City Council outlines process for selecting next city manager

The Dover City Council has outlined the process it will use to select the city's next city manager, following City Manager J. Michael Joyal Jr.'s announcement that he will retire at the end of the year.

Joyal announced July 9 that he intends to retire from his position as city manager, effective Dec. 31, 2026, after more than 33 years of service to the city of Dover, including the last 21 years as city manager.

Mayor Dennis Shanahan said the City Council has reviewed the requirements of the city charter and developed a plan to begin the search by first seeking qualified candidates from within the city organization.

"After a careful review of the requirements of Dover's charter, the City Council has developed a plan to select the next city manager," Shanahan said. "The first step will be to solicit interest from qualified candidates among current city employees. The council believes this approach recognizes the depth of experience and talent within the organization while also allowing us to move through the process in a deliberate and orderly way."

Current city employees interested in being considered for the position are asked to submit a resume and cover letter to the mayor by noon on Friday, Aug. 7. The cover letter should detail the candidate's experience, qualifications and training for the position of city manager, as outlined in the city charter.

The City Council will review the letters of interest and qualifications and determine which candidates will be interviewed. After the interview process, the council will make a selection.

If a qualified candidate is not found through the internal process, the City Council will initiate a broader search.

"This is one of the most important responsibilities of the City Council," Shanahan said. "The city manager plays a central role in the day-to-day operation of municipal government, the implementation of City Council goals and the long-term stewardship of the city. We are committed to a process that is thoughtful, fair and focused on the best interests of Dover."

Joyal first joined the city in 1992 as an intern while completing graduate studies. He was hired as assistant to the city manager in 1993, was named assistant city manager in 1995, and was appointed city manager in 2005.

Joyal has said he will work with the mayor and City Council in the months ahead to help ensure a smooth transition.

The City Council will provide additional information about the process as it moves forward.

Oak Street bridge topic of NHDOT informational meeting

The New Hampshire Department of Transportation (NHDOT) will host a Public Informational Meeting to discuss bridge rehabilitation and replacement alternatives, with associated roadwork and traffic control, including detours, of the state-owned Red List bridge (069/046) carrying Oak Street over the CSX rail line in the City of Dover and the Town of Rollinsford. The meeting will include Dover officials.

The meeting will be held Thursday, Aug. 6, 2026, at 6 p.m. in Council Chambers and the Council Conference Room at Dover City Hall. The public is encouraged to attend and participate.

The purpose of the meeting is to present citizens and public officials with information regarding the proposed project and to solicit public input to ensure that project decisions meet public transportation needs and community goals and protect and enhance the environment.

This project will affect cultural or historic resources that may be eligible for or listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Individuals or organizations with a demonstrated interest in the potential impacts to historic resources have an opportunity to become Consulting Parties under Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act. Additional information will be provided at the public informational meeting.

Supervisors of the Checklist in session Aug. 5

The Supervisors of the Checklist will be in session on Wednesday, Aug. 5, 2026, from 5:30 to 6:30 p.m. in the City Clerk's office at Dover City Hall, 288 Central Ave.

During this session, supervisors will register new voters, record changes of address, and make other necessary corrections to the checklist. The supervisors will also re-register voters who received an annual verification letter and remove voters who did not respond to the annual verification letter.

The Supervisors of the Checklist previously met on June 2, 2026, and identified registered voters who had not cast a ballot in five years. Those voters were mailed a letter informing them of their pending removal from the checklist and the need to re-register before voting. Any voter who has voted at least once in the last five years, or who has registered to vote since the 2024 general election, will remain on the checklist and does not need to take any action. Active voters can review their voter registration information through the Secretary of State's voter information lookup portal, app.sos.nh.gov.

Voters can re-register during the Supervisors of the Checklist meeting, at the City Clerk's office during regular business hours, Monday through Thursday from 8:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., and Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m., and at the polls on election day. The next election is the state primary on Tuesday, Sept. 8, 2026.

COAST board approves new fare structure effective Sept. 1

Base cash fare to increase to \$2

After proposing a new fare structure earlier this year, hosting eight public input sessions throughout the region, and accepting written and oral comments through May 29, the COAST Board of Directors has approved new fares that will take effect on Sept. 1, 2026.

