Dover Community Trail offers public access to protected greenways

Since the mid-1990's, the City of Dover has been actively planning and acquiring rights-of-way for the Community Trail Project. The trail follows a former railroad bed through much of the City and provides public access to protected greenways along the Cochecho and Bellamy Rivers.


This multi-use trail provides opportunities for bicycling, hiking, bird watching, and fishing. It comprises of two sections: a paved urban section stretching three-quarters of a mile from the Transportation Center to Fisher Street, and a natural section two and a half miles long following the Cochecho River from the Beckwith Ballfields to Watson Road.

The Community Trail Advisory Committee is always seeking volunteer adopters to help maintain the beauty and function of the Dover Community Trail by removing litter, trimming overgrowth, and reporting maintenance concerns to the city. Adopters may be individuals, organizations, or civic groups and will be recognized with signage along the trail.

Upcoming public listening session to address Route 108 improvements

The New Hampshire Department of Transportation (NHDOT) will hold a public listening session in Dover on Monday, March 18, 2019 to discuss proposed improvements to New Hampshire Route 108 in Dover, Somersworth, and Rochester. The public is invited and encouraged to attend to provide input on potential improvements.

The March 18 public listening session will be held in the Renaissance Room at the Dover Middle School, 16 Daley Drive in Dover, beginning at 7 p.m. and ending at 9 p.m. A short presentation will be followed by open discussion of ideas and dialogue between the public and the NHDOT project team.

This project involves the study of improvements to NH Route 108 from the intersection of NH Route 9/Indian Brook Drive in Dover to Innovation Drive in Rochester, a distance of approximately five miles. The objective of the project is to develop a design alternative that will improve the safety and mobility of all users by applying 'Complete Street' principles, with the central goal of achieving an appropriate balance between the needs of motorized, non-motorized, and transit users of the corridor.

Interested property owners, public officials, employers and roadway users are welcome and will be given the opportunity to provide input on the project.

Historic properties may be impacted by the project. Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act offers those that possess a direct interest in historical resources, including town officials, Historical Societies, and Historical Commissions, an opportunity to become more involved in an advisory role during project development as "Consulting Parties." Art installation at City Hall aims to increase suicide awareness

A piece of art titled "Missing", by local artist Amy Issa, will be on display at Dover City Hall for 30 days outside the City Clerk's office. The exhibit is designed to raise awareness of the effects of suicide and consists of two four-foot by sixfoot sections, painted in acrylic.

Issa describes her work as promoting "awareness of the effects of suicide. Not only representing the pain felt by those of us left behind, but also as an acknowledgement of the never-ending feeling of hopelessness suffered by those who either attempt or died by suicide. The simple, colorful silhouettes are used to represent the nameless, faceless people from all walks of life scarred by loss. The lasting tragic effects of losing someone to suicide are carried by the friends and loved ones left behind. Such a profound loss leaves an empty space in the hearts and souls of those living without their partner, son, daughter, mom, dad, friend... In some of the figures are holes meant to represent that space inside of us created by the loss of our loved one that can never be filled. The holes represent that piece of us they took with them when they left us behind."

The City Council approved a resolution on Feb. 13, 2019 to display the art work. The resolution was sponsored by Mayor Karen Weston, City Councilor Matt Keane and City Councilor Dennis Shanahan. Shanahan serves as the Council liaison to the Arts Commission. The Arts Commission approved the temporary installation in November.

The Dover Arts Commission was established to develop and promote programs, forums and exhibits that highlight the talent and active art related venues currently existing within the city.

2019 'Moose Plate' grant round open for cultural heritage projects

The N.H. Department of Natural and Cultural Resources is now accepting letters of intent for its 2019 Conservation License Plate Grant Programs. DNCR "Moose Plate" grants support the restoration, preservation and/or conservation of publicly owned items significant to New Hampshire's cultural heritage.

Three of the DNCR's divisions support grant programs

through Moose Plate funding: the State Library, the State Council on the Arts and the Division of Historical Resources. Each division's grant program has specific requirements; applicants may only apply to one grant program in a given year.

Organizations seeking funding must submit a letter of intent, which provides a brief description of the project and confirms that the resource is publicly owned, by May 3. If a project fits program criteria, a full application must be submitted by June 14.

Each year, the DNCR receives a percentage of funds raised from the sales of Moose Plates. To help preserve the state's cultural heritage, the department designates a portion of those funds for the conservation of cultural resources in New Hampshire.

Among the 24 projects receiving more than \$200,000 in DNCR grant funding for the fiscal year 2018 grant round were the conservation of a grand drape and eight doublesided ears at Newbury's Old Town Hall, the rehabilitation of the Union Academy's windows in Canaan, and the conservation of "Drunk and Idle," a record of Strafford County Jail Inmates from 1909-1938.

