

Municipal Election is Tuesday, Nov. 7

The City of Dover municipal election is Tuesday, Nov. 7, 2023. The polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. that day in all of Dover's six wards.

At the election, voters from all wards will elect the Mayor, two at-large City Councilors, and one at-large School Board

member. In addition, voters in each of the six Dover wards will elect a City Councilor and School Board member and election officers, including a Supervisor of the Checklist, a Moderator, three Selectpersons, and a Ward Clerk. All elected positions are two-year terms.

Proposed stormwater utility ordinance gets first airing before City Council

Vote on utility to occur in December

Council will also consider improvements to Class VI road, archery hunting on city parcel

The City Council holds its first regular meeting of the month on Wednesday, Nov. 8, at 7 p.m. in City Hall's Council Chambers.

On the agenda is a first reading of the proposed Stormwater and Flood Resilience Utility, which has been reviewed by the City Council's Ordinance Committee and the Dover Utilities Commission and was the subject of two public informational workshops. The first reading of the ordinance refers the proposed ordinance to a Council workshop next Wednesday, Nov. 15, and a public hearing and possible vote on Wednesday, Dec. 13. 
Also on the agenda is a resolution that would allow Chinburg Development, LLC., to make improvements to Old Oak Street, a Class VI road, as a part of their subdivision planned near Gulf Road and Oak Street. The resolution would allow Chinburg Development to petition the city to publicly accept the road in the future if the improvements meet the city's requirements for public street acceptance. The Planning Board gave the development conditional approval for the project on July 6, 2023.

There are two public hearings at the meeting: one on proposed revisions to the Peace and Good Order ordinance and the other to the Bicycles and Play Vehicles ordinance. Both involve updating references and park hours of the Dover Skate Park from its old location on River Street to its new location at Guppey Park. The proposed revisions to the Peace and Good Order ordinance would also allow for archery hunting on a city-owned parcel off Sullivan Drive to licensed hunters during hunting season, provided that hunting takes place at least 300 feet away from any playground, field, or open space.

The meeting will begin with a proclamation honoring the Dover High School's field hockey team, which recently won the state championship in their division.

City Hall clock tower to be repaired

The clock that keeps the time on the City Hall clock tower stopped working Tuesday morning due to a faulty motor. A specialty clock repair person who does maintenance on the clock was notified, and he is scheduled to be onsite next week to determine if the motor, which is no longer manufactured, can be repaired.

The E. Howard & Co. clock, made in Boston, is original to the 1935 City Hall building. It's located within the clock tower that, by the use of gears, moves the hands on the four exterior clock faces that keep the time. Originally, the clockwork mechanism was driven by weights but was later upgraded to utilize an electric motor believed to have occurred in the 1940s or 1950s. The Bodine synchronous electric motor last seized up in 2013. David Graf of Tower Clock Repair & Restoration, the clock repair specialist, was able to have the repairs made to the obsolete motor along with other clockwork maintenance.

The clock itself was not part of the clock tower restoration project last year except for installing an electrical outlet to plug in the clock's electric motor. That project included removing the building antenna, repairing and restoring the gold leaf dome, copper roofing,

metal sheeting and exterior clock faces.

Woodman Museum to honor veterans with special events on Saturday

The Woodman Museum will host an all-day event complete with re-enactors from the Revolutionary War to today on Saturday, Nov. 4, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

The event will feature performances by the 1st NH Revolutionary War Infantry and a Revolutionary War-era Fife and Drum Corps. Attendees can meet with active duty personnel and veteran organizations at vendor tents and see military vehicles and more.



Watch the Worldwide Premiere of Sabaton's "The War To End All Wars"

The celebration continues later that evening with the worldwide premiere of Sabaton's "The War To End All Wars - The Movie" at 7 p.m. Founded in 1999 in Falun, Sweden, Sabaton is a five-piece band that is recognized for its fact-based music about important points in history.

Developed in partnership with Yarnhub, an animation studio focused on historical content, this 67-minute-long musical motion picture features songs from Sabaton's 10th studio album. The movie vividly tells the stories of World War I, providing viewers with an opportunity to learn more about this crucial part of history and reflect on the sacrifices made by those who fought in the war.

Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles markers to be unveiled Wednesday

Two commemorative markers honoring Dover as the birthplace of the Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles will be unveiled in the city on Wednesday, Nov. 8.

A historical marker will be unveiled at noon on Central Avenue, followed by the unveiling of a decorative manhole cover at 28 Union St., at 12:15 p.m., where TMNT creators Kevin Eastman and Peter Laird lived when they created the comic book in 1983.

The manhole cover ceremony will include remarks by Dover Mayor Robert Carrier, TMNT co-creator Kevin Eastman, and other guests. Eastman also designed the artwork for the marker.

The events mark the 40th anniversary of the Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles franchise and the 400th anniversary of Dover. Mirage Studios, formed by Eastman and Laird, was located at 28 Union St. in Dover, where the first TMNT comic book was created before the company moved to Northampton, Mass.

The commemorations are made possible by the Dover Arts Commission, the city's Planning Department, the New Hampshire Division of Historical Resources, Griffin Hansen of the Animation Education Association, and Dover resident James Lane, who organized a fundraising campaign to which more than 200 people donated \$13,000.

Jetpack Comics in Rochester is providing free Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles comics to attendees of the event while supplies last.

Temporary closure of Union Street on Wednesday, Nov. 8

Dover Police Chief William M. Breault announces the following street closure for the Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles historical marker dedication on Wednesday, Nov. 8

To allow the dedication, Union Street will be closed to all traffic east of Court Street between 12 and 1:30 p.m. on that date. On-street parking restrictions will be in effect in certain posted areas.

