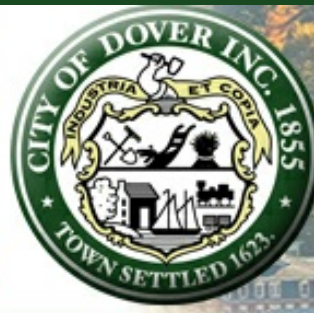

Dover High School cosmetology students craft wigs for cancer patients

Cosmetology students at Dover High School's Regional Career and Technical Center have partnered with EBeauty Community Inc. to support Beauty Without Boundaries, a nonprofit providing free refurbished wigs to cancer patients nationwide.

The collaboration aims to help the students practice their skills while giving back. The second- and third-year students are washing, styling and crafting personal messages called "love notes" to accompany each donated wig that will be distributed to recipients across the U.S. The love notes are meant to provide encouragement to the recipients.

Beauty Without Boundaries collects donated wigs and ships them for refurbishing before distribution. Wigs can cost hundreds to thousands of dollars and are not always covered by insurance.

Dover CTC's three-year cosmetology program is one of only two in New Hampshire that meets certification requirements. Teachers and students are enthusiastic about the partnership that allows them to refine their skills while supporting community members in need.

Throughout the school year, the students have ambitious plans to clean, cut, color, and style hundreds of wigs, keeping the preferences of the recipients in mind during the styling process.

To fund shipping costs, students and teachers are actively raising money.



Water treatment plant enters final phase of construction

Construction of the Pudding Hill Water Treatment Plant is 90% complete. The contractor, Penta Corporation, told the city earlier this month that it is on track to have the plant substantially complete by February 2024.

With the building fully enclosed, work is focused on getting the filtering equipment ready for testing and cleaning the wells that will be used by the treatment plant. Construction on the water treatment plant began in the spring of 2022.

The plant, off Stonewall Drive, is a three-tier filtration system that will remove PFAS, 1,4 dioxane, MTBE, iron, manganese, and other compounds from the Pudding Hill aquifer. Once online next year, the aquifer will be capable of providing up to 40% of the city's daily drinking water needs. The city has not pumped from the aquifer since 2019, when it voluntarily took offline when aquifer monitoring wells detected plumes of PFAS contaminants to not further draw contaminants into the aquifer before the treatment plant was completed.

In 2021, the City Council approved a settlement and funding agreement between the city and New England Metal Recycling, LLC., for the treatment plant to remove PFAS the city believes migrated from the former Madbury Metals site. The settlement provides \$11 million for the construction, engineering, and operational maintenance of a water treatment plant designed to remove contaminants from the drinking water, allowing the City of Dover to utilize the Pudding Hill aquifer again. The city has also received nearly \$5.2 million in

Dover residents give high marks for quality of life in National Citizen Survey

Results from the [2023 National Community Survey](#) show Dover residents continue to rate their community as an excellent place to live, giving high marks for quality of life, public safety, and city services.

The survey, conducted over the summer by the National Research Center for the City of Dover, polled residents on topics including the local economy, education, health care, infrastructure, and more. Out of nearly 120 categories, Dover ranked equal to or above benchmarks from other U.S. cities surveyed.

Overall, 89% of respondents rated Dover as an excellent or good place to live, and 87% said they would recommend living here. Residents identified the economy, safety, infrastructure, and environment as top priorities.

The survey found residents gave high ratings to public safety services like police, fire and EMS. Other highly-ranked services included public schools, parks, library services, drinking water and storm drainage.

Lower ratings went to yard waste pickup, housing variety and availability, and cost of living.

"The National Community Survey provides valuable insights directly from Dover residents on where we're doing well and where we can improve," said City Manager J. Michael Joyal, Jr. "This feedback guides our budgeting and helps ensure we're responsive to our citizens' needs."

This year was the ninth time Dover has conducted the National Community Survey, conducted every two years. The city commissioned the National Research Center to analyze this year's responses and compare them to other U.S. cities. Survey findings will help shape budget priorities and recommendations for sustaining and improving city services.

