Budget sessions continue with public hearing on school portion FY2025 plan

Citywide audit results also before City Council at Feb. 28 meeting

The City Council will hold a public hearing on the public education portion of the proposed FY2025 budget at its Wednesday, Feb. 28 meeting. School Superintendent William Harbron and Business Administrator Michael Limanni presented the School Department's budget at the Council's Feb. 21 budget workshop. A video recording of the workshop and videos of the School Board's budget review and associated school budget documents are posted to the FY2025 Budget Revealed online resource. The public hearing on all other aspects of the budget will occur at a City Council special meeting on Wednesday, March 20, 2024.

Also at the Feb. 28 meeting, the City Council will receive a presentation on the fiscal year 2023 audit from an independent consulting firm and its annual comprehensive financial report compiled by the Finance Department

The City Charter requires an annual independent audit of all the city's financial accounts, and the Annual Comprehensive Financial Report (ACFR) is published to fulfill the requirement for fiscal year 2023. The ACFR covers all funds the city has become obligated to administer in connection Saturday: 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. with its responsibilities for providing services. The ACFR's financial statements have been audited by certified public accountants who will present their report to the City Council during the City Manager's Report.

There is also a public hearing on the resolution for the city to utilize a \$440,000 InvestNH grant for eligible workforce housing units. If approved by the City Council, the Ad hoc Committee to Address Housing Needs will develop recommendations for the grant's proposed use to be presented to the City Council in September 2024.

The final public hearing will be on the acceptance of the FY2025 Community Development Block Grants (CDBG) Action Plan and expenditures for the FY2025 CDBG Entitlement Funds, FY2024 Program Income and FY2024 Program.

The Council will also consider authorizing the installation of a public art display on Waldron Court – all the materials and labor are to be donated for the project. This community engagement project by the Dover Arts Commission invites the public to create yarn and other fabric wrappings for trees within Waldron Court. The installations would be displayed publicly in the spring, transforming Waldron Court into a dynamic art exhibit.



Mild winter accelerates site work for waterfront development

The transformation of land into the Cochecho Waterfront Development at Washington and River streets continues at a rapid pace, and the building of the first phase of private developments is on the horizon.

The relatively mild winter and lack of snow have helped these efforts, with crews from Northeast Earth Mechanics working on multiple fronts daily at the site: stabilizing the shoreline, building the public roadways, and installing the associated utilities, while also readying Pad C and D for private developer Cathartes to begin its construction, anticipated to start this spring. The installation of utilities includes water, sewer and a drainage system that includes a bioretention system that treats stormwater in its place, as well as installing electrical conduit and duct banks.

In a little more than a month, the parcels on the site can be sold to Cathartes' business entity, CPI Management, as detailed in the land disposition agreement and associated amendments between Cathartes and the City of Dover. According to the third amendment to the land disposition agreement between CPI Management and the City of Dover, two parcels are set to be transferred in the sale set to close by April 5, 2024. This date may be extended, pending sign-offs required from the State of New Hampshire and CPI's financial institution.

Shoreline stabilization

The shoreline stabilization is time-sensitive, as this work needs to cease by mid-March so as not to interfere with the spring salmon run. The stabilization requires crews to build a toe wall that borders the Cochecho River, which will retain soils from flowing into the river when completed. To build the wall, crews utilize metal sheathing to build a coffer dam to protect works from the river's tidal waters. Much of the stone utilized for the wall is repurposed from the old stone wall by Fish Ladder Park, rebuilt in 2018. Once completed, the toe wall will extend to near the Makem Bridge on Washington Street.

Blasting underway

A blasting crew are mobilizing to the site to remove ledge in the area of the first phase of private construction; the work is estimated to take about a month to complete. Blasting will occur once or twice a day, generally between the hours of 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. The crew utilizes a series of whistles before each blast to warn workers and the nearby public: 3 long horns - 5 minutes to blast; 2 long horns - 2 minutes to blast; and 1 long horn - all clear, blasting complete.

Food, cash donations, and fares collected on 'Leap Day' will benefit food pantry


In honor of 2024 being a Leap Year, COAST is planning a "Day it Forward" campaign in support of fellow nonprofit Gather. All fare box collections on February 29 and contributions made by COAST staff will be donated along with non-perishable food and personal care donations collected during a Leap Day Stuff-A-Bus event at Hannaford on Central Avenue in Dover. In addition, COAST will match any bus tickets purchased and donated to Gather clients via COAST's website now through Feb. 29.

"This year we have an extra day to do something good and make the world a better place," said Vanessa Polychronis, COAST Community & Employee Relations Manager. "COAST and Gather serve many of the same people and communities. This year's 'Day it Forward' campaign is a chance to make sure that Gather can respond to those who are experiencing food insecurity this winter. Dover among first in New Hampshire to take strong position against slavery

Dover has a history of anti-slavery activism, notably associated with the influential newspaper "The Morning Star" and Abolitionist Senator John Parker Hale.

