Downtown utility work postponed to next week

Downtown utility work by both Unitil and Eversource has been postponed until next Tuesday, Nov. 12. There will be no work activity or parking restrictions downtown on Friday, Nov. 8 or Monday, Veterans Day, Nov. 11.

Beginning Tuesday, Nov. 12, work will continue on First Street and will result in on-street parking restrictions near Central Avenue between 7 a.m. and 5 p.m., and may also result in intermittent closures of First Street. Local traffic for First Street may access the road from the Chestnut Street end.

Also beginning Wednesday next week, work will continue on Chapel Street between 7 a.m. and 5 p.m. which will result in on-street parking restrictions between Main Street and the Janetos Plaza driveway, and a closure of Chapel Street at Main Street. While the street is closed, a detour will be in place via Broadway and Saint John Street. Parking restrictions will be posted in advance, and those who have parking permits for Chapel Street may park on Saint John Street or anywhere else on Chapel that is not posted.

Unitil is installing a gas main from Chapel Street to First Street.

Eversource is improving the reliability of the electric utility downtown. The work is in response to power disruptions earlier this year and follow-up meetings between Eversource and downtown merchants.

Spur Road reconstruction expected to begin this month

Neighborhood meeting slated for Nov. 14

The reconstruction of Spur Road, including drainage work and the installation of a section of water main from Finch Lane to New Bellamy Road, is expected to begin later this month with the replacement of the drainage system. Trenches from this work will be patched for the winter months. Construction of the water main will begin in the spring of 2020.

A neighborhood meeting to review the project will be held on Thursday, Nov. 14, at 6:30 p.m., in the City Hall auditorium. All residents are encouraged to attend this meeting to meet the contractor and City staff who will be working on the project. The City has hired D&C Construction to complete the project.

A description of the proposed work and construction process will be given during the neighborhood meeting, followed by time for residents to ask questions of the contractor and City officials. There will be a review of the anticipated construction timeline and discussion of expected temporary impacts.

The following events are recorded in "Notable Events in the History of Dover, New Hampshire: From the First Settlement in 1623 to 1865," by George Wadleigh, and several other historical sources.

For more on the history of Dover, settled in 1623 and the oldest permanent settlement in New Hampshire and seventh oldest in the country, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street; and the Woodman Museum, Central Avenue. Nov. 8, 1683 - Was exceedingly dark, from 10 in the morning,

till two in the afternoon, which might be occasioned by a very black and thick cloud passing over very low. It seemed as though the sun had been greatly and totally eclipsed.

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Nov. 14, 1818 - Joseph Cushing is born.

Joseph Cushing was born on the family farm on the Dover Point Road on November 14, 1818. The farm included land along the Bellamy River from St. Mary's New Cemetery down to the Varney Brook, and the lane leading into the farmhouse is now called Cushing Road. The house is still standing and dominates a landscape of modern ranch and cottage style homes. Joseph got his education in Dover Schools; probably over at the nearby Upper Neck District Schoolhouse near the end of Tuttle Lane, and then up at the Pine Hill Schoolhouse in Dover. When he was twenty years old, he left the farm and went to Gloucester, Massachusetts, to work in a fish market, but only stayed there a short time. A circus came to Gloucester and Joseph knew that that was what he wanted. He joined as a roustabout, but saved his wages and soon bought the lemonade concession. He later added the candy business. He was on his way then and became part owner, with the side shows under his control. He learned the circus business thoroughly and eventually bought out the whole show, and it became Cushing Circus of Dover, N.H.

Circuses in those days were transported by team from town to town as booking had to be made within ten to fifteen mile radius, what with gravel and clay roads and possible rainy weather. The equipment had to be struck each night, but the performers lodged in rooming houses and traveled by day.

Mr. Cushing was a great publicity man and believed in side show freaks to up his attendance records. He was always on the lookout for exceptional exhibits and it is said that he taught P.T. Barnum and other circus greats some on their come-on stunts. Some of their odd people wintered in Dover and were seen around our streets during the off season. One of the Colonel's publicity gimmicks was a team of 40 matched cream colored horses drawing his band wagon through the streets and driven by a single pair of reins and one driver. What a stunt.

