The Supervisors of the Checklist will meet on Friday, Oct. 25, 2019, from 7 to 7:30 p.m., and Monday, Oct. 28, from 6 to 6:30 p.m., at the City Clerk's office at City Hall, 288 Central Ave.

During the Oct. 25 session, supervisors will register new voters, make changes of address and name, make changes of party affiliation, and make other necessary corrections to the checklist. The Oct. 25 session is the last opportunity to change party affiliation before the Presidential Primary. The Secretary of State has not yet set a date for the Presidential Primary.

During the Oct. 28 session, supervisors can register new voters, make changes of address and name, and make other necessary corrections to the checklist, except for party affiliation changes.

Party affiliation cannot be changed on the day of the Municipal Election, Nov. 5, 2019.

Planning Board, City Council receive Capital Improvements Program

The City of Dover's Capital Improvements Program (CIP) for fiscal years 2021 through 2026 was presented to the City Council and Planning Board at a joint workshop on Wednesday, Oct. 16, 2019.

An online resource, including a copy of the proposed CIP, additional video content, and more information, can be found on the [City's website at this link](#).

The Planning Board and City Council will continue to review the CIP over the next several weeks. The City Council is expected to vote on the proposed CIP in November or December.

The CIP is a tool which outlines a schedule for the next six years for capital projects and purchases over \$25,000 which maintain and improve the community infrastructure.

The CIP is updated annually and involves input sessions with the Planning Board and City Council, including public hearings. The Planning Board will forward its recommendations to the City Council, after which the City Council will discuss and ultimately approve the CIP later this year.

Drug Take Back Day is Oct. 26

On Saturday, Oct. 26, 2019 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., the Dover Police Department and the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) will give the public another opportunity to prevent prescription drug and opioid abuse and theft by ridding their homes of potentially dangerous expired, unused, and unwanted prescription drugs. Medications can be brought to the Dover Police Department at 46 Chestnut St. for disposal. The service is free, anonymous, and no questions will be asked.

For the first time, the DEA and local law enforcement will accept vape pens and e-cigarette devices in addition to the traditionally accepted unused or expired medications. Batteries must be removed by the consumer from all devices before disposal.

Dover, like communities across the state, continues to see the effects of the opioid crisis and youth vaping rates. Just last year, Dover experienced 12 fatal opioid overdoses in the city in addition to dozens of non-fatal overdoses. While the medical examiner is still investigating cases for 2019, the Dover Police Department suspects there have been six fatal opioid overdoses this calendar year.

Youth vaping is on the rise and a concern. The Youth Risk Behavior Survey shows that one third of all Dover High School students have used an electronic vapor product at least once in their life.

"Drug Take Back Days are an important part of the Dover Police Department's prevention strategy," said Dover Police Chief William Breault. "We know that teens are more likely to misuse substances if they are easy to access. This event provides the members of the public an opportunity to safely dispose of the medications and vape devices in their homes."

Americans are now advised that their usual methods for disposing of unused medicines - flushing them down the toilet or throwing them in the trash - pose potential safety and health hazards. The DEA states that unused prescription drugs thrown in the trash can be retrieved and abused or illegally sold. Unused drugs that are flushed contaminate the water supply. Vape devices thrown in household trash can be a fire hazard.

If unable to attend a collection event during the national take-back day, a permanent takeback box is available at Wentworth-

Douglass Hospital. This summer, the hospital installed a disposal box in the main lobby of the the hospital, providing the community with an additional disposal option. The box is available seven days a week.

Fall leaf collection begins Oct. 28

The City of Dover 2019 fall leaf collection will take place on the following weeks:

Bagged leaves will be picked up on the same day as trash and recycling.

Grass clippings, leaves, brush and yard waste are also accepted at the Recycling Center during regular operating hours, Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday, 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

This week in DOVER HISTORY



The following events are recorded in "Notable Events in the History of Dover, New Hampshire: From the First Settlement in 1623 to 1865," by George Wadleigh, and several other historical sources.

For more on the history of Dover, settled in 1623 and the oldest permanent settlement in New Hampshire and seventh oldest in the country, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street; and the Woodman Museum, Central Avenue. Oct. 19, 1652 - The General Court ordered that the northern bounds of Dover should extend from the first fall of the Newichawannock River (Salmon Falls) upon a north and by west line four miles.



Oct. 21, 1657 - It was ordered that all the inhabitants should have a respect to the order made concerning the falling of timber, which was that no man should fall above five trees for clapboards or pipe staves before he had wrought them up into those articles. Whoever violated this order should be liable to the penalties before specified, and Joseph Austin was chosen for Dover Neck and Thomas Footman for Oyster River to see that the order was enforced, being allowed one half of the fines which were incurred. Any other inhabitant who should inform and prove violations of the order should have the like part of the fines.



Oct. 18, 1669 - The town made a donation of 32 pounds to Harvard College for the purpose of erecting a new brick building, the old wooden one being small and decayed.