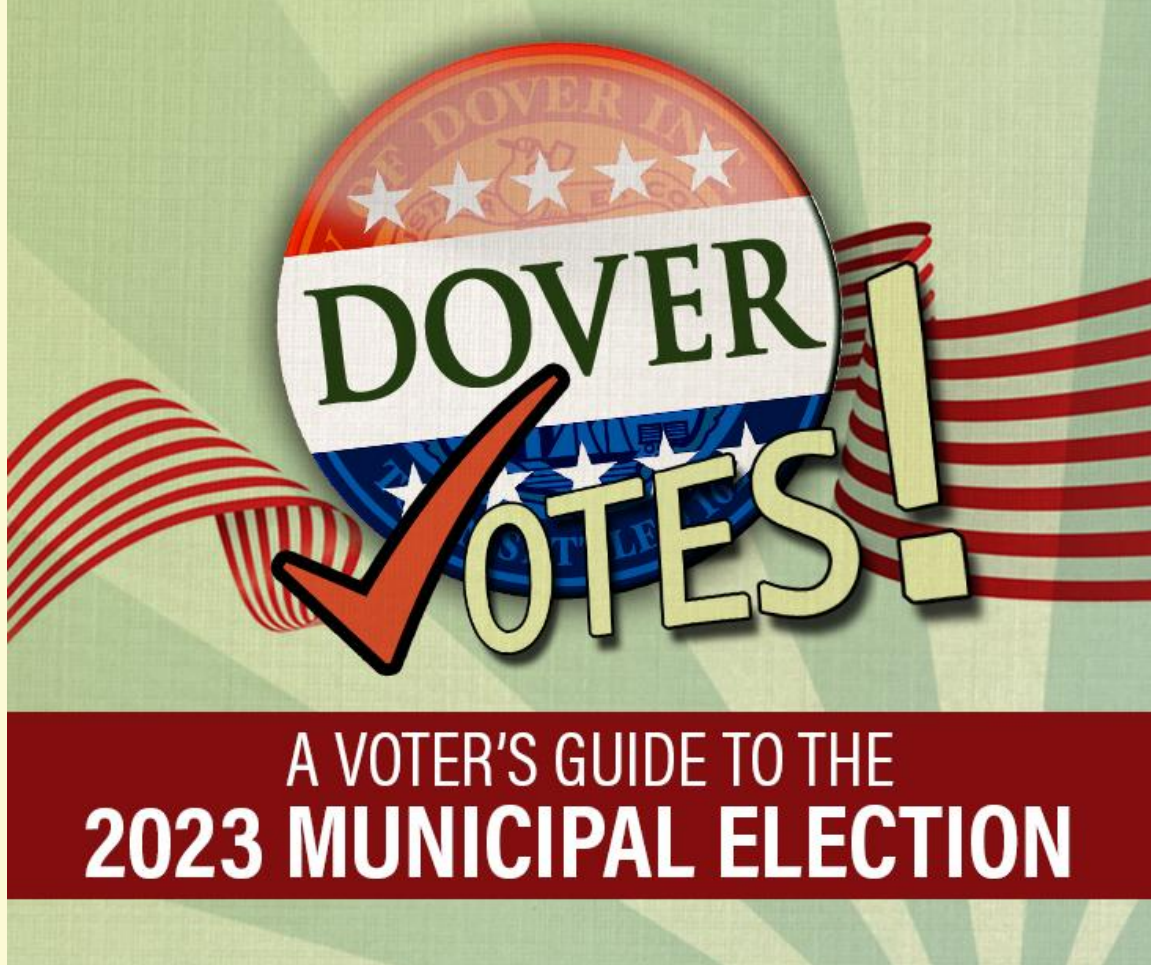
Skate Park grand opening ceremony postponed to Sunday

Waste Management has an odor hotline that residents are encouraged to call if they believe they are smelling odors emanating from the Waste Management's Turnkey Landfill in Rochester.

The hotline number is 855-514-5157. Callers may request to receive a callback from Waste Management about their issue.

Community Services Director John Storer has been in contact with Waste Management's

environmental compliance manager about the issue. The compliance manager noted there have been some odor issues due to the heavier than usual rain this summer, which can impact their gas extraction system. The manager also noted other projects Waste Management is undertaking to mitigate odors.

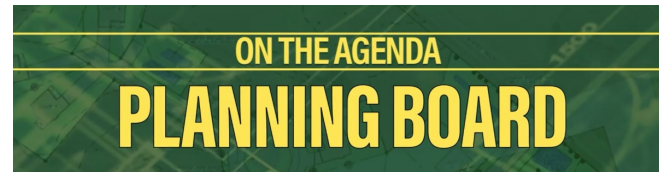

The following events are from various historical records, sources, and texts about the history of Dover.

