# Nelson Street construction begins week of July 4

Construction work on Nelson Street and the upper part of Atkinson Street is expected to begin the week of July 4. Work will include roadway and sidewalk reconstruction, as well as upgrades to underground utilities throughout the neighborhood.

#### New traffic patters in effect for Chestnut Street

Crews have completed striping on Chestnut Street to accommodate traffic pattern changes. These new traffic patterns are now in effect.

The new traffic patterns and street markings are as follows:

- The double-yellow line on Chestnut Street, between Fourth and Third streets in the direction of Washington Street, will be revised to guide motorists to a new through-lane;
- A dedicated left-turn-only lane will be marked for motorists turning left onto First Street from Chestnut Street:
- A dedicated left-turn-only lane will be marked for motorists turning left into the Transportation Center parking lot from Chestnut Street;
- To help guide motorists, a painted island will be installed in the area between the railroad tracks on Chestnut and First streets.
- A parking bay will be installed at the outermost lane on Chestnut Street, from First Street to the crosswalk by the Post Office;
- A painted island will be installed on Chestnut Street from the location of the Post Office, in the direction of First Street, to facilitate a single through-lane in either direction;
- A bus pull-out area will be created by the Post Office, at the location of the existing crosswalk;
- A bus pull-out area will be designated in front of the police station.

In the coming weeks, additional work will include:

 The crosswalk adjacent to the Post Office will be relocated towards Washington Street. Handicapped accessible tipdowns will be installed, along with a bumpdown on the Post Office side of the crosswalk.

# Hourly on-street parking rates increase 25 cents July 1 today

Dover Police Chief Anthony F. Colarusso, Jr. announces that meter rates for on-street spaces will increase from 75 cents to \$1 per hour starting today, Friday, July 1, 2016. The increase was authorized by Dover City Council as part of the recently adopted fiscal year budget and fee schedule.

Meter rates will not change for the parking garage and surface parking lots. In addition, there are no changes to the rates for all-day parking on River Street or at the Transportation Center.

The last meter rate increase was in 2009 when the Orchard Street and Belknap Street lots, and Henry Law Avenue, were the only metered locations. The remainder of the downtown was metered in 2011.

"This increase was recommended by the Parking Commission several months ago based on a recognition and belief in the importance to the City of a vibrant active central business district, which in large part depends on adequate and convenient parking," Colarusso said. "The additional parking capacity provided in the new parking garage is an important advancement, but it became important to carefully manage our parking capacity to assure maximum benefit."

The following events are recorded in "Notable Events in the History of Dover, New Hampshire: From the First Settlement in 1623 to 1865," by George Wadleigh, "Historic Rambles About Dover," by Robert A. Whitehouse, "Port of Dover: Two Centuries of Shipping on the Cochecho" by Robert A. Whitehouse and Cathleen C. Beaudoin, and several other historical sources.

July 6, 1690 - Two companies under the Captains Floyd and Wiswall, who were scouting, discovered an Indian track, which they pursued until they came up with the enemy at Wheelwright's Pond in Lee (then a part of Dover), where a bloody engagement ensued for some hours; in which Wiswall, his lieutenant, Flagg, and sergeant Walker, with twelve more, were killed, and several wounded. It was not known how many of the enemy fell, as they always carried off their dead. Floyd maintained the fight after Wiswall's death, till his men, fatigued and wounded, drew off; which obliged him to follow. The enemy retreated at the same time; for when Captain Convers went to look after the wounded, he found seven alive, whom he brought in by sunrise the next morning, and then returned to bury the dead. **July 8, 1707** - John Bunker and Ichabod Rawlins, both of Dover, going with a cart from Lt. Zachariah Field's garrison to James Bunker's for a loom, were assaulted by many Indians, and both slain. The enemy, supposed to be 20 or 30 in number, slaughtered many cattle for the Jones's at the same time, to the number of 15 or more. (Pike)

July 5, 1792 - From the pages of the Dover Phoenix: "We are informed from good authority that a canal is to be dug from Winnipesaukee pond to unite the waters with Cochecho River - and that a subscription is filling for that purpose - and we hear that a gentleman of Property in Portsmouth has offered 500 pounds towards the undertaking - and considering the rage for Canal cutting - it will be accomplished with ease - as 'tis said, that the water in the pond at the time of the great freshet, a few years since, overflowed, and found their way into Cochecho River."



**July 4, 1807** - "On this day the Federalists of this town celebrated the anniversary of the day on which America became independent in the true spirit of Freemen. The day was ushered in by the discharge of cannon and ringing of the bells. At 10 o'clock, A.M. a procession was formed at Mrs. Tebbetts' by Ezra Green, Esq. the Marshal of the day; consisting of about sixty gentlemen of this and the neighboring towns who (preceded by a number of gentlemen musicians of this town who generously volunteered their services in promoting the amusements of the day) marched to the Meeting-house. The public exercises commenced with an appropriate ode, composed for the occasion by Henry Mellen, Esq. which was sung and played by a select band of musicians in a style of superior excellence, after which an interesting, patriotic and elegant oration was delivered to a brilliant and highly gratified audience by Moses Hodgdon, Esq. in which the orator forcibly and correctly traced to their sources the causes of the democratic faction in our nation, the various measures by which they ascended to power, and the causes of the present deplorable situation of our beloved country. The performance being closed by another ode prepared for the occasion, the company repaired to the Court House and partook of an elegant dinner which was provided for the occasion by Mrs. Lydia Tebbetts, the hall and table being ingeniously and elegantly decorated, after which the following toasts were given accompanied by discharge of cannon and appropriate music and among the rest that much admired one entitled the "Embargo" was sung by Henry Mellen, Esq. The utmost harmony prevailed through the day which was closed in the full expectation of a glorious resurrection of the cause of truth and federalism."

# Online survey to help with new chapter of City's Master Plan

The City of Dover is now developing a new chapter of the Master Plan, the Stewardship of Resources Chapter. This new chapter will bring together a range of resources and issues considered critical components of what helps make Dover a unique place.

Specifically, the Stewardship of Resources Chapter will address the following: energy, natural resources, historic and cultural resources, coastal management, natural hazards and social capital.

The City of Dover completed a comprehensive, community-wide visioning process as part of its master planning process in 2012. Dover's Master Plan can be found online here. The topics to be addressed in the new Stewardship of Resources Chapter were identified during the visioning process. The topics were considered to be of such importance that they are found across five of the eight overarching vision themes upon which the Vision Chapter is based. These themes are:

- 1.0 People and Community
- 2.0 Downtown
- 4.0 Municipal Government and School Services
- 5.0 Open Space and Recreation
- 7.0 Sustainability

The Stewardship of Resources Steering Committee is seeking input from the community. As part of the outreach plan, a survey has been prepared to allow citizens, business leaders, and other stakeholders in the community a chance to provide input. The Dover Master Plan is a critical community resource. Participation in the survey will help develop a strong new chapter of the Plan.
