

## Sewer smoke testing in downtown Dover begins July 12

On July 12 and 13, 2018 crews will test the sanitary sewers in a portion of downtown Dover by blowing nontoxic smoke into the sewer system. This process - smoke testing - can help the City locate spots where stormwater and groundwater can enter the sewer system.


Crews from Wright-Pierce will oversee and conduct the smoke testing. Community Services crews will monitor the testing. Smoke testing will occur between 7 a.m. and 3 p.m. each day.

Smoke testing involves forcing nontoxic, harmless smoke through the sewer system. The odorless smoke used will not stain clothes or furniture and does not create a fire hazard. Smoke will appear if there are leaks in the system. Some smoke may enter homes and businesses if there are dried up drain pipes or defective plumbing. Residents in the area being tested can fill seldom-used drains with water to prevent smoke from entering the home.

Community Services crews will begin notifying residents before the work begins by placing door hanger cards on the doorknobs of affected properties. These cards have additional information about what to expect during the smoke testing. The testing does not require crews to enter homes, and residents do not need to be home during the testing. If residents see smoke in their home or on their property during the testing, they should notify the crew working on their street or contact Community Services at 516-6450.

## New construction debris, Freon disposal rates in effect

New rates for construction debris disposal at the Recycling Center on Mast Road are now in effect. For residents, the rate is 10 cents per pound, with a minimum charge of \$5. The rate for contractors is 15 cents per pound with a minimum charge of \$25.

Residents and contractors are required to pay on a perload basis. Running a tab or paying after a final load is not permitted. Trucks larger than a one-ton dump truck are not permitted.

In addition, the disposal fee for items containing Freon has increased to \$20. Items containing Freon include refrigerators, freezers, air conditioners, humidifiers and dehumidifiers.


## Alumni Drive closed weekdays, some weekends until July 20

## A scientist's views on the pros and cons of DNA technology

Where will genetic engineering lead us? This unique perspective on risk from a former scientist who worked on the Human Genome Project will be held on Monday, July 16, from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m., at the Dover Public Library. The roughly 90-minute presentation will include time for questions and discussion.



This is a free talk open to the public presented by Matt Endrizzi, a former molecular biologist who was a team leader on the Human Genome Project and other genome sequencing projects at the Whitehead Institute in Cambridge, Massachusetts from 2000-2002. Previously he worked at Harvard Medical School and Florida State University.

The goal of this talk is to share a unique perspective on risk to human health and the environment that is not on the public's radar. Endrizzi combines his knowledge from molecular biology research with his expertise as a public high school teacher to present cutting edge information in a clear and simple way. Some may be alarmed by what they hear, but ultimately he intends to share a hopeful message.

Recombinant DNA was first created in 1971 when scientists spliced together DNA from different organisms and put the new DNA into bacteria to test it. This practice raised concerns among scientists that they may alter the bacteria to cause cancer or other problems in people working with this material. These concerns led to a voluntary moratorium on making recombinant DNA until the National Institutes of Health funding this research

published guidelines for handling and containing these molecules several years later in 1976. Research involving recombinant DNA has evolved into many forms and applications over the last four decades and has proliferated throughout the world to businesses, high schools, and even Do It Yourself kits.

There have been many voices opposed to playing God, planting GMO's, and using genetic information to make decisions about our fate. Meanwhile, voices from the science industry more frequently say the initial perceived risks were exaggerated. For many, it may be overwhelming to consider opposing the fundamental methods of biotechnology, but the aim of this talk is to propose a way we might be able to embrace the good and minimize the bad. In order to do this, we must all grow in our understanding of what science has to teach us about genetic engineering.

The following events are recorded in "Notable Events in the History of Dover, New Hampshire: From the First Settlement in 1623 to 1865," by George Wadleigh, "Historic Rambles About Dover," by Robert A. Whitehouse, "Port of Dover: Two Centuries of Shipping on the Cochecho" by Robert A. Whitehouse and Cathleen C. Beaudoin, and several other historical sources.

For more on the history of Dover, settled in 1623 and the oldest permanent settlement in New Hampshire and seventh oldest in the country, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street; and the Woodman Institute Museum, Central Avenue. The Public Library also maintains an online collection of historical information, located here.



