City now accepting Community Development Block Grant applications

The City of Dover Department of Planning and Community Development is now accepting applications from public service agencies, qualified individuals and eligible organizations for grants from the fiscal year 2021 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program. The fiscal year spans July 1, 2020 to June 30, 2021.

Applications are <u>available online here</u> and at the Planning Department. The application submission deadline is 4 p.m. on Monday, Dec. 30, 2019, at the Department of Planning and Community Development, 288 Central Ave., Dover, NH 03820-4169.

CDBG workshops to provide an overview of the CDBG Program and specific application requirements will be held in the First Floor Conference Room at City Hall on Monday, Dec. 2, 2019 at 10 a.m. and Tuesday, Dec. 3 at 5:30 p.m. Applicants are encouraged but not required to attend.

The City of Dover may reject incomplete or late applications.

The City of Dover has been a CDBG entitlement community for over 25 years. The HUD program provides annual grants on a formula basis to entitled cities and counties to develop viable urban communities by providing decent housing and a suitable living environment, and by expanding economic opportunities, principally for low and moderate income people. HUD awards grants to entitlement community grantees to carry out a wide range of community development activities directed toward revitalizing neighborhoods, economic development, and providing improved community facilities and services. Entitlement communities develop their own programs and funding priorities. The entitlement grant is expected to be available in the summer or fall of 2020. The amount to be received by the City of Dover has yet to be determined by Congress.

State DRA sets Dover tax rate

First half of tax bill due Dec. 27

The City of Dover's property tax rate for fiscal year 2020 (tax year 2019) has been calculated by the New Hampshire Department of Revenue Administration (DRA) and certified on Nov. 18, 2019, at \$25.19 per \$1,000 assessed valuation.

According to City Manager J. Michael Joyal, Jr., the late adoption of the state budget delayed the certification of the tax rate by the DRA.

Tax bills have been mailed to all property owners and are expected to arrive by Wednesday, Nov. 27, according to the City's Finance Department. The first half of the tax bill is due Friday, Dec. 27, 2019, and the second half is due by Monday, June 1, 2020. demand, visit www.dover.nh.gov/dntv.

Want the latest news and important information about your city? Check out the City of Dover's official <u>Facebook page</u> and <u>twitter feed</u> for the latest updates. The tax rate set by the DRA represents an increase of 27 cents, or a 1.1 percent increase over the prior year.

"It should be noted the overall tax rate increase would have been significantly higher but was minimized primarily due to an overall increase in assessed value of approximately 5 percent or \$176 million realized from the combination of new construction and increased market value throughout the entire community," Joyal said.

There are four components of the tax rate: the city portion, local education portion, state education, and Strafford County. The tax rate of \$25.19 is broken down as follows:

- **City**: \$9.28, a decrease of 9 cents over the previous year;
- Local education: \$11.37, an increase of 49 cents over the previous year;
- State education: \$1.98, a decrease of 8 cents;
- **County**: \$2.56, a decrease of 5 cents over the previous year.

A home heating safety reminder from Dover Fire and Rescue

With winter and colder weather approaching, Dover Fire and Rescue urges residents to think about safety when keeping warm.

According to the National Fire Protection Association, heating equipment is a leading cause of fires in U.S. homes, including one- and two-family homes and apartments.

Heating equipment fires account for 16 percent of all reported home fires and 19 percent of home fire deaths, second only behind smoking materials.

"When colder weather arrives, we turn to home heating to take the chill out of the air," said Fire Chief Paul Haas. "But before you do, remember that home heating equipment can be dangerous, and even fatal, if not used and cleaned properly." Space heaters are most often involved in home heating fires, figuring in two of every five of these fires and accounting for 84 percent of associated deaths, 75 percent of injuries, and 52 percent of direct property damage.

The leading factor contributing to ignition for home heating fire deaths -- 56 percent -- was heating equipment too close to items easily burned, such as upholstered furniture, clothing, mattress, or bedding.

The leading factor contributing to home heating fires -- 30 percent -- is failure to clean heating equipment, primarily chimneys.

"Many of the fires caused by heating equipment are directly related to the change in seasons," Haas said. "Half of these fires occur in December, January and February."

Haas added it is not too early to think about home heating safety as colder fall weather will arrive soon.

