



Coming up at the next City Council meeting

Ordinance before City Council approves searchable, electronic version of City Code

At its regular meeting on Wednesday, Jan. 22, the City Council will vote on an ordinance to codify recent changes to the City Code, as well as a new, electronic database. The Want the latest news and important information about your city? Check out the City of Dover's official <u>Facebook</u> <u>page</u> and <u>twitter feed</u> for the latest updates. vote will follow a public hearing.

In 2017, the City Council approved a contract with General Code to conduct a comprehensive review and update of the City Code, which was previously updated and recodified in 2013. The contract included General Code's recommended updates to all chapters of the City code, as well as a newly formatted electronic version that is easily searchable. Currently, the Code is published as PDF files on the City's website and as paper copies, neither of which is easily searchable.

During its review of the City Code, General Code conducted an editorial and legal analysis of the code, as well as draft versions of online code in the eCode360 format for review by the Ordinance Committee and City staff. The Ordinance Committee has been reviewing these materials since January 2019.

The ordinance before the City Council to recodify the City Code does not include substantial changes to the code, other than providing clarity of language, accurate citation of referenced state statutes, consistency of terminology, and a more accessible and searchable version of the code. Code revisions identified by the Ordinance Committee and City staff will be addressed by a separate City Council resolution and ordinance changes.

Although General Code does recommend some revisions to the City Charter, which were identified as part of the editorial and legal analysis, Charter revisions will be addressed with the establishment of a Charter Commission and a vote by the public in an upcoming municipal election.

The Jan. 22 City Council meeting begins at 7 p.m. in Council Chambers at City Hall.

Colder temperatures continue tonight Warming centers open, including additional overnight location

Temperatures tonight, Friday, Jan. 17, 2020, are expected to reach a low of zero degrees. The complete forecast for Dover from the National Weather Service can be viewed here: <u>go.usa.gov/xPGSn</u>.

As colder weather continues, Dover's warming centers remain open.

For those seeking to warm up, several City of Dover public facilities are available as warming centers. Dover's warming

centers include the McConnell Center, the Public Library and City Hall. These specific public buildings are accessible and welcome those seeking relief from the cold during regular business hours.

Warming centers in Dover are also available and accessible anytime at the City's Police Station, located downtown on Chestnut Street, and the City's three fire stations. The Liberty North End Fire Station is located at 262 Sixth St. The Central Fire Station is located at 9-11 Broadway. The South End Fire Station is located at 25 Durham Road.

In addition, an overnight warming center at the Niles Park Community Center, located at 58 Union Street, will open at 6 p.m. today, Friday, Jan. 17, from 6 p.m. until 8 a.m. Saturday. This location is for overnight warming only, with no sleeping arrangements. The warming center received authorization to open from Dover Fire and Rescue. While open, the warming center will be staffed by volunteers.

Additional overnight warming centers will be available this week as follows:

A warming center at St. John's United Methodist Church, located at 28 Cataract Ave., will be open from 6 p.m. to 8 a.m. on Sunday, Jan. 19 and Monday, Jan. 20. This location is for overnight warming only, with no sleeping arrangements. The warming center will be staffed by volunteers.

A warming center at the assembly hall at St. George's Maronite Church, located at 15 Chapel St., will be open from 6 p.m. to 8 a.m. on Tuesday, Jan. 21 and Wednesday, Jan. 22. This location is for overnight warming only, with no sleeping arrangements. Access to the St. George's Maronite Church warming center is from Mechanic Street, not the main entrance to the church. The warming center will be staffed by volunteers.

Other organizations interested in opening and operating a temporary emergency shelter in Dover are asked to contact and coordinate with the City of Dover's Emergency Management Director, Fire Chief Paul Haas. In accordance with the City of Dover's already established Emergency Operations Plan, Chief Haas will ensure that fire and life safety guidelines of the New Hampshire Fire Marshal are met wherever and whenever a temporary emergency shelter is established and activated in Dover.

In conjunction with the City of Dover's walk-in warming centers located throughout the community, the City's Public Welfare Department is available to coordinate services for those who need and want emergency assistance, including shelter, food and medical care. The Public Welfare Department offices at the McConnell Center are open Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., and can be reached by phone at 603-516-6500. For after-hours emergency needs, the public welfare program also remains accessible simply by calling 603-742-4646 or visiting the police or fire stations to request assistance. Police and fire personnel are trained emergency responders and will notify and coordinate with the City's public welfare providers, day or night, getting assistance to those who truly want help. This assistance can include finding available shelter space, day or night, along with transportation, if needed.

To further assist with emergency sheltering needs throughout the Tri-City area, the Strafford County's Extreme Cold Weather Shelter, located at 276 County Farm Road in Dover, may also open when deemed necessary by area emergency management officials and the Strafford County Commissioners. Should this temporary emergency facility be activated, the City of Dover will share this information via the City's website at <u>www.dover.nh.gov</u>, via email notifications, social media, and Channel 22. American Red Cross lifeguard training course offered at Dover Indoor Pool

An American Red Cross Lifeguard Training Course will be held at the Dover Indoor Pool, Sunday, Feb. 23 through Thursday, Feb. 27. Participants will gain the knowledge and skills needed to prevent and respond to aquatic emergencies. The course includes the latest science in first aid, CPR/AED for the Professional Rescuer, emergency cardiac care, as well as the latest lifeguarding rescue skills and safety protocols. Students must be at least 15 years old by the last day of the class.

