Fireworks illegal in Dover

Police Chief William Breault and Fire Chief Perry Plummer are reminding residents that consumer fireworks are not only dangerous, they're also illegal in the City of Dover.

According to city ordinance, "no person, firm, partnership or corporation shall offer for sale, expose for sale, sell at retail, purchase, possess, transport, use or explode any fireworks without a permit."

Permits are granted only for approved displays conducted by licensed operators using

Class C fireworks. Displays must be authorized by both the Fire and Rescue Chief and the Police Chief, and operators must hold a valid license or a certificate of competency from the State of New Hampshire.

Fireworks pose serious risks. The National Fire Protection Association reports fireworks cause nearly 20,000 fires annually, resulting in more than \$100 million in property damage. In 2024, an estimated 14,700 people were treated in U.S. emergency rooms for fireworks-related injuries, a 52% increase from the previous year. Children under 15 accounted for nearly one-third of those injured.

Beyond physical harm, fireworks can also cause significant distress for military veterans living with post-traumatic stress disorder and can be traumatic or frightening for pets.

Residents are encouraged to choose safe and festive alternatives, such as:

- Glow sticks
- Red and blue bubbles
- Silly string
- Confetti poppers
- Party crackers
- Pinwheels

Groundwater monitoring, exploration on Council's July 9 agenda

The City Council meets next on Wednesday, July 9, 2025.

The meeting begins with the Mayor and City Council proclaiming July 2025 as Plastic Pollution Reduction Month in Dover, encouraging residents and businesses to reduce their plastic consumption and waste and choose more sustainable alternatives.

On the agenda are three resolutions related to groundwater monitoring and exploration for fiscal year 2026, with the city consultant Emery & Garrett Groundwater Investigations, LLC. One would authorize monitoring of the Pudding Hill aquifer for contamination for \$183,000, which the city expects to receive reimbursement from New England Metals Recycling, LLC, as part of the 2021 settlement agreement related to the groundwater pollutants found in the aquifer. A second resolution would authorize allocating \$179,950 for the city-wide groundwater monitoring program, which includes sampling and testing at 13 well monitoring sites; the program would also assist with monitoring the aquifers' water levels to help guide city aquifer management decisions for drinking water production. The final resolution would authorize spending \$315,000 for consultants to explore potential areas for future groundwater supplies.

Also on the agenda is a procedural resolution to affirm the fiscal year 2026 budget adjustment to accommodate the debt for the Dover High School athletic complex project. The City Council took up that resolution and an accompanying one its June 25 meeting, where the City Council authorized just over \$18 million in debt bonding for the project. There was a question at the end of the June 25 meeting whether the City Council voted on the FY26 budget adjustment or only voted to amend the resolution and did not fully execute it.

The City Council will also be asked to authorize:

- Accepting a donation from Mr. Handyman of Dover to support improvements at the Community Trail's Rotary Trailhead at the Dover Transportation Center.
- A dog warrant for unlicensed dogs. State law requires that dog owners obtain a dog license annually by May 1. The resolution would authorize the City Clerk to issue a warrant to law enforcement for the process of collecting fees and fines to those who haven't registered.
- Two resolutions for the purchase of books and media for the Dover Public Library totaling \$110,000.
- Allowing the city to purchase bulk oil and lubricant products on an as-needed basis for FY26.

New Community Power rate change

effective Aug. 1, 2025

The Community Power Coalition of New Hampshire set its electricity rates for the sixmonth rate period beginning Aug. 1, 2025.

Community Power's default "Granite Basic" electricity supply rate for Dover's residential and small commercial customers will be 13.419 cents per kilowatt-hour (kWh), effective Aug. 1, 2025, through Jan. 31, 2026. It's a 3.719-cent, or 38.3%, per kWh increase above the current rate. Eversource rates are also increasing. The new rate for Eversource default electricity is 11.196 cents per kWh.

Based on usage of 650 kWh per month, the estimated cost for the Granite Basic plan is \$87.22 per month for the electricity portion of the bill. The estimated cost for the Eversource default rate would be \$72.77 per month for the electricity portion.

In the <u>press release</u> announcing the increase, CPCNH's Board of Directors stated, "The electricity market is driven by factors such as the regional and global price of natural gas and other fossil fuels, availability of fuel and electricity supply, customer demand, and weather events. New England's electricity market is heavily dependent on the price of natural gas, which is driven by global market trends and can react with volatility to geopolitical events around the world."

Changing energy suppliers

Dover's electricity customers are free to choose between Community Power, third-party options, or their utility provider, Eversource. The New Hampshire Department of Energy created a <u>website</u> to help customers shop for competitive energy power suppliers.

