Coming up at the next City Council meeting

Council to hold workshop on sports complex initiative, homelessness, affordable housing and master plan

The City Council will hold a workshop on Wednesday, March 2, 2022. Agenda items include an introduction to the private organization called the Dover Sports Complex Committee, an update on homelessness and the warming center, a review of the city's Master Plan, and a discussion about ongoing affordable housing strategies.

The committee eyes Maglaras Park as a potential location for the project and plans to solicit interested parties through a proposal that is included in the agenda materials.

Agenda materials also include recommendations from the chapters of Dover's Master Plan. The City Council receives an annual update on the Master Plan ahead of the introduction of the City Manager's proposed city-wide budget this spring.

The meeting is scheduled for 7 p.m. in Council Chambers at City Hall. It will broadcast live on Channel 22 and online at dovernh.viebit.com, where it will also be available for on-demand viewing. Click here for the complete agenda.

School Board to hold budget workshop Monday

The School Board will continue its budget discussions at a workshop this Monday, Feb. 28.

The workshop's focus will be for the School Board to identify its budget priorities if the City Council reduces the amount of the School Board's fiscal year 2023 budget the School Board adopted Feb. 14.

The adopted budget is \$74,955,953. It maintains current staffing levels in the school district and funds 11 new full-time and part-time positions the School Board identified as priorities during its budget workshops. The 11 positions and associated costs are included in the meeting's agenda materials. The adopted budget also provides an estimated amount for a new teacher contract, as the current one expires this August. The School Department's fiscal year 2023 budget would require \$50,033,789 to be raised by local property tax and is \$4,155,311 above the estimated tax cap for the school side of the budget.

The workshop begins at 6 p.m. in the McConnell Center's School Board Chambers and will be televised live on Channel 22 and online at <u>dovernh.viebit.com</u>, where it will also be available for on-demand viewing. <u>Click here</u> for the complete agenda and agenda materials.

Masks at Dover's public schools now optional but recommended

Face masks at Dover public schools are now optional but recommended in most instances following new guidance from the New Hampshire Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) on Feb. 23. However, masks are still required on school buses per federal Centers for Disease Control guidance. They are also required for a limited duration following a return to school after a positive COVID-19 test.

Dr. Benjamin Chan, DHHS state epidemiologist, provided the updated guidance at Gov. Chris Sununu's Feb. 23 COVID-19 press conference. Chan <u>said</u> that "at this point in the pandemic, we are no longer recommending universal facemasks for people in indoor, public locations unless a person's required to wear a facemask for their specific situation."

Following the press conference, Department of Education Commissioner Frank Edelblut issued a <u>technical advisory</u> stating that "mask requirements in school policies are inconsistent with Ed 306 rules" and that "schools should transition to adopt these new public health recommendations as quickly as possible."

On Thursday, Dover School Superintendent William Harbron <u>issued an update</u> on new guidelines in the city's public schools. The update includes when masks would be required, such as on school buses and individuals without symptoms returning to school for days 6 through 10 following a positive COVID-19 test.

Harbron had planned to review DHHS data on Feb. 28 to determine whether to relax masking at schools based on the School Board's COVID-19 Decision Matrix adopted for the 2021-2022 school year. The matrix was based on DHHS's previous guidance regarding masking.

Dover Police Department hires grant-funded social worker

With funding from a Community Oriented Policing Service (COPS) grant through the US Department of Justice, the Dover Police Department announced this week the hiring of Dover native Kaitlin Jones as the department's police social worker. Her focus will be to work as a

liaison with various social service agencies and clinical providers with the goal of providing more direct follow-up referrals for individuals and families, not responding directly to police calls.

Jones has been assigned to the department's Community Response and Engagement Unit. She comes to the Dover Police Department from the Rochester School District where she had been a guidance counselor. She has a master's degree in social work from Bridgewater State University.

Dover, like many communities across the state, continues to see the impacts of the opioid crisis, people experiencing homelessness, and the lack of access to mental health services. The police social worker will work closely with police officers, firefighters, community mental health agencies, recovery centers, anti-poverty agencies, the school department, other city departments, and other agencies that can help those in need. She will then refer individuals and families to the resource(s) most equipped to assist.

One of Jones' responsibilities will be to follow up with individuals and families after police interactions to provide them with clear direction on how to obtain appropriate services and help them through that process. Examples of police interactions that may involve follow-up and referrals include; domestic disturbances, drug overdoses, suicide attempts, death investigations, and mental health related calls. The goal is to provide referral assistance to individuals and families when they are no longer experiencing a crisis in order to reduce the number and frequency of those crises. This will also reduce need for public safety intervention.

