Council to review proposed stormwater utility at Nov. 15 workshop

The City Council will hold a workshop on the proposed stormwater and flood resilience utility ordinance on Wednesday, Nov. 15.

The Council held a first reading of the ordinance, entitled Municipal Stormwater Utility, at its Nov. 8 meeting; the



Council will hold a public hearing and possibly a vote on the ordinance on Dec. 13. The proposed ordinance was included in the Council's Nov. 8 <u>agenda materials</u>. The proposed ordinance, as well as other stormwater and flood resilience utility information, is available on the city's <u>Stormwater</u> <u>Management webpage</u>. Information on this page includes but is not limited to how a stormwater utility would work and its need, a link to frequently asked questions, and prior presentation materials.

At the workshop, city staff and consultants will review all aspects of the proposed ordinance, including the work and findings of the Council's ad-hoc stormwater funding committee, the need for the ordinance, how it would work, utility fee structure and available credit options.

Dover celebratesTeenage Mutant Ninja Turtles with commemorative markers

Two commemorative markers honoring Dover as the birthplace of the Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles were unveiled in the city on Nov. 8.

The events mark the 40th anniversary of the Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles franchise and the 400th anniversary of Dover. Mirage Studios, formed by Kevin Eastman and Peter Laird, was located at 28 Union St. in Dover, where the first TMNT comic book was created before the company moved to Northampton, Mass.

Eastman and Laird's wife, Jeannine Atkins, and members of Laird's family were on hand for the celebrations. Eastman and Atkins spoke to the crowd about the history of TMNT. Dover resident James Lane, whose dedication to ensuring a marker at 28 Union St., also spoke.

"This is home to us," Eastman said. "This is where they were created."

The state historical marker at Union Street's intersection with Central Avenue was unveiled first followed by the decorative manhole cover at 28 Union St., where TMNT creators Kevin Eastman and Peter Laird lived when they created the comic book in 1983. Eastman created the artwork for the cover.

The commemorations are made possible by the Dover Arts Commission, the city's Planning Department, the New Hampshire Division of Historical Resources, Griffin Hansen of the Animation Education Association, and James Lane, who organized a fundraising campaign to which more than 200 people donated \$13,000 to privately fund the decorative sewer manhole cover.

Dover voters choose elected officials; results available online

The City Clerk has posted election results and voter turnout for the Nov. 7, 2023 Municipal Election to the dedicated election page

www.dover.nh.gov/government/opengovernment/election-information/2023-municipalelection/.



Voters from all wards elected the Mayor, two at-large City Councilors, and one at-large School Board member. In addition, voters in each of the six Dover wards elected a City Councilor and School Board member and election officers, including a Supervisor of the Checklist, Moderator, Selectpersons, and Ward Clerks. All elected positions are two-year terms.

Voter turnout information from City Clerk Jerrica Vansylyvong-Bizier includes votes cast, absentee ballots cast, turnout percentage, and the number of registered voters. There were a total of 4,186 votes cast at the election, for an overall turnout percentage of 21.8% of registered voters casting a ballot. The highest turnout was in Ward 3, with 24.5% of registered voters voting in the election. Ward 5 had the lowest turnout, with 15.7% of registered voters casting a ballot.

Voter turnout was lower in this election as compared to the 2021 Municipal Elections. That year, there were a total of 5,120 ballots cast, with a voter turnout of 24.6%. It was also considerably lower than the Nov. 3, 2020 General Election, where 19,387 ballots were cast, an 80.1% turnout.





The following events are from various historical records, sources, and texts about the history of Dover.

Nov. 14, 1818 — Joseph Cushing is born.

Joseph Cushing was born on the family farm on the Dover Point Road on Nov. 14, 1818. The farm included land along the Bellamy River from St. Mary's New Cemetery down to Varney Brook, and the lane leading into the farmhouse is now called Cushing Road. The house is still standing and dominates a landscape of modern ranch and cottage-style homes. Joseph got his education in Dover schools, probably over at the nearby Upper Neck District Schoolhouse near the end of Tuttle Lane, and then up at the Pine Hill Schoolhouse in Dover. When he was twenty years old, he left the farm and went to Gloucester, Massachusetts, to work in a fish market, but only stayed there a short time. A circus came to Gloucester, and Joseph knew that that was what he wanted. He joined as a roustabout but saved his wages and soon bought the lemonade concession. He later added the candy business. He was on his way then and became part owner, with the side shows under his control. He learned the circus business thoroughly and eventually bought out the whole show, and it became Cushing Circus of Dover, N.H.

