City Council budget deliberations continue

Discussion continues at workshop next week; possible budget adoption at special meeting

The City Council will hold its next budget session on Wednesday, April 5, for general budget deliberation. A special meeting will be held after the workshop if the City Council is prepared to vote on the budget. If not, budget deliberations will continue on April 12.

Both sessions include a public forum, during which Dover residents and business and property owners can speak about the proposed budget.



Dover Chamber announces annual award winners, including Educator of the Year

The Greater Dover Chamber of Commerce is pleased to announce that Meaghan Dunn, an English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) teacher at the Frances G. Hopkins Elementary School at Horne Street, has been named as the Chamber's 2023 David K. Bamford Educator of the Year. Chamber staff, Awards Committee members, Dover School Committee members, and Dover School Superintendent Dr. William Harbron attended a recent assembly at the school to surprise Dunn in person. As the Educator of the Year, Dunn will receive a \$1,000 stipend.

Brittany Granfield, dean of students at the Hopkins School, who nominated Dunn for the award, said, "Meaghan is always seeking innovative ways to serve all students. She has formed relationships with a diverse network of partners to enhance her students' learning experience. Meaghan visits other districts to learn about new strategies, attends meetings and cultural events to support connections, and participates in numerous voluntary trainings to improve outcomes for all learners. She also uses innovative technology to make the school and our community more accessible for students and families."

The Greater Dover Chamber of Commerce voted this year to name the Educator of the Year Award in honor of David K. Bamford, a local businessman and property developer who passed away in July. A strong proponent for education, Bamford worked to establish the Seacoast Education Endowment for Dover (SEED), a nonprofit that uses money raised by business and individual community giving to award grants to Dover public school teachers for innovative programs, practices, and resources. He was named the Citizen of the Year by the Greater Dover Chamber of Commerce in 2016.

In addition to Educator of the Year, the Greater Dover Chamber of Commerce will present the following awards at the Annual Awards Gala on May 4: Dana Lynch, Volunteer of the Year; Stephanie and Michael Bolduc, Citizens of the Year; Monarch School of New England, Nonprofit of the Year; Keslar Insurance Agency, Business of the Year; and Danielle Festa, Community Arts Champion.

The Chamber's 2023 Annual Awards Gala will be held at the Rivermill at Dover Landing and will feature a cocktail reception and dinner. Tickets for the Annual Awards Gala are \$90 per person (\$75 for Chamber members).

This year's event will incorporate Dover's 400th celebration, a year-long effort to recognize Dover's milestone anniversary.

Warming Center closes Saturday

The Warming Center of Strafford County closes its operation for the winter tomorrow, April 1.

SOS Recovery Community Organization was contracted to operate the Warming Center, activated when the weather met pre-defined criteria for life-threatening conditions. Strafford County partnered with the cities of Dover, Somersworth, and Rochester and oversaw and aided SOS' operations.

Numerous volunteers helped staff at the Warming Center and/or provided meals. Red's Good Vibes also provided thousands of meals during operations.

In addition to providing a safe space for those unhoused, SOS offered wrap-around services for clients seeking assistance to help meet their basic needs. During the season, 15 clients accessed treatment and recovery services. Others received stabilization services and medical care. The Greater Seacoast Community's mobile health van made weekly visits, with health van staff and often University of New Hampshire nursing students to provide medical care to more than 30 people that might have otherwise ended up in the emergency room. Dr. Reiko Johnson with Volunteers In Medicine provided additional medical support visits.

The Warming Center primarily operated during the overnights but opened during the day during significant winter storms. SOS provided public recaps of services each night on the Warming Center Facebook page.

Need emergency assistance?

Those in need of emergency assistance, including food, shelter, and medical care, are encouraged to connect with their local welfare office. The City of Dover owns the Willand Drive facility. The City Council authorized its purchase in December 2020 with federal grant funds to help ease pressure on regional facilities that provide services to the unhoused during the first winter of the COVID-19 pandemic. For the 2022-2023 winter season, the cities of Dover and Rochester each provided \$50,000 for operations. Through Strafford County, the state provided \$29,000 for operations. Somersworth provides in-kind services through emergency personnel. The City of Dover and Strafford County also provide in-kind facility and maintenance support.





NH Humanities Council grant helps Library tell story of Dover's indigenous history

The Dover Public Library recently curated an indigenous-themed play space in its Children's Room and will install a StoryWalk this spring to feature an indigenous story at Henry Law Park. Both initiatives are made possible with the support of the New Hampshire Humanities Council and are intended to help foster a deeper understanding of Dover's indigenous history.

The indigenous-themed play space was created to encourage imaginative play and provide a reading nook for children and their families. It includes a structure to mimic traditional Native American housing found in the local area, log seating around a low table where families and friends can gather, and a canoe. A tree bookshelf holds picture books highlighting many indigenous authors, and various indigenous crafts will be offered in this space on a rotating basis.

