Road closures and traffic restrictions in place Sunday for road race

On Sunday, May 19, 2019 at 10 a.m., the Spirit of Recovery 5K Run/Walk event will be held at Liberty Mutual on Liberty Way. This event is part of the Dover Race Series.

Between 10 and 10:15 a.m., Sixth Street will be closed in both directions to accommodate the early portion of the race course, between the Indian Brook Drive and Liberty Way intersection and the Education Way and Venture Drive intersection.

Motorists should expect lane shifts and brief delays on Sixth Street between 10 and 11 a.m. Dover Police officers will be on hand to help control the flow of traffic. Parking for the event will be at Liberty Mutual, 100 Liberty Way. The course follows an out-and-back route utilizing Liberty Way, Sixth Street, and Education Way (Measured Progress).

The 10th Annual Spirit of Recovery event is a fundraiser to benefit the Triangle Club of Dover, which offers 12-step treatment programs for people battling drug, alcohol, nicotine and heroin addiction. The Triangle Club has been hosting peer-driven recovery support groups since 1984.



No flowers may be planted in the ground. No glass or breakable containers will be permitted on the lot. Only lots that have monuments with extended bases or cement pads on the side of the monument will be allowed to display flowers after June 6.

Items that do not conform with the above rules and regulations (such as solar lights, remembrance lights, wooden signs, shepherds hooks and personal items) will be removed and disposed of by the Cemetery Department.

Dover Middle School introduces the Snack Shack

Teacher Mary Calhoun and Principal Kimberly Lynde's eigth-

grade advisory, in partnership with a group of fifth graders, have created the Snack Shack. The idea behind the Snack Shack is to try to reduce the amount of edible food that is thrown out and provide snacks and drinks for students who may need a little more at lunch.

The students have set up a table in the cafeteria at Dover Middle School with three bins; one for fruit, one for drinks and one for pre-packaged snacks. Any student who has leftovers that fit into one of these categories, may leave their snack or drink in one of the bins. Then, any student who may still be hungry or thirsty at lunch time, may take an item from the bins. The students will also be monitoring the bins for the first week to help explain the process.

Leftovers will be brought to the nurse's office at the end of each day.

"I am so proud of all the students involved with the creation of the Snack Shack and so warmed by the idea that this is meant to help others," said DMS Principal, Kimberly Lyndes. "It shows how much our students care for each other."

The following events are recorded in "Notable Events in the History of Dover, New Hampshire: From the First Settlement in 1623 to 1865," by George Wadleigh, and several other historical sources.

For more on the history of Dover, settled in 1623 and the oldest permanent settlement in New Hampshire and seventh oldest in the country, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street; and the Woodman Museum, Central Avenue. The Public Library also maintains an online collection of historical information, <u>located here</u>.

May 22, 1669 - For the accommodation of the ministry on Dover Neck the town voted to set apart 40 pounds of mill rents and a penny rate in provisions upon the estates of all the inhabitants, excepting Oyster River, the vote to stand for one year, the penny rate to be paid in October or November, or "a free contribution what every man will free give." At the same time it was voted to build a Minister's house upon Dover Neck, 44 feet in length, 20 feet wide, 14 feet between joist and joist, with a stack of brick chimnies and a cellar 16 feet square; the house to be built "at the charge of the whole town in general."




May 20, 1723 - Ordered that two schoolmasters be procured for the ensuing year and that their salary exceed not 30 pounds apiece, to attend the directions of the selectmen for the service of the town in equal proportions. At the same time Mr. Sullivan accepts to serve the town as schoolmaster three months certain, beginning his services the 21st day of May; promising the selectmen if he left sooner he would give them a month's notice to provide themselves with another, and the selectmen were also to give him a month's notice if they disliked him.

May 17, 1805 - The Dover Turnpike road from Dover to South Berwick was opened this year. In the Sun, of this date, John Wheeler, Treasurer, gives notice to stockholders that the Directors have ordered the fourth assessment to be paid, and Stephen Sawyer advertises for "30 or 40 stout able bodied young men" to work on the road.

May 19, 1851 - The barn of Mr. John Guppy burnt by a fire, and with it two horses, four oxen, three cows, and a large quantity of hay.

May, **1921** - The Dover telephone system was hit hard by the Aurora Borealis. The magnetic storm burned out fuses and put more than 100 local phones out of order. Great damage was done to the big switchboard on the top floor of the Strafford Bank building.

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Lecture explores Dover man's search for answers and the Holocaust's toll

Martin Rumscheidt will speak at the Dover Public Library on Tuesday, May 28 at 6:30 p.m. Rumscheidt was born in a small town in Germany in 1935, during the rise of Adolf Hitler. His father worked for I. G. Farben, a large chemical company that used concentration camp prisoners to build and run some of its factories during World War II. As an adult, Rumscheidt learned about his father's company's complicity in war crimes and asked his father for details. His father denied knowing anything. He will tell his story of coming to terms with the sins of his father, and his Christian beliefs.

Rumscheidt became an ordained minister in the United Church of Canada. His professional studies focus on how Christianity can allow

for such atrocities as the Holocaust. He has written a scholarly book on the subject, "In Search for a Theology Capable of Mourning: Observations and Interpretations after the Shoah," published by Wipf & Stock Publishers in 2017. Rumscheidt lives in Dover.

Meet "The Gravestone Girls" at the Dover Library May 21

On Tuesday, May 21 at the Dover Public Library at 7 p.m., cemetery historians "The Gravestone Girls" will present a virtual tour of New England cemetery art, history, and symbolism. Their 90-minute presentation, called "Welcome to The Graveyard", will be centered on local cemeteries and is built on photographs recently taken in burying places, particularly in Pine Hill Cemetery which began as Dover's first public burying ground in 1731.

The Girls, led by Brenda Sullivan, will explain why we have cemeteries and gravestones, why the stones look the way they do, and how their styles and art have evolved over almost 400 years. Brenda has been studying gravestones for nearly twenty years. A lifelong Massachusetts resident, she has spent many hours in graveyards all over the world. Her education in art history and restoration led to the creation of The Gravestone Girls whose mission, "Keep Our Dead Alive!", is accomplished through educational lectures, tours, and gravestone rubbing classes. The Girls also create beautiful and unusual sculpted castings of the primitive art found on the faces of old New England gravestones. Their gravestone art pieces are shown regularly at art and craft festivals.

Brenda works with libraries, historical societies, genealogy groups, and museums to raise awareness and teach residents what history lies buried in their own back yards. She adds, "Almost everyone is interested in these peaceful and beautiful spaces, but may be hesitant to say so to others. Our presentation lets you know you're not the only one. Come see what we do."