Funds received by the DNCR also support its Division of Parks and Recreation's Historic Sites Bureau and its Division of Forests and Lands' Natural Heritage Bureau.

New Hampshire's Conservation License Plates help conserve our state's natural, historical and cultural heritage. Since 2001, the Moose Plate program has raised more than 20 million dollars that have directly contributed to the ongoing success of projects around New Hampshire. All funds raised through the purchase of Moose Plates are used for the promotion, protection and investment in New Hampshire's natural, cultural and historic resources.

The following events are recorded in "Notable Events in the History of Dover, New Hampshire: From the First Settlement in 1623 to 1865," by George Wadleigh, and several other historical sources.

For more on the history of Dover, settled in 1623 and the oldest permanent settlement in New Hampshire and seventh oldest in the country, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street; and the Woodman Museum, Central Avenue. The Public Library also maintains an online collection of historical information, <u>located here</u>.

March 12, 1630 - Edward Hilton, having obtained a grant of the patent in his own name (March 12, 1630), acted as his own agent until he disposed of a portion of his interest to others, when Captain Thomas Wiggin was appointed, Mr. Hilton being made one of the commissioners for the affairs of New England by the Lords of the Council, and as such was attorney for the delivery of possession of Saco and Biddeford to Richard Vines. This grant from the Council conveyed to Edward Hilton and his associates all that part of the river Piscataqua called by the natives Wecanacohunt, and by the settlers Hilton's point, with the south side of said river up to the falls of Squamscot, and three miles into the main land for breadth. This grant now contains within its limits Dover, Durham, Stratham, and parts of Newington and Greenland.




March 10, 1643 - It appearing to the Court that the Commissioners appointed to lay out the bounds between Dover and Strawbery Banke did not consider Strawbery Banke as a Town, nor so exactly viewed the land on that side of the river as was needful and thereupon laid out certain lands to Dover which is most convenient for Strawbery Banke, and certain lands to Strawbery Banke which is most convenient for Dover, it was ordered that all the marsh and meadow ground lying against the Great Bay on Strawbery Banke side should belong to Dover, together with four hundred achres of upland ground adjoining and lying as may be most convenient for the imprisoning and fencing in of the said meadow, the remainder of the said ground to belong to Strawbery Banke, reserving the due right to every one that hath property in the same.



March 8, 1830 - A portion of Piscataqua Bridge, extending from the arch about 400 feet south, was carried away by the force of the waters and a great pressure of ice, of about three acres in extent.

March 9, 1830 - The political contest of this year was noted for its acrimonious character. The Jackson party having nominated Matthew Harvey for Governor, the opposition, which retained the name of Republicans, brought out Gen. Timothy Upham.

March 11, 1834 - Voters approve a market house at an expense not exceeding \$5,000. The selectmen were authorized to employ a surveyor to make a plan of the town, provided he will furnish a lithographic map of the same - expense not to exceed \$50. Representatives instructed to procure the passage of an act authorizing the town to appropriate a portion of its school money for the support of a High School.

Free organic gardening course at

the Library

The Dover Public Library is pleased to offer a free, comprehensive three-part organic gardening course on consecutive Monday nights, March 18, March 25 and April 1, from 6-8 p.m. in the Library's Lecture Hall. The course, totaling six hours over the three nights, will include practical tips on how to create a new garden, soil preparation, seed starting, planting techniques, container gardening, cultural techniques during the growing season (such as watering, fertilizing, and pest and weed control), how plants and soil interact, succession planting, planting multiple crops in the same space at the same time, how to compost, crop rotation, cover cropping, and mycorrhizobials.

The sessions will also include discussions about our existing industrial food production system, including pesticides, genetically modified seeds, seed labeling and supplier concentration, globalization and famine, organic certification, and regulatory capture.

The instructor is Vincent Cirasole from Rochester. He has taught physical education and organic gardening in New York before relocating to the Granite State in 2013. He is also a Master Gardener, a commercial vegetable grower, and organic growing enthusiast. Over a period of years, Cirasole developed this tri-part course, which has proven to be fascinating and popular with students. Reference material and sources of additional information will be distributed to all participants at no charge, but pre-registration is required. Parking bans are determined on a storm-by-storm basis, or when needed for additional snow removal. There are a number of ways for residents to stay informed about parking bans when declared:

Tune into **Channel 22**, where winter parking ban notifications will appear.

Sign up for **text alerts** via the city's emergency notification system, CodeRed. Select "Parking Ban Notifications." You can access the sign-up page here: <u>https://public.coderedweb.com/CNE/en-</u> <u>US/BF3E3900491F</u>. Please note that to sign up for text alerts, you must create a managed account. Once created, you'll see the option to select parking ban notifications.
