City offices closed for Veterans Day

City administrative offices, including City Hall, will be closed on Monday, Nov. 12, 2018, for Veterans Day. Regular hours will resume on Tuesday, Nov. 13, 8:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m.

The Public Library is also closed on Monday, Nov. 12, for Veterans Day.

Veterans Day is a parking holiday in Dover. Metered parking is not required on parking holidays.

Recreation facilities, including the Butterfield Gym and Fitness Center at the McConnell Center, the Indoor Pool and Dover Arena are open regular hours on Monday, Nov. 12.

Trash pickup and curbside recycling are not affected by the holiday and will follow a regular schedule.



Saint Thomas Street to close for utility work

Utility work at the 104 Washington Street construction site will require additional road closures on Monday, Nov. 12.

The work will require the closure of the entrance of Saint Thomas Street, at Chestnut Street, from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. each day. Saint Thomas Street will reopen each evening and during the weekend. When Saint Thomas Street is closed, Chestnut Street will be open in both directions.

For traffic accessing the District Court or the McConnell Center via Saint Thomas Street, the road will be open to two-way traffic from Atkinson Street while the work is under way.

From either direction on Chestnut Street, motorists can follow a marked detour around the block to Atkinson Street. The District Court's permitted parking area and sally port will remain open and accessible from Chestnut Street.

The work may continue on Tuesday, Nov. 13, if needed.



Turnpike require lane closure for three weeks

The New Hampshire Department of Transportation announces bridge repairs began this week on the Spaulding Turnpike (NH 16) southbound bridge over NH Route 108 in Dover.

This bridge deck and expansion joint repair work is expected to take three weeks to complete and will require a lane closure during daytime hours. The available lane width during the lane closure time period will be 16 feet.

Signs will be in place to alert motorists of the lane restriction.

City transitions to storm-based winter parking bans

Earlier this year, the City Council approved a change in the city's winter parking ban procedures. Parking bans will now be determined on a storm-by-storm basis.

When required for snow plowing or cleanup, the Community Services Director will declare a parking ban by 3 p.m. The ban will then take effect at 10 p.m. citywide, except downtown, which will begin at 1 a.m. the following morning.

When a declared parking ban is in effect, parking on city streets is prohibited. Any vehicle parked on the street,

sidewalk or adjacent public parking area during a declared parking ban may be ticketed and/or towed at the vehicle owner's expense.



Parking ban declarations will also be sent to **local media**, including newspaper, radio and television outlets.

The new storm-based parking ban ordinance replaces the former winter parking ban, which was in effect from Dec. 1 to April 1.

Dedication ceremony slated for Henry Law Park mural

Dover-area residents and art lovers of all ages are invited to the official unveiling of the Garrison City's newest public art installation, The Henry Law Park Mural. On Sunday, Nov. 11, the Dover Arts Commission will hold a ribbon cutting and dedication ceremony to mark the completion of the large-scale artwork and introduce the artists who created it. The event takes place at 2 p.m. at Henry Law Park, 9 Henry Law Ave., Dover.

Created by a dedicated group of teens under the guidance of Dover artist Brian Cartier, and intended to facilitate a conversation about our world, the vibrant mural celebrates Dover's diverse cultural heritage using vivid color, abstract imagery, painted handprints, and inspiring text.

Working with Cartier in an afterschool program, the teens took inspiration for the mural from their positive experiences living in

Dover, their hopes and wishes for future generations, and a Native American Mi'kmaq (or Micmac) prayer about peace and healing among all people.

Residents also had a hand in the project during a community art day held earlier this year. People of all ages, backgrounds, and artistic abilities helped to illustrate Dover's increasingly diverse population and honored their family heritage by adding colorful handprints on a world map to show their state or country of origin. In doing so, they embraced the mural's themes of inclusiveness and community, helping to ensure that Dover remains a welcoming haven to all for generations to come.

This week in DOVER HISTORY

The following events are recorded in "Notable Events in the History of Dover, New Hampshire: From the First Settlement in 1623 to 1865," by George Wadleigh, and several other historical sources.

For more on the history of Dover, settled in 1623 and the oldest permanent settlement in New Hampshire and seventh oldest in the country, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street; and the Woodman Museum, Central Avenue. Nov. 10, 1772 - This day Rev. Mr. Belknap preached a sermon before his Excellency John Wentworth, Esq. governor of His Majesty's province of New Hampshire, at a review of the second regiment of Foot, at Dover, in said province; and met so favorable a hearing, that the officers requested a copy for the press, which was granted.



Nov. 14, 1818 - Joseph Cushing is born.