The new fares reflect rising operating costs and are consistent with fare increases implemented by public transit systems across New England and the country. Beginning Sept. 1, COAST's \$2 base cash fare will align with fares currently charged by systems including Manchester Transit Authority (MTA), Nashua Transit System (NTS), Portland Metro, Biddeford-Saco-Old Orchard Beach Transit, Green Mountain Transit, and the Rhode Island Public Transit Authority (RIPTA).

"This is the first time since 2008 that COAST has implemented a systemwide fare increase," said Rad Nichols, Executive Director of COAST. "For nearly two decades, we've worked hard to keep fares as affordable as possible to encourage people to use public transportation. While affordability remains a priority, we also have a responsibility to ensure our fare structure is fair and sustainable for our riders, our funding partners, and the communities that support COAST service."

COAST last adjusted its fare structure in 2008, when the base cash fare increased from \$1 to \$1.50.

According to COAST, only six individual public comments were received during the public comment period. Overall, commenters expressed an understanding that COAST must generate additional fare revenue after maintaining the same fares for 18 years. Some raised concerns that higher fares could discourage ridership and offset the additional revenue generated. One commenter provided feedback on ticket bundle pricing and structure.

COAST also consulted with public transit agencies that have recently implemented similar fare increases. Those agencies have not reported a measurable decline in ridership attributable to the fare changes. COAST will continue offering ticket bundles at the \$20 price point, which remains convenient for customers and aligns with the most common ATM cash withdrawal denomination.

Beginning Sept. 1, the one-way base cash fare will increase from \$1.50 to \$2. Discounted fares for older adults and individuals with disabilities, which are set at half the base fare, will increase from \$0.75 to \$1.

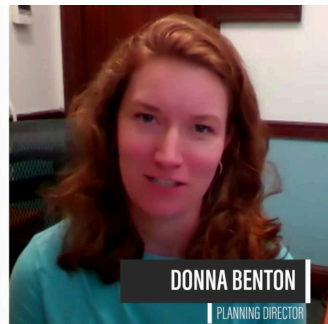
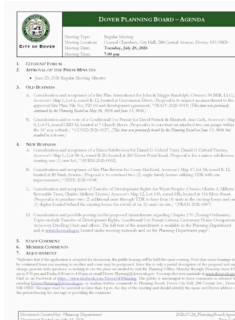

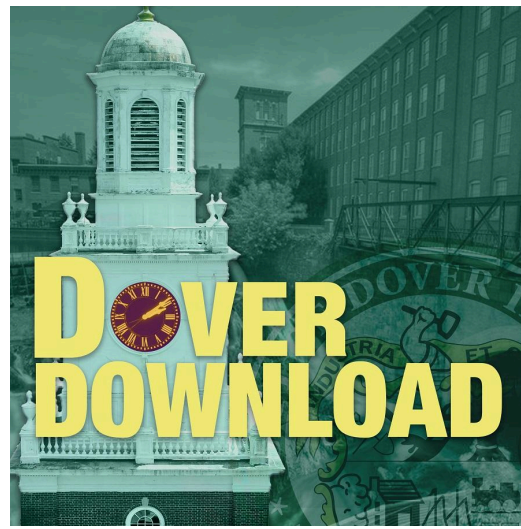

Don't Trash Dover (DTD) and the Community Trail Advisory Committee (CTAC) are teaming up for a one-hour cleanup effort along the Dover Community Trail on Saturday, July 25, from 9:30 to 10:30 a.m. The event will take place rain or shine and is open to all community members who wish to lend a hand.

