curbside trash and recycling vendor

A resolution before the City Council recommends negotiating a new contract with Waste Management for the collection and disposal of solid waste and recycling. The contract with Pinard Waste Services, the current vendor, expires in June. Pinard did not submit a bid for another five-year contract.

The resolution before the City Council is the result of a recommendation by the Solid Waste Advisory Commission and Community Services staff to pursue the new contract with Waste Management, Inc.

At a City Council workshop on Wednesday, Jan. 8, Community Services Director John Storer reviewed the bid, the city's requirements for the collection and disposal of trash and recycling, and the projected cost of the new contract. If approved, the cost of the Waste Management contract in fiscal year 2021 will result in an increase of \$1 million over the current contract, or a \$400,000 increase for solid waste and a \$600,000 increase for recycling.

"Fortunately, for about the last 10 years the city has experienced stable pricing for both solid waste and recycling services," Storer said. "But with the state of the world's recycling market, combined with highly competitive labor rates, significant price increases are pending."

Storer said at the workshop that Community Services also reviewed whether it's feasible for the city to purchase its own trash trucks and add new staff, but he also recommends pursuing a contract with Waste Management for the next fiveyear contract, both for the curbside collection and disposal of trash and recycling. Waste Management was the lowest bidder.

As the City Council continues to deliberate, Storer said residents should not see a change to existing services.

"Assuming the city is able to successfully negotiate a contract with Waste Management, they would start providing service on July 1, 2020," Storer said. "Until that time, Pinard remains the city's contractor, so residents should not see any change in collections services, or changes in the weekly collection schedule."

The City Council tabled the resolution at its Jan. 8 regular meeting. The Council is expected to revisit the resolution at its Jan. 22 regular meeting.

places for presidential primary

The City Council this week set the polling places and times for the upcoming presidential primary in New Hampshire. The primary election will be held on Tuesday, Feb. 11, 2020.

As a result of the City Council's vote, polling times in Dover will expand by an hour, from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.



In addition to the new polling times, the Ward 3 polling location will move to the parish hall at St. Joseph's' Church, 150 Central Ave.

Prior to the municipal election in November 2019, three of the city's polling places in wards 1, 2 and 3 had transitioned to new locations to address concerns about access and parking. Ward 3 had initially moved from Langdon Place to St. Ann's Rehabilitation Center on Dover Point Road. According to City Clerk Susan Mistretta, the move to St. Joseph's parish hall means more accessible parking and better access to the polls for those with disabilities.

The polling places for all Dover wards are as follows:

- Ward 1: Horne Street Elementary School, 78 Horne St.
- Ward 2: Woodman Park Elementary School, 11 Towle Ave.
- Ward 3: St. Joseph's Church, Parish of the Assumption, 150 Central Ave.
- Ward 4:- Elks Lodge, 282 Durham Road
- Ward 5: St John's Methodist Church, 28 Cataract Ave.
- Ward 6: Riverside Rest Home, 276 County Farm Road

Safety concerns prompt additional streets to be included in winter-long parking ban

Due to safety concerns, Police Chief M. William Breault has declared an emergency parking ban on the following streets, in accordance with Chapter 166 of the City of Dover's ordinances:

- Saint Thomas Street, no parking on the northerly side (odd numbered), between the Locust Street Belknap Street
- Fifth Street, no parking on the northerly side (odd numbered), between Grove Street and Tammany Park
- **Baker Street**, no parking on the northerly side (odd numbered)
- Everett Street, no parking on the westerly side (odd numbered)

Signs declaring the additional parking restrictions will be posted on the affected streets. These streets will follow the same winter-long parking ban restrictions, from December 1 to April 1, or until the emergency parking ban is lifted.

Several city streets are already subject to a parking ban on one side of the street from December 1 to April 1.

The parking restrictions during the winter months on these additional streets are the result of concerns about the ability of emergency vehicles to access the streets. In addition, these restrictions help keep the roads accessible during snow removal operations.

During a declared citywide parking ban, both sides of these streets are restricted.

