Council to hold public hearings on City Hall clock tower restoration, wetland permit

At its regular meeting on July 13, the City Council will hold a public hearing on a resolution to fund the restoration of the City Hall clock tower, followed by a vote to authorize the expenditure.

The resolution would award the bid for the work to Careno Construction Company of Portsmouth for a cost not to exceed \$576,000. The bid total includes the removal of the former communication tower atop City Hall and new copper sheeting for the clock tower dome.

The City Council is also set to authorize the expenditure of \$158,586.72 to the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services' Aquatic Resource Mitigation Fund, which the NHDES requires for the city to obtain the wetlands permit needed to move forward with the waterfront development on River Street. Per state law, mitigation is required for impacts to wetlands, river banks and tidal buffer zones, according to the resolution. In June, the NHDES notified the city

that it would approve its wetlands permit, subject to the 30-day appeal period, the Governor and Executive Council's approval, and the mitigation fund's payment.

Also on the agenda are resolutions to authorize:

- The expenditure of \$35,940 to paint the Dover 400 logo at 23 crosswalks in the downtown area ahead of the city's 400th anniversary next year;
- An additional scope of work for GeoInsight, Inc., of Londonderry, for \$36,200, related to the dredge cell closure;
- The expenditure of \$299,900 to Wright-Pierce of Portsmouth for engineering services for the wastewater treatment plan's secondary clarifier; and
- The city to apply, accept and expend grant funds from the Bureau of Justice Assistance for bulletproof vests for the Police Department. The \$3,375 grant requires a 50% match funded through the police operating budget.

City anticipates delivery of fluoride next week, allowing it to be added again to public drinking water

Supplies had been exhausted due to nationwide shortage

The City of Dover expects to soon resume adding sodium fluoride to its public drinking water system. Community Services received notice today, Friday, July 8, that a pending shipment is anticipated to arrive late next week.

Last week, the City of Dover announced that its supply of sodium fluoride had been exhausted and would temporarily not be adding it to the public drinking water. The City of Dover public water system also includes some Madbury, Rollinsford and Somersworth customers.

Community Services, which oversees Dover's drinking water supply, has been unable to obtain a resupply of sodium fluoride since April due to a nationwide shortage. In recent years, sodium fluoride has only been available through foreign vendors, and the city has been unable to find a domestic supplier.

When available, Community Services will again target its fluoride concentration level to 0.7 milligrams per liter (mg/L) in the water system, as state and federal guidelines recommend.

Fluoride is not required for safe drinking water but instead used as a health benefit. Dover has added sodium fluoride into the water system since 1990, following its approval by voters through a ballot referendum question in the 1987 municipal election. Per state law, adding or removing fluoride from a public water system is allowed following the written petition of 10% of registered voters of all municipalities served by the water system and a majority vote by those voters at a city election or town meeting.

Dover receives \$5.2 million grant for new water treatment facility

Funding from the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 awarded this week will help Dover with the construction of a new, state-of-the-art water treatment facility.

The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services (NHDES) announced Thursday that Gov. Chris Sununu and the Executive Council, at recent meetings, have approved multiple projects, in a combination of grant and loan funds, for needed drinking water and wastewater system improvements, totaling more than \$7.2 million. NHDES provided the funding through the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARPA), and the Drinking Water State Revolving Fund (DWSRF). NHDES has offered over \$100 million in funding for more than 200 projects, which are in the process of finalizing their proposals to NHDES for submission to the Governor and Executive Council for approval.

Dover will receive a \$5,188,000 ARPA grant, which is administered through the Per- and Polyfluoroalkyl Substances Remediation Grant and Loan Fund (PFAS RLF), to assist with the construction of a new treatment facility to remediate PFAS, as well as other contaminants, within groundwater at the Pudding Hill well field. The project includes design, bidding, construction and engineering oversight of the construction.

"On behalf of the City or Dover, we are extremely grateful for the funding assistance provided through the ARPA Grant," said Director of Community Services John Storer. "The funds will help us a complete a state-of-the-art water treatment plant to provide continued safe and reliable water to our customers, and it will enable the project to be completed at virtually no cost to system ratepayers. The staff at DES have been collaborative partners in helping the City advance this project."