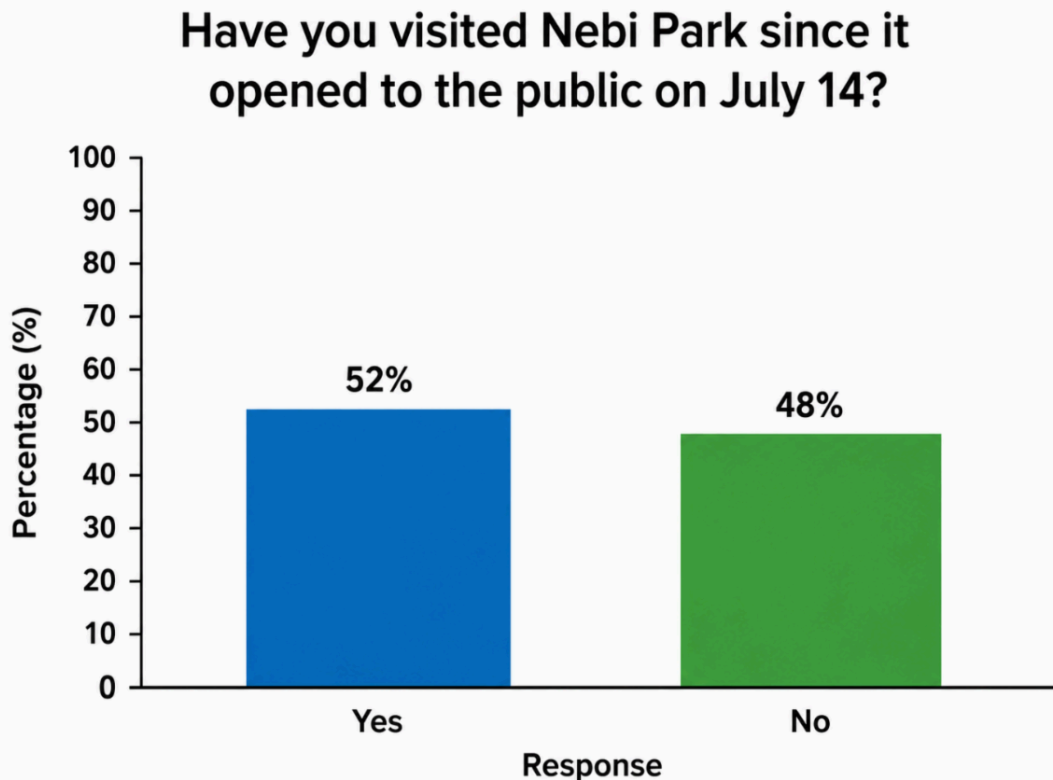

The following events are from various historical records, sources, and texts about the history of Dover.

