

Parking, traffic restrictions in place for Central Falls retaining wall work

Work to reconstruct the Central Falls retaining wall began this week. While the work is under way, Central Avenue will be restricted to one lane from the Central Avenue Bridge to Orchard Street. In addition, eight parking spaces on the bridge are unavailable. These traffic and parking restrictions are necessary for crews to move and store equipment, and will remain in place for the duration of the restoration work. Sidewalks and crosswalks in the area will remain open.

The contractor, George R. Cairns and Sons, Inc. of Windham, expects to conclude work sometime in March.

Demolition of the wall will begin the week of Jan. 7. More than 2,000 cubic yards of material will removed from the site and trucked away. That work will continue throughout January.

In February, the contractor anticipates laying the new foundation, with the new wall being in place sometime in March.

Crews will return in the spring for landscaping work.

State to hold public hearing in Dover on privatization of bus

terminals, Spaulding Turnpike service area

The State of New Hampshire's Public-Private Partnership Infrastructure Oversight Commission will hold a second public hearing on Wednesday, Jan. 9, 2019 at 6:30 p.m. at the Dover City Hall Auditorium, 288 Central Ave., on proposed projects for the privatization of the Dover and Portsmouth bus terminals, and the development of the Spaulding Turnpike Service Area.

The public is invited to attend and provide comments on whether the public-private partnership is the appropriate procurement method.

The agenda is as follows:

- 6:30 p.m.: Public hearing to receive public comment on proposed privatization of the Dover and Portsmouth Bus Terminals.
- 7 p.m.: Public hearing to receive public comment on proposed development of the Spaulding Turnpike Service Area.

The regular meeting of the Public-Private Partnership Infrastructure Oversight Commission will immediately follow the public comment sessions.

If the hearing is postponed, it will be rescheduled to Wednesday, Jan. 16, 2019 at 6:30 p.m., Dover City Hall Auditorium.

The following events are recorded in "Notable Events in the History of Dover, New Hampshire: From the First Settlement in 1623 to 1865," by George Wadleigh, and several other historical sources.

For more on the history of Dover, settled in 1623 and the oldest permanent settlement in New Hampshire and seventh oldest in the country, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street; and the Woodman Museum, Central Avenue. Jan. 4, 1835 - The coldest morning observed for many years, the thermometer indicating 28 degrees below zero.

Jan. 7, 1845 - The Hon. John P. Hale's letter to his

constituents against the annexation of Texas is published. Hale refused to obey a resolution of the state legislature directing him and the New Hampshire delegation in Congress to support the annexation of Texas. Hale argued the measure was only presented to promote slavery. The Democratic State convention was quickly reassembled and Hale's nomination was withdrawn.




Jan. 6, 1850 - Died in Concord, Jeremiah Stickney, aged 85. He was the first person to manufacture cotton and woolen hand cards in Dover, having established the business here as early as 1798, in a building which stood where the No. 2 Factory was built. For many years he employed a large number of people, principally children, in the manufacturing of cards, the teeth of which were set by hand. The manufacturing of cards by machinery, which was introduced about 1820, replaced the old process, and he gave up the business.

Jan. 6, 1862 - The row of buildings formerly known as Marston's Block caught fire in the store of D. H. Wendell, and before the fire was extinguished five or six stores and property to the amount of \$20,000 was destroyed.



Jan. 8, 1863 - Charles H. Flanders of Dover, a soldier in Co. K, 11th Regiment, who died of wounds received at the battle of Fredericksburg, was buried with military honors by the Strafford Guards.




"The White Mountain" with Dan Szczesny at Dover Library Jan. 15

On Tuesday, Jan. 15 at 7 p.m., the Friends of the Dover Public Library will present a talk by author, lecturer, and journalist Dan Szczesny about his newest book, "The White Mountain". Over the course of one calendar year, Szczesny explored the history and mystique of New England's tallest mountain. But Mount Washington is more than just a 6,288foot rock pile: the mountain is the cultural soul of climbers, hikers, and tourists from around the world looking to test their mettle against its extreme conditions in return for a chance to experience its most intense natural beauty.

Szczesny's research took him outside of the archives; he

was on the team of a 97-yearold ultra-runner, he dressed as Walt Whitman and read poetry while hiking up the mountain, and he spent a week in winter cooking for the scientists at the Observatory. In "The White Mountain", Szczesny turned a veteran journalist's eye toward exploring Mount Washington's place in the collective consciousness of the country and our state. He explores how this rugged NH landscape reflects our timeless obsession and passion for exploration and discovery.



Dan Szczesny is a long-time resident of New Hampshire. His other books include travelogues on Nepal and Alaska. He is a Hemingway Foundation finalist for short fiction and has also written collections of short stories and poetry. Dan has traveled widely throughout the country speaking about adventure travel and the importance of getting kids into the outdoors. He currently calls Manchester, New Hampshire his Base Camp where he lives with his wife and daughter. Learn more about Dan's work at <u>www.danszczesny.com</u>.

STEM Saturday at the Dover Public Library: Balloon-powered cars

Get ready, set, go! Kids in grades K and up are invited to join the fun at the Dover Public Library on Saturday, Jan.12 at 2 p.m. to make balloon-powered cars race in the Lecture Hall.

Did you know? Balloon-powered cars use jet power to move. The stored air in the balloon pushes through a straw, creating thrust-the force that pushes the car forward. So when air from the balloon moves in one direction, it pushes the car in the opposite direction.

How far will they go? We will experiment with how to make the cars go farther by reducing friction (rubbing), by lightening the car, by pointing the jet back straighter, and by straightening the axles.