In November 2021, the City Council authorized a \$13,297,910 contract to construct the Pudding Hill Water Treatment Facility, capable of removing contaminants from the drinking water.

In 2019, the City of Dover voluntarily took three wells at the Pudding Hill aquifer offline when separate monitoring wells detected plumes of PFAS contaminants. No PFAS were found in the drinking water pumped from the wells; however, ongoing use of the aquifer could draw PFAS, known as perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances, into the aquifer before a water treatment facility could be built. PFAS seeped into the ground from the former auto recycling plant off Knox Marsh Road that Schnitzer Steel Industries Inc. now owns. The City Council last year approved a settlement and funding agreement between the city and New England Metal Recycling, LLC., which provides \$11 million for the construction, engineering, and operational maintenance of a water treatment plant designed to remove contaminants from the drinking water, allowing the City of Dover to utilize the Pudding Hill aquifer again. The Council also approved an agreement with NEMR parent company Schnitzer Steel Industries, Inc., as the third-party guarantor of the funding and settlement agreement.

The new water treatment plant, which will be located off Stonewall Drive, is anticipated to be

operational within two years.

The Pudding Hill aquifer, when in operation, provides a significant amount of the city's drinking water.

ARPA is a \$1.9 trillion economic stimulus bill to speed up the United States' recovery from the economic health effects of the COVID-19 pandemic and the resultant recession. The Act defines eligible uses of the state and local funding, including responding to public health emergencies, responding to workers performing essential work during the COVID-19 emergency, providing revenue relief to states and making investments in water, sewer and broadband infrastructure.



Dover Download podcast your guide to what's happening this week



The following events are from a variety of historical records, sources and texts about the history of Dover.

For more on the history of Dover, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street, and the Woodman Museum on Central Avenue. The Public Library also maintains an online collection of historical information, <u>located here</u>.

July 13, 1776 — It was voted that 42 shillings be given by the town to each of the soldiers enlisted and that they shall proceed in the present expedition to Canada, not exceeding 15 or 16 men, and that the Selectmen pay the money in the best manner they can from the town's account.

July 12, 1792 — The first newspaper published in Dover, entitled "The Political and Sentimental Repository, or the Strafford Register," appeared this day.

July 9, 1860 — "Died, Captain Moses Paul, aged 63. He was Agent of the Cocheco Manufacturing Co. for nearly 30 years, and had been connected with the manufacturing business from its first introduction to Dover. During this long period, the affairs of the Company were conducted by him with an energy and success which secured the approbation of its stockholders, while the care and attention which he ever bestowed upon the many thousands in its employ won for him their respect and esteem. Few manufacturing establishments in the country have been managed with more success, and in none has a better feeling more uniformly prevailed between the employers and the employed. Liberal and public spirited as a citizen — ever ready with his counsel and his means to advance the welfare of the community — the city of Dover owes much of its prosperity and many of its public improvements to his open hand and generous heart. Few men have enjoyed more deservedly a larger measure of the respect of their fellow citizens, and the death of none will be more deeply and generally regretted." (Dover Enquirer)

July 9, 1910 — On this day, one of Dover's fraternal orders, the St. Paul Commandery of the Knights Templar, marched with a band to Pine Hill Cemetery to perform the decennial

decoration of the graves of dead knights. The ceremony also included a memorial service over the grave of Moses Paul, the first commander of the Dover order, who had died 50 years earlier. About 50 knights and a large crowd of onlookers attended the ceremony, which also included a memorial address by Dr. Lewis Flanders. Flowers were placed on the graves of 138 knights.