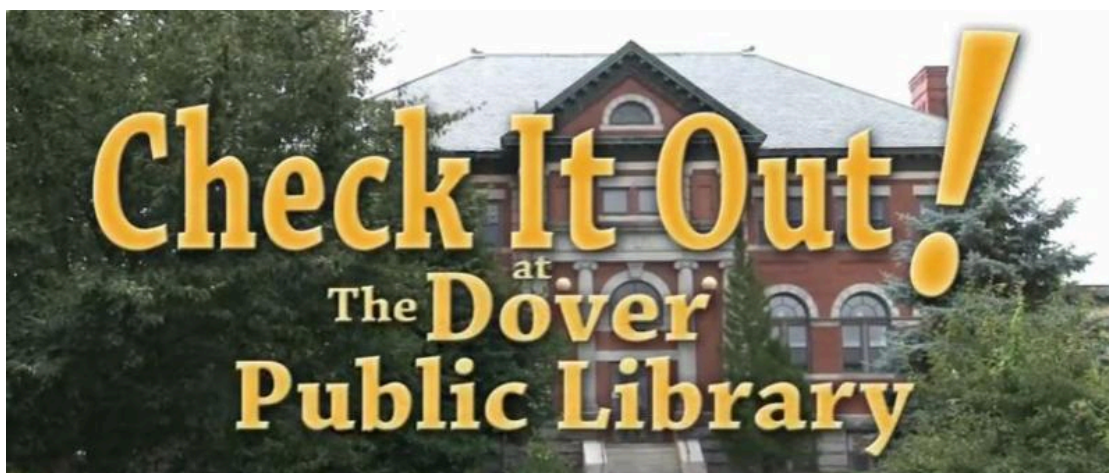

July 24, 1843 — Meeting in Dover's newly built Town Hall, residents voted to allow Strafford County to use portions of the building for court proceedings and county business. The agreement provided space for the court, county officers, juries and other related functions. In return, the county would pay Dover \$3,000 and could continue using the rooms as long as the court remained in Dover. The decision strengthened Dover's role as the seat of Strafford County government. Although the county had been organized in Dover in 1771, its courts had met in several locations before the Town Hall opened in 1842 at the corner of Washington Street and Central Avenue. The arrangement allowed one building to serve both town and county government at a time when Dover was still legally a town. Dover became a city in 1855. County courts continued to share municipal space for decades. After Dover's second City Hall burned in 1889, Strafford County constructed a separate courthouse on Second Street, which opened in 1890.

July 25, 1857 — Dr. Ezra Green died this day at 101 years and 28 days old. Dr. Green was born in Malden, Mass. on June 17, 1746, graduated at Harvard College 1765, and settled in Dover as a physician in 1767. He served in the Army and Navy five years in the war of the Revolution, sailing with the celebrated Captain Paul Jones in the "Ranger," but ever afterwards lived in Dover, where he was held in great respect. For many years in early life, having given up the practice of his profession, he was the principal merchant or trader, going once or twice in the season to Boston to purchase his most valuable goods. He was the first Postmaster appointed for the town by President Washington, and held the office until he voluntarily resigned it during Thomas Jefferson's administration. He attended church regularly almost up to the last years of his life, was accustomed to vote in town meetings when he was nearly one hundred years old, and took a lively interest in public affairs as long as he lived. July 22, 1899 — The auction of Jonathan Sawyer's estate was halted on this day after the top bid for his enormous mansion fetched only \$10,000, 10% of its estimated value at the time. The mansion, located where Burger King stood most recently, was among the largest and grandest homes in Dover at one time. The property then included a large orchard, as well as two additional, vacant lots, and another on Stark Avenue. Before the auction was halted, the Stark Avenue property sold for \$1,005 and the orchard for \$1,505. Sawyer made his fortune with his woolen mills. The former Sawyer Mills in Dover was later converted into apartments and is now owned by Chinburg Properties.

July 30, 2010 — It was revealed on this day that Tuttle's Farm on Dover Point, then the oldest family-operated farm in the country, was up for sale. The farm was started by John Tuttle in 1632 and had been in the family for 11 generations. The 133-acre farm wouldn't sell until 2013, when it was purchased by Matthew Kozazcki of Newbury, Mass., who owned Tendercrop Farm in Newbury and Wenham, Mass. The former Tuttle's Farm would become Tendercrop Farm's first New Hampshire location.

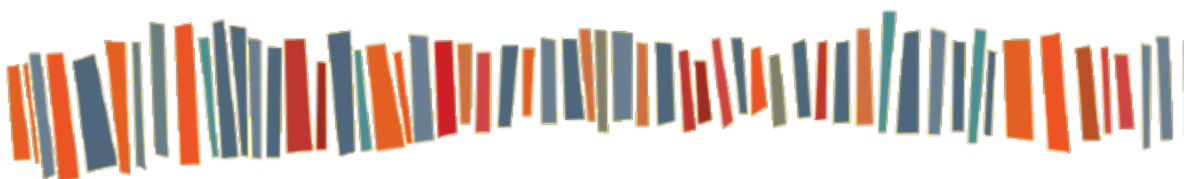

Red Cross declares emergency blood shortage

The American Red Cross is declaring an emergency blood shortage as the blood supply fell nearly 25% in June. Blood donors are urgently needed to give now to help ensure patients receive lifesaving medical care without delay.

The shortage comes during the height of trauma season, when hospitals frequently see increased demand for blood due to serious injuries and other medical emergencies, according to the Red Cross.

A steep decline in blood donations since the end of May has created a growing gap between supply and patient need. Currently, Red Cross distributions to hospitals are nearly 3,500 units higher per week than expected. The shortage is especially serious for types O positive and B negative blood. Blood donors are urgently needed to give now to help ensure patients receive lifesaving medical care without delay.
