

# Council gets first look at FY2023 budget

**Budget sessions to continue next week** 

The City Manager presented the proposed fiscal year 2023 budget to the City Council at its March 23 meeting.



In the following weeks, beginning next Wednesday, March 30, the City Council will hold budget workshops to receive detailed departmental budget requests. On March 30, the City Council will receive presentations from the School, Executive, Finance, Planning, and Information Technology departments. The

complete budget workshop schedule is listed below.

The proposed budget for fiscal year 2023 submitted to the Council by City Manager J. Michael Joyal, Jr., is \$180,987,528 across all funds, an increase over the previous year of \$18,134,646, or 11.1%. The General Fund portion of the budget, funded primarily through property taxes, is \$141,057,001, an increase over the previous year of \$10,542,897, or 8.1%. As proposed, the city portion of the budget is \$100,000 under the provisions of the tax cap; the school portion of the budget is \$4.3 million over the tax cap. In total, the proposed budget is \$4.2 million above the estimated tax cap. For the Council to adopt the budget as presented would require a two-thirds affirmative vote instead of a simple majority.

### Library roof replacement begins early April

#### Parking capacity to be temporarily reduced

The Dover Public Library is getting a new slate roof.

The project, scheduled to begin in early April, will replace the existing slate roof – original to the 1905 building – with new slate shingles. The contractor will also replace the upper roof copper cornice and the six copper decorative details. The work is expected to be completed in July.

The library will remain open during its regular operating hours throughout the construction, with continued access through the rear handicap-accessible door; however, its front door may not always be accessible. There will also be a temporary reduction of about 15 parking spaces to facilitate the roof replacement, and there may be a need to change traffic patterns in the parking lot. The City Council <u>awarded</u> the contract for the project to Portsmouth-based Careno Construction Co., Inc. in January for a cost not to exceed \$886,998.

### Celebrating Greek independence



## Council awards bid to construct sidewalks on Whittier Street

#### Neighborhood project meeting scheduled for April 5

A new section of sidewalk will be built on Whittier Street this year following the City Council's awarding of the construction bid at its March 23 meeting. The new section of sidewalk on Whittier Street would be from Sixth Street to Glenwood Avenue; the project also includes associated minor roadway and drainage improvements.

Community Services will hold a neighborhood meeting about the pending project on Tuesday, April 5 at 6 p.m., at the Public Works Building, 271 Mast Road in Dover. The meeting will include a review of the project goals and anticipated temporary impacts. All interested parties are encouraged to attend this public meeting.

## **Spring street sweeping begins April 4**

#### Sidewalk sweeping and cleaning already underway


Community Services' annual street sweeping operations will begin citywide April 4 and are expected to continue through early June.

In advance of street sweeping, crews are already cleaning sidewalks with blowers and brooms. Crews will begin sweeping the streets Monday, April 4, weather permitting. Downtown streets are scheduled to be cleaned first before moving to the rest of the city.

Sweeping operations will require temporary parking bans to allow crews to clear the street; advanced notice will be provided through signage, email and social media. ## Claire St. Cyr sworn in as Dover's first female police officer in 1945

In 1942, City Marshal Andrew H. McDaniel replaced his retiring bookkeeper, Sgt. William Lathrop, with Claire St. Cyr, a recent graduate of the McIntosh Business School. Originally hired as a clerk and stenographer, St. Cyr, upon turning 21 years old in 1945, became Dover's first female police officer.

St. Cyr's promotion came as a surprise. On her 21st birthday, St. Cyr came to work and noticed 21 roses on her desk. Standing about were Marshal McDaniel, Sgt. "Ted" McDonough and others. McDaniel spoke up and said that the Police Department had long needed a policewoman and then swore in St. Cyr as a member of the Department.

Although a member of the sworn police force, St. Cyr remained mostly within Police headquarters keeping the books and writing

court papers. St. Cyr was not given a uniform, but had a badge (actually two badges – the regular issued police badge and a smaller gold colored one), and was authorized to make arrests. St. Cyr left the Dover Police Department for about a year and a half to start a family with her husband, Charlie Watson. Returning in 1947, then as Mrs. Watson, she remained with the Police Department until 1950.



Claire St. Cyr (Watson) is also the subject of a book, along with her husband, Charlie, "Claire and Charlie: An Unlikely Wartime Love Story," published in 2017 and written by Claire and Charlie's son, Warren Watson, a long-time journalist and graduate of St. Thomas Aquinas High School in Dover. The book focuses on Watson's parents and their experiences as the children of immigrants, with world war, and the erosion of French-Canadian culture in New England.

During the years of 1946 and 1947 Dover's second policewoman, Carolyn Foley, remained the sole sworn female officer in the Department. Foley, like Claire (St. Cyr) Watson, was not given a uniform but was authorized to make arrests and was shown how to operate a police cruiser. The majority of Foley's time with the Department was spent keeping the books, handling abuse cases and monitoring the police base radio at the station. Like Watson, Foley was a graduate of the McIntosh Business School (which became the former McIntosh College in Dover).

It was long before Watson or Foley were sworn in as police officers that a previous City Marshal requested a woman on the force. In 1914, Chief of Police Edward Clarke requested a policewoman to help out. He wrote, "There are many delicate cases in which a man cannot get sufficient information for the Department to work on." Eva M. Arlin of the Probation Office provided female prisoner assistance during this time. In the 1920 annual report, Miss Arlin was listed as receiving \$6.22 for an "expense with prisoner." Until the hiring of Claire St. Cyr (Watson) in 1942 and her eventual promotion in 1945 to a sworn officer, there is no other mention of a policewoman in Dover.

