School Board begins FY25 budget process

School Board members began their fiscal year 2025 budget planning this week with a brief review of next fiscal year's estimated revenues and expenditures

At the Nov. 20 workshop, Superintendent William Harbron and Business Administrator Michael Limanni gave an initial, high-level overview of the School Department's FY2025 budget, including significant drivers on the revenue and expenditure sides of the FY2025 budget.

The budget process will continue on Monday, Nov. 28, with a workshop that will begin to go into greater detail. Additional budget workshops are planned for December and January. By ordinance, the School Board must submit its budget request annually to the City Manager by Jan. 15. The City Manager will then incorporate the School Department's proposed budget into the overall city-wide budget that will be presented to the City Council by Feb. 15. The City Council must adopt a final budget by April 15. The new fiscal year begins on July 1.

Holiday Parade street closures and traffic restrictions

Dover Police Chief William M. Breault announces the following road closures and parking

restrictions for the Dover Holiday Parade, which returns after a three-year hiatus. The parade begins at 3 p.m. on Sunday, Nov. 26, 2023, and will follow its traditional route along Central Avenue (NH Route 108) from the Greater Dover Chamber of Commerce, 550 Central Ave., to Cleary Cleaners at 120 Central Ave.

On Sunday, Nov. 26, Central Avenue will be closed to all traffic from 2:45 to 4:45 p.m. from the intersection of Chestnut and New York streets to the intersection of Stark Avenue and East Watson Street. This includes much of the downtown area. Temporary traffic detours will be in effect, but motorists not coming to watch, participate or visit the downtown are encouraged to avoid the downtown area entirely.

Additional street closures will be in effect from 11:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. to accommodate parade staging and setup. These include:

- Sixth Street, between Horne Street and Central Avenue;
- Maple Street, between Sixth and Hough streets;
- Grove Street, between Fifth and Hough streets;
- Mt. Vernon Street, between Sixth and Milk streets.

Parking restrictions will be posted to prohibit on-street parking on Sixth Street between Horne Street and Central Avenue, beginning at 9 a.m. on Sunday, Nov. 26, and in other locations where necessary along the parade route.

Dover Police are coordinating with CSX Transportation railways to temporarily suspend freight trains at the downtown crossings to accommodate the event. Amtrak Downeaster passenger train service will not be interrupted. For information about traffic, contact Dover Police Lt. Marn Speidel at 603-742-4646.

Capital Improvements Program before

City Council and Planning Board Nov. 29

City Manager J. Michael Joyal, Jr. will submit and present his proposed FY2025-2030 Capital Improvements Program (CIP) to the City Council and Planning Board at a joint public workshop on Wednesday, Nov. 29. It begins at 7 p.m. in the McConnell Center's Room 305.

The CIP prioritizes all capital spending of \$25,000 or more for items with a useful life of three years or longer. It includes cost estimates, recommended time schedules to complete projects, and financing methods, which include debt financing, the annual operating budget, capital reserve funds, and grant funding.

After it is presented, the Planning Board and City Council will review the proposed CIP, and each body will hold a public hearing. The Planning Board reviews the CIP to ensure the proposed projects are based upon priorities established in the Master Plan and recommends whether the Council should adopt it. After its review, the Council will adopt the six-year CIP, authorize appropriations of capital reserve funds to finance the FY2025 non-debt financed projects, and authorize bonding and appropriations of debt-financed FY2025 CIP projects.

The CIP page, <u>found here</u>, will be updated with the proposed FY2025-2030 CIP after the Nov. 29 presentation.

Tax rate not yet certified by state

The City of Dover 2023 property tax rate has not yet been certified by the New Hampshire Department of Revenue Administration, and tax bills have not been mailed.

Upon receiving the certification from NHDRA, the city will issue a public notice of the 2023 property tax rate. Tax bills will be calculated with the certified rate, printed and mailed to property owners. Last year, the NHDRA certified Dover's 2022 on Dec. 7.

City Hall clock tower clock being repaired

Expected to be operational within a couple of weeks

The City Hall clock tower clock is expected to be operational in the next couple of weeks, if not sooner.

The clock's synchronous motor seized on the morning of Oct. 31, which may have been the result of a power outage in the downtown area that occurred that morning. David Graf of Tower Clock Repair & Restoration of Kittery, Maine, has removed the motor and brought it to an electrician for repairs. Graf has informed the city that the motor can be fixed and is anticipated to be completed by the end of next week. Once fixed, Graf will reinstall the motor and get the clock running again.






Nov. 28, 1692 — In an attempt to prevent the drawing off of soldiers from the Cochecho and Oyster rivers, the Provincial Council ordered the Treasurer to disburse 20 or 30 pounds to supply the soldiers with provisions and to enable them to continue at their posts for the better defense of the Province.

Nov. 25, 1831 — The barn of Jacob Sawyer at Garrison Hill was destroyed by fire, killing eleven cows and a large quantity of hay.

Nov. 27, 1852 — "The shock of an earthquake was distinctly felt, resembling the rattling of carriage wheels on frozen ground."

