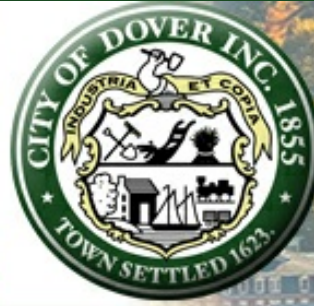

Upcoming holiday hours for City offices, facilities

City administrative offices, including City Hall, will be closed on Thursday, Nov. 22, and Friday Nov. 23, 2018, for Thanksgiving.

The Public Library will be closed on Thanksgiving Day and Friday, Nov. 23. The Public Library will also be closed on Sunday, Nov. 25, for the annual Holiday Parade. The Library is open regular hours on Saturday, Nov. 24.

The Recycling Center on Mast Road and all Recreation facilities will be closed on Thanksgiving Day.

Curbside trash and recycling pickup will be delayed one day on Thursday and Friday only.

Downtown parking is free on Friday, Nov. 23, part of the the Plaid Friday initiative to encourage shopping local.

Eversource, utilities urge caution: As temperatures dip, scams rise

While bracing for colder temperatures this winter season, Eversource wants its customers to look out for the seasonal increase in common utility scams. These scammers will show up at front doors or call on the phone posing as Eversource employees to get money, demand personal information for identity theft, or use deceptive marketing tactics to convince customers to switch energy suppliers. This week, as part of Utilities United Against Scams, a consortium of over 100 energy companies, Eversource is urging its customers to beware of scammers and to heed law enforcement's warnings.

A common utility con involves customers getting phone calls warning that their service is about to be shut off because of unpaid bills. The caller claims to be a billing representative from Eversource who tells a customer that to avoid an immediate shutoff, they need to settle an overdue bill by providing a credit card number or a prepaid debit card. Both businesses and homeowners are targeted and, unfortunately, scammers are meeting with great success. While the median monetary loss for all scam victims is \$274, the median loss for a utility scam victim is \$500, according to the Better Business Bureau. In fact, the BBB has found that people are more susceptible to utility scams than they are to Internal Revenue Service scams.

"We will never demand an on-the-spot payment, in person or by phone. Don't panic and don't pay," said Eversource Senior Vice President and Chief Customer Officer Penni Conner. "We're always working to serve you better and are proud to partner with our fellow energy companies, retailers and local law enforcement. We also urge our customers who receive a suspicious phone call or home to call us at 1-800-662-7764 to verify ANY request for payment or personal information."

Police have investigated several recent scams and typically see a seasonal uptick in those targeting utility customers.

Reminders:

- All Eversource employees carry photo identification; field workers wear company logoed clothing and drive company vehicles.
- Eversource representatives never demand instant payment in person or over the phone.
- Eversource representatives do not require the use of prepaid debit cards (such as Green Dot MoneyPak,

Vanilla or Reloadit.)

- Eversource representatives never request customers meet at a payment center, such as a department or grocery store, to make a payment.
- Eversource does not solicit door-to-door or on the phone on behalf of third-party energy suppliers.

Eversource urges anyone who believes they are a target of improper solicitation to please alert local law enforcement and contact the company directly at 1-800-662-7764. The energy company tracks these types of customer concerns and reports them to state regulators.

Eversource.com and the Utilities United Against Scams websites provide more information on how to protect personal information and avoid becoming a victim of utility scams. Road closures next week around Washington Street construction site

The construction project of the former Robbins block will result in the following street closures next week:

On Monday, Nov. 19, between 7 a.m. and 5 p.m., Chestnut Street will be closed between Washington Street and the Locust Street fork. From the south, only local traffic to Saint Thomas Street will be permitted. Traffic exiting the Citizens Bank drive-thru will be required to turn left (north) toward Washington Street.

On Tuesday, Nov. 20, between 7 a.m. and 5 p.m., Saint Thomas Street will be closed at the Chestnut Street intersection. During this time, two-way local traffic (including traffic for the District Court and McConnell Center) will be allowed on Saint Thomas Street from the westerly (Atkinson Street) end only.

These closures are required for crews to complete underground utility installation in connection with the 104 Washington Street project. The construction project is being managed by Fulcrum Associates and the utility work has been subcontracted to SUR Construction.

Bridge repairs on Spaulding

Turnpike continue

The New Hampshire Department of Transportation announces bridge repairs are under way on the Spaulding Turnpike (NH 16) southbound bridge over NH Route 108 in Dover.

