Winter storm to bring significant snowfall to Dover

The City of Dover is monitoring weather reports about a storm system that is expected to bring significant snowfall and whiteout conditions to Dover Saturday evening and Sunday. A Winter Storm Watch is in effect for Dover.

According to the most recent information from the National Weather Service, on Saturday night into Sunday snow will quickly break out across the area. to dangerous, especially with winds that can reduce visibility to one quarter mile or less at times.

Once the storm arrives, Community Services crews will begin plowing operations to keep the city's streets and road shoulders clear.

For anyone travelling during the storm, motorists are reminded to avoid crowding snowplows and to allow emergency vehicles to pass.

For updated storm information, including closures and cancellations, visit dover.nh.gov.

Some winter storm safety suggestions include:

- Keep generators a minimum of 10 feet from homes and make sure they are wired correctly;
- Clear vehicles of snow before driving;
- Keep all chimneys and vents clear to prevent carbon monoxide from backing up into the building. Some vents, such as pellet stove vents, may exit the building through a wall and are susceptible to being blocked by excessive snow buildup on the outside of the building;
- Keep all exits clear of snow so occupants can escape quickly if a fire, or other emergency, should occur. Keep in mind that windows should be cleared to allow a secondary means of escape in case the primary means of escape is blocked by fire. Keeping exits clear also allows emergency workers to access your building;
- Keep fire hydrants clear of snow;
- Be aware of thin ice under snow;
- Check roof drains and gutters and make sure they are clear of snow and ice.

Citywide parking ban begins Saturday

Due to the winter storm system anticipated this weekend and to allow for snow removal operations, Director of Community Services John Storer has declared a citywide parking ban. The citywide ban begins at 10 p.m. on Saturday, Jan. 19 and concludes at 6 a.m. on Tuesday, Jan. 22, except for the downtown. The ban will be in effect downtown on Sunday, Jan. 20, from 1 to 6 a.m., and on Monday, Jan. 21, from 1 to 6 a.m.

How to stay informed about citywide parking bans

When a declared parking ban is in effect, parking on city streets is prohibited. Any vehicle parked on the street, sidewalk or adjacent public parking area during a declared parking ban may be ticketed and/or towed at the vehicle owner's expense.

There are a number of ways for residents to stay informed about weather-related parking bans:

Tune into **Channel 22**, where winter parking ban notifications will appear when declared.

Sign up for **text alerts**, which will be sent when a parking ban is declared, via the city's emergency notification system, CodeRed. Select "Parking Ban Notifications." You can access the sign-up page here: <https://public.coderedweb.com/CNE/en-US/BF3E3900491F>. Please note that to sign up for text alerts, you must create a managed account. Once created, you'll see the option to select parking ban notifications.

Sign up for **email alerts** at bit.ly/doverdownload. Select Parking Ban Alerts.

The current parking ban status will be posted **online** at drivingdover.com and the city's winter parking ban page at www.dover.nh.gov/government/city-operations/police/parking-bureau/parking-bans.html.

Follow the city's **social media** accounts on Facebook and Twitter for parking ban updates and status.

Parking ban declarations will also be sent to **local media**, including newspaper, radio and television outlets.

Take action before the storm

Before winter approaches, Dover Fire and Rescue recommends adding supplies to an emergency kit to prepare for the weather. This may include rock salt to melt ice on walkways, sand to improve traction, snow shovels and other snow removal equipment. Make sure you have adequate clothing and blankets to keep you and your family warm. Consider purchasing a generator to use in the event of prolonged power outages.

Other steps to be ready:

- Complete a Family Emergency Plan and discuss it as a family. This is a simple way of keeping each member of the family informed on critical information: where to reconnect should you become separated, who to call, and what you will do should a winter storm occur.
- Have an Emergency Contacts Card and place one in your Emergency Kit.
- Prepare an Emergency Kit. The Emergency Kit should be easily accessible should you and your family be forced to shelter in place (stay at home) for a period of time.