The City of Dover will host an unveiling event for a commemorative sewer manhole cover and historical marker that marks the birthplace of the Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles comic cartoon and television franchise, whose creators Kevin Eastman and Peter Laird began illustrations for the comic in 1983 at 28 Union St., a residential home which has since been demolished.

The event begins at 12 p.m. at the Woodman Museum at the corner of Union Street and Central Avenue, where an unveiling event will be held for the commemorative marker from the New Hampshire Division of Historical Resources. From there, participants will move a short distance down Union Street to the unveiling of the commemorative sewer manhole cover near the location where the house at 28 Union St., once stood.







The following events are from various historical records, sources, and texts about the history of Dover.

For more on the history of Dover, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street, and the Woodman Museum on Central Avenue. The Public Library also maintains an online collection of historical information <u>located here</u>.

Nov. 8, 1683 — Darkness fell over Dover from 10 in the morning until 2 p.m., as a very black and thick cloud crawled along. It seemed as though the sun had been greatly and totally eclipsed.


Nov. 7, 1774 — A town meeting was held to see if the inhabitants would raise anything, either "in money, fat cattle or sheep," for the relief of the poor of Boston, then suffering from the operations of the Port Bill. And it was voted that the town would "give something."

Nov. 6, 1818 — Capt. John Riley died on this day at age 66 after falling from the staging of a ship being built in Dover.

Nov. 4, 1943 — The Portland Evening Express shines a spotlight on Ernie Bastianelli, a 155-pound powerhouse of a fullback on the Dover High School football team, warning that he was a serious threat to Deering High School when the two teams were scheduled to meet the next day. The newspaper said Ernie was carrying on a family tradition started by his older brother, Al, who the newspaper called a "forward passing genius," and who was away serving in the US Navy. The newspaper predicted that Ernie was all but guaranteed a spot on New Hampshire's All-State Team.

Nov. 6, 2001 — Voters on this day returned Doris Grady to the Dover School Board as an

at-large member after she previously served from 1993-99. Grady, a retired teacher with 44 years in public education, received over 50% of the 4,664 votes cast. As a board member, Grady said she would tackle issues like space needs, contracts, and teacher accountability. Grady would continue to serve on the Board until 2015. Grady, who was named the Retired Teacher of the Year at the New Hampshire Excellence in Education Awards Ceremony in both 2009 and 2018, died in 2019 at age 96.



Indigenous Peoples of the Northeastern Woodlands at Dover Public Library

Celebrate Native American Heritage Month this November by learning about the 20,000 years of culture and traditions of the Abenaki people.

Dover Public Library will be joined by Mt. Kearsarge Indian Museum on Wednesday, Nov. 8 at 6:30 p.m. for "Indigenous Peoples of the Northeastern Woodlands." The talk explores the native cultures of the Northeastern Woodlands and includes a digital tour of the museum, artifacts, and a discussion of the history of tribes in the area.

This is an in-person event with the option to watch virtually from home. Those who wish to view virtually will need to visit the library's website to sign up and receive a link to the program.

Mt. Kearsarge Indian Museum in Warner was founded in 1991 by Charles "Bud" Thompson and his wife Nancy. The museum is a center for Native life throughout the Americas, both traditional and contemporary, and features artifacts and information on the cultures of the Northeastern Woodlands, Seminole, Cherokee, Navajo, and Plains tribes. Since its founding, the museum has welcomed visitors from all over the United States and 38 foreign countries, including 7,500 school children every year.

This program is free and open to the public.

Reach for the Top Therapy Services

Reach for the Top Therapy Services is a 501(c)(3) non-profit therapy center that provides family-centered, trauma-informed, outpatient occupational, physical, and speech therapies for children with exceptional needs. Reach for the Top is located at Suite 331 inside Dover's McConnell Center at 61 Locust St.

Reach for the Top Therapy Services was founded in September 2014, and the organization recently celebrated its ninth anniversary. Reach was founded with a strong commitment to providing comprehensive therapy services focused on a family-centered model, in which the family is included in each session from the evaluation to every visit thereafter. This family-centered model helps instill consistency for the child and makes sure that families are best equipped to help their child outside of their therapy sessions.

"We aim to build relationships and resilience for the children," says Executive Director and occupational therapist Amy Rich Crane, MSOT, OTR/L, BCP. "At Reach, we know we are only a small piece of the child and family's journey and that they will be better served when they are empowered to co-create the therapeutic strategies that work for them."

Children with a wide array of needs come to Reach to work with their team of specialists. At Reach, their highly trained team collaborate with families to support children in physical therapy, occupational therapy, speech therapy, and feeding therapy, and in 11 other specialty programs located throughout the community, empowering children with diagnoses such as ADHD, autism, failure-to-thrive, Downs Syndrome, Developmental Delay, and more. The state-of-the-art clinic features large sensory integration rooms, a fine motor STEM room, a nature nook, quiet speech rooms, an infant/toddler room, a life skills room, a physical therapy gym, and an oral motor and feeding space that all work with Reach's practice of science-based play. Reach works with over 600 children ranging from the ages of 1 week old to 20 years old and serves families in Stafford, Rockingham, Carroll, Belknap, and Hillsborough Counties and Southern Maine.

"Reach is committed to comprehensive, fun, creative, strengths-based intervention plans following best-practice standards of care," says Rich Crane. "We are excited to keep growing and expanding to help children, families, and employees develop and nurture their skills, which strengthens our community."


understand our children's needs, which, ultimately, leads to us being able to offer the best services that we can."