July 6, 1690 - Two companies under the Captains Floyd and Wiswall, who were scouting, discovered an Indian track, which they pursued till they came up with the enemy at Wheelwright's Pond, in Lee (then a part of Dover), where a bloody engagement ensued for some hours; in which Wiswall, his lieutenant, Flagg, and Sergeant Walker, with twelve more, were killed, and several wounded. It was not known how many of the enemy fell, as they always carried off their dead. Floyd maintained the fight after Wiswall's death, till his men, fatigued and wounded, drew off; which obliged him to follow. The enemy retreated at the same time; for when Captain Convers went to look after the wounded, he found seven alive, whom he brought in by sunrise the next morning, and then returned to bury the dead.



**July 8, 1707** - John Bunker and Ichabod Rollins, both of Dover, going with a cart from Lt. Zachariah Field's garrison to James Bunker's for a loom, were assaulted by many Indians, and both slain. The enemy, supposed to be 20 or 30 in number, slaughtered many cattle for the Jones's at the same time, to the number of 15 or more.



**July 12, 1792** - The first newspaper published in Dover, entitled "The Political and Sentimental Repository or Strafford Register," appeared this day.



**July 9, 1860** - Died, Captain Moses Paul, aged 63. He was Agent of the Cocheco Manufacturing Co. for nearly 30 years, and had been connected with the manufacturing business from its first introduction into the place. During this long period, the affairs of the Company were conducted by him with an energy and success which secured the approbation of its stockholders, while the care and attention which he ever bestowed upon the many

thousands in its employ won for him their respect and esteem. Few manufacturing establishments in the country have been managed with more success, and in none has a better feeling more uniformly prevailed between the employers and the employed. Liberal and public spirited as a citizen - ever ready with his counsel and his means to advance the welfare of the community - the city of Dover owes much of its prosperity and many of its public improvements to his open hand and generous heart. Few men have enjoyed more deservedly a larger measure of the respect of their fellow citizens, and the death of none will be more deeply and generally regretted. (Dover Enquirer)

# NH DHHS issues draft request for proposals for Medicaid Care Management Procurement, announces public information sessions

The New Hampshire Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) is seeking public input on its plan to solicit proposals from qualified Managed Care Organizations (MCOs) to deliver health care services to eligible and enrolled Medicaid participants through New Hampshire's Medicaid Care Management (MCM) program.

In order to provide transparency on the future of the MCM program, on July 9, DHHS will release the draft request for

proposals (RFP) and draft model contract for public comment. Once the draft RFP and model contract are issued, DHHS will hold six public information sessions throughout the State to provide all stakeholders, elected officials and the public the opportunity to see and comment upon the Department's plans.

"The Department plans to select three MCOs to provide high quality, high value integrated healthcare for Medicaid beneficiaries throughout New Hampshire," said DHHS Commissioner Jeffrey A. Meyers. "We expect the MCOs to advance the goals of the MCM program and address pressing needs such as the opioid crisis, coordination and expansion of community mental health services and enhanced services for children and families who are also served in the State's child welfare system."

MCOs must demonstrate the capability to provide a person-centered, integrated, and value driven delivery system that offers the full array of accessible Medicaid services taking into account each person's physical well-being, behavioral health (mental health and substance use disorders), and social service needs. DHHS will challenge its managed care organizations to work more responsively with providers and members to improve access to care and promote healthy behaviors. New Hampshire's MCM program will incentivize value over volume, enhance program efficiency, and hold MCOs accountable for demonstrable improvements in health outcomes.

In order to provide sufficient opportunity to review and comment on the draft RFP and model contract, DHHS is hosting six Public Information Sessions. The sessions are scheduled for 5:30 to 7:30 p.m. so that those who work during the day are able to attend.

On the seacoast, the session will be held in Portsmouth on Wednesday, July 11, at the Community Campus, 100 Campus Drive, Portsmouth.

A session will also be held in Concord on Tuesday, July 24, at the Department of Health and Human Services, Brown Building Auditorium, 129 Pleasant St.