Other streets included in the December 1 to April 1 ban are:

- **Third Street**, no parking on the northerly side (odd numbered), from Chestnut Street to Grove Street
- Fourth Street, no parking on the northerly side (odd numbered), from Chestnut Street to Grove Street
- Fifth Street, no parking on the northerly side (odd numbered), from Chestnut Street to Grove Street
- Lincoln Street, no parking on the northerly side (odd numbered), from Chestnut Street to Grove Street
- **Summer Street**, no parking on the southerly side (even numbered), from Central Avenue to Belknap Street
- **Belknap Street**, no parking on the westerly side (odd numbered), from Washington Street to Silver Street
- **Cushing Street**, no parking on the easterly side (even numbered), from Washington Street to Silver Street
- Lexington Street, no parking on the easterly side (even numbered), from Washington Street to Silver Street
- **Nelson Street**, no parking on the southerly side (even numbered), from Locust Street to Atkinson Street
- **Rogers Street**, no parking on the southwesterly side (even numbered)
- Forest Street, no parking on the northwesterly side (even numbered)
- Essex Street, no parking on the southwesterly side (even numbered)
- Hancock Street, no parking on the southwesterly side (even numbered)
- Folsom Street, no parking on the southerly side (even numbered)
- West Concord Street, no parking on the northerly side (odd numbered)

Richmond Street, no parking on the westerly side (odd numbered)

Dover Fire and Rescue warns of possible scam

Dover Fire and Rescue is warning residents of a possible phone scam from the "Firefighter Support Organization" reportedly raising money on behalf of Dover Fire. Dover Fire and Rescue is not aware of any authorized fundraisers on its behalf at this time and urges residents to use caution.

Follow these tips from the Federal Trade Commission before making a donation:

Ask questions

- What's the charity's website, address, and mission?
- How much of my donation will go directly to programs that help police or firefighters, rather than to fundraising?
- How many police officers or firefighters does the charity help, and in what ways?
- If supporting the police or firefighters in your own community is important to you, ask how the charity spends money in your area.

Be careful how you pay

• If someone asks you to send them cash, wire money,

- donate by gift card, or leave money under your front door mat for pick up, don't do it. That's how scammers often ask you to pay. It's safer to pay by credit card or check.
- If you're donating online, check that the webpage where you enter your payment information has "https" in the web address. That means your information is transmitted securely.
- Legitimate charities will give you a receipt that shows the amount of your donation. Keep that record and check your credit card statements to make sure you're only charged for the donation you wanted to make.

Watch out for scammers' tricks

- They spoof caller ID to make their fundraising calls look like they're from your local area code or from an organization you know.
- They pressure you into donating immediately before you have time to do any research. A legitimate charity will welcome your donation at any time.
- They claim that you'll win a sweepstakes or get a prize if you donate, which is against the law.
- They thank you for a donation you don't remember making. Scammers do that to trick you into thinking you actually made a pledge, and guilt you into sending them money.
- They suggest you'll receive special treatment for donating. For example, no legitimate fundraiser would guarantee that you won't be stopped for speeding if you have a police organization's decal in your car window.

American Red Cross lifeguard training course offered at Dover Indoor Pool

An American Red Cross Lifeguard Training Course will be held at the Dover Indoor Pool, Sunday, Feb. 23 through Thursday, Feb. 27. Participants will gain the knowledge and skills needed to prevent and respond to aquatic emergencies. The course includes the latest science in first aid, CPR/AED for the Professional Rescuer, emergency cardiac care, as well as the latest lifeguarding rescue skills and safety protocols. Students must be at least 15 years old by the last day of the class.

The following prerequisites must be fulfilled:

- Swim 300 yards continuously.
- Tread water for 2 minutes.
- Starting in the water, the participant must be able to swim 20 yards using front crawl or breaststroke, surface dive 7-10 feet, retrieve a 10-pound object, return to surface, swim 20 yards back to the starting point with the object and exit water without using a ladder or steps

within 1 minute, 40 seconds.

- No refunds will be given for failure to pass prerequisite requirements.
- All course dates MUST be attended in order to pass the course.

Time to renew dog licenses

Dog licenses for 2020 are now available. All dogs must be licensed by April 30 to avoid a late fee. The cost for a male or female dog is \$10, a neutered male or spayed female dog is \$7.50 and puppies (3-7 months) are \$7.50 for first licensing.

Residents 65 years of age or older may license one dog for \$3. Additional licenses require regular fees.

The City Clerk's office requires proof of rabies information and a certificate of spaying or neutering.

Late fees of \$1 a month begin June 1.