Take action at home:

- Have your heating system checked by a professional annually. This will ensure that your system is working safely and efficiently which, in turn, will save you money.
- If you heat by wood, clean your fireplace or stove, have your chimney flue checked for any buildup of creosote and then cleaned to lessen the risk of fire.
- Make sure your home is well insulated and that you have weather stripping around your doors and windowsills to keep the warm air inside.
- Close off unneeded rooms, stuff towels or rags in the cracks under doors and cover windows at night.
- Use extreme caution when using alternative heating sources. Refuel kerosene heaters outside and keep them at least three feet from flammable objects. When using kerosene heaters, be sure to maintain ventilation to avoid build-up of toxic fumes.
- To keep pipes from freezing wrap pipes in insulation, heat tape or layers of old newspapers. Cover the newspapers with plastic to keep out moisture and let faucets drip a little to avoid freezing.
- Learn how to shut off water valves in case a pipe bursts. If the pipes freeze, remove any insulation or layers of newspapers and wrap pipes in rags.
- Disconnect garden hoses and shut off and drain water from pipes leading to outside faucets. This reduces the chance of freezing in the short span of pipe just inside the house.

Take action in the car

- Plan ahead for winter travel. Be sure to let someone know where you are going, along with your primary and alternate routes.
- Prepare your vehicle for winter by checking, or having your mechanic check, your car. This includes antifreeze levels, battery and ignition systems, breaks, exhaust systems, fuel and air filters, lights, oil, and windshield wipers and fluid.

Help with snow removal by keeping city's right-of-way clear

With the potential for up to a foot of snow or more this weekend, Community Services is reminding property owners to keep the City's right-of-way clear of obstructions.

The City's right-of-way applies to streets, sidewalks, utility poles, trees, signs and water, sewer and drainage lines. Obstructions in the right-of-way, such as lawn markers, pose a safety concern to fire apparatus and maintenance equipment, and can prohibit the City's plow crews from maintaining adequate road width during winter storms.

The City's right-of-way is typically 50 feet, and extends 12 to 14 feet beyond the edge of pavement. This additional space is often necessary for snow removal and storage during the winter months, and allows crews to maintain clear and safe roadways.

In addition, be mindful of other obstructions that may interfere with snow removal during and after winter storms. For example, trash bags and recycling bins on city streets and sidewalks can impede the work of snow plows and sidewalk tractors.

The New Hampshire Department of Transportation (NHDOT) also reminds residents and visitors that no parking is permitted on state maintained roads which will impact or prevent snow removal operations.

NH State law (RSA 262:32) allows for the towing of any vehicle that is "obstructing snow removal or highway maintenance operations." Additionally, residents and visitors are reminded there is no parking at any time along any Interstate highway.

Strafford County cold weather shelter to open Saturday

The Strafford County Extreme Cold Weather Shelter, located at 276 County Farm Road in Dover, will open Saturday, Jan. 19, at 2 p.m. to ensure any unsheltered county residents are safe from extreme, life-threatening cold, according to the Strafford County Commissioners. The shelter is adjacent to Southeastern New Hampshire Services.

The shelter will remain open until 10 a.m. on Tuesday, Jan. 22.

Transportation to the shelter is available by shuttle from the Amtrak platform at the Dover Transportation Center (train and bus station) on or around every hour, from 2 p.m. to 8 p.m. on Saturday and on the same schedule, weather permitting, on Sunday. The COAST bus route to the County Complex will be available Monday. Upon closing, transportation coordination will be provided via COAST bus passes and shuttle service to local community service partner agencies.

Are your pipes protected?

With colder weather in the forecast, be sure to protect against frozen pipes and water damage.

Here are some tips to help prevent frozen pipes:

- Keep building temperatures as consistent as possible, never less than 55 degrees Fahrenheit;
- Insulate areas where water supply lines are located and eliminate drafts;
- If you have water pipes in basements, crawl spaces, or outside walls, insulate the pipes, using pipe-sleeves or other insulating material;
- Allow warm air to circulate by opening up doors to closets and cabinets where pipe chases are located;
- If you suspect that a pipe is particularly susceptible to freezing, as an emergency measure, leave water running at a trickle to prevent freezing. This is never recommended as a permanent measure and should be monitored frequently;
- Dry sprinkler systems are still susceptible to freezing, as water can accumulate in low spots and through