Women have continued to serve the police force in Dover ever since. Currently, seven women serve as sworn officers on the Dover police force. Today, whether male or female, all Dover police officers perform the same job.

## Kindergarten registration now open at Dover's public elementary schools

Dover elementary schools are now accepting appointments for kindergarten registrations for the 2022-2023 school year. To be eligible, children entering kindergarten must be five years old by Sept. 30, 2022. In addition, to complete the registration process, parents and guardians must provide a legible copy of a birth certificate, proof of residency, current health and immunization records, and, if necessary, a parenting plan or court custody agreement.

- Families with a child currently attending a Dover public school can add a new child to their existing registration account by logging into the *Infinite Campus Parent Portal*.
- Parents will be prompted at various steps in the online registration process to upload several documents that will be attached to the child's registration. These documents can be scanned or photographed with a smartphone camera as long as they are legible. Registration progress can be saved and returned to at a later time if needed. ## Registration open for Dover Football League 2022 season

Registration is now open for the upcoming Dover Football League 2022 season.

The Dover Football League (DFL) is an organization that comprises three tackle football divisions open to the boys and girls in Dover

and the surrounding towns of Barrington and Nottingham. Youth division is any player in second through fourth grade; the junior division comprises fifth and sixth graders; the senior division is made up of seventh and eighth graders. DFL plays in the 17-town Northeast Junior High School Football League under the National High School Federation rules.



DFL's mission is to develop and grow responsible, upstanding community members through teaching the fundamentals of contact football, including, but are not limited to: proper individual technique, playbook execution, and the value of teamwork. DFL strives to encourage and develop players through the ranks by closely working with the Dover High School football staff to ensure a smooth transition for players when they step up to play at DHS.

Coaches are USA Football certified, and background checked through the National Center for Safety Initiatives. The certification requires DFL coaches to plan for and develop your player with the USA Football - Football Development Model (FDM). The FDM is a new initiative designed to make the game safer by reducing contact and teaching athletes in a manner that meets them in their stage of development. The following events are from a variety of historical records, sources and texts about the history of Dover.

For more on the history of Dover, settled in 1623 and the oldest European permanent settlement in New Hampshire and seventh oldest in the country, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street; and the Woodman Museum on Central Avenue. The Public Library also maintains an online collection of historical information, located here.

**March 25-29**, **1699** — A severe storm bears down on Dover, delivering five days of constant snow, rain, hail, thunder and extreme wind. It began with snow and ended with snow.

March 26, 1759 — At a public town meeting held at the old meeting house on Pine Hill, Col. John Gage, Capt. Howard Henderson and Lt. Dudley Watson were chosen a committee to petition the General Assembly for liberty to raise money by a lottery to build a bridge over the Cochecho River. It was also voted to have two schools in town, exclusive of a grammar school

and the school in Madbury. (Madbury was still a part of Dover.)

**March 25**, **1856** — First organization of the City Government — Hon. Andrew Peirce, the Mayor elect, taking the oath of office, and Charles Clements, Esq. Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, surrendering the official seals and records of the town to his successor.

March 25, 1968 — Dover High School teachers squared off against Marshwood High School teachers in the first faculty basketball tournament held between the schools. The Marshwood Hawks downed the Green Wave teachers by a pounding 77-63. The high scorer for Marshwood was Rod Wotton, who racked up 27 points. The high scorers for Dover were Jack Barron with 16, and 10 points each for Dale Hanson, Greg Kageleiry and Ron Montalto.

March 30, 1999 — Then Community Services Director Mike Bobinksy announces he will leave the City of Dover's top public works job in June of that year for a position as assistant city manager in Draper, Utah. Bobinsky had been appointed director of a newly formed Community Services department in 1994, which was created to oversee public works, recreation, facilities and grounds, and cemetery services. Bobinsky later returned to the area and is currently the director of Public Works and Utilities in Somersworth.

## Grants available to Dover, state residents for mortgage payments, property taxes and utility bills

The American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 provided \$50 million to New Hampshire, funding the New Hampshire Homeowner Assistance Fund (HAF). The HAF offers aid to eligible residents struggling to pay their mortgage, property taxes, utility bills, and other housing costs during the COVID-19 pandemic. The state contracted with the New Hampshire Finance Authority to administer the program.

Eligible homeowners can receive up to \$20,000 assistance for mortgage loan reinstatement for delinquent mortgage payments, and property charges, such as delinquent property taxes, homeowner insurance, and homeowner/condominium association fees/dues. They can also receive up to \$3,000 for utility bills, such as electricity, gas, heating fuel, water, sewer and internet bills.

Cumulative HAF assistance of less than \$5,000 will be given as a grant. For \$5,000 and above, funds will be provided through a two-year non-interest-bearing forgivable grant. The grant is due in full upon sale, cash-out refinance or transfer of ownership within two years of HAF assistance. If these events do not occur, the grant will be forgiven.

Eligibility requirements include New Hampshire property ownership that is the owner's primary residence, coronavirus pandemic-related income reduction or expense increase since Jan. 21, 2020, and income equal to or less than 125% of area median income.

### Ninth annual Saint Mary Academy 5K Run/Walk is April 9




