School Board to vote on FY2025 budget

Reduced tax cap overage request from \$2.9 million to just under \$2.3 million

The School Board is set to adopt its fiscal year 2025 budget at a 7 p.m. special meeting on Tuesday, Jan. 16. The School Board's budget will then be incorporated into the city-wide budget that will be introduced to the City Council next month.

On Monday, the School Board held its final budget workshop where the group informally agreed to forgo \$670,000 transfers into its capital reserve funds to reduce the local property tax burden. Coming into the budget workshop, the School Board's working budget totaled \$85,507,439 in estimated revenue and expenditures, proposing that \$58,022,509 be raised by local property taxes, a \$6,263,209, or a 12.1% increase over the adopted FY2024 adjusted budget. That put the School Board's budget an estimated \$2,962,549 above the education side of the city's tax cap calculation. The reduction of \$670,000 of capital reserve transfer and other adjustments brought the amount above the estimated tax cap to just under \$2.3 million.

The new budget does not add any new positions, and Superintendent William Harbron and Business Michael Administrator Limanni have explained the request for additional money above the tax cap is to maintain current services due to the significant loss in state education funding, including a reduction of \$2,254,464 in state adequacy

education aid and a \$183,412 reduction in the statewide education tax. There is also a significant increase in the estimated legally required special education costs. The FY2025 budget's estimated special education cost increase is \$2,569,369, which includes \$1,123,000 in legally required special education transportation costs.

The proposed budget also includes an increase of \$1,518,309 in wages and benefits from the three union contracts approved by the School Board and City Council this year, affecting the Dover Teachers Union, Dover Paraeducators, and the Dover Educational Office Personnel unions.

"All we're asking for this year is the status quo to keep what we're doing and not take away any more positions," said School Board Chair Robin Trefethen at the School Board's Jan. 8 workshop.

Respiratory virus surge straining hospitals; City advises caution

The City of Dover is urging residents to be vigilant as New Hampshire experiences high levels of influenza, COVID-19 and respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) activity this winter. This respiratory virus surge is straining healthcare facilities across New Hampshire, including Wentworth-Douglass Hospital in Dover.



In response to a health alert issued by the New Hampshire Department of Health and Human Services (NH DHHS), the City is actively working with local health authorities and institutions to effectively manage the public health situation.

Dover Fire Chief and Emergency Management Director, Michael McShane, emphasizes the importance of community vigilance during this time.

"We are facing a serious situation with the co-circulation of multiple respiratory viruses,"

McShane said. "It is crucial for everyone to follow health guidelines. Stay up to date with vaccinations, avoid crowded places, and seek medical advice early if you experience symptoms. Together, we can navigate through this challenging period by being responsible and caring for each other."

To safeguard the health and well-being of all residents, the City of Dover advises the public to adhere to the following safety tips:

- Get Vaccinated: Ensure you are up to date with COVID-19, flu, and eligible for RSV vaccinations.
- Stay Home if Sick: If you exhibit symptoms like fever, sore throat, or cough, stay home and seek medical advice.
- Cover Coughs and Sneezes: Use tissue paper to cover your mouth and nose when you cough or sneeze.
- Frequent Hand Washing: Wash hands regularly with soap and water for at least 20 seconds.
- **Consider Masking**: Wear masks in crowded or high-risk areas to protect yourself and others, especially the vulnerable.

In response to the influx of patients with respiratory illnesses, Wentworth-Douglass Hospital has activated additional policies, including universal masking requirements for staff and care teams in all clinical areas. Patients and visitors are strongly encouraged to wear a facility-issued face mask during direct interactions with staff in patient rooms and clinical care areas where direct care is provided.


Dover Arts Commission now accepting applications for City Arts Grant

The Dover Arts Commission is accepting applications for its City Arts Grant, with winning proposals to be awarded up to \$3,000.

