Dover Fire & Rescue reminds residents daylight-saving is a good time to change smoke and carbon monoxide detectors

As daylight-saving time ends on Sunday, Nov. 3, safety officials are urging people to change and test the batteries in smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors. The message is simple and the habit can be lifesaving.

Dover Fire & Rescue reminds residents that one simple step can help save their lives and the lives of those around them. Everyone is encouraged to use the extra hour

they "gain" from daylight-saving time to change the batteries in their own smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors, test the alarms and remind friends, family, neighbors and fellow community members to do the same.

Communities nationwide witness tragic home fire deaths each year, but, everyone can work together to help reduce the number of home fire fatalities. Non-working smoke alarms rob residents of the protective benefits home fire safety devices were designed to provide. The most commonly cited cause of non-working smoke alarms: worn or missing batteries.

"Eighty percent of child fire fatalities occur in homes without working smoke alarms," said Dover Fire Chief Paul Haas. "It's a tragic statistic that could be reduced by adopting the simple habit of changing batteries during daylight savings." Changing smoke alarm batteries at least once a year, testing those alarms and reminding others to do the same are some of the simplest, most effective ways to reduce these tragic deaths and injuries.

Additionally, the International Association of Fire Chiefs recommends that smoke alarms in homes be replaced every 10 years and to have both ionization and photo electric smoke alarms to alert people to all types of home fires.

"The peak time for home fire fatalities is between 11 p.m. and 7 a.m. when most families are sleeping," Haas said. "Smoke alarm maintenance is a simple, effective way to reduce home fire deaths. Children and senior citizens are most at risk, and a working smoke alarm can give them the extra seconds they need to get out safely."

In addition, Haas recommends residents not only use the "extra" hour they save from the time change to test smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors and to plan and practice escape routes, but also to make sure fellow neighbors and community members do the same. Families should also prepare a fire safety kit that includes working flashlights and fresh batteries.

Tragically, home fires injure and kill thousands each year. Those most at risk include:

- **Children** Home fires kill 500 children ages 14 and under each year. Roughly three-quarters of child fire fatalities under age 15 occurred in homes without working smoke alarms.
- **Seniors** Adults 75 and older are 2.8 times more likely to die in a home fire.
- Low-Income Households Many low-income families are unable to afford batteries for their smoke alarms. These same households often rely on poorly installed, maintained or misused portable or area heating equipment - a main cause of fatal home fires.

## River Street utility work wrapping up

The installation of a gas main connecting River Street and Washington Street is expected to conclude today, Friday, Nov. 1. The work is being conducted by a Unitil contractor and is in preparation of development of the waterfront.

On Monday, Nov. 4, crews are expected to pave the excavated trenches on site. This work will require lane closures on both River and Washington streets, but not the complete closure of either street.

## Central Avenue traffic restrictions remain in place as utility work continues

A portion of Central Avenue remains restricted to one lane during underground utility work adjacent to the Cocheco Mill Courtyard.

The traffic restriction will remain in place on weekdays from 7 a.m. to 6 p.m. In addition, while the work is ongoing, four parking spaces will be unavailable on weekdays from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. At some point during the week of Nov. 4, the work will shift to night operations. When that occurs, traffic will remain restricted to one lane and parking restrictions will remain in place while the night work is ongoing.

The utility work, which is being completed by an Eversource contractor, is necessary to improve the reliability of the electric utility downtown. The work is in response to power disruptions earlier this year and follow-up meetings between Eversource and downtown merchants.

The trench work will eventually cross Central Avenue from the courtyard to First Street and may require additional parking restrictions on First Street once the Central Avenue work is completed. The work is expected to last about two weeks.

# Night utility work to affect downtown traffic and parking beginning Sunday

On Sunday, Nov. 3, at 8 p.m., work is scheduled to begin to install a gas main from Chapel Street to First Street. This work is expected to continue from 8 p.m. to 6 a.m. each evening, Sunday through Thursday, for approximately two to three weeks.

As the work progresses, traffic will be reduced to one lane on either a portion of Main Street northbound or on Central Avenue southbound. Initially, this work will require the temporary, complete closure of Chapel Street at Main Street, and the Franklin Plaza loop. Detours will be in effect to facilitate reverse direction traffic. The Janetos Plaza will remain accessible from all driveways except the southbound, left turn at the mouth of Chapel Street.

Additionally, parking will be prohibited in the westerly spaces along Central Avenue, from Second to Third streets, for the overnight hours from 8 p.m. to 6 a.m. only.

Once the work on Main Street and Central Avenue is complete, additional parking restrictions will be in place along the first block of First Street and the first 100 feet of Chapel Street.

The following events are recorded in "Notable Events in the History of Dover, New Hampshire: From the First Settlement in 1623 to 1865," by George Wadleigh, and several other historical sources.

For more on the history of Dover, settled in 1623 and the oldest permanent settlement in New Hampshire and seventh oldest in the country, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street; and the Woodman Museum, Central Avenue. **Nov. 7, 1774** - A town meeting was held to see if the inhabitants would raise anything, either "in money, fat cattle or sheep," for the relief of the poor of Boston, then suffering from the operations of the Port Bill. And it was voted that the town would "give something."


**Nov. 2, 1789** - The town voted to allow the Society of Friends 13,000 feet of boards for their proportion of the money paid for the purchase of a bell, as soon as the same could be collected from the persons who bought the lots.

**Nov. 6, 1818** - Died, Capt. John Riley, aged 66. His death was occasioned by a fall from the staging of a ship building in this town, two days previous, by which both his thighs were broken and mangled in the most shocking manner. He has left a numerous family to mourn the loss of a kind husband and father and true friend. (Strafford Register)

**Nov. 3, 1828** - Presidential election; after a warm contest between the supporters of John Quincy Adams and Jackson, the vote of Dover was 505 for Adams, 322 for Jackson.

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**Nov. 5, 1834** - Drowned in the Cochecho, near the Landing, Capt. Moses P. Perkins, aged 40.