Later this spring, a StoryWalk will be installed at Henry Law Park. Twenty aluminum display units were purchased and will be installed in and around Henry Law Park, ending at the entrance to the Children's Museum. Each display shows a page of a children's picture book, and families walk the approximately half-mile route to read the entire book. An indigenous story will be featured to allow participants to learn more about different Native cultures. The StoryWalk is designed to allow books on display to change as needed. The StoryWalk Project was created by Anne Ferguson of Montpelier, Vt., and developed in collaboration with the Kellogg-Hubbard Library. Its mission is to promote early literacy, physical activity, and family time together outdoors.

Land acknowledgment plaques installed at city and school buildings

The City of Dover has installed nearly two dozen bronze plaques at city facilities and schools to recognize and honor the indigenous peoples who originally inhabited the region. The plaques were funded through a generous grant from the New Hampshire Humanities Council.

The grant helped establish the Indigenous Dover initiative, which aims to foster a deeper understanding and appreciation of the history of the indigenous peoples who lived in the area, now known as Dover, long before the arrival of European settlers.

In 2021 the City Council endorsed a land acknowledgment drafted by the Committee on Racial Equity and Inclusion (CREI). The acknowledgment, displayed at city facilities and schools, reads:

"This facility is located at Cocheco (CO-chi-co) within N'dakinna (n-DA-ki-na), now called Dover, New Hampshire, which is the unceded traditional ancestral homeland of the Abenaki (a-BEN-a-ki), Pennacook, and Wabanaki Peoples, past and present. We acknowledge and honor with gratitude the land, waterways, living beings, and the Aln8bak (Al-nuh-bak), the people who have stewarded N'dakinna (n-DA-ki-na) for many millennia."

"Recognizing and honoring the indigenous peoples of the land is important for the City of Dover for several reasons," said City Manager J. Michael Joyal, Jr. "Acknowledging their presence and contributions fosters a sense of cultural awareness, promotes a better understanding among community members, and keeps their history alive. Honoring our indigenous peoples is also a way for the City of Dover to continue its commitment to racial equity, social justice, and the creation of a diverse and welcoming community."

The plaques were installed at the following locations: City Hall, the Public Library, the McConnell Center, Rotary Arts Pavilion, the Indoor Pool, Dover Arena, Jenny Thompson Pool, the city's three fire stations, the police station, the parking garage, the Transportation Center, Community Services on Mast Road, Dover High School, Dover Middle School, Frances G. Hopkins Elementary School, Woodman Park Elementary School, and Garrison Elementary School.

The indigenous peoples in the region primarily consisted of the Abenaki, Pennacook, and Wabanaki tribes. These tribes were part of the larger Algonquian language family and shared cultural and linguistic similarities. They were skilled hunters, fishers, and farmers, relying on

abundant natural resources. Their communities were organized around seasonal movements, as they migrated between locations to take advantage of various resources throughout the year. The indigenous peoples of Dover had complex social structures, rich oral traditions, and a deep spiritual connection to the land and its resources.

The following roads will be closed at points during the race:


- Church Street, from 8 to 11 a.m.
- Locust Street, between Silver Street and Kirkland Street, from 9:10 to 10 a.m.
- Locust Street, between Trakey Street and Central Avenue, from 9 to 9:30 a.m.
- Atkinson Street, from 9 to 10 a.m.
- Belknap Street, from 9 to 10 a.m.
- Fisher Street, from 9 to 10 a.m.

Motorists should anticipate additional brief closures and traffic delays in the downtown area between City Hall and Silver Street to accommodate the start of the race at 9 a.m. Drivers and residents will encounter delays on other streets along the course including Rutland, Elm, Belknap, Trakey, Summer, and Nelson streets between 9 and 10 a.m.

The course includes a portion of Dover's Community Trail between Fisher and Folsom Streets.

Parking will be prohibited on Church Street on Saturday until 11 a.m. Event participants may park in the Orchard Street Parking Garage or in any other downtown municipal lot. Metered parking is in effect on Saturdays.

Civil War nurse Sarah Low saved lives and touched hearts

As part of Women's History Month, the City of Dover, New Hampshire is recognizing Sarah Low, a remarkable woman who served as a nurse during the Civil War. Sarah Low was born in South Berwick, Maine, in 1830, one of seven siblings, but moved to Dover with her parents, Dr. Nathaniel Low and Mary Ann Hale, when she was a child.

