

Site work begins for Dover waterfront development

Access to area will be restricted beginning on Monday, June 12

Work is underway at the city-owned waterfront parcel on River Street. Construction and infrastructure firm, Northeast Earth Mechanics, Inc., is mobilizing equipment at the site, marking the

Tuesday, Thursday, Saturday: 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. commencement of the development of the waterfront property. A ground-breaking ceremony will be held at the site in the coming weeks.

Northeast Earth is slated to start installing fencing along Washington Street Extension on Monday, June 12. Upon installation, public dock use will be limited. Dock access will be available for the Gundalow event scheduled for later this month, part of the city's 400th-anniversary celebration.

Dover's waterfront development represents a considerable undertaking. Public improvement measures form a significant part of this project, from constructing a new street system for site access to establishing necessary utilities for the upcoming buildings. A new 3.4-acre public riverfront park, shoreline stabilization, site grading to account for projected sea-level rise, and a new stormwater management system with green infrastructure are also part of the project.

The city also plans to upgrade the River Street pump station, which handles roughly 80% of the city's wastewater. With the pump station approaching its 30th year, the City Council has approved an amendment to its contract with Wright-Pierce to undertake the design work for these upgrades.

The project also includes a private development component, led by developer Cathartes, which is expected to begin next year once some of the public improvements are complete. The development plan includes three mixed-use buildings, two multifamily buildings, and three clusters of townhouses.

Approved by the Planning Board in June 2022, the development aims to revitalize the Dover waterfront and introduce approximately 26,000 square feet of commercial space and 418 residential units, comprising both rental and condominium units for sale.

The waterfront development project, which has been in the planning stages for years, took a significant step forward with the approval of the city's public improvements plan and Cathartes' site plan last year.

Council to review public water supply system and improvements at workshop

The City Council will get an update on the public supply system at a workshop at 6 p.m.

Wednesday, June 14, before the Council's regular meeting at 7 p.m.

Representatives from Underwood Engineers, a city consultant, will review recent and future water system upgrades. Current projects include the Pudding Hill Water Treatment Plant, the new one million-gallon water storage tank off Webb Place and associated Smith Well Road water main upgrades and the Portsmouth-Dover Emergency Interconnection. Future planned projects include the Garrison Hill water tank rehabilitation and French Cross Water Treatment Plant upgrades.

Consultants from Emery & Garrett Groundwater Investigations will review ongoing aquifer status, drought resiliency, water quality monitoring, and potential future supply sources.

The City of Dover and Dover400 are choreographing a fireworks display this Fourth of July.



Dover Arts Commission introduces Dover's new Literary Laureate

The Dover Arts Commission is pleased to announce the appointment of Steve Bargdill as the Dover Literary Laureate.

Bargdill, an author and Dover resident, expressed his belief in the transformative power of literature, stating, "I believe literature has the power to enrich and transform the lives of individuals and communities."

The primary mission of the Dover Literary Laureate is to broaden community involvement in all forms of literary expression. In this role, Bargdill will be responsible for attending monthly Arts Commission meetings and developing and implementing literary projects and activities to enhance the quality of life for Dover citizens.

Bargdill has published works in literary outlets such as Literary Orphans, Tinge Magazine, and Your Impossible Voice. His short story, "The Taco Robbers From Last Week," earned a nomination for the prestigious 2021 Pushcart Prize. Bargdill's educational background includes an MFA in Fiction from the University of New Hampshire, an MA in English Literature from the University of Wyoming and a BA in English Literature from the University of Iowa. Furthermore, he was honored with the 2019 Dick Shea Memorial Award for Fiction. Bargdill also shares his expertise as a creative writing instructor at Great Bay Community College.

"We are thrilled to have Steve on board to help expand community engagement in all facets of literary expression," said Jane Hamor, Chair of the Dover Arts Commission. "With Steve's

literary knowledge and passion for community enrichment, the Dover Arts Commission is confident that his appointment as the Dover Literary Laureate will foster a vibrant and inclusive literary culture within the city."

Smith Well Road reconstruction work begins later this month

Work is anticipated to begin later this month on Smith Well Road to install new utilities, including new sewer and water supply lines. The project is connected to building the new elevated water tank, which will provide additional reliability and redundancy to the city's water system.

An exact start date has not yet been set, but the work is expected to begin after June 20.

The work on Smith Well Road will include connecting to the water main on Glenwood Avenue, which will impact traffic and include a temporary water shutoff when the connection is made. Temporary water supply lines will be installed to service Smith Well Road, which will require brief individual water shutoffs to allow the contractor to connect properties to the temporary line. The city will provide a 48-hour notice for non-emergency water shutoffs.

The work on Smith Well Road will also include the reclamation of the road. Reclamation is the process of grinding the existing pavement in place and mixing it with the existing base gravel material to improve the strength of the base. The reclaimed material can be shaped to reestablish the roadway cross-section and improve drainage. Later this season, the contractor will return to lay new pavement.

