilities or to gain Indian permission for an expansion of Massachusetts military presence in the Kennebec River valley.

Using the transcripts of three treaty conferences conducted by Shirley, Patricia Violette, Executive Director of Albacore Park Museum and Visitor Center in Portsmouth, will compare key English and Indian cultural concepts, examine selected exchanges in the transcripts for cultural clues, and discuss why cultural differences made it so hard for Natives and non-Natives to achieve lasting peace.

Dover schools to hold kindergarten, first-grade registration

Dover elementary schools are now accepting appointments for kindergarten and first-grade registrations for the 2019-2020 school year. To be eligible, children entering kindergarten must be five years old by Sept. 30, 2019; and children entering first grade (if not currently in Dover public kindergarten), must be six years old by Sept. 30, 2019. In addition, to complete the registration process, parents and guardians must provide a copy of a birth certificate, proof of residency, proof of immunization and physical exam, and, if necessary, court documents stating custodial rights.

The following events are recorded in "Notable Events in the History of Dover, New Hampshire: From the First Settlement in 1623 to 1865," by George Wadleigh, and several other historical sources.

For more on the history of Dover, settled in 1623 and the oldest permanent settlement in New Hampshire and seventh oldest in the country, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street; and the Woodman Museum, Central Avenue. The Public Library also maintains an online collection of historical information, <u>located here</u>.



Feb. 17, 1696 - The Provincial Council having information that the bridge over Cochecho river was broken and gone, whereby relief to Heard's Garrison would be hindered in case of an attack from the enemy, ordered the Secretary to give notice to Capt. John Woodman, Capt. John Tuttle and the Selectmen of Dover that they with all convenient speed call the inhabitants of the town together and make a sufficient bridge over the same.

Feb. 19,1699 - "The Lt. Governor was pleased to give the Council to understand that this day Capt. John Tuttle of Dover with some other of the inhabitants of said town had been to inform him that the Indians late conversant at Cochecho were all suddenly withdrawn, and that they departed on Thursday night last, supposed to be occasioned by an Indian that came that afternoon out of the woods, and made all dispatch to gather all the Indians together, with whom he went away that night. Some of the squaws who seemed to be well affected to the English discovered a great deal of sorrow, saying they should never see them again, and by their whole carriage gave occasion for suspicion that the Indians designed mischief against us, and desired the Council's advice: - who thought meet that the Lt. Governor forthwith issue out his order to the Major of the Militia of this Province, wath all expedition requiring him to command all the Captains of the several towns that they immediately appoint Watch and Ward in their several precincts, and that they continue so till further order; and likewise take care that if any Indians come into any of the towns in a peaceable manner they may be civilly treated."

Feb. 15, 1744 - Col. Thomas Wallingford, a member of the Assembly from Dover, made complaint to the House that on the 13th, during the session, Cyprian Jeffrey, of Portsmouth, storekeeper, made an assault upon him and drawing his knife said "he would cut his (Wallingford's) throat, if he got forty men to do it." The House, considering that Jeffrey in so doing, did greatly affront, insult and offer great indignity to them, issued a warrant for his arrest, and on his being brought before them he acknowledged himself to be in fault and declared that he had no design to affront the House or Col. Wallingford and prayed for forgiveness, which was granted. Col. Wallingford declaring himself satisfied, and the offender dismissed on paying costs.

Feb. 17, 1824 - Notice was given that the Savings Bank for the County of Strafford, in Dover, was organized and ready to receive deposits.



Feb. 17, 1856 - Another severe snow storm occurred at this time, blocking up travel so effectually that no trains reached Dover on any railroad for four days.

It was well reviewed by Kirkus Reviews which is a major book review source used by librarians and booksellers in America. Kirkus called the essays "pointed and energetic."

She is in five anthologies including Thoreau's Legacy, an anthology from The Union of Concerned Scientists and her essay Tell me Something is in the Norton College Anthology. Six of her essays have been nominated for Pushcart Prizes and Street Kid was a runner-up in the Brooklyn Literary Arts Contest. She has had 60 publications in, among others, The Sun, North American Review, Solstice Literary Magazine, Under The Sun, and Silk Road.
