Council budget review continues this week

The City Council began its general budget review at its March 27 <u>workshop</u>. The general budget review allows Councilors to ask additional budget questions to the city manager and department heads and begin shaping the budget into its final form.

Council members discussed what aspects they wanted to keep, add, or subtract from the proposed budget. The Council will continue its general budget review at a Wednesday, April 3 workshop, beginning at 7 p.m.

Following the workshop, if the Council is ready, it will call a special meeting to adopt the FY2025 budget. If the Council does not adopt the budget that night, it will do so the following week at its regular meeting on Wednesday, April 10.



River Street to close April 8 for summer

River Street will closed to vehicular and pedestrian traffic 24 hours a day starting Monday,

April 8. The closure also includes a section of sidewalk at the northeastern edge of Henry Law Park and a section of Washington Street from the Makem Bridge. The closure is anticipated to continue through at least Labor Day in September 2024.

The closure will allow the contractor to install a new water main, stormwater drainage, and electrical duct bank related to the waterfront project and complete other roadway work.

The Greater Dover Chamber of Commerce hosted the annual State of the City on Thursday, March 28, at 121 Broadway in Dover. Gary Bannon, the City of Dover's recreation director, was the keynote speaker. He is retiring in April after 34 years with the city.

The event also featured a panel discussion on the local rental market, and the city's efforts to promote the creation of accessory dwelling units (ADUs) as a way to increase the housing supply. Ryan Pope, the city's housing navigator, and Toni Gooch from Kennebunk Savings Bank highlighted a new loan program that allows homeowners to finance ADU construction with favorable terms.

City survey seeks experiences from those trying to obtain housing

Deadline approaches for property tax credits, exemptions for veterans, elderly, blind, deaf, disabled

The City of Dover offers property tax exemptions for qualified property owners that include veterans, the elderly, the blind, the deaf, the disabled, and those with solar energy systems.

To qualify for tax exemptions, a person must apply and demonstrate that they meet requirements set out by state law, such as residency, asset, and income limits. The deadline to apply for exemptions for the December 2024 property tax bill is Monday, April 15, 2024.

Applications for tax exemptions are available at the Tax Assessment Office in City Hall. The applications are also available online at https://www.dover.nh.gov/government/city-operations/finance/tax-assessment/applications/.

Tax Credit for Veterans

The City of Dover offers credits for qualified veterans, their spouses, or surviving spouse, including:

Veterans' Credit provides up to \$750 per year for those who served on active service in a qualifying war/conflict with applicable awards. This credit also encompasses service members who have served on active service in a qualifying war/conflict and remain on active duty, and includes training for active duty by a member of the National Guard or Reserve member.

All Veterans' Credit provides up to \$750 per year for those who served or are currently serving and are not eligible for the Veterans' Credit. This also includes training for active duty by a member of the National Guard or Reserve.

Service-Connected Total and Permanent Disability Credit, providing up to \$4,000 annually to veterans totally and permanently disabled due to a service-connected disability; double amputees or paraplegics due to service-connected injuries also qualify.

Please refer to RSA 72:28, RSA 72:28-b, and RSA 21:50 for specific state law language regarding eligibility for these credits. Veterans and active service members are encouraged to contact the Tax Assessment Office at 603-516-6014 with questions about veteran tax credits and/or eligibility.

Elderly Tax Credit

Provides at least \$166,000 off the assessed property value for those who meet age, income, asset, and residency requirements.

For ages 65 to 74, the exemption is \$166,000

For ages 75 to 79, the exemption is \$234,000

For ages 80 and older, the exemption is \$300,000

Blind Exemption

Provides \$166,000 off the assessed property value for those who are legally blind. Must meet residency requirements

Deaf Exemption

Provides \$166,000 off the assessed property value for those who are deaf or have a severe hearing impairment

Must meet residency, income, and asset requirements

Disability Exemption

Provides \$166,000 off the assessed property value for those who are eligible under Title II or Title XVI of the federal Social Security Act for benefits to the disabled Must meet residency, income, and asset requirements

Exemption for Solar Energy Systems

Provides up to \$30,000 off the property's assessed value of a solar energy system. As defined by RSA 72:61, a solar energy system utilizes energy to heat or cool the interior of a building or to heat water for use in a building that includes one or more collectors and a storage container. It also means a system that provides electricity for a building using photovoltaic panels. The amount of the exemption is the assessed value of the solar energy system, up to \$30,000.



Survey scopes Dover's natural resources inventory

The Strafford Regional Planning Commission, in association with the City of Dover, is conducting a Natural Resources Inventory (NRI).

They seek the public's opinions on Dover's natural resources. The NRI will help ensure resources are managed in a way that aligns with the needs and desires of the city for years to come.

Take the survey at https://www.surveymonkey.com/r/DOVNRI. It should about 10 minutes or less to complete.

An NRI compiles information on significant, naturally occurring resources within a given locality, such as forests, farmlands, streams, lakes, wetlands, and rocky ridges. Cultural resources, such as historic, scenic, and recreational assets are also included in the inventory. NRIs are comprised of maps, data, and a report that describes the resources, project goals and recommendations for the next steps.

By visualizing an area's resources – where they occur and how they relate to each other, their surroundings, and existing development – an NRI provides a foundation for informed land-use planning and decision-making. NRIs also serve as the basis for identifying conservation priorities and other strategies, such as local regulations to protect natural resources and identify the need for more detailed studies such as wildlife habitat assessment or wetland evaluation.