To opt in, out, or select a Community Power option with more renewable energy content, customers can:

Please note that it may take one to two billing cycles to reflect the change. To complete the change, customers will need their Eversource account number.

About Community Power

Since launching in early 2023, Community Power has introduced more competition and product options to an increasing number of electric customers in New Hampshire. Customers can easily select different renewable energy options. The Granite Basic offers 25.2% of its energy from renewable sources. They also offer Granite Plus with 33%, Clean 50 with 50% and Clean 100 with 100% energy provided from renewable options.

The Community Power program is authorized under state law RSA 53:E. It allows municipalities and counties to aggregate retail electric customers to "access to competitive markets for supplies of electricity and related energy services" on a voluntary basis. The program is self-funded through revenues generated by participating customers and does not use taxpayer funds to cover program expenses.

Payne Street weekday closure extended through July 18 for waterfront work

The weekday closure of Payne Street (formerly River Street) will continue through Friday, July 18 to accommodate work on the waterfront project. The street will be closed between Henry Law Avenue and Washington Street from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday — excluding holidays — for road and utility work related to the city's waterfront construction project.

Payne Street will reopen each day after work is complete. When the road is closed, the contractor will post road closure signs on Central Avenue at Hanson Street, Main Street at Washington Street, and Henry Law Avenue at Hanson Street to help inform motorists.

The closure allows workers to safely complete the installation of the stormwater treatment area, street curbing, and sidewalks, along with other related road work.

Dover's water tank capacity remains limited; city urges mindful use, especially during hot weather

Major water tank offline for repairs; city relying on smaller tank until late July

Dover's water operators urge citizens to continue limiting outdoor water use — especially water irrigation on hot, humid days — to ensure sufficient water reserves for residents, businesses and emergency needs.

The city can store only 20% of its normal water holding capacity, with its 4-million-gallon Garrison Hill tank offline for repairs. Dover is relying on its 1-million-gallon Smith Well tank to meet city water needs until the Garrison Hill tank resumes operation, expected by July 25.

If water irrigation is necessary, water operators urge users to consider irrigating overnight before 6 a.m., when household water demand increases significantly across the city.

"Hand watering and avoiding watering during the heat of the day will go a long way to ensure enough water for everyone, including our firefighters," said Community Services Director John Storer, noting that automatic irrigation systems often waste lots of water.

Dover's current limited water storage capacity, combined with high seasonal demand, can strain the water system by requiring groundwater production facilities to start and stop more frequently than optimal. Unlike turning on a faucet, each start/stop cycle involves time-consuming power-up and power-down processes to avoid stressing the aquifer or damaging critical equipment, such as pumps and wells.

"Our goal is to buffer the extreme usage peaks that drain the smaller tank," Storer said.

The Garrison Hill tank has been offline since March for its first significant rehabilitation since it began operation in 1968. The original project schedule had the tank online for peak summer water use; however, the higher-than-normal precipitation this spring created additional moisture and condensation within the tank, delaying some of the project repairs.

Track water use, get leak alerts with 'Eye On Water'

Water customers can monitor their water usage with the Eye On Water online portal and mobile app. The system helps track daily, monthly, and yearly consumption; users can also sign up to receive alerts for potential leaks. Ways to conserve

Residents and customers can conserve water by adopting the following best practices:

- Limit outdoor watering. According to the EPA, irrigation accounts for 30% of residential water use nationally about 9 billion gallons per day. Avoid irrigating during the hottest parts of the day when evaporation is highest.
- Utilize commercial car washes. They are more efficient with water and don't dump dirty water into the storm drains.
- Fixing leaky plumbing conserves water and saves money. Leaking faucets and toilets can waste thousands of gallons a year, leading to increased water bills.
- Be mindful of indoor water use. Take shorter showers, turn off the water when brushing teeth, and run dishwashers and washing machines only when full.

The following events are from various historical records, sources, and texts about the history of Dover.