For more on the history of Dover, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street, and the Woodman Museum on Central Avenue. The Public Library also maintains an online collection of historical information [located here](#).

Oct. 25, 1665 — The town selectmen ordered that because there were several disputes between the people of Dover and the neighbors at Oyster River, anyone with grievances should meet to state their case before the next public town meeting at the meeting house on Dover Neck. At the meeting, they would have an opportunity to explain their differences in order to settle disputes peacefully.

Oct. 25, 1677 — The residents of Dover wrote a petition to the King of England on this day, asking to remain part of the Massachusetts Bay Colony. For many years, Massachusetts ruled Dover, even though Dover's residents originally lived under the King's protection. The people of Dover were happy being part of Massachusetts and did not want to be under the direct control of the King. They wrote the petition because they were worried the King would try to take control of Dover away from Massachusetts. In the petition, they told the King they were his loyal subjects, but they wanted him to allow Dover to stay under the government of Massachusetts. Thirty-four men signed the petition, some by writing their names and some by making their mark "X" because they could not write.

Oct. 27, 1801 — Col. Otis Baker of Dover died on this day at the age of 75. He was a member of the House of Representatives and of the Committee of Safety during the Revolution and a Justice of the Court of Common Pleas from 1773 to 1785.

Oct. 29, 1828 — The materials from the old jail on Pleasant Street, taken down earlier that year, were sold on this day.

Oct. 25, 1962 — On this day, Lee Wulf arrives at Woodman Park Elementary School for a

much-anticipated appearance. Lee Wulff was a popular and well-known outdoorsman and angler. His profound love for fly fishing led him to become an emblematic figure in the recreational fishing community. Beyond just being a fly fisherman, Wulff was also an accomplished artist, pilot, author, filmmaker, outfitter, and fervent conservationist. His advocacy for ethical fishing practices, notably the catch and release principle, showcased his deep-seated commitment to the conservation of fish populations, particularly the Atlantic Salmon.

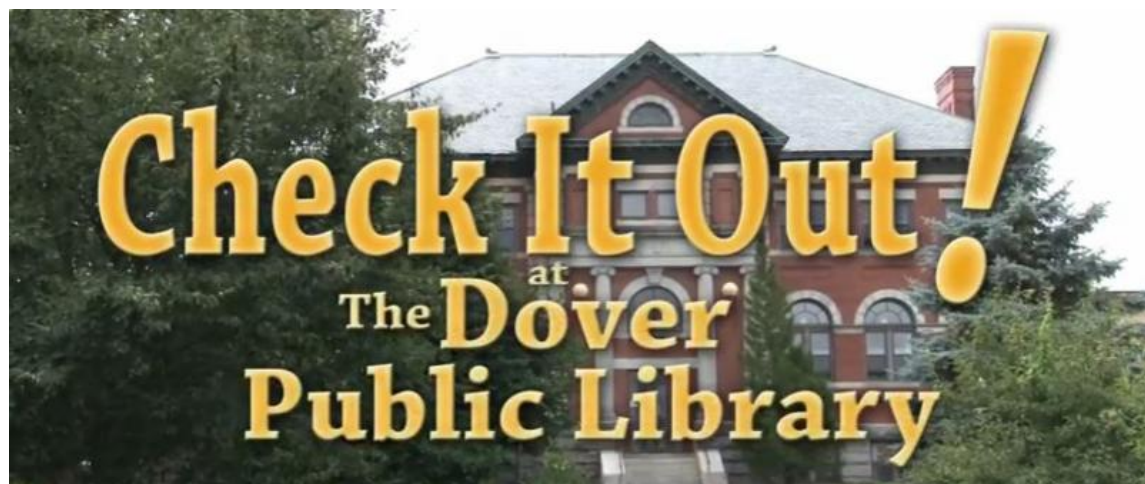


'Voices of Dover' series: Thomas Massingham

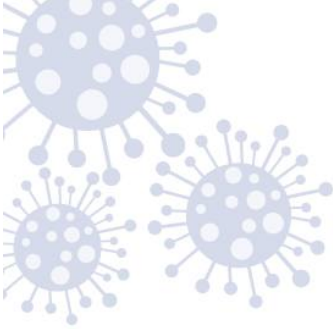


Water to be temporarily shut off on Monday on Abbey Lane