Here are some home heating safety tips from Dover Fire and Rescue:

- Keep anything that can burn at least three feet away from heating equipment, like the furnace, fireplace, wood stove, or portable space heater.
- Have a three-foot "kid-free zone" around open fires and space heaters.
- Never use your oven to heat your home.
- Have a qualified professional install stationary space heating equipment, water heaters or central heating equipment according to the local codes and manufacturer's instructions.
- Have heating equipment and chimneys cleaned and inspected every year by a qualified professional.
- Remember to turn portable heaters off when leaving the room or going to bed.
- Always use the right kind of fuel, specified by the manufacturer, for fuel burning space heaters.
- Make sure the fireplace has a sturdy screen to stop sparks from flying into the room. Ashes should be cool before putting them in a metal container. Keep the container a safe distance away from your home.
- Test smoke alarms at least once a month.

Haas said now is also a good time to make sure an escape plan is in place. If a fire breaks out in your home, you may have only a few minutes to get out safely once the smoke alarm sounds. Everyone needs to know what to do and where to go if there is a fire.

"You put your seat belt on every time you drive your car, in case an accident happens," Haas said. "In similar fashion, you should prepare ahead of time in case of a fire. If one breaks out, it will be too late to take those preparatory steps."

Here are some additional tips about creating an evacuation plan:

- Pull together everyone in your household and make a plan. Walk through your home and inspect all possible exits and escape routes. Households with children should consider drawing a floor plan of your home, marking two ways out of each room, including windows and doors. Also, mark the location of each smoke alarm.
- A closed door may slow the spread of smoke, heat and fire. Install smoke alarms in every sleeping room, outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home.
- When you walk through your plan, check to make sure the escape routes are clear and doors and windows can be opened easily.
- Choose an outside meeting place (i.e. neighbor's house, a light post, mailbox, or stop sign) a safe distance in front of your home where everyone can meet after they've escaped. Make sure to mark the location of the meeting place on your escape plan.
- Go outside to see if your street number is clearly visible from the road. If not, install house numbers that are plainly legible and visible from the street to ensure that responding emergency personnel can find your home.
- If there are infants, older adults, or family members with mobility limitations, make sure that someone is assigned to assist them in the fire drill and in the event of an emergency. Assign a backup person too, in case the designee is not home during the emergency
- Tell guests or visitors to your home about your family's fire escape plan. When staying overnight at other people's homes, ask about their escape plan. If they don't have a plan in place, offer to help them make one. This is especially important when children are permitted to attend "sleepovers" at friends' homes.
- Once you're out, stay out. Under no circumstances should you ever go back into a burning building. If someone is missing, inform the emergency dispatcher when you call. Firefighters have the skills and equipment to perform rescues.

City to conduct fall sign clean-up

The City of Dover's Department of Planning and Community Development announces it will conduct a clean-up of offpremise signs, including those placed on trees and utility poles or within the right-of-way without permission.

In Dover, temporary signs are permitted only in selected commercial zoning districts and must meet dimensional and liability requirements. With a few exceptions, temporary signs that are not located on the owner's property (also known as "off-premise" signs) are prohibited throughout Dover. Sign clean-ups are conducted in order to remove signs placed without permission, such as those often found attached to roadside trees and utility poles, or on the ground along roadsides. These signs can cause a safety hazard for motorists and pedestrians or create a visual blight that is unsightly for residents and visitors.

Assistant City Manager Chris Parker explains that another goal of the clean-up is to support those organizations with legal signage.

"Dover's sign regulations were created to balance the need for identification, advertising, and communication with the need to protect safety and welfare and maintain an attractive appearance throughout the City," Parker said. "Removing illegal signs helps to ensure that those who've followed these regulations know that their efforts to obtain permits are meaningful."

Owners are advised to remove any unpermitted signs prior to the clean-up, which will occur prior to Thanksgiving. Any sign that is confiscated will be held at City Hall for 30 days prior to being recycled or destroyed, unless the sign is claimed by the owner after paying a reclamation fee based on the actual cost of man-hours and equipment use. Repeat offenders may be subject to prosecution and fines.

The City's focus on enforcement of the ban on off-premise signage began in 2010. The Zoning Ordinance, Chapter 170 of the Dover City Code, addresses sign review and regulations in Section 170-32. For guidance on the placement of political advertising, refer to New Hampshire state law, RSA 664:17 "Placement and Removal of Political Advertising."

