

CDBG grant applications now available

The City of Dover Department of Planning and Community Development is now accepting applications from public service agencies, qualified individuals and eligible organizations for grants from the fiscal year 2019 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program. The fiscal year spans July 1, 2018 to June 30, 2019.

Applications are available online at <u>www.dover.nh.gov/government/city-operations/planning/</u> and at the Planning Department. The application submission deadline is 4 p.m. on Wednesday, Nov. 15, 2017, at the Planning Department, located at 288 Central Ave., Dover, NH 03820-4169.

CDBG workshops to provide an overview of the CDBG Program and specific application requirements will be held in Room 305 at the McConnell Center, 61 Locust St., on Wednesday, Oct. 18, 2017, at 10:30 a.m. to 6 p.m. Attendance at the workshop is not a prerequisite for submission of an application. Unlike in previous years, interested parties may submit an application for the Public Service category and an application for the Public Facilities category, with some restrictions.

Incomplete or late applications are ineligible.

Eligible CDBG activities include, but are not limited to acquisition of property, development or improvement of public facilities, clearance or demolition, public services, and special economic development activities. updates.

To be considered eligible for funding, certain requirements must be met, including but not limited to:

- Submission of a complete and timely application.
- Support the goals outlined in the City's Consolidated Plan.
- Meet one of the following HUD national objectives:
 - 1. Benefit low and moderate income people;
 - 2. Eliminate of slums and blight;
 - 3. Meet a particularly urgent community development need.

The City of Dover has been a CDBG entitlement community for over 25 years. The HUD program provides annual grants on a formula basis to entitled cities and counties to develop viable urban communities by providing decent housing and a suitable living environment, and by expanding economic opportunities, principally for low and moderate income people. HUD awards grants to entitlement community grantees to carry out a wide range of community development activities directed toward revitalizing neighborhoods, economic development, and providing improved community facilities and services. Entitlement communities develop their own programs and funding priorities. The entitlement grant is expected to be available July 1, 2016. The amount to be received by the City of Dover has yet to be determined by Congress.

Paving for the Week of Oct. 15

Master Plan committee working on climate change chapter

A steering committee is working on a new chapter of City's Master Plan that addresses climate change. As the panel prepares a draft of the new chapter, it seeks public input on climate change and its effects on energy, food, infrastructure, health and safety, natural resources, and water availability and quality.

There are several ways to participate, including two inperson upcoming workshops. The workshops will be held at the Dover Middle School (16 Daley Drive) on Thursday, Oct. 19, 6:30-9 p.m. and Saturday, Oct.21, 9-11:30 a.m. Refreshments will be served. The fifth annual Night at the Museum, a fundraiser for the Woodman Museum, will be held on Saturday, Oct. 14 and Sunday, Oct. 15, 2017, from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m., at Pine Hill Cemetery, 131 Central Ave.

This year's event, "More Voices from the Cemetery," is the continuation of the popular series.

In two dozen scenes, laid out all over Pine Hill Cemetery, history will come to life during the 90-minute escorted tours of this burial ground that dates from 1731. More than 40 noted, nefarious, or notorious Dover citizens will come to life beside their headstones, regaling visitors with tales of mirth, woe, and amazement.

Among the residents lifting their voices in the cemetery will be sea captains, business leaders, soldiers, politicians, ministers, lost lovers, and even a famous opera singer.

Movie and discussion on gender equality at the Dover Public Library

Without an education, Hermione may never have met Harry Potter and helped to defeat Lord Voldemort; Matilda would never have discovered her powers; and Jane Eyre would never have escaped a miserable life. How would your favorite book change if the heroine suddenly disappeared?

If we imagine what our beloved stories would be like without the heroines, imagine what our world would look like without equal education for all genders. Education inequality affects all of us, and around the globe thousands of girls are prevented from attending school or are unable to finish due to discrimination, tradition, poverty, or violence.

On Wednesday, Oct. 18 at 7 p.m, in the Dover Public Library's Trustees Room, a film will be shown addressing

the global girls' education crisis, followed by a discussion about how gender inequality around the world impacts girls and women's education.

The movie being presented is a CNN film called "We Will Rise: Michelle Obama's Mission to Educate Girls Around the World". It was produced last year in celebration of International Day of the Girl and celebrates the power of girls' education. It follows Michelle Obama, actors Meryl Streep and Freida Pinto, and CNN journalist Isha Sesay as they meet a group of girls from Liberia and Morocco who have overcome the odds to get an education. The film is 50 minutes and rated TV-PG.

This program is sponsored by OWLS, a community service group affiliated with the Dover Public Library and a member of the Harry Potter Alliance (HPA). It is part of a campaign called "A World Without Hermione" jointly run by HPA and "She's the First".

The Harry Potter Alliance is a worldwide non-profit organization that uses the power of volunteering to turn fans into heroes, while "She's the First" helps to fund scholarships and mentorships, as well as basic needs for girls seeking an education in developing countries.

The City of Dover 2017 fall leaf collection will take place on the following weeks:


- Nov. 6-10

Support the Dover Veterans Park with engraved brick donation

A new City park to honor all veterans is expected to be constructed and open this fall, in time for Veterans Day. The park will be located on the front lawn of the McConnell Center.

To help fund the construction and maintenance of the Dover Veterans Park, park organizers have launched a brick donation campaign. The bricks will be installed on the entrance walkway and engraved with the name, military rank and branch and years of service for individual service members. Bricks can be purchased by anyone wishing to honor a veteran who has served our country. A red 4-inch by 8-inch brick costs \$50. A larger 8-inch by 8-inch brick costs \$100.

The Dover Veterans Park was first proposed by a committee consisting of Mayor Karen Weston, City Councilor John O'Connor, City Manager J. Michael Joyal, Jr., and Recreation Director Gary Bannon. The City Council subsequently included some funding for the park in the annual Capital Improvements Program. The

McConnell Center was chosen as an ideal location because it is near some of the City's memorial monuments and named after Capt. Joseph McConnell, a Dover native, Korean War Veteran, and the first Triple Jet Ace.

The Dover Veterans Park is intended to recognize all veterans.

Oct. 19, 1652 - The General Court ordered that the northern bounds of Dover should extend from the first fall of the Newichawannock River (Salmon Falls) upon a north and by west line four miles.

Oct. 15, 1693 - At 10 o'clock in the morning, a great rumbling noise was heard by many in Dover towards the northeast, supposed to be a considerable earthquake. (Pike)



Oct. 16, 1746 - The day is appointed by the Governor with advice of Council, as a day of public fasting and prayer on account of the French fleet now upon or near our coast, the shortness of our harvest of corn, etc.

Oct. 13, 1846 - A friendly address to the people of Dover, from the people of Dover, in England, in favor of peace, was received by the selectmen and published in the

Enquirer.

Oct. 14, 1855 - One of the heaviest thunder showers of the season took place this evening about 11 o'clock. The lightning struck in various places, shattering buildings, etc., and the watchman at the gas works was knocked down and stunned.