City Arts Grants are available to individual artists and arts organizations to create visual art, music, dance, theatre, film, and literary projects that benefit the residents of Dover and enrich the city's cultural life. Eligible projects include concerts, performances, festivals, workshops, exhibits, readings, after-school programs, and other creative endeavors that engage the arts and artists to benefit the community.

City Arts Grants have a rolling deadline and applications can be submitted anytime during the City of Dover's fiscal year, which runs from July 1 to June 30.

City Council honors girls golf champ Carys Fennessy

Dover Mayor Robert Carrier recognized Dover High School junior and golfer Carys Fennessy's recent championships at the Jan. 10 City Council meeting, reading a proclamation praising her accomplishments.

Fennessy won her third consecutive state individual golf championship in October 2023. Last November, Fennessy won the New England Girls Golf Championship in Connecticut with a score of 67, five under par.

"She is an inspiration to our community, embodying the values of hard work, dedication, and sportsmanship," Mayor Carrier said, reading from the proclamation.

The proclamation highlighted Fennessy's eight tournament wins in 2023, scoring an average of 73.5 strokes across all events. It noted that she has committed to attending the College of Charleston in South Carolina on a golf scholarship after graduation.

"May her success serve as a beacon of pride for the City of Dover," Carrier said.

Carrier and the Dover City Council proclaimed Jan. 10, 2024, as a day to recognize Fennessy's accomplishments and presented her with the proclamation at the City Council meeting.

January 16 is the last day that residents can register to vote in the City Clerk's office before the Jan. 23 primary election. Following this date, voter registration will occur at the voter's polling place on Election Day. However, this does not apply to those requesting an absentee ballot. Residents requesting an absentee ballot may also register to vote in the City Clerk's office until 5:30 p.m. on Monday, Jan. 22, the day before the election.

be held on Tuesday, March 12, 2023.





The following events are from various historical records, sources, and texts about the history of Dover.


Jan. 15, 1704 — The highest tide ever at the time was observed on this day. The tide caused great damage to warehouses and cellars; carried away some houses and many stages at the Isle of Shoals; transported many hay stacks, and in some places tore up great quantities of marsh and removed it far off into other places.

Jan. 16, 1766 — Lee, part of the original territory of Dover, and later Durham, was set off and incorporated as a town on this day.

Jan. 14, 1776 — Johnson, a Native American, arrived in Dover on this day to preach, receiving a contribution of 5 pounds and 4 shillings.

Jan. 15, 1822 — (From the Strafford Register) "Died, Mr. Dover Gage, a respectable black man, at a very advanced age. He and his sister, were stolen from his parents in Africa, while playing a short distance from his home by some of those miscreants in human shape who violate the rights of their fellow man and make slaves of those whose complexions the God of all may have tinged with a darker hue than their own. He lived in this town from his youth, useful and respected, but it seems to have been the peculiarly hard fate of Mr. Gage to have been denied a home where his own choice or that of his friends would have fixed him: for scarcely had he been placed in his grave ere his body was again stolen, and it may be by his unrelenting white persecutors."

Jan. 12, 1856 — One of the greatest snowstorms known for many years. The ground was covered to a depth of nearly two feet and drifted in many places to a depth of five or six feet. All the railroad trains were thrown into confusion, and travel was much impeded.

Dover residents invited to free workshop on private well water safety

The Seacoast Private Well Initiative invites residential private well users in Dover to a free workshop and water testing event. Aimed at educating homeowners on the health risks associated with common well water contaminants, this event is scheduled for Tuesday, Jan. 30, 2024, at 6 p.m. at the Dover City Hall Auditorium, located at 288 Central Ave.

Participants will learn about contaminants that may affect their well water, such as radon, arsenic, lead, and PFAS, and the importance of regular water testing. The workshop will cover the types of contaminants to test for, reasons for testing, and the process of collecting water samples. In addition, attendees will receive guidance on selecting the appropriate water treatment solutions if contaminants are found.

The event is part of an ongoing effort to ensure the safety and health of the community's drinking water. Experts will be on hand to explain the testing process, and private well attendees will leave with a test kit and instructions for returning filled bottles for analysis.
