Super Day in Dover







The 31st annual Cochecho Arts Festival continues tonight, July 14, 2017 at 6 p.m. with Truffle at the Rotary Arts Pavilion, Henry Law Park. The BelAirs will also perform. The show is part of the Liberty Mutual Headliner Spoltlight series and is sponsored by the Access Sports Medicine and Federal Savings Bank.

City of Dover and surrounding towns to hold Hazardous Waste Collection Day

The City of Dover, along with the towns of Rollinsford, Lee and Madbury, will hold a Hazardous Waste Collection Day on Saturday, Aug. 26, 2017, from 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m., at the City's Community Services facility, 271 Mast Road.

The goal of Hazardous Waste Collection Day is to allow for the proper disposal of household hazardous materials. Residents of the four communities can bring household hazardous waste to Community Services for safe disposal.

The following household waste will be accepted: fertilizer with acids; bathroom cleaners; brush cleaner; pesticides car waxes/polish; disinfectants; corrosives; fungicides; creosote; furniture polish paint/stain/finish; insect spray; driveway sealers/tar; metal polish (lead and oil based); lighter fluid; flea powder; mothballs; rust preventative; pest strips/traps; gasoline; oven cleaner; solvents; pesticides; radiator flush; photo chemicals; thinner/turpentine; poisons; roofing tar; rug cleaner; wood preservatives; pool chemicals; and wood strippers.

Empty containers are not hazardous. Please dispose of them in your regular trash.

Explosives, asbestos, latex paint, oil (new or used) and antifreeze will not be accepted.

Hazardous Waste Collection Day in Dover is for household residents only. Proof of residency is required.

Third Street lot now closed

The Third Street parking is now closed. The lot closed on Thursday, July 6, 2017, as development of the property

begins.

Merchants are asked to encourage customers to use the following nearby parking locations in addition to the Third Street and Central Avenue parking spaces already in use:

- Central Avenue, in front of Holy Rosary Credit Union (both sides);
- Central Avenue, in front of Metro Spa and Café Expresso (evenings);
- Chestnut Street parking lot (Dover Delight and Doug's Hoagies);
- Fourth Street (Chestnut Street to Central Avenue);
- Second Street;
- Broadway (towards the Central Fire Station).
- It is important during this time that employees avoid on-street, customer parking spaces. Several lowcost, monthly permit options are available through the City's Parking Bureau.

When construction is complete, the parking spaces in the Third Street lot along the railroad tracks will again be available for public use.

Central Avenue bridge work continues the week of July 17

Alternative parking available to downtown customers, businesses

Repair work to the Central Avenue Bridge will continue the week of July 17.


The east side of the bridge has reopened, and work has shifted to the west side of the bridge.

The contractor is currently on schedule to complete the work by Aug. 22, 2017.

During the work, there is no parking on the bridge. The bridge sidewalks will remain open and accessible, with the exception of brief closures necessary to complete the work.

Additional parking is available in the immediate area for downtown businesses and customers. Both the Orchard

Street parking lot and public parking garage are available. The City has also arranged for 40 private parking spaces to be available as public parking for the duration of the work. These spaces are located in the parking lot behind Oriental Delight and in the Orchard Street parking lot.



The Central Avenue Bridge work includes the removal of pavement, patching the bridge's concrete deck, repairing expansion joints, and repaving the bridge.

Washington Street gas main work continues week of July 17

Utility crews will continue work to replace a gas main on Washington Street, from the Makem Bridge to Locust Street, and along Central Avenue, from the lower square to Kirkland Street.

While the work is under way, motorists should expect temporary detours and delays. Work crews will be on site Monday through Friday, approximately 7 a.m. to 3 p.m.

The following events are recorded in "Notable Events in the History of Dover, New Hampshire: From the First Settlement in 1623 to 1865," by George Wadleigh, "Historic Rambles About Dover," by Robert A. Whitehouse, "Port of Dover: Two Centuries of Shipping on the Cochecho" by Robert A. Whitehouse and Cathleen C. Beaudoin, and several other historical sources.

For more on the history of Dover, settled in 1623 and the oldest permanent settlement in New Hampshire and seventh oldest in the country, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street; and the Woodman Institute Museum, Central Avenue. The Public Library also maintains an online collection of historical information, located here.



July 15, 1675 - William Furber, Anthony Nutter and John Woodman were chosen "to treat and discourse with the selectmen of Portsmouth and of the Isle of Shoals or other meet persons," about "raising money for the relief of those who have suffered either by their estates or services in the present war with the Indians."



July 16, 1781 - On the petition of Capt. Thomas Young and Capt. James Calef, stating that they had been "ordered by Col. Stephen Evans without loss of time to enlist or draft fourteen able bodied effective men to serve three months if not sooner discharged, wherever the Commander in Chief shall order as soldiers," it was voted "Capt. Young and Capt. Calef be a committee to raise the fourteen men required, and that they give thirty shillings silver money to each man that enlists, which they shall have whether called on to go into service or not, and when they march each man shall receive thirty shillings more like money."



July 17, 1817 - President Monroe, who took his seat on the 4th of March of this year, made a visit to New England, going from Boston to Portsmouth and Portland, and returning by way of Dover, which he reached this day. He was received at the line of the State by the committee appointed by the town authorities, conducted by the Marshals and select escort.



July 14, 1835 - Plato Waldron, aged about 56, drowned in the Cochecho, near the Landing. Plato was born a slave of Thomas Westbrook Waldron and was probably about the last member of the "peculiar institution" who lived and died in Dover. For many years previous to his death he was Janitor of the Courts when in session in the old Court House.



July 20, 1837 - Died, Deborah Coffin, the oldest person in town, having been baptised Sept. 17, 1738, She was born in the house on Central street which stood on the high bank which was dug away to make room for Varney's block, and in which her ancestors lived until the great earthquake in 1755 shook down the chimney. Her great grandfather was Peter Coffin, whose garrison stood on the spot where she was born, and whose house and mills were burnt when Major Waldron was killed by the

Indians in 1689. It was a tradition of the family that when the Indians entered his garrison four of his hired men attempted to put them out, but the family prevented them believing they could trust the Indians. The Indians murdered the four hired men, but spared all the family. Her father had ten children, the eighth of whom was Deborah. She remembered that when she was young and the women went out to milk, a man went with them with a gun, for fear of the Indians. Much of the land on Washington street, granted originally to Peter Coffin, remained in the family until "Aunt Deborah's" death.