The city was the site of "The Morning Star," a radical anti-slavery newspaper produced by Freewill Baptists and first published in 1848. The newspaper vigorously campaigned for the complete abolition of slavery, despite opposition, even within their own denomination. The newspaper's editor, William Burr, led a concerted campaign against slavery, despite Dover's economic reliance on the cotton trade, which indirectly depended on slave labor in the South. The principled move plunged the newspaper into financial crisis, but as the public mood became more receptive to the abolitionist message, its circulation figures picked up. The newspaper's anti-slavery stance was a bold decision, especially in an overwhelmingly white community where the major employers were large cotton mills. The city's prosperity was largely dependent on the cotton trade, making its anti-slavery position particularly remarkable. When Abraham Lincoln visited Dover in 1860, editor William Burr was among those invited to join him on the speaker's platform.

Dover's anti-slavery sentiment extended beyond the newspaper. The city was the first in New Hampshire to send strongly abolitionist representatives to the State Legislature and one of the first in the U.S. to send an openly abolitionist senator to Washington. John Parker Hale was first elected to the United States Senate in 1855, and re-elected in 1859, serving until 1865. Hale began his Congressional career as a Democrat but helped establish the anti-slavery Free Soil Party and eventually joined the Republican Party. In the Senate, he maintained his antislavery activity and was regarded as one of its leaders. Hale's prominence in the antislavery movement led to his receiving the presidential nomination of the Liberty Party in 1847.





The following events are from various historical records, sources, and texts about the history of Dover.

For more on the history of Dover, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street, and the Woodman Museum on Central Avenue. The Public Library also maintains an online collection of historical information <u>located here</u>.

Feb. 28, 1664 — Philip Chesley and Patrick Jemison were chosen to lay out the highways from Oyster River to Cochecho, make them fit for horse and foot, and bring an account of their charges to the Townsmen.


Feb. 25, 1804 — William Hurd and John Jones were sentenced by the Supreme Judicial

Court, held in Dover, "to sit one hour in the pillory, pay a fine of \$200 each, and costs of prosecution, and to stand committed until sentence be performed," for passing counterfeit \$10 bills of the New Hampshire Bank.

Feb. 26, 1828 — Publication of the Dover Enquirer began on this day.

Feb. 25, 1924 — More than 1,000 people attend the opening of a new municipal ski jump at Garrison Hill. Four New Hampshire University (University of New Hampshire) Outing Club members held a ski exhibit during the event. The group was led by Gunnar Michelson, an intercollegiate ski champion, whose longest jump of the day was 63 feet.

Feb. 24, 1999 — With Amtrak already committed to providing passenger rail services from Portland to Boston, which would become the Downeaster, a Dover committee met on this day in 1999 to discuss what they would like to see in a Dover train station. The station would eventually open as the Dover Transportation Center and remains in operation today.



Film screening of "Regenerating Life" with panel discussion to follow

The Dover Public Library, along with the Seacoast N.H. Permaculture group, will host a viewing of the film "Regenerating Life" on Sunday, March 3 at 1:30 p.m. in the library's lecture hall. Options for virtual attendance are also available by going to the library's event calendar to register to receive the virtual link. This event is part of a worldwide series of community screenings. Following the film viewing, a panel discussion will take place featuring:

- Amy Antonucci, moderator, Seacoast Permaculture
- Jim Laurie, representing Bio4Climate
- John Feldman, filmmaker [virtual]
- Zuska Mulkerin, panelist who speaks for water [virtual]

"Regenerating Life" takes an ecological approach to unraveling the climate crisis. It challenges the prevailing idea that carbon emissions from the burning of fossil fuels are the primary cause of this crisis and offers a new narrative. The film proposes that it is humankind's relentless destruction of the natural world that has caused the climate crisis. This is because nature – the vast biodiversity that exists on our planet – regulates and balances Earth's climate.

Filmmaker John Feldman dives into the economic and political systems that have encouraged this destruction of Earth through the relentless quest for wealth and dominion, but stresses that we can reverse this destructive process by regenerating life. John visits people who are developing solutions. By working with nature, they are restoring the forests, fields, wetlands and oceans. They are regenerating soils to grow healthy food and build healthy communities. This is the solution to the climate crisis.

"Regenerating Life" invites audiences to rethink their assumptions about climate change and humankind's relationship to nature. Through community screenings and discussions, people may be inspired to come together to make changes in their own communities to help restore regional forests, parks and waterways and support the emergence of community gardens and locally grown nutritious food.