This bridge deck and expansion joint repair work requires a lane closure during daytime hours. The available lane width during the lane closure time period will be 16 feet.

Signs will be in place to alert motorists of the lane restriction.

Road closures and traffic restrictions in place for Thanksgiving Day race

Dover Police Chief William M. Breault announces the following road closures and parking restrictions for the Dover Turkey Trot 5K run/walk event, organized by and benefiting the Garrison Elementary School Parent/Teacher Association. This is the final race of the 2018 Dover Race Series.

On Thanksgiving Day, Thursday, Nov. 22, 2018 at 8:30 a.m., Shaws Lane will be closed in both directions between Garrison Road and Tideview Drive, for a period of approximately 15 minutes to accommodate the start of the race (8:20 to 8:35 a.m.). Garrison Road will be closed in the westerly direction at Morningside Drive from 8:30 to 9:30 a.m., with traffic diverted through the Morningside neighborhood.

Between 8:30 and 9:30 a.m., motorists should expect additional delays in the following locations:

- Back River Road and Garrison Road
- Garrison Road and Shaws Lane
- Back River Road and Spruce Lane
- Mast Road and Spruce Lane
- Linda Avenue, Riverdale Avenue and Morningside Drive

Parking restrictions will be posted on Shaws Lane to be effective on the day of the event. Event parking will be available in the lots adjacent to the Shaws Lane parking lot, the upper field parking near Garrison and Back River roads, and in the Morningside Drive, Meridian Drive and Shadow Drive neighborhoods.

Road closures, traffic restrictions in place for Holiday Parade

Dover Police Chief William M. Breault announces the following road closures and parking restrictions for the annual Dover Holiday Parade. The parade will be held at 2:30 p.m. on Sunday, Nov. 25, 2018 and will follow its traditional route south on NH Route 108 from the Greater Dover Chamber of Commerce to CVS Pharmacy.

On Sunday, Nov. 25, Central Avenue (NH Route 108) will be closed to all traffic from 2:15 to 4:30 p.m. between the intersection of Chestnut and New York streets to the intersection of Stark Avenue and East Watson Street. Temporary traffic detours will be in effect.

Additional street closures will be in effect from 11:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. to accommodate parade staging and setup. These include:

- Sixth Street, between Horne Street and Central Avenue

- Maple Street, between Sixth and Hough streets
- Grove Street, between Fifth and Hough streets
- Mt. Vernon Street, between Sixth and Milk streets

Parking restrictions will be posted to prohibit on-street parking on Sixth Street after 9 a.m. on Sunday, Nov. 25, and in other locations where necessary along the parade route.

Dover Police are coordinating with Pan Am Railways for the temporary suspension of freight trains at the downtown crossings to accommodate the event. Amtrak Downeaster passenger train service will not be interrupted.

Storm-based winter parking bans

Earlier this year, the City Council approved a change in the city's winter parking ban procedures. Parking bans are now determined on a storm-by-storm basis.

When required for snow plowing or cleanup, the Community Services Director will declare a parking ban by 3 p.m. The ban will then take effect at 10 p.m. citywide, except downtown, which will begin at 1 a.m. the following morning.

When a declared parking ban is in effect, parking on city streets is prohibited. Any vehicle parked on the street, sidewalk or adjacent public parking area during a declared parking ban may be ticketed and/or towed at the vehicle owner's expense.

Follow the city's **social media** accounts on Facebook and Twitter for parking ban updates and status.

Parking ban declarations will also be sent to **local media**, including newspaper, radio and television outlets.

The new storm-based parking ban ordinance replaces the former winter parking ban, which was in effect from Dec. 1 to April 1.

News from Dover's public schools

SEED Prize Patrol awards Dover schools \$9,500

SEED, a nonprofit organization dedicated to lifting academic excellence in Dover schools, recently granted Dover teachers more than \$9,500 to implement innovative learning projects across all grade levels from elementary to high school.

Dover Middle School received the largest grant award. Kate Schulten was given \$5,000 to purchase three collaboration stations to create an innovative learning atmosphere. Thanks to a prior year SEED grant, Schulten was able to attend Growth Mindset training and these stations connect the methodology with a hands-on tool that fully immerses students in problem solving and teamwork. The stations consist of uniquely shaped, whiteboard-topped tables that can also be elevated for sit/stand options to allow students to move around and interact during the brainstorming process. Also at the middle school, eighth grade math teacher Patty Mulqueen was gifted a grant valued at \$500 to purchase innovative logic games to engage students' logic and reasoning skills in a non-traditional manner.