City Council increases property tax exemptions for elderly, blind, deaf and permanently disabled

The City Council increased property tax exemptions for qualifying property owners who are elderly, blind, deaf or permanently disabled at its Feb. 23 meeting. The Council also increased qualifying income levels and asset limits for the elderly, disabled, and deaf exemptions.

The increased exemption and qualifying income and asset levels are effective for fiscal year 2023. The deadline to apply for these exemptions and veterans' tax credit is April 15, 2022.

Elderly Tax Credit:

- For ages 65 to 74, the exemption increased from \$115,000 to \$166,000
- For ages 75 to 79, the exemption increased from \$162,000 to \$234,000
- For ages 80 and older, the exemption increased from \$207,000 to \$300,000

Blind Exemption:

The tax exemption increased from \$115,000 to \$166,000

Deaf Exemption:

The tax exemption increased from \$115,000 to \$166,000

Disability Exemption:

Would tax exemption increased from \$115,000 to \$166,000

Maximum income levels (elderly, deaf and disabled):

- Single: Increased annual income from \$42,000 to \$47,000
- Married: Increased from annual income levels from \$57,000 to \$64,000

Maximum asset level (elderly, deaf and disabled):

 The maximum asset level for all applicants for elderly, disabled and deaf applicants increased from \$169,800 to \$186,100

To qualify for the tax exemptions, a person must apply and demonstrate they meet requirements set out by state law, such as residency, asset and income limits.

In addition to the above tax exemptions, there is also the veterans' tax credit. It provides up to \$750 tax credit for all veterans or veteran spouses who meet residency requirements.

Color of Bulky Item Tag changing from orange to green

The color of the City of Dover's bulky item trash tags is changing from orange to green in the coming weeks, though orange tags will always be accepted for bulky trash pickup after the change is made.

Community Services changed color with a recent order of new tags; the color now matches the color of Dover's pay-as-you-throw trash bags. The rollout of the new green tags may take a few weeks or longer, depending on how many orange bulky tags a vendor may still have on hand.

Any previously purchased orange bulky tags will be always be accepted for bulky trash pickup.



Bulky tags are used to dispose of all non-metal items too large to fit in a Dover trash bag, such as furniture, mattresses, toilets and carpets, etc. Bulky items are picked up on regular trash pickup days. The tags cost \$10 each and can be purchased at the City Clerk's Office at City Hall and the Public Works Facility and Recycling Center on Mast Road. Bulky tags can also be purchased at most locations where City of Dover trash bags are sold.

Black Lives Matter Seacoast to air second annual awards ceremony on Sunday

Black Lives Matter Seacoast invites the public to attend its second annual BLM Seacoast Excellence Awards ceremony, when the five winners for 2022 will be honored in an online event set to debut at 6 p.m. Sunday, Feb. 27. In addition to the online stream, the ceremony will air on local access channels throughout the Seacoast, including Dover's DNTV, Channel 22.

The mission of BLM Seacoast includes uplifting people of color in the Seacoast areas of New Hampshire, Maine, and Massachusetts. The organization announced it created this event to honor the "many wonderful people of color whose hard work has benefited the Seacoast."

The hosts for the event will be the co-founder and current board chair for BLM Seacoast, Tanisha Johnson, and Saniyah Bolton, the current co-director of the BLM Seacoast Youth Division.

Samrawit Silva will be the keynote speaker for the Black Lives Matter Seacoast 2022 awards.

The event will feature keynote speaker Samrawit Silva, a 2021 BLM Seacoast Excellence Award winner who graduated from Peter T. Paul College of Business and Economics at the University of New Hampshire. She became heavily involved in social justice at UNH, helping form the 8PercentSpeaks movement. It is her passion for justice that brought her to 350NH, where she currently works as an electoral climate organizer. She helps organize peaceful protests and volunteers as a peacekeeper in protests in Concord. Her focus for the past year

has been raising awareness for the Tigray genocide affecting her family. Having lost a handful of people already and not knowing the status of her mother or youngest siblings, Samrawit continues to advocate non-stop, traveling to Sudan to help refugees.

Don't Trash Dover to hold Litter Collection Walk on



Free weekly vaccination and booster clinics continue at the Dover Public Library

Registration encouraged; walk-ins welcome

Dover Fire and Rescue and the Dover Public Library continue to hold free, weekly vaccination and booster clinics on Wednesdays from 2 to 6 p.m. at the library. Pre-registration is encouraged to ensure all paperwork is completed before the appointment; however, walk-ins are welcome. The Pfizer-BioNTech will be the only vaccine and booster available at the clinics.