- condensation. All sprinkler systems should be regularly maintained. Contact your sprinkler maintenance company for recommendations;
- Have a plan in place for responding to water leaks and heating failures;
 - Never use torches or devices with open flames to thaw frozen pipes;
 - Seal cracks: caulk around door frames and windows to reduce incoming cold air. Winter winds whistling through overlooked openings can quickly freeze exposed water pipes;
 - Open cupboard doors in the kitchen and bathrooms: Water lines supplying these rooms are frequently on outside walls. Leaving the doors open when the temperature is below freezing allows them to get more heat;
 - Protect outdoor pipes and faucets: In some homes, the outside faucet has its own shut-off in the basement in addition to the shut-off valve for the entire house. If you have a separate valve for outside faucets, close the valve, remove hoses and drain the faucet. If you don't have a separate valve, wrap the outside faucets (hose bibs) in newspapers or rags covered with plastic;
 - Insulate indoor pipes or faucets in unheated areas: pipes in internal unheated areas such as the garage or crawl space under the house should be wrapped with insulated foam. Wrap the entire length of the exposed pipe and cover all valves and pipe fittings.

Remember, when temperatures that hover in the teens or drop to single digits for an extended period of time can weaken pipes and cause breaks.

WHEN TEMPERATURES STAY BELOW FREEZING:

- Give pipes a helping hand**
If pipes run through cabinets or vanities, open the doors to let warmer room temperatures flow in.
- Keep water working**
Keep water moving through the pipes by allowing a small trickle of water to run. The cost of the extra water is typically lower than the cost of repairing a broken pipe.

BUT IF YOUR PIPES DO FREEZE:

- Shut off the water immediately**
Don't attempt to thaw pipes without turning off the main shut-off valve.
- Thaw pipes with warm air**
You can melt the frozen water in the pipe by warming the air around it with a hair dryer or space heater. Be sure not to leave space heaters unattended and avoid the use of kerosene heaters or open flames.
- Be careful turning water back on**
Once pipes are thawed, slowly turn the water back on and check pipes and joints for any cracks or leaks that might have been caused by freezing.

Time to renew dog licenses

Dog licenses for 2019 are now available. All dogs must be licensed by April 30 to avoid a late fee. The cost for a male or female dog is \$10, a neutered male or spayed female dog is \$7.50 and puppies (3-7 months) are \$7.50 for first licensing.

Residents 65 years of age or older may license one dog for \$3. Additional licenses require regular fees.

The City Clerk's office requires proof of rabies information and a certificate of spaying or neutering.

Late fees of \$1 a month begin June 1.

Dog licenses can be renewed at the City Clerk's office at City Hall, by mail or online.

In addition to online licensing, rabies information can also be updated online and the certificate mailed to the City Clerk's office.

A checking account is required for online dog license registration. To ensure privacy, dog owners must provide the dog's tag number.

Winter Recess



The following events are recorded in "Notable Events in the History of Dover, New Hampshire: From the First Settlement in 1623 to 1865," by George Wadleigh, and several other historical sources.

For more on the history of Dover, settled in 1623 and the oldest permanent settlement in New Hampshire and seventh oldest in the country, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street; and the Woodman Museum, Central Avenue. Jan. 22, 1770 - The town voted to build a new bridge over the Cochecho River "below Capt. Waldron's mills at the lower falls." Two hundred pounds were raised by taxes for the work. A meeting was held Feb. 26 to see if the town would reconsider the above vote, when "by polling" it was voted not to reconsider.



Jan. 19, 1810 - The memorable "Cold Friday" occurred in Dover and throughout the region, of which mention is frequently made by New England historians. The thermometer ranged all day long from 15 to 20 degrees below zero while the wind attained to the proportions of a hurricane. A family in Sanbornton, whose house was prostrated by the gale, perished before its members could reach the nearest shelter, a half mile away. A stage driver on the route from Boston to Salem, was found frozen stiff upon his box with the reins in his hands, when the horses halted before the hotel door in Lynn.



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Jan. 19, 1836 - The Rev. Holmes Cushman, a Methodist minister and afterwards a trader in Dover, was sentenced to the Massachusetts State Prison for three years, for obtaining goods by false pretenses in Boston.



Jan. 18, 1855 - The shock of an earthquake was felt in many places about half past six in the evening.