As success continued, Mr. Cushing, or Colonel Cushing as he got to be known, toyed with the idea of taking his show to Europe but could not finance it alone, so he took in a partner, a Mr. Seth Howe; and they charted a steamship The South Hampton, put aboard their forty acts of animals and all went to England. They were very successful and stayed over there three years- the first American circus to ever tour England. On Friday, May 17, 1858, they gave a command performance before Queen Victoria, Prince Albert and their guests. The velvet gown that Mrs. Cushing wore at that performance is now on exhibition at our Woodman Institute.

Eventually the circus property was sold at auction in London and Colonel Cushing returned with one hundred thousand dollars - a fortune in those days. But the Colonel was not ready to retire yet, so in 1861 he got another show together and toured the South and Southwest. He was again successful and his restless nature drove him to a new venture. This time he got his friends to back him and chartered another ship The North Star, and took the whole show to South America. Everything went fine with this venture, as far as business was concerned but things went wrong suddenly when the treasurer disappeared with all the funds. The Colonel came back to Dover in 1877 and retired to the farm where he lived until his death in 1884 at the age of 66. But the circus world did not forget him and many circus people came to visit him in his retirement. The famous midget General Tom Thumb visited him many times. There was a story our Dad told about Tom Thumb contracting a cold while visiting the Colonel and our grandpa Dr. Jefferson Smith was called in to treat him. We have heard many more stories from father's generation about the town boys going down to the Cushing farm to see the lions and tigers in their winter quarters. Also there was the one about the orangutan that the Colonel allowed in the house and could wear clothes and eat with knife and fork.

From Rambles About the Dover Area 1623-1973, by Daniel J. Smith, 1973.

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Nov. 13, 1833 - Meteoric shower of stars observable, between 3 and 4 o'clock in the morning, which attracted much attention throughout the country.

Nov. 12, 1845 - All the necessary preparations for the execution of Andrew Howard this day, were made. The gallows was erected in the Dover jail yard, and there was a collection of several thousand persons to witness the execution, when the reprieve of the prisoner to the 8th of July, 1846, was announced.

Nov. 11, 1923 - The opening gun in a campaign against Sunday athletics is fired. A football game scheduled at Guppy Park is prohibited and about 800 people are sent away disappointed. The action was taken by police after an objection to the game was made at the police station by members of the Men's Bible Class at the Washington Street Baptist Church.



Pelicans of Star Island topic of book talk at the Library

Local author, Jennifer Moore, and photojournalist, Anna Solo, will talk about their newly released book depicting the seasonal

workers on Star Island at the Dover Public Library on Tuesday, Nov. 19 at 6:30 p.m. Copies of the book will be for sale following the talk.

As a visitor to Star Island, Jennifer Moore has long been fascinated by the staff who work behind the scenes to make Star Island a relaxing and memorable experience. Moore and Solo collaborated on the project. The book is called "Pelicans: Seasonal Workers of Star Island," and offers an intimate look into this unique island way of life.

Moore, a blogger known locally for sustainable events like the Portsmouth Public Library's Clothing Swap and Project



Upcycle, often encountered confusion when describing the project; "People would give me a quizzical look and eventually ask some version of, 'There are pelicans on Star Island?' At that point I explain that I'm not talking about birds and that "Pelicans" is the nickname for the seasonal workers on Star. My hope is that this book will make readers more aware and curious about Star Island and the Pelican community."

Together, Moore and Solo shadowed the Pelicans over the summer of 2018, as they worked in the historic grand hotel, The Oceanic, and on the grounds of the small and rugged island. "Pelicans" offers a condensed history of the Isles of Shoals with specific focus given to Star Island. The photography is organised into three sections; On Duty, Off Duty, and End of Season. Matt Ralph at Plainspoke provided graphic design, while artwork and maps were drawn by illustrator Elizabeth DeJure Wood.

Says Solo, "Observing and capturing the way Pels live, work, and unwind in this unique and beautiful pocket off the coast of New Hampshire was one of the most engaging and fulfilling projects I've ever had the privilege of working on. Everyone was so open and willing to share their stories, and I'm grateful that I was able to help tell them. The commute wasn't half bad, either!"

Anna Solo graduated from the Rochester Institute of Technology with a degree in photojournalism. Originally from New York City, she currently lives in Portsmouth, NH, working on stories about the people and places of New England. Jennifer Moore was born and raised in New Hampshire and grew up sailing off the coast of New England. In addition to working at the local public library, Jennifer maintains a blog called Recovergirl, where she celebrates sustainable style.

Says Moore, "I carried the idea of this book around for years. It's such a great feeling to see it finally become a reality."
