## UNH fellow to measure Dover's carbon and nitrogen output

The City of Dover's Planning and Community Development Department has welcomed Jackson Kaspari to City Hall for the summer as a University of New Hampshire Sustainability Fellow. Dover was selected to host one of the UNH Sustainability Institute's 23 fellowships in 2018. These fellowships pair outstanding graduate and undergraduate students with competitive, challenging, multi-disciplinary projects based with organizations and communities throughout New England.

**City Hall hours:**

The City's project will be a first in New Hampshire. The project is not only a calculation of the carbon footprint of municipal operations, but also the nitrogen footprint created by the City's facilities, fleets, school food purchases, fertilizer program, and wastewater treatment methods.

Kaspari will utilize a tool developed by UNH, the Sustainability Indicator Management and Analysis Platform (SIMAP), which was designed for campus analyses. Part of Kaspari's work will be to begin to modify the tool in ways more directly applicable to municipalities.

Kaspari is a 2018 graduate of UNH with a B.S. in chemical engineering, as well as a graduate of St. Mary Academy and St. Thomas Aquinas High School in Dover. Following the summer fellowship, he will continue at UNH as a doctoral student of physical chemistry. The project ties in with Kaspari's research interests in atmospheric chemistry.

"This project will provide me an excellent opportunity to give back to the Dover community via the application of many skills developed during my time as a chemical engineering undergrad and atmospheric researcher," Kaspari said. "Furthermore, compiling a carbon and nitrogen footprint baseline, using SIMAP, will be the essential first step allowing the City to establish and execute reduction goals for years to come."

The project will result in a final report and presentation to the City Council with recommendations for reducing the City's production of each pollutant. A carbon footprint considers both carbon dioxide and methane emissions that are released into the atmosphere through many activities, including the production and consumption of food, fuels, manufactured goods, materials, roads, buildings, transportation and other services. A nitrogen footprint estimates the reactive nitrogen produced as a byproduct of burning fossil fuels or resulting from the production and waste of food, fertilizer use, and human and animal waste.


Kaspari will be mentored by Assistant City Planner Elena Piekut, who is the Planning Department liaison to the Dover Energy Commission.

"The Energy Commission has become a dynamic group of citizens with wide-ranging scientific, technical, and legislative expertise, and they are very pleased to have been selected for this fellowship," Piekut said. "We look forward to providing the Commission, City Council, and broader public with a picture of the City's impacts and steps the City can take to lessen those impacts where practical."

This project furthers many goals identified in the City's Master Plan, the guiding document for planning efforts and policies. Goals established throughout the chapters of the Master Plan consider becoming a community that can

sustain itself and provide a high quality of life for generations, protecting and conserving its natural resources, including water quality, and maintaining infrastructure that supports many modes of transportation. A specific objective of the Stewardship of Resources Chapter of the Master Plan is to "identify and adopt a carbon limit and specific reduction strategies for City buildings and vehicles." With the help of Kaspari and UNH, the City will do that and more.

According to Christopher Parker, AICP, Dover's Assistant City Manager, who oversees planning activities, "In Dover, the Master Plan isn't just a report we complete, shelve and admire, it is a document we live, and grow with. This project is an example of the community embracing the Stewardship Chapter and its recommendations."

Like Piekut and Kaspari, Parker is excited to see this project move forward.

"Dover has recognized the changing climate and environment we live in and wants to address challenges related to that adaptation," Parker said. "This project will help the community better plan for the future and ensure that our vehicles and buildings are invested in and have a long and valuable useful life."

## Traffic restrictions and road closures in place for Sunday 5K

On Sunday, June 17, 2018 at 9 a.m., the Father's Day 5K Run/Walk event will be held at Margaritas on Members Way. This event is part of the Dover Race Series and benefits Goodwin Community Health.

## Dover Rising Waters initiative holding contest for young artists

The Dover Rising Waters initiative is a group of volunteer citizens working to implement climate actions identified in the City's Master Plan. Its first undertaking, the High Water Mark Project, seeks to engage community members in proposing and implementing public art projects that convey future flood risks as sea levels rise and extreme precipitation events become more frequent and intense. The goal of the project will be visualized through public art projects in Dover that spark community conversations about the impacts of flooding and rising sea levels.

The first round of the High Water Mark Project focuses on youth art in the form of a public contest. At least one winning project proposal will be selected, and the artist will win a cash prize.

Following the winning selection, the High Water Mark

Project team will seek funding for implementation of the designs and collaborate with the winning artist to implement and publicize the project. Additional rounds will focus on professional artists and other interested parties.