The following prerequisites must be fulfilled:

- Swim 300 yards continuously.
- Tread water for 2 minutes.
- Starting in the water, the participant must be able to swim 20 yards using front crawl or breaststroke, surface dive 7-10 feet, retrieve a 10-pound object, return to surface, swim 20 yards back to the starting point with the object and exit water without using a ladder or steps within 1 minute, 40 seconds.
- No refunds will be given for failure to pass prerequisite requirements.
- All course dates MUST be attended in order to pass the

course.

- Tuesday, 12-6 p.m.
- Wednesday, 12-6 p.m.
- Thursday, 12-4 p.m.

The cost of the course is \$200.

Time to renew dog licenses

Dog licenses for 2020 are now available. All dogs must be licensed by April 30 to avoid a late fee. The cost for a male or female dog is \$10, a neutered male or spayed female dog is \$7.50 and puppies (3-7 months) are \$7.50 for first licensing.

Residents 65 years of age or older may license one dog for \$3. Additional licenses require regular fees.

The City Clerk's office requires proof of rabies information and a certificate of spaying or neutering.

Late fees of \$1 a month begin June 1.

Dog licenses can be renewed at the City Clerk's office at City Hall, by mail or online.

In addition to online licensing, rabies information can also be updated online and the certificate mailed to the City Clerk's office.

A checking account is required for online dog license registration. To ensure privacy, dog owners must provide the dog's tag number.

Jan. 17, 1664 - Thomas Layton and John Roberts were chosen to "appraise goods taken by distress," and Robert Burnuni and William Follett to "go in preambulation of the towns bounds "between Dover and Exeter. Philip Chesley was also chosen to look after "persons that do trangress the town's orders about the cutting of timber for pipe staves," at Oyster river.


Jan. 22, 1770 - The town voted to build a new bridge over Cochecho River "at the upper ware next below Capt. Waldron's mills at the lower falls." Two hundred pounds were raised by tax for the purpose and two shillings lawful money was to be paid per day to the men working on the same, finding themselves. A meeting was held Feb. 26, to see if the town would reconsider the above vote, when "by polling" it was voted not to reconsider.

Jan. 23, 1777 - Theophilus Dame, Esq., sheriff of the County of Strafford, received orders from the Committee of Safety to "liberate from prison all such of the New York prisoners as gave bonds with two sufficient sureties, to the Speaker of the House, to remain true prisoners within the town of Dover, such sureties being inhabitants of this State."

Jan. 19, 1836 - the Rev. Holmes Cushman, a Methodist minister and afterwards a trader in Dover, was sentenced to the Massachusetts State Prison for three years, for obtaining goods by false pretenses in Boston.

Jan. 18, 1855 - The shock of an earthquake was felt in many places about half past six in the evening.



Rochester author Russ Staples to recount his historic Everest Odyssey

More than 50 years ago, author Russ Staples trekked from Kathmandu to Mount Everest in sneakers and a borrowed backpack, making him one of the earliest Americans to set foot at the 17,800-foot base camp.

To celebrate, Staples will be promoting his recently published memoir, My Everest Odyssey, at the Dover Public Library on Wednesday, Jan. 29 at 6:30 p.m. Copies of his book will be available for sale and signing.



The New Hampshire native was one of the earliest trekkers to

the base of Mount Everest, the world's tallest mountain. While a Peace Corps volunteer in southern India in 1967, the 22 year old set out with a borrowed backpack, \$200 in his pocket and an abundance of youthful enthusiasm that would serve him well on his often-harrowing, 27-day, 400-mile journey by foot.

Unlike Everest adventures of today, Staples' 1967 hike was unsupported -- the robust Everest tourism industry hadn't yet arrived in Nepal. There were no planes, no hospitals, and certainly no rescues. Instead, he relied on the generosity and kindness of rural Nepali farmers and his own grit and determination. His journey took him by ancient Buddhist monasteries, through neatly terraced fields and pristine Himalayan wilderness as he walked in the footsteps of Sir Edmund Hillary and the 1963 American expedition.

Staples' memoir is based on the journal he kept during his trek and includes incredible, never-before-published photos of an Everest and a Nepal that exist now only in the pages of history books.

The program is free and open to the public.

Know what's "In the Bin": How to keep your your recycling clear of contamination

The City of Dover and Pinard Waste would like to remind residents that only the items listed below should go in your household recycling bin:

- Metal: Food and beverage cans.
- Glass: Bottles and jars.
- Plastic: Bottles, jars, jugs and tubs.
- Paper and Cardboard: Mixed paper, newspaper, magazines and boxes.

When we recycle properly, materials can get to their next best use, which helps protect the environment by conserving natural resources, saving energy and reducing greenhouse gas emissions. Placing



items in recycling bins that are not recyclable such as Styrofoam, light bulbs, plastic flower pots and bags, contaminates the entire load and sends it to a landfill. It's important to know when an item is not recyclable and to place it in the trash. Follow these simple recycling guidelines:

1. Recycle all bottles, cans and paper.

- 2. Keep items clean and dry.
- 3. No plastic bags of any kind.

Knowing what's "In the Bin" can help avoid contaminated loads of recycling, which are being rejected at processing centers and disposed as trash. These contaminated loads of recycling result in additional charges to the city.