Road closures and traffic restrictions in place for Thanksgiving Day race

Dover Police Chief William M. Breault announces the following road closures and parking restrictions for the Dover Turkey Trot 5K run/walk event, organized by and benefiting the Garrison Elementary School PTA. This is the final race of the 2019 Dover Race Series.



On Thanksgiving Day, Thursday, Nov. 28, 2019 at 8:30 a.m., Shaws Lane will be closed in both directions between Garrison Road and Tideview Drive, for a period of approximately 15 minutes to accommodate the start of the race (8:20 to 8:35 a.m.). Garrison Road will be closed in the westerly direction at Morningside Drive from 8:30 to 9:30 a.m., with traffic diverted through the Morningside neighborhood.

Between 8:30 and 9:30 a.m., motorists should expect additional delays in the following locations:

- Back River Road and Garrison Road
- Garrison Road and Shaws Lane

COAST to hold final round of public information meetings and hearings

The Cooperative Alliance for Seacoast Transportation (COAST) is announcing its final round of opportunities to provide public input on COAST's redesign of the region's public transit system during the first week of December. Over the past 15-plus months COAST has undertaken a comprehensive review of its entire public transit system, asked for and received tremendous input from riders, partners and stakeholders, and based on that input, developed a proposal to redesign its services to better meet the needs of the region today and into the foreseeable future.

"There has been a remarkable amount of work undertaken over the past year-plus," said Rad Nichols, COAST Executive Director. "We have held 16 public forums over three distinct public input periods, collected and analyzed over 330 responses to onboard and online surveys, and attended numerous partner and stakeholder meetings, all of which were necessary to get us to the point where we are today. The proposed conceptual plan has really come together, and we were very pleased with the positive response we received when the plan was released earlier this year."

These meetings will represent the final public input opportunities on the proposed system changes coming to COAST in mid-2020. The meetings will be held as follows:

- Tuesday, Dec. 3 (10 a.m. to 12 p.m.), Dover Public Library
- Tuesday, Dec. 3 (6 p.m. to 8 p.m.), Somersworth City Hall
- Wednesday, Dec. 4 (6 p.m. to 8 p.m.), Portsmouth Public Library
- Thursday, Dec. 5 (9 a.m. to 11 a.m.), Friends of Farmington Meeting Space
- Thursday, Dec. 5 (6 p.m. to 8 p.m.) Rochester Public Library

The following items will be presented for final input:

- Final conceptualized plan, including routes and schedules
- Fare and fare media changes
- New recognized holidays
- Temporarily extending COAST ADA service to affected ADA clients no longer residing within COAST's service area

Public input on the final conceptualized plan will be accepted at the public information meetings and hearings.

The new system has numerous benefits for riders; including dramatic reductions in travel times for the longest trips, more timely connections between routes, clockface scheduling, expansion of Saturday services and extensions of service coverage to a small number of highly sought areas. As required due to coming funding reductions, the service is designed to have a lower overall operating cost, make better use of vehicle downtime to maximize revenue service, eliminate service to some of the lowest ridership areas and reduce peak vehicle needs and associated costs.

"We owe an enormous amount of gratitude to the NHDOT for helping COAST assemble the funding necessary for implementation. A \$4.95M award of FTA funds, passed through the NHDOT over the next three years, will help COAST transition to the new service designed for better cost efficiencies, while also improving customer service," explained Nichols.

Visitors to the online landing page can read a project overview, review the project progress to date, see the latest version of the proposed system and timetables, obtain details on upcoming meetings and provide public comment and input through available forms.

Nichols added, "We are very proud of the comprehensive public input and planning process we have undertaken and feel that the result is a system design that best reflects the changing needs of the region. We are excited to see the proposed system move to the next stage after the upcoming final public input round."

Nichols closed by saying, "Throughout this process, COAST has been committed to achieving the organization's stated goals of actively engaging stakeholders in collaborative efforts to be responsive to the region's changing needs, promoting fiscal stewardship of public transportation, and conducting ourselves with fiscal integrity and transparency that respects the taxpayers and municipalities we serve."

COAST is a non-profit agency, operating a regional public transit system that relies primarily on federal and local government support to operate. These scammers often pose as Eversource employees to get money, demand personal information for identity theft, or use deceptive marketing tactics to convince customers to switch energy suppliers. This week, as part of Utilities United Against Scams, which is a consortium of over 100 energy companies, Eversource is urging its customers to look for the signs of scammers.