July 8, 1998 — The City Council on this day recognized Dover's 375th Anniversary Committee. The committee had spent a year planning the events and festivities that were celebrated the weekend before the Council's July 8, 1998 meeting. The group worked to secure funding and volunteers, staged the festival, and helped increase awareness of the city's heritage and history, then Mayor Wil Boc said as part of a proclamation. Sam Allen, chairman of the committee, accepted the proclamation, and presented the city with a separate proclamation designating July 3-5, 1998 as Dover's 375th Anniversary, signed by Gov. Jeanne Shaheen. He gave a second copy of the proclamation to Thom Hindle, to be preserved by the Woodman Institute Museum. "When you start out in an endeavor like this, you never know how it's going to end up," Allen said, who added the committee's goal was to get people to reflect on what is unique about the city. "We went out trying to plan activities that would cause that to happen. And we accomplished that beyond my wildest expectations." Allen now serves on Dover400, the committee charged with planning for Dover's 400th anniversary in 2023.

Assistance programs available ahead of

electricity rate increase in August

Eversource Energy's electricity rates will increase significantly for at least six months, beginning Aug. 1, 2022, after the New Hampshire Public Utilities Commission (PUC) granted the increase due to rising electricity production costs.

The rate increase, <u>approved by the PUC on June 23</u>, affects residential and business customers.

Beginning Aug. 1, 2022, the electricity for residential customers will increase 111.5%, from 10.669 cents per kilowatt-hour to 22.556 cents per kWh. Eversource seeks bids every six months from electricity generators and adjusts electricity rates accordingly after receiving PUC approval.

"For a residential customer using 650 kWh per month, when transmission and distribution costs are included, the result will be an increase in the monthly bill from \$145.11 to \$222.44, or about \$77.33 more (an increase of 53.3%), compared to current rates," the <u>PUC stated</u> in its June 23 order approving the rate increase. "The residential energy service rate is 13.74 cents per kWh higher than the same six-month period (August to January) a year ago."

According to Eversource, which only transmits but does not generate electricity, the increase is due to record-high natural gas prices and the global economy.

"Natural gas is the primary fuel for generating electricity in the region," an Eversource email about the rates increase states. "Given world events, we could see continued volatility in energy supply prices for the foreseeable future."

Payment assistance programs

Eversource also offers payment programs, including:

- Extended payment plans to help customers pay off a balance over a period of time and prevent service interruption;
- Budget billing, to help avoid seasonal bill spikes with a fixed payment amount each month based on average annual usage;
- Discount rate for customers with a household income that meets eligibility requirements;
- New start program, which may eliminate portions of an overdue balance in as little as 12 months with on-time payments.

Potential legislative relief

Gov. Chris Sununu and legislative leaders proposed energy relief programs on June 22. The proposals include a \$100 credit for most residential electric bills in the state, \$7 million from state surplus funds to shore up the Electric Assistance Program, and an allocation of \$7.5

million to provide low-income families financial assistance to keep cool during the summer.

The proposed energy relief programs still need to go through the legislative process before becoming a reality.

City schedules neighborhood meetings in advance of road reconstruction projects

Community Services will hold two neighborhood meetings about upcoming road reconstruction projects this month. One meeting will be for the Court Street and Union Street Reconstruction Project, and the other will be for the Fifth Street and Grover Street Reconstruction Project. Both projects are in the preliminary design phase.

The meetings will allow city staff to discuss project objectives with residents and the findings of the recently completed base surveys. The meetings will also allow city staff to solicit residents for feedback and gather ideas as work begins on final design plans.

The reconstruction for both projects includes upgrading underground utilities and addressing the conditions of the drainage, roadway and sidewalks. Work to date has included geotechnical borings to investigate subsurface conditions within the project area, video inspection of the existing stormwater drain, sewer main and sewer services and creating base surveys. The goal is to have final design plans ready for both projects by year's end to allow the projects to go for bid and for construction work to begin in 2023.

The City of Dover is committed to a multi-modal approach to roadway design, particularly in urban residential areas. The City of Dover has tasked each project's contracted engineer consultant to design the reconstruction project so that streets and sidewalks are safe and accessible for all users regardless of age, physical ability or mode of transport.

Court Street and Union Street Reconstruction Project

The city has contracted with Wright-Peirce of Portsmouth to design the project, which began work last summer.