The following events are from various historical records, sources, and texts about the history of Dover.

For more on the history of Dover, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street, and the Woodman Museum on Central Avenue. The Public Library also maintains an online collection of historical information located here.

April 3, 1695 — The Provincial Council on this day instructed the Treasurer to order the constables (law enforcement officers) in Dover and Oyster River not to collect taxes from the people who had paid to support soldiers sent from Massachusetts to protect the frontier. In essence, the residents of Dover and Oyster River were exempted from paying certain taxes that year as they had already contributed funds to maintain the military forces protecting their frontier communities.


March 31, 1760 — At a public town meeting held at the old meeting house on Pine Hill, it was voted that there be no more schools for the year ensuing than by law is required. A committee was appointed to settle the lines between Dover and Barrington and empowered to prosecute or petition to the General Assembly if needed. (This appears to have been the last "public town meeting held at the old meeting house on Pine Hill.)

March 31, 1827 — The net amount of postage accrued at the Dover Post Office for the year ending March 31, 1827 was \$819.70, the highest in the state except for Portsmouth.

April 1, 1935 — The Flying Yankee train begins service this day, including a stop in Dover. The Flying Yankee was a pioneering 1935 diesel-electric streamliner train built for the Maine Central and Boston & Maine Railroads. It was the third streamliner in North

America after the Union Pacific's M-10000 and Burlington's Pioneer Zephyr. The stainless steel, air-conditioned train seated 142 passengers. Initially running between Portland, Boston, and Bangor, it proved extremely popular. As newer equipment replaced it, it was reassigned to other New England routes under names like The Cheshire. Retired in 1957, it was displayed at museums before being purchased for restoration by New Hampshire in 1997. Restoration efforts continue with the goal of returning it to operation.

March 27, 2002 — The Dover City Council unanimously voted to rename the Locust Street building that had previously served as a high school and middle school after Air Force Capt. Joseph McConnell Jr., a Dover native. McConnell was the first triple jet ace in history, shooting down 16 MiGs in the Korean War. He enlisted at 18, earning his wings in 1948 after serving in World War II. McConnell died in 1954 while testing a jet. Retired Air Force Maj. Dom Domingo urged honoring McConnell, as Dover lacked memorials to him despite his achievements. The City Council agreed naming the school properly recognizes this "outstanding human being" and "native son." The building is now known as the McConnell Center.



Eclipse viewing party at the Public Library

Something phenomenal will hit New Hampshire on April 8.

The Dover Public Library will hold a viewing party from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m. on Monday, April 8, on the library's front lawn to watch the solar eclipse.

The all-ages event will feature activities while waiting for the moon to overshadow the sun, including experimenting with shadow drawings, making eclipse viewers and creating corona art. Refreshments will be served. The library also will have a telescope with a special sun filter for viewing the eclipse.

This year's solar eclipse will feature totality in northern New Hampshire and a 95% partial eclipse in Dover. New Hampshire is one of only 13 U.S. states that will experience a total solar eclipse. Total solar eclipses are rare in New Hampshire. Over the past 155 years, the state has had only two total solar eclipses, in 1932 and 1959.

There will not be another total solar eclipse visible in New Hampshire until 2079, when Dover will be in the path of totality.

Since Dover's view is not of a total eclipse, glasses must be worn the entire time when viewing the sun. The library is handing out free eclipse glasses on Wednesday nights from 5 p.m. to 8 p.m. You do not need to be a cardholder to get glasses. To ensure an adequate supply, glasses are limited to one per couple, two per family.

If glasses remain after March 27, they also will be handed out at a special STEM event on solar eclipses on Saturday, March 30, at 2 p.m. and at an educational talk on eclipses

titled "The Sky Guy Talks Eclipses" on Monday, April 1, at 6 p.m.

Library to host astronomy expert to discuss eclipses

Scientists can predict eclipses 1,000 years into the future, as noted in books about eclipses written in the 1970s that mention an eclipse happening on April 8, 2024.

While Dover will only have a 95% partial eclipse, the city can look forward to 100% totality on May 1, 2079. But residents don't have to wait 55 years to learn more about this fascinating natural phenomenon.

The Dover Public Library will host "The Sky Guy Talks Eclipses!" at 6 p.m. on Monday, April 1. The event will be in-person, but there is also an option to stream live from home. Those wishing to watch virtually need to sign up on the library's website to receive a link.

In this informal, family-friendly talk, John Gianforte, director of the University of New Hampshire Observatory, will discuss the upcoming solar eclipse, why solar eclipses occur and the conditions that make them possible. He also will cover how to safely observe solar eclipses and make simple equipment to safely view the sun, with or without an eclipse. In addition, he will explain what can be expected from locations in New Hampshire, Maine and Vermont during the eclipse. Questions are welcomed.

Gianforte is an astronomer and astronomy professor at UNH. His main research interests include observing and analyzing exoplanet transits and characterizing exoplanetary systems. He has taught astronomy courses for the University System of New Hampshire since 2002 and writes about astronomy on theskyguy.org and for local newspapers.

Gianforte has appeared on New Hampshire Public Radio, NHPBS programs and WMURTV's "New Hampshire Chronicles." He co-founded the Astronomical Society of Northern New England in 1983 and has chaired the New England Fall Astronomy Festival Organizing Committee at UNH for 12 years. He can be found at the UNH Observatory's twice-monthly public observing sessions.