Dog licenses can be renewed at the City Clerk's office at City Hall, by mail or online.

In addition to online licensing, rabies information can also be updated online and the certificate mailed to the City Clerk's office.

A checking account is required for online dog license registration. To ensure privacy, dog owners must provide the dog's tag number.

The following events are recorded in "Notable Events in the History of Dover, New Hampshire: From the First Settlement in 1623 to 1865," by George Wadleigh, and several other historical sources. For more on the history of Dover, settled in 1623 and the oldest permanent settlement in New Hampshire and seventh oldest in the country, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street; and the Woodman Museum, Central Avenue. The Public Library also maintains an online collection of historical information, located here.

Jan. 10, 1656 - It was agreed that there shall be no more grants of lands made either to any of the present inhabitants or to any others until all the grants that are already made be laid out and bounded, and likewise that commonage be laid out to all our inhabitants in our several respective places. Also that no further grants of land shall be made to any but by the consent of every inhabitant, reserving power for the present selectmen till the last of February next to accommodate any inhabitant further as in their wisdom they see meet if any shall desire it, which time being expired the present acts are hereby ratified and confirmed. The same day the town confirms all previous grants and further agreed that "whereas there are several grants of land made by the town to the inhabitants of which some are in controversy," to appoint Elder Wentworth, John Heard, John Bickford, William Furber and Left. Hall to "bound any of the lands which are or shall be in controversy betwixt us and any of our inhabitants or neighbors," engaging to "rest satisfied with their decision whether it be more or less than our grants provide, the persons acting herein to be upon their oaths to lay it out according to every man's grant as near as they can to their best judgment and understanding, which being done by them or any three of them aforementioned shall stand for a current act," and they were to continue in this service till others were chosen.



Jan. 16, 1766 - Lee, part of the original territory of Dover, and afterwards of Durham, set off and incorporated as a town.

Jan. 14, 1776 - Johnson, an Indian, preached in Dover, for whom a contribution was made amounting to 5 pounds and 4 shillings.

Jan. 10, 1787 - Died, John Wentworth, Jr., the first lawyer in Dover and an eminent and useful citizen. He was born July 14, 1745, graduated at Harvard College 1768, was a member of the House of Representatives and of the Committee of Safety, and a member of the Continental Congress in 1778-1780.

Jan. 15, 1822 - (From the Strafford Register) "Died, Mr. Dover Gage, a respectable black man, at a very advanced age. He, and his sister, was stolen from his parents in Africa, while playing a short distance from his home, by some of those miscreants in human shape who violate the rights of their fellow man and make slaves of those whose complexions the God of all may have tinged with a darker hue than their own. He lived in this town from his youth, useful and respected; but it seems to have been the peculiarly hard fate of Mr. Gage to have been denied a home where his own choice or that of his friends would have fixed him: for scarcely had he been placed in his grave ere his body was again stolen, and it may be by his unrelenting white persecutors."





"Lighthouses of the New Hampshire Seacoast and Southern Maine" with Jeremy D'Entremont Jan. 21

The Friends of the Dover Public Library invite the public to learn about the history of our nearby coastal lighthouses from a renowned marine historian on Tuesday, Jan. 21 at 7 p.m. in the library's Lecture Hall.

Jeremy D'Entremont has been called the leading expert on New England's historic lighthouses. He grew up in Massachusetts and received his BFA in filmmaking from Emerson College in Boston. In the late 1980s, he became a tour guide for Friends of the Boston Harbor Islands. He started writing for "Lighthouse Digest" magazine and has penned more than 300 articles for "Lighthouse Digest", "The Keeper's Log", and "Soundings", among other publications.

He has given more than 200 lectures around the region, and

has authored 21 books. With two exceptions, each has focused on lighthouse history. The new fourth edition of his "Lighthouse Handbook: New England" will be published in May 2020 from Cider Mill Press.

Jeremy moved to Portsmouth in 2001. At that time, the Portsmouth Harbor Lighthouse was licensed to the American Lighthouse Foundation. Seeing a need for a local chapter to help ALF care for the structure, he founded the Friends of Portsmouth Harbor Lighthouse and its first public open house was held in June 2001.

From 2008 to 2018, he operated his own company called "New England Lighthouse Tours," based in Portsmouth. Over 11 seasons, he gave personalized tours for more than 1,300 people from all over the U.S., and as far away as China, Australia, Italy, and the UK. He has also narrated over 150 lighthouse cruises since the early 1990s.