Joseph Cushing was born on the family farm on the Dover Point Road on November 14, 1818. The farm included land along the Bellamy River from St. Mary's New Cemetery down to the Varney Brook, and the lane leading into the farmhouse is now called Cushing Road. The house is still standing and dominates a landscape of modern ranch and cottage style homes. Joseph got his education in Dover Schools; probably over at the nearby Upper Neck District Schoolhouse near the end of Tuttle Lane, and then up at the Pine Hill Schoolhouse in Dover. When he was twenty years old, he left the farm and went to Gloucester. Massachusetts, to work in a fish market, but only stayed there a short time. A circus came to Gloucester and Joseph knew that that was what he wanted. He joined as a roustabout, but saved his wages and soon bought the lemonade concession. He later added the candy business. He was on his way then and became part owner, with the side shows under his control. He learned the circus business thoroughly and eventually bought out the whole show, and it became Cushing Circus of Dover, N.H.

Circuses in those days were transported by team from town to town as booking had to be made within ten to fifteen mile radius, what with gravel and clay roads and possible rainy weather. The equipment had to be struck each night, but the performers lodged in rooming houses and traveled by day.

Mr. Cushing was a great publicity man and believed in side show freaks to up his attendance records. He was always on the lookout for exceptional exhibits and it is said that he taught P.T. Barnum and other circus greats some on their come-on stunts. Some of their odd people wintered in Dover and were seen around our streets during the off season. One of the Colonel's publicity gimmicks was a team of 40 matched cream colored horses drawing his band wagon through the streets and driven by a single pair of reins and one driver. What a stunt.

As success continued, Mr. Cushing, or Colonel Cushing as he got to be known, toyed with the idea of taking his show to Europe but could not finance it alone, so he took in a partner, a Mr. Seth Howe; and they charted a steamship The South Hampton, put aboard their forty acts of animals and all went to England. They were very successful and stayed over there three years- the first American circus to ever tour England. On Friday, May 17, 1858, they gave a command performance before Queen Victoria, Prince Albert and their guests. The velvet gown that Mrs. Cushing wore at that performance is now on exhibition at our Woodman Institute.

Eventually the circus property was sold at auction in London and Colonel Cushing returned with one hundred thousand dollars - a fortune in those days. But the Colonel was not ready to retire yet, so in 1861 he got another show together and toured the South and Southwest. He was again successful and his restless nature drove him to a new venture. This time he got his friends to back him and

chartered another ship The North Star, and took the whole show to South America. Everything went fine with this venture, as far as business was concerned but things went wrong suddenly when the treasurer disappeared with all the funds. The Colonel came back to Dover in 1877 and retired to the farm where he lived until his death in 1884 at the age of 66. But the circus world did not forget him and many circus people came to visit him in his retirement. The famous midget General Tom Thumb visited him many times. There was a story our Dad told about Tom Thumb contracting a cold while visiting the Colonel and our grandpa Dr. Jefferson Smith was called in to treat him. We have heard many more stories from father's generation about the town boys going down to the Cushing farm to see the lions and tigers in their winter quarters. Also there was the one about the orangutan that the Colonel allowed in the house and could wear clothes and eat with knife and fork.

Nov. 13, 1833 - Meteoric shower of stars observable, between 3 and 4 o'clock in the morning, which attracted much attention throughout the country.



Nov. 12, 1845 - All the necessary preparations for the execution of Andrew Howard this day, were made. The gallows was erected in the Dover jail yard, and there was a collection of several thousand persons to witness the execution, when the reprieve of the prisoner to the 8th of July, 1846, was announced.



Nov. 11, 1923 - The opening gun in a campaign against Sunday athletics is fired. A football game scheduled at Guppy Park is prohibited and about 800 people are sent away disappointed. The action was taken by police after an objection to the game was made at the police station by members of the Men's Bible Class at the Washington Street Baptist Church.



Stephen Collins performs as artist James McNeil Whistler at Dover Public Library The Friends of the Dover Public Library are once again pleased to host actor and stage performer Stephen Collins on Tuesday, Nov. 20 at 7 p.m. in the Library's Lecture Hall. His one-man show, "Butterfly", will focus on the life and times of New England native, James McNeil Whistler (1834-1903), the volatile American artist who struggled for personal freedom and artistic expression. Whistler was a leading proponent of



the credo, "art for art's sake". Collins depicts Whistler at two phases of his life - first, as a bankrupt artist on commission in Venice in his forties, and then as the established, yet lonely, legend in his sixties in London.

The title of the play is drawn from the artist's signature on his paintings, which was in the shape of a stylized butterfly possessing a long stinger for a tail. The symbol combined two aspects of his personality - his art, characterized by a subtle delicacy, and his public persona, which was combative. The portrayal ends with Whistler describing how he created his most famous painting, "Arrangement in Grey and Black No. 1", commonly known as "Whistler's Mother" - the revered portrait of motherhood.

Stephen Collins is a classically trained actor. He has performed twice earlier this year at the Dover Public Library as Walt Whitman, and, in a program on justice, as William Lloyd Garrison, John Brown Abraham Lincoln and Thomas Hardy.

He currently performs nine one-man shows and has received rave reviews for over a decade. Mr. Collins' performances brings poets, artists, statesmen, and playwrights to life on the stage. 