At Garrison Elementary, Becca Cotter received \$249 for an IXL classroom license for four main content areas: Language Arts, Math, Science, and Social Studies. IXL is an educational learning program that targets student's needs. Individuals can fill gaps in learning at school and at home, while being challenged in other disciplines where they are more confident.

Meanwhile, Woodman Park School teacher Katie Gorski was awarded \$600 to purchase tools for the Zones of Regulation program which enables students to determine if they are ready to learn and empowers them to utilize exercise tools to improve their learning experience.

At Dover High School, Transition Coordinator Baylee St. Pierre was approved for two grants with a combined value of \$1,400 to support transportation to work-based learning opportunities outside of the classroom and provide life skills lessons for developmentally disabled students. History teacher Eric Salmons received \$750 for project based learning equipment that will allow students to create and edit history-themed Podcasts using current technology.

Finally, Seacoast Charter School was given two awards. Art teacher Hanna Pasquale received \$1,000 to create an authentic darkroom to allow students to better understand development and light/exposure fundamentals of film photography. Karen Donahue received \$700 towards professional development in the area of STEM.

SEED is currently underway with its Lighting the Way to

Learning appeal, an intense effort by SEED's entirely volunteer-led organization to raise \$150,000 toward creating a \$500,000 endowment fund. The endowment fund will create a legacy for educational excellence in Dover public schools by allowing the nonprofit to underwrite grant awards in perpetuity. Nov. 17, 1707 - At a public town meeting at the meeting house on Dover Neck, Capt. John Gerrish, moderator, it

was voted that Mr. Pike have 15 pound per annum added to his salary of 65 pounds, one third part thereof to be paid in money, the other two thirds in provision as formerly, and that the mill rents as they shall be received be a part of his salary.



Nov. 18, 1755 - "About four o'clock in the morning was an exceeding shock of ye earthquake which shock was nere as much as that in ye year 1727, Oct. 29, but ye noise was not so loud." (diary entry) John Winthrop Hollis, Professor of Mathematics and Philosophy at Harvard College, described the "great earthquake which so lately (Tuesday, Nov. 18, 1755) spread terror and threatened desolation throughout New England," in a lecture delivered in the chapel of the college on the week following the earthquake.



Nov. 22, 1824 - The town voted to give \$5,000 towards the building of a new stone Jail provided the same should be erected in Dover.



Nov. 19, 1856 - Two young men, George S. Clark, aged 26, and John Foss, aged 23, were killed by the premature discharge of a cannon which they were firing on Garrison Hill, to celebrate the election of President Buchanan.



Nov. 20, 1930 - The keys to the new National Guard Armory in Dover are turned over to Battery B. It will formally be opened to the public on Nov. 25.

The Friends of the Dover Public Library are once again pleased to host actor and stage performer Stephen Collins on Tuesday, Nov. 20 at 7 p.m. in the Library's Lecture Hall. His one-man show, "Butterfly", will focus on the life and times of New England native, James McNeil Whistler (1834-1903), the volatile American artist who struggled for personal freedom and artistic expression. Whistler was a leading proponent of the credo, "art for art's sake". Collins depicts Whistler at two phases of his life - first, as a bankrupt artist on commission in Venice in his forties, and then as the established, yet lonely, legend in his sixties in London.



The title of the play is drawn from the artist's signature on his paintings, which was in the shape of a stylized butterfly possessing a long stinger for a tail. The symbol combined two aspects of his personality - his art, characterized by a subtle delicacy, and his public persona, which was combative. The portrayal ends with Whistler describing how he created his most famous painting, "Arrangement in Grey and Black No. 1", commonly known as "Whistler's Mother" - the revered portrait of motherhood.

Stephen Collins is a classically trained actor. He has performed twice earlier this year at the Dover Public Library as Walt Whitman, and, in a program on justice, as William Lloyd Garrison, John Brown Abraham Lincoln and Thomas Hardy.

He currently performs nine one-man shows and has received rave reviews for over a decade. Mr. Collins' performances brings poets, artists, statesmen, and playwrights to life on the stage. "Butterfly", is a one-man show performed by actor Stephen Collins about the life and times of New England native, James McNeil Whistler, the Volatile American artist who struggled for personal freedom and artistic expression mostly in Victorian England.