Under Jeremy's leadership, FPHL has not only preserved and maintained Portsmouth Harbor Lighthouse, but has also created a very educationally effective public access program at the historic site. On average, the lighthouse welcomes over 5,000 visitors during each open house season. Jeremy is now leading the effort to preserve the wave-swept Whaleback Lighthouse at the mouth of the Piscataqua River, in Kittery. It is a daunting effort to establish a docking system at Whaleback, but when this effort is realized, it will permit the restoration and long-term preservation of this 1872 offshore sentinel.

He is also editor of the website "New England Lighthouses: A Virtual Guide" at <u>www.newenglandlighthouses.net</u>. He has appeared on the History Channel, the Travel Channel, PBS, and NPR. On April 28, 2019, ALF presented Jeremy D'Entremont with its "Keeper of the Light" award.

City warming centers

For those seeking to warm up during cold weather, several City of Dover public facilities are available as warming centers. Dover's warming centers include the McConnell Center, the Public Library and City Hall. These specific public buildings are accessible and welcome those seeking relief from the cold during regular business hours.

Other warming centers in Dover are also available and accessible anytime, 24/7, at the City's Police Station, located downtown on Chestnut Street, and the City's three fire stations. The Liberty North End Fire Station is located at 262 Sixth St. The Central Fire Station is located at 9-11 Broadway. The South End Fire Station is located at 25 Durham Road.

In conjunction with the City of Dover's walk-in warming centers located throughout the community, the City's Public Welfare Department is available to coordinate services for those who need and want emergency assistance, including shelter, food and medical care. The Public Welfare Department offices at the McConnell Center are open Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., and can be reached by phone at 603-516-6500. For after-hours emergency needs, the public welfare program also remains accessible simply by calling 603-742-4646 or visiting the police or fire stations to request assistance. Police and fire personnel are trained emergency responders and will notify and coordinate with the City's public welfare providers, day or night, getting assistance to those who truly want help. This assistance can include finding available shelter space, day or night, along with transportation, if needed.

To further assist with emergency sheltering needs throughout the Tri-City area, the Strafford County's Extreme Cold Weather Shelter, located at 276 County Farm Road in Dover, may also open when deemed necessary by area emergency management officials and the Strafford County Commissioners. Should this temporary emergency facility be activated, the City of Dover will share this information via the City's website at <u>www.dover.nh.gov</u>, via email notifications, social media, and Channel 22. For more information about the Strafford County's Extreme Cold Weather Shelter, including the shelter's operational status, contact 1-857-323-0388.

In addition to the warming centers and sheltering options provided by the City of Dover, organizations with an accessible facility and interested in opening and operating a temporary emergency shelter in Dover are asked to contact and coordinate with the City of Dover's Emergency Management Director, Fire Chief Paul Haas. In accordance with the City of Dover's already established Emergency Operations Plan, Chief Haas will ensure that fire and life safety guidelines of the New Hampshire Fire Marshal are met wherever and whenever a temporary emergency shelter is established and activated in Dover.

Know what's "In the Bin": How to keep your your recycling clear of contamination

The City of Dover and Pinard Waste would like to remind residents that only the items listed below should go in your household recycling bin:

- Metal: Food and beverage cans.
- Glass: Bottles and jars.
- Plastic: Bottles, jars, jugs and tubs.
- **Paper and Cardboard:** Mixed paper, newspaper, magazines and boxes.

When we recycle properly, materials can get to their next best use, which helps protect the environment by conserving natural resources, saving energy and reducing greenhouse gas emissions. Placing



items in recycling bins that are not recyclable such as Styrofoam, light bulbs, plastic flower pots and bags, contaminates the entire load and sends it to a landfill. It's important to know when an item is not recyclable and to place it in the trash. Follow these simple recycling guidelines:

- 1. Recycle all bottles, cans and paper.
- 2. Keep items clean and dry.
- 3. No plastic bags of any kind.

Not sure if an item is recyclable? When in doubt, visit <u>https://www.recyclesmartma.org/</u>. Enter the item name and click search.

Knowing what's "In the Bin" can help avoid contaminated loads of recycling, which are being rejected at processing centers and disposed as trash. These contaminated loads of recycling result in additional charges to the city.