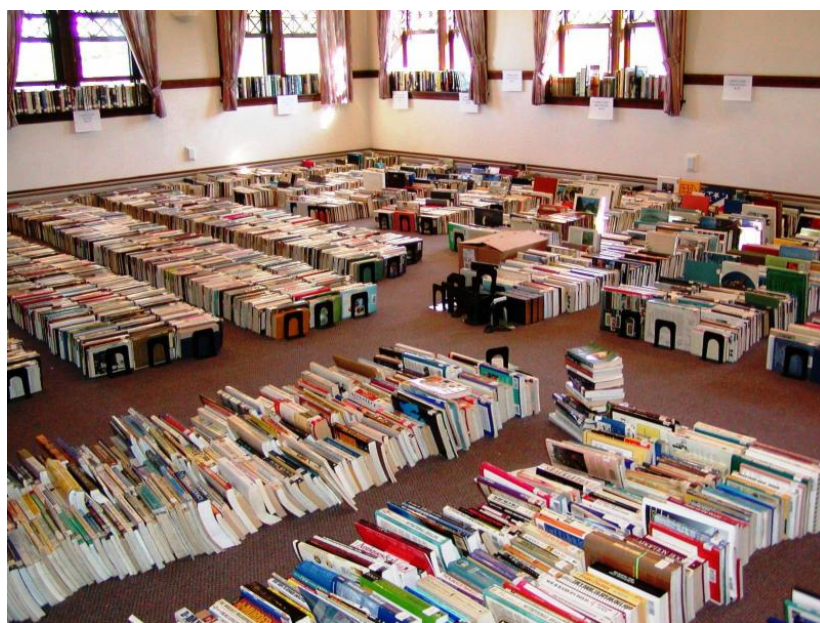


Oct. 20, 1823 - Died in Lee, Walter Cooper, aged 49, the first cashier of Strafford Bank in Dover.



Oct. 22, 1840 - A warehouse near Young's Tannery on the Landing burned down, and a large quantity of merchandise destroyed.





Friends of the Library annual booksale begins Oct. 25

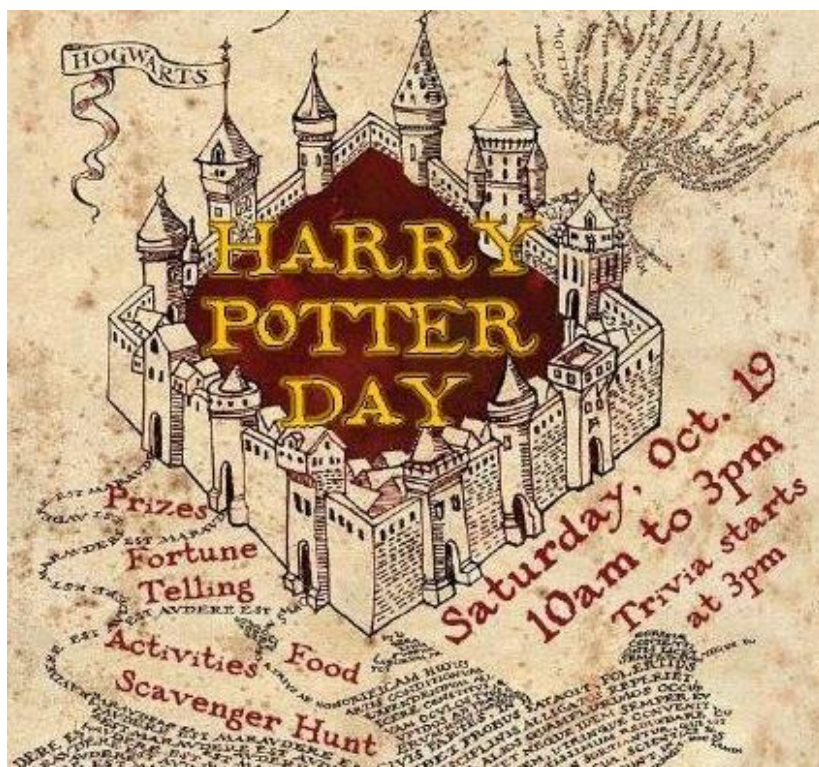
Doors open at 9 a.m. on Friday, Oct. 25 for the Friends of the Library's annual, two-week-long, gigantic fall booksale at the Dover Public Library. Only library cardholders will be able to purchase items on the first day of the sale so be sure to bring your Dover borrower's card with you on the 25th. The sale opens to non-cardholders and the general public at 9 a.m. on Saturday, Oct. 26.

Thousands of paperbacks, hardcover books, and media items for all ages will be available at prices from 50 cents to \$2. Many of the sale items are books donated to the library, while others are items discarded from the library's collections. Booksale prices will be further reduced on Wednesday, Oct. 30, and during week two of the booksale, Nov. 4-10, the remainder of the items will be sold for the bargain price of just \$1 per bag or boxful. Any leftover books will be given away for free beginning Tuesday, Nov. 12.

The library requests that no further book donations be made. Donations will again be accepted after Nov. 18.

All proceeds benefit the Friends of the Library, a 501(c)3 charitable organization which last year donated over \$15,000 to the library for museum passes, children's and adult programs, furnishings and equipment. Applications to join the Friends of the Library are available at the library's circulation desk. Membership is \$15 annually or \$10 for seniors. Friends who work at the booksale receive a 50 percent discount on purchases.

The Strand, located on Third Street, is a nonprofit, multi-arts and entertainment center.

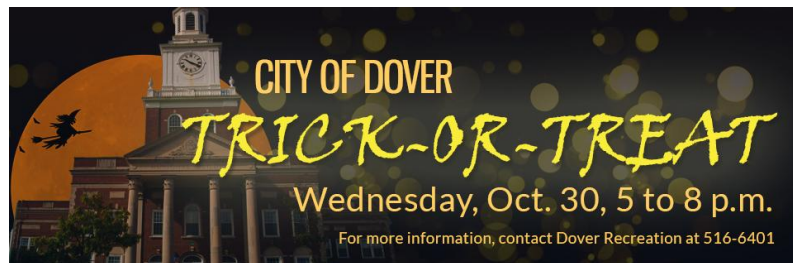