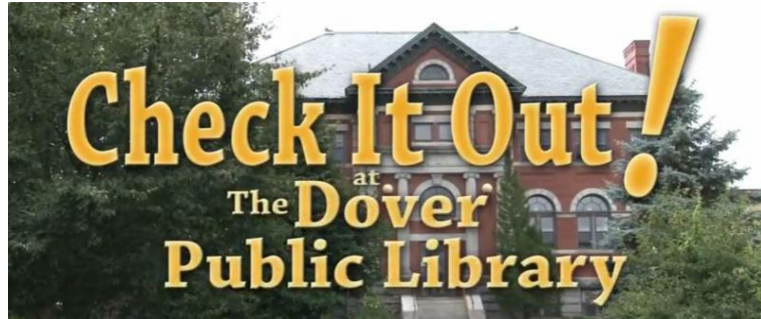
The event also supports the Dover Food Pantry. A free hot dog will be given to everyone who brings at least three canned goods to the event.

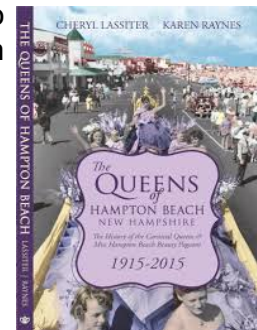

## 'Queens of Hampton Beach' to screen at the Library June 26

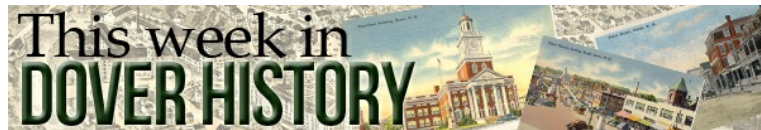

The Miss America pageant was recently in the news by deciding to eliminate the swimsuit portion of the competition. Come for the fascinating history of this New Hampshire seacoast institution.

The following events are recorded in "Notable Events in the History of Dover, New Hampshire: From the First Settlement in 1623 to 1865," by George Wadleigh, "Historic Rambles About Dover," by Robert A. Whitehouse, "Port of Dover: Two Centuries of Shipping on the Cochecho" by Robert A. Whitehouse and Cathleen C. Beaudoin, and several other historical sources.

For more on the history of Dover, settled in 1623 and the oldest permanent settlement in New Hampshire and seventh oldest in the country, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street; and the Woodman Institute Museum, Central Avenue. **June 17, 1657** - It was ordered that whoever should kill a wolf or wolves, whether English or Indian, within the town should have for so doing four pounds for every wolf killed, the head to be brought to the meeting house on Dover Neck or delivered to the constable and be by him publicly declared.



**June, 1792** - The State Legislature sits in the new Court House, recently completed in Dover, making Dover the state Capitol. In this court house, many of the state's most famous attorneys were heard, including Daniel Webster, Jeremiah Mason, Ichabod Bartlett and Jeremiah Smith. It is written that Daniel Webster, while living in Portsmouth, would ride horseback through Newington, across the Piscataqua River bridge, on to Leighton's Hill where he would call on William King Atkinson, and together they would ride in a most friendly manner to the Dover Court House, where all day they would wage fierce legal battles. The United States District Court would also convene here for a time, with Judge John Sullivan presiding. The Courthouse was later converted into tenements, and in the 1920s, a garage and gas station.



**June 18, 1833** - A public meeting was held for the purpose of making arrangements for the reception of President Jackson, then on a visit to Concord, and who was expected to pass through Dover on his way to Portland. But the President, in consequence of feeble health, returned direct to Boston and Washington.



**June 16, 1852** - Candace Waldron, born a slave in the family of Thomas W. Waldron in 1781, died, aged 71.



**June 16, 1862** - A heavy frost destroys corn in many places in Dover.

## Walking tours of historic Dover

The Greater Dover Chamber of Commerce is again hosting walking tours of historic Dover through Labor Day weekend.

The next tour is this Saturday, June 16.

The Saturday morning walking tours begin at 10:30 a.m. Three different, 90-minute walking tours will be offered throughout the summer, and take place from one of three Dover locations as specified on the tour schedule.

The June 16 tour will leave from the Dover Chamber parking lot located at 550 Central Ave. You will stroll down the Central Avenue Business District while learning about the rise and fall of the textile industry, "Dover's Black Day," and notable visitors and residents of Dover's past. You will also visit the Cochecho, Bellamy and Piscataqua Rivers that gave Dover its economic advantage, from ship building, to farming, to leading the way in cotton manufactured goods from the 1820s to 1880s. Along the way you will notice the ten different types of architecture used through the City dating back to the late 1700s.