"We always want to protect our customers from scams, and that's why it's critical we continue to raise awareness and educate the public about all the different tactics these scammers use," said Eversource Senior Vice President and Chief Customer Officer Penni Conner. "If someone shows up at your home or calls you and demands immediate payment, do NOT give it to them. Call us right away at 1-800-662-7764 to verify ANY request for payment or personal information."

A common utility con involves customers getting phone calls warning that their service is about to be shut off because of unpaid bills. The caller claims to be a billing representative from Eversource who tells a customer that to avoid an immediate shutoff, they need to settle an overdue bill by providing a credit card number or a prepaid debit card. In many cases, the caller ID will display "Eversource." Both businesses and homeowners are targeted and, unfortunately, scammers are often successful. According to the Better Business Bureau's 2018 Scam Tracker Risk Report, the median loss for a utility scam victim is \$500.

The energy company wants to remind its customers:

- Eversource representatives never demand instant payment in person or over the phone.
- Eversource representatives do not require the use of prepaid debit cards (such as Green Dot MoneyPak, Vanilla or Reloadit).
- Eversource representatives never request customers meet at a payment center, such as a department or grocery store, to make a payment.
- Eversource does not solicit door-to-door or on the phone on behalf of third-party energy suppliers.
- All Eversource employees carry photo identification; field workers wear company logoed clothing and drive company vehicles.

Eversource urges anyone who believes they are a target of improper solicitation to please alert local law enforcement and contact the company directly at 1-800-662-7764. The energy company tracks these types of customer concerns and reports them to state regulators.

Eversource.com and the Utilities United Against Scams websites provide more information on how to protect personal information and avoid becoming a victim of utility scams. Concerned customers can also report scams and fraudulent activity by calling the New Hampshire Public Utilities Commission at 603-271-2431.

SEED partners with WDH to fund high school CPR program

The Seacoast Educational Endowment for Dover ("SEED"), a nonprofit organization that promotes academic excellence by providing innovation grants to Dover educators, recently partnered with Wentworth-Douglass Hospital to fund CPR/First Aid training at Dover High School.

The donation, valued at \$1,036, was given to Health and Wellness teacher Mary Jean Hippern and used to purchase mannequins, manuals, and video tutorials. Cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) is a lifesaving technique useful in many emergencies, including a heart attack or near drowning, in which someone's breathing or heartbeat has stopped. CPR keeps oxygenated blood flowing to the brain and other vital organs until medical personnel arrive.

"CPR and first aid are lifelong skills that every person should know," said Hippern. "One of my former students performed CPR on his father, he later spoke to the school board about the importance for all students to learn CPR, stating it was one of the most valuable things he learned in high school."

In addition to life-saving skills, some vocations require CPR certification for employment. "We are so excited to work with Wentworth-Douglass to bring this critical programming to the high school," said Sue Vitko, Chair, SEED Board of Directors.

The following events are recorded in "Notable Events in the History of Dover, New Hampshire: From the First Settlement in 1623 to 1865," by George Wadleigh, and several other historical sources.

Nov. 28, 1692 - The Provincial Council, to prevent the drawing off of the soldiers from the Cochecho and Oyster rivers, ordered the Treasurer to disburse 20 or 30 pounds to supply said soldiers with provisions, and to enable them to continue at their posts for the better defense of the Province.



Nov. 22, 1824 - The town voted to give \$5,000 towards the building of a new stone jail, provided it be built in Dover.

Nov. 27, 1852 - The shock of an earthquake was distinctly felt, resembling the rattling of carriage wheels on frozen ground.

Nov. 23, 1859 - Mrs. J. Stone of Tuftonboro is killed at the train depot in Dover attempting to get on the cars - she being on her way to Boston to spend Thanksgiving with her son.

Nov. 20, 1920 - The Hotel Leighton on Third Street advertises a Thanksgiving dinner for \$1, beginning at noon on Thanksgiving. Among the dishes served are Consomme Britaniere Royal, Roast Stuffed Vermont Turkey, Roast Stuffed Chicken with Giblet Gravy, Fried Fillet of Sole, Green Apple Fritters, and a wide variety of soups.


Unveiled during Apple Harvest Day, the souvenir showcases Dover's beloved landmark, the Damm Garrison House. Each year leading up to 2023, a new