Vaccinations are available for the following age groups:

- 5 to 11 years old: first and second vaccine doses
- 12 years and older: first and second vaccine doses and vaccine booster doses (Pfizer-BioNTech only)

To register for an appointment, visit the State of New Hampshire's online vaccine scheduling system at https://vini.nh.gov/providers/s/. (Please note you must register via this link and not vaccinations.gov.) You do not need to be a Dover resident or a New Hampshire resident to register.

Follow the instructions to set up an account; it requires a name, street address, email address and phone number. Once the account is verified, the user can create an appointment. To

schedule an appointment at Dover Public Library:

- Select the "Create/Manage Appointment" icon
- Click on the green "Schedule Appointment" button
- Select either initial vaccine series or booster
- Under "Search Location," enter 03820 in the address/zip code field
- Select: "Dover Fire-Standing Clinic," then click "See availability"
- Choose an appointment time slot

Please arrive on time for the appointment scheduled. The vaccine clinic will be in the second-floor meeting room of the Dover Public Library at 73 Locust St.

Vaccines widely available

Vaccines are available at most local pharmacies, including walk-in service at some, as well as fixed sites throughout the state. To schedule an appointment, visit <u>vaccines.nh.gov</u> and click on "Find COVID-19 Vaccines".

COVID testing

Many health insurance plans cover COVID-19 tests without a copay, coinsurance, or deductible for persons with symptoms of COVID-19. Locations throughout the state offer COVID-19 tests, including hospitals, pharmacies, primary care offices, urgent care centers. The State of New Hampshire is also offering free at-home saliva test kits through a partner agency, Vault Medical Services, which can be ordered online at https://learn.vaulthealth.com/nh/.

Tests for active COVID-19 disease are available in locations across New Hampshire and include both the polymerase chain reaction (PCR) test and the rapid antigen test. The PCR test is for persons with or without symptoms of COVID-19. The rapid antigen test is for persons with symptoms and within a specific timeframe after onset of symptoms.

The following events are recorded in "Notable Events in the History of Dover, New Hampshire: From the First Settlement in 1623 to 1865," by George Wadleigh, and several other historical sources.

For more on the history of Dover, settled in 1623 and the oldest European permanent settlement in New Hampshire and seventh oldest in the country, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street; and the Woodman Museum, Central Avenue. The Public Library also maintains an online collection of historical information, <u>located here</u>.


Feb. 28, 1664 — Philip Chesley and Patrick Jemison were chosen to lay out the highways from Oyster River to the Cochecho, make them fit for horse and foot, and bring an account of their charges to the Townsmen.

March 1, 1858 — Gen. Sam Houston and Horace Greeley attended a public meeting at Dover City Hall to discuss the war with Mexico and "the Texas question," which was the annexation of Texas 13 years earlier.

March 2, 1860 — Abraham Lincoln of Illinois, then a little known Republican candidate for president, addressed the Republicans of Dover on the politics of the day during a speech at City Hall that lasted nearly two hours.

Feb. 26, 1997 — U.S. Sen. Jeanne Shaheen, then governor of New Hampshire, visited Horne Street School as part of a push to support public kindergarten. She talked about her plan for the state to fund construction costs to provide space for new kindergartens. Her plan included a 25-cent increase on cigarettes to help pay for the \$30 million proposal. During the visit to Horne Street School, then School Board Chair Sam Allen said he was "very excited" with the idea of Dover providing public kindergarten. The Board that year would endorse an alternative public and private kindergarten program to begin in 1998, but that plan was reversed by a new School Board in 1998, which voted to fully fund public kindergarten, including the use of state construction, kindergarten and foundation aid, which would cover 75% of the initial cost and \$750 per student. New Hampshire was the last state in the nation to mandate public kindergarten, passing a law in 2007 that required all communities to offer public kindergarten by 2009.

Feb. 28, 2001 — The Dover City Council approves a resolution to form an Arts Commission. The resolution was sponsored by then City Councilors Matt Mayberry, Betsey Andrews Parker and Tom Dunnington. The newly formed panel would hold its first meeting nearly a year later,

- Picture ID for taxpayer and spouse (must be a Driver's License, or state issued ID Card, or other official document)
- All W-2's for all places worked in previous year
- Prior year tax return if applicable
- Routing number and bank account number for direct deposit