When the Civil War broke out in 1861, Sarah Low had a strong desire to help the wounded soldiers of the Union army. Despite her family's disapproval, she left Dover in September 1862 and traveled to Philadelphia, where she joined the Union Hotel Hospital. She then worked as a nurse for two and a half years in various hospitals in Washington, DC, and witnessed the horrors of war firsthand, as she tended to the men who had been shot, maimed, or infected by disease. She wrote numerous detailed letters back to her friends and relatives in Dover and across the state, describing the scenes of suffering and heroism that she saw every day. She also kept careful records of her patients, and after the war, many of them sent her photographs and other fond testimonials. In April 1864, Low was invited to a reception given by President Abraham Lincoln, and a year later, she attended his wake and watched his funeral procession.

Sarah Low returned to Dover in 1865, after the war ended. She continued to care for others, especially her aging parents and her sister's children. She was also active in various charitable and patriotic organizations, such as the Grand Army of the Republic and the Women's Relief Corps.

Sarah Low died in 1912, at the age of 82. She is buried in Pine Hill Cemetery in Dover, next to her parents. Her grave is marked by a simple stone that reads "Sarah Low: Civil War Nurse". Her legacy lives on through her letters and memorabilia, many of which are now preserved at the New Hampshire Historical Society in Concord.

Sarah Low was a remarkable woman who dedicated her life to serving others. She was one of the many brave and compassionate nurses who made a difference during the Civil War. The City of Dover is proud to honor her as part of Women's History Month.

The following events are from a variety of historical records, sources, and texts about the history of Dover.


March 31, 1760 — At a public town meeting held at the old meeting house on Pine Hill, it was voted that no more schools be built, other than what was required by law. A committee was appointed to settle the lines between Dover and Barrington and empowered to prosecute or petition the General Assembly if needed. (This appears to have been the last "public town meeting held at the old meeting house on Pine Hill.")

April 6, 1805 — The following notice appeared in the Dover Sun: IMPORTANT DISCOVERY — A number of men digging up the earth, in this town, for the purpose of making an aqueduct through Mr. Daniel Waldron's land, discovered a vein of dark brown sand running from east to west, much impregnated with Quick-silver of the best quality. Upon close inspection globules of this metal were found dispersed through this vein from the size of the smallest grain of sand to that of a duck shot — which leaves no room for doubt, but upon further attention, larger quantities may be discovered, and prove beneficial to the owner of the land." Quicksilver was the name for mercury.

April 5, 1852 — Nearly a foot of snow fell in Dover this day, which was made worse by heavy winds that created steep snow drifts. The snow shut down the railroad for four hours. It was nearly six months between the first and last snow of this winter — one of the longest and severest ever remembered to that point.

April 3, 1922 — Police arrested two men from Lawrence, Mass. — Ralph Augusta and Charles Seinto — for the suspected theft of a "high-powered touring car." Police alleged the two men drove the stolen car recklessly through Franklin Square while people were boarding and stepping off the trolleys. One woman was slightly injured after being struck by the car. Police would later learn that Augusta was only borrowing the car with permission from the owner and that Seinto, who was driving the car, didn't have the vehicle's registration. The two men were released and Seinto was fined \$25 for driving without registration.

April 3, 1997 — After funding for a consolidated district courthouse in Dover was initially stripped from the state budget, then Gov. Jeanne Shaheen revealed that \$3.3 million was included in her capital budget proposal. Despite the funding proposal, officials at that time still hadn't decided where to build a new consolidated district courthouse, which would serve Dover, Somersworth, and Durham. Just weeks before, the Dover City Council endorsed a plan to build the new courthouse on county land at the Strafford County Complex, following 18 months of discussion on possible locations. The new courthouse would eventually be constructed at its current location on Saint Thomas Street. The 7th district court is now referred to as the circuit court.



Westlaw legal database now available at the Dover Public Library

The Dover Public Library now offers Westlaw Public Access, a comprehensive legal research database designed especially for use in government, law, and public libraries. Westlaw access is provided through a partnership with the New Hampshire Law Library, the state's only public law library. Derry's, Portsmouth's and Littleton's public libraries also provide access to Westlaw.

"I am thrilled that the Dover Public Library was chosen to be a partner Library, and thank New Hampshire Law Library Librarian Mary Searles for making this happen," said Dover Public Library Director Denise LaFrance. "Westlaw is a very powerful tool, and being able to offer free access to the public is a real boon to those doing legal research."

People interested in researching legal information in their cases have few options, and they tend to be either time-consuming, far away, or expensive. Free Westlaw access means that anyone who comes to the Dover, Derry, Portsmouth or Littleton libraries will have the same online sources used by attorneys. The public can also access Westlaw for free in Concord at the New Hampshire Law Library.

"Partnering with public libraries increases the reach and impact of the state's law library," Searles said. "We're able to bring accurate and reliable legal information closer to the people who need it. Public librarians are available to help patrons use Westlaw and to find legal information and appropriate organizations for more help."

Researchers do not need a library card to use Westlaw, and librarians are available to provide reference assistance.