Nov. 26, 1855 — Elections for ward officers under a new city charter were held this week.

Nov. 26, 1999 — Proceeds from the 1999 Dover High School alumni basketball game held on this day benefited a new scholarship fund honoring former Green Wave player Mary Ellen Driscoll, who died in May of that year. Driscoll, part of Dover's 1977 championship team, loved playing basketball and alumni games. The fund named for the nursing professional would support a student going into that field. About 60 former players took part in the games that year.



The Spirit of Christmas Past: Four Centuries of Christmas in America at Dover Public Library

How did Christmas go from a rowdy celebration to the family-centered event it is now?

Trace the development of the celebration of Christmas at Dover Public Library on Wednesday at 6:30 p.m. in "The Spirit of Christmas Past: Four Centuries of Christmas in America." This is an in-person program with the option to stream live from home. Sign up is needed at the library's website to receive a link for virtual viewing.

In this illustrated lecture, Kenneth C. Turino explores the history of the holiday from when it was outlawed in 17th century New England through the mid-21st century when all the trappings of a traditional Christmas were in place. For many, the celebration of Christmas today is the most important holiday of the year. However, many of the customs taken for granted as part of the current holiday festivities and religious celebrations are actually a product of more recent history. Among the topics discussed are how Christmas trees were raised, halls were decked, and Santa Claus came to town.

Turino is the manager of community partnerships and resource development at Historic New England. He has published several articles on the history of Christmas and has a

book in development.

Stay up to date with parking ban alerts

Parking Manager Bill Simons reminds City of Dover drivers to sign-up for parking ban alerts. Parking bans are declared during throughout the winter to facilitate snow removal, and after storms for snow removal and clean-up.

Users can receive text and/or email alerts if a winter parking ban is declared, which requires the removal of all vehicles from public ways to allow street and sidewalk plowing. To receive text alerts, visit https://bit.ly/dovercodered, or text "DoverNH" to 99411 from your phone. To receive email alerts, visit https://bit.ly/doverdownload.

'As-needed' winter parking bans

During winter storm events or post-storm cleanups, the Community Services Director may declare a winter parking ban to allow crews to clear roads efficiently. When a parking ban is declared, all vehicles must be off public ways by the time the ban goes into effect. If vehicles are not removed, they may be ticketed and/or towed.

Most residents know not to park on the roads when there is an active storm. However, Community Services struggles with compliance with parking bans for post-storm cleanups when crews remove high snow banks or push snow back, so streets and sidewalks are passable and ready for the next storm.

"Ninety-five percent of parking tickets for winter parking ban violations come on cleanup nights," Simons said. "The goal is not to give out any tickets or have any cars towed and let Community Services do their job."

A parking ticket is \$50. A tow is likely to be above \$150.

Unless a parking ban is declared, vehicles may be parked on the street except for areas covered by the seasonal winter parking restrictions.

When a winter parking is declared

A parking ban will be declared by 3 p.m. to begin at a designated time later that evening. When a ban is declared, parking is prohibited on city streets, sidewalks and adjacent parking areas, such as the angled spaces on School or First streets. Vehicles must be parked on private property, at an authorized public parking lot, or the parking garage. Vehicles that violate the parking ban may be ticketed and towed at the vehicle owner's expense.

Apartment building owners are encouraged to alert all tenants about announced parking bans.

The parking ban for the downtown area typically starts later than all other parts of the city.

Many options to receive parking ban notifications

The City of Dover utilizes its website, social media accounts, Channel 22, text and email alerts, and press releases to local news media to notify residents about parking bans. The current ban status is always posted at https://www.dover.nh.gov/government/city-operations/police/parking-bureau/parking-bans.html. People can also call 603-516-PARK (7275) to check the parking ban status.

For email notifications, visit https://bit.ly/dovernewsletters and select the "Parking Ban Alerts" option. For text-based notifications via the City of Dover's emergency notification system, CodeRED, sign-up by texting "DoverNH" to 99411. Please note that cellular phone carrier and/or text message fees may apply.

Text alerts are also available by creating an account and logging into the city's emergency notification system, <u>CodeRED</u>. After creating an account, select the option for Parking Ban Notifications under "Additional Notifications." Users must provide a phone number capable of receiving text alerts. Cellular phone carrier and/or text message fees may apply.

Users should receive a confirmation email or text after a successful sign-up. If not, call the City of Dover's Media Services at 603-516-1641 for assistance.

Where to park during a parking ban?

Some public parking lots have areas available for overnight parking. Click here to view a map of municipal parking lot locations in the downtown area. The Orchard Street Parking Garage has limited short-term spaces and is for "Permit Parking Only" above the second floor (look for signs). Overnight parking is available in spaces 101-278 for \$1/hr. Paid parking in the garage is 24/7, including holidays. Users may pay for parking or extend parking time through the smartphone "Flowbird parking" application. Users must know the number of the space where the vehicle is parked.

Dover's Festival of Trees returns Dec. 1