July 5. 1792 — According to the Dover Phoenix, plans were underway to dig a canal linking Lake Winnipesaukee to the Cochecho River. A fundraising effort, or subscription, had begun to support the project. A wealthy man from Portsmouth reportedly pledged 500 pounds toward its construction. Given the growing enthusiasm across the country for building canals at the time, the Phoenix expressed confidence that the project would be completed successfully. The newspaper also noted that during a major flood several years earlier, water from Lake Winnipesaukee naturally overflowed and found its way into the Cochecho River, suggesting that the two bodies of water are already loosely connected by nature. In a later edition dated July 19, a contributor to the Phoenix offered to create a connection between the lake and the river for just \$100. However, he acknowledged that making the route navigable for transporting timber, especially from the Merrymeeting River through Rochester's Norway Plain, would likely cost several thousand dollars. The proposed canal was part of a larger movement during the late 18th and early 19th centuries in the United States known as the "Canal Era." Before railroads, canals were viewed as critical infrastructure for economic growth, allowing for the easier transport of goods, particularly lumber and agricultural products, to market. Lake Winnipesaukee, one of New Hampshire's largest lakes, was a key natural waterway, and the Cochecho River, which runs through Dover, was an important commercial and industrial corridor. A canal connecting the two would have created a direct water route from the interior of the state to the seacoast, boosting trade and economic development. The canal was never constructed.

July 9, 1860 — Capt. Moses Paul died on this day at 63 years old. He served as the agent, or general manager, of the Cocheco Manufacturing Company for nearly 30 years and had been involved in Dover's textile industry since its earliest days. Throughout his long career, he ran the company with energy and success, earning the full support of its stockholders. His constant attention to the well-being of the thousands of people employed at the mills also earned him deep respect from the workforce. The Cocheco Manufacturing Company, under Paul's leadership, became one of the most successful textile operations in the country. His fair and respectful treatment of workers helped foster a strong relationship between management and labor, something rare at the time. Paul was also a generous and civic-minded citizen. He frequently gave his time, advice, and financial support to improve the community. Many of Dover's public works and civic advancements were made possible through his leadership and generosity.

July 8, 1998 — The City Council on this day recognized Dover's 375th Anniversary Committee. The committee had spent a year planning the events and festivities that were celebrated just days before the Council's July 8, 1998 meeting. The group worked to secure funding and volunteers, staged the festival, and helped increase awareness of the city's heritage and history, then Mayor Wil Boc said as part of a proclamation. Sam Allen, chairman of the committee, accepted the proclamation and presented the city with a separate proclamation designating July 3-5, 1998, as Dover's 375th Anniversary, signed by Gov. Jeanne Shaheen. He gave a second copy of the proclamation to Thom Hindle, to be preserved by the Woodman Institute Museum. "When you start out in an endeavor like this, you never know how it's going to end up," Allen said, who added the committee's goal was to get people to reflect on what is unique about the city. "We went out trying to plan activities that would cause that to happen. And we accomplished that beyond my wildest expectations." Allen also served on Dover400, the committee that organized Dover's 400th anniversary in 2023. **July 4, 2003** — More than 8,000 people gathered at Dover High School for the City of Dover's Fourth of July fireworks display, during one of the handful of years fireworks were launched from the high school. Attendees enjoyed an evening of live Irish music, dancing, games, and a 25-minute fireworks show.



Is there more to the story of Captain Kidd?

Captain William Kidd is known as one of the most notorious pirate outlaws ever, but his legend is tainted in a bed of lies.

Kidd was an English American privateer and leading



New York husband and father. The King of England himself dubbed Kidd "trusty and wellbeloved," and some historians describe him as a "worthy, honest-hearted, steadfast, much-enduring sailor" who was the "victim of a deliberate travesty of justice." With honors far more esteemed than the menacing Blackbeard, or any other sea rover at the turn of the seventeenth century, how can Kidd be considered both gentleman and pirate, both hero and villain?

The ninth great-grandson of legendary privateer Captain William Kidd, Marquis is an award-winning American history and historical fiction author. He works by day as a vice president and principal hydrogeologist with an environmental consulting firm in Boulder, Colorado, and by night as a writer of historical works.

City to host informational walk July 10 on decline of the ash tree

The City of Dover will host a public informational tree walk on Thursday, July 10, to raise awareness about the rapid decline of downtown ash trees due to an invasive insect known as the emerald ash borer.

The walk will begin at 6 p.m. at Dover City Hall, 288 Central Ave., and conclude at Garrison City Beerworks, 455 Central Ave. During the event, participants will learn how the emerald ash borer is affecting the city's ash tree population and what steps the city is taking in response.

The emerald ash borer, a small beetle native to Asia, kills ash trees within two to four

years of infestation. Once trees are infested, treatment is no longer effective. Dead or dying ash trees quickly become hazardous and must be removed to protect public safety.

City staff and tree experts will be on hand to share information, answer questions, and collect feedback on the future of Dover's downtown landscape. The walk will conclude with an informal Q&A session at the brewery.

Residents are encouraged to attend, learn more about the threat, and support efforts to replace and replant trees to help preserve the health and beauty of the city's streetscape.