Circuses in those days were transported by team from town to town as booking had to be made within a 10- to 15-mile radius, what with gravel and clay roads and possible rainy weather. The equipment had to be struck each night, but the performers lodged in rooming houses and traveled by day.


Mr. Cushing was a great publicity man and believed in sideshow freaks to up his attendance records. He was always on the lookout for exceptional exhibits, and it is said that he taught P.T. Barnum and other circus greats some of their come-on stunts. Some of their odd people wintered in Dover and were seen around our streets during the off-season. One of the Colonel's publicity gimmicks was a team of 40 matched cream-colored horses drawing his bandwagon through the streets and driven by a single pair of reins and one driver. What a stunt.

As success continued, Mr. Cushing, or Colonel Cushing as he got to be known, toyed with the idea of taking his show to Europe but could not finance it alone, so he took in a partner, Mr. Seth Howe; and they charted a steamship The South Hampton, put aboard their forty acts of animals and all went to England. They were very successful and stayed over there for three years, the first American circus to ever tour England. On Friday, May 17, 1858, they gave a command performance before Queen Victoria, Prince Albert, and their guests. The velvet gown that Mrs. Cushing wore at that performance is now on exhibition at our Woodman Institute.

Eventually, the circus property was sold at auction in London, and Colonel Cushing returned with one hundred thousand dollars – a fortune in those days. But the Colonel was not ready to retire yet, so in 1861, he got another show together and toured the South and Southwest. He was again successful, and his restless nature drove him to a new venture. This time, he got his friends to back him and chartered another ship, The North Star, and took the whole show to South America. Everything went fine with this venture, as far as business was concerned, but things went wrong suddenly when the treasurer disappeared with all the funds. The Colonel came back to Dover in 1877 and retired to the farm, where he lived until his death in 1884 at the age of 66. But the circus world did not forget him, and many circus people came to visit him in his retirement. The famous midget General Tom Thumb visited him many times. Also, there was the one about the orangutan that the Colonel allowed in the house and could wear clothes and eat with a knife and fork. *From Rambles About the Dover Area 1623-1973, by Daniel J. Smith, 1973.*

Nov. 12, 1845 — All the necessary preparations for the execution of Andrew Howard on this day were made. The gallows were erected in the Dover jail yard, and there was a collection of several thousand people to witness the execution when the reprieve of the prisoner to the 8th of July, 1846, was announced.

Nov. 15, 2004 — The Cochecho Waterfront Development Advisory Committee holds a hearing to solicit public input on how the city's waterfront parcel off River Street should be developed. More than 70 people attended the session, which was held at the Public Library. At the hearing, committee members introduced a design charette, as well as a set of development guidelines established in 1996 and updated in 2004. The Cochecho Waterfront Development Advisory Committee was formed in April 2004 by the City Council to help guide development of the land. The site is now being developed by Cathartes.



Bestselling authors to discuss latest works in online event

Bestselling authors Tess Gerritsen and Paul Doiron will discuss their latest books in an online event hosted by the Dover Public Library on Nov. 20.

Gerritsen will talk about her new novel "The Spy Coast," the first in the Martini Club series. The book follows Maggie Bird, a retired spy living in Maine whose quiet life is disrupted when a body turns up in her driveway.

She turns to her network of former intelligence agents known as the Martini Club to uncover who is trying to kill her.

Gerritsen has sold more than 40 million books worldwide. Her series featuring homicide detective Jane Rizzoli and medical examiner Maura Isles inspired the TNT TV series "Rizzoli & Isles."

Doiron will discuss "Dead Man's Wake," the 14th installment in his Mike Bowditch crime novel series set in Maine's North Woods.

In the new book, game warden investigator Bowditch leaves his engagement party to investigate a deadly hit-and-run boat crash and discovers there may be more than meets the eye.

Doiron's books have received several awards, including the Maine Literary Award and New England Society Book Award for Fiction.