Traffic control

At least one lane of traffic on Smith Well Road and Barry Street will be maintained during the project, with traffic flow controlled by flaggers. Glenwood Avenue traffic will also be impacted when the connection is made, which is expected to include a full closure of Glenwood Avenue at the Smith Well Road intersection sometime this summer for a period of one to two workdays. Traffic is likely to be diverted via Horne and Glencrest streets. More details on the traffic plan will be released soon.

The following events are from a variety of historical records, sources, and texts about the history of Dover.

June 16, 1852 — Candace Waldron, born in Dover in 1781 as a slave to the family of Thomas W. Waldron, died on this day at 71 years old.


June 14, 1856 — A silver salver was presented to the Hon. John Parker Hale by the citizens of Dover as "a token of their approbation of his fidelity to Human Rights." Hale, of Dover, served in the United States House of Representatives and Senate and was a prominent figure in the antislavery movement.

June 16, 1862 — A heavy frost destroyed the corn in many places in Dover.

June 12, 1921 — The Dover Board of Assessors announced the total inventory valuation of the City for 1921 as \$13,677,024. This included mills and machinery at \$1,121,621, 580 horses,

four oxen, 889 cows, 92 sheep, 55 hogs, 3,913 fowl, 71 vehicles, and four boats.

June 12, 1999 — Merrimack-based PC Connection, which also operated a call center out of a 16,000-square-foot space in the Cocheco Falls Millworks, announced it was expanding its space in the mills to 32,000 square feet and would employ more than 200 people. PC Connection, now known as Connection, no longer operates out of the Dover mill complex. The Cocheco Falls Millworks were purchased by Eric Chinburg and partners in January 2012 and is now called Cocheco Mills.



An Enduring Presence: Remembering The Old Man of the Mountain 20 years later

On May 3, 2003 the symbol of New Hampshire came tumbling down. Now, 20 years later, we look back on the Old Man of the Mountain and his legacy.

Join Dover Public Library on Monday, June 19 at 6:30 p.m. for "An Enduring Presence: The Old Man of the Mountain," a lecture by Inez McDermott. The event takes place in person with and option to watch virtually from home. Sign-up is needed to receive a link to watch online.

When the Old Man of the Mountain fell from his perch high above Franconia Notch, it made international news. Many in New Hampshire and beyond responded as though mourning a beloved public figure. The Profile was and continues to be, central to New Hampshire's literary history, tourism, commerce, political messaging, conservation, and environmental concerns and policies. This program examines the Old Man's role in shaping New Hampshire's identity from its first recorded discovery in the early 19th century until today. From extraordinary examples of innovative engineering and heroic risk-taking to letters from children donating their allowance to help purchase the surrounding forest, the efforts made for 200 years to protect the Old Man are a major part of this story. Audiences will be asked to share their reminiscences, and we will discuss why these granite ledges, the result of a "miraculous accident," according to a state geologist, have played such an outsized role in the hearts of so many.

Inez McDermott is a professor emeritus of art history at New England College. She is a curator of art and history exhibitions at various museums and galleries throughout New England, including, most recently, An Enduring Presence: The Old Man of the Mountain at the Museum of the White Mountains at Plymouth State University (June-September 2023). Professor McDermott has lectured on various art history topics throughout New Hampshire with a special focus on American art. She has served as an arts councilor for the New Hampshire State Council on the Arts, as a board member for New Hampshire Humanities, and currently serves on the board of the Saint-Gaudens Memorial and on the Interpretation Committee for the New Hampshire Historical Society.

Documentary on Dover's Major Waldron and the Pennacook to screen at the Dover Public Library

In celebration of Dover's 400th Anniversary, the Dover Public Library has partnered with Indigenous New Hampshire Collaborative Collective representatives to present a short documentary about Major Richard Waldron. The documentary "Pennacook Retribution: Who Shall Judge" will screen at the library on Monday, June 12 at 6:30 p.m. and will be followed by a panel discussion by the filmmakers. The panel will feature Paul and Denise Pouliot, Charles and Anne Jennison, Kathleen Blake, and the filmmaker Catherine Stewart. The event will be a hybrid offering meaning it can be viewed in person or by registering to view at home. See the library's website to register for the event.

"Pennacook Retribution – Who Shall Judge the Indians Now?" was written by Anne Jennison, a traditional Abenaki storyteller, and historian, in collaboration with the Cowasuck Band of the Pennacook-Abenaki People and the Indigenous New Hampshire Collaborative Collective. The documentary reframes a moment in history through the eyes of the people who have lived on this land for over 12,000 years.

In 1689, Major Richard Waldron was executed by the Pennacooks in an event known as the Cochecho Massacre. Waldron's story usually paints him as a tragic hero and the Pennacook Indians as the "savages" who murdered him. But what does this story look like from their perspective of the Pennacook?

Once known to the Pennacook Abenaki as Cochecho (meaning "place of the rapid current") and known to early English colonists as the Cochecho Plantation, Dover is a city familiar with Major Richard Waldron. Many streets, buildings, and civic properties bear his name.

The film is supported by the University of New Hampshire Humanities Center, which administers a grant from the American Council of Learned Societies (ACLS), and generous donations from individuals. Pennacook Retribution is produced by Film Unbound.

National citizen survey seeks opinions from Dover residents
