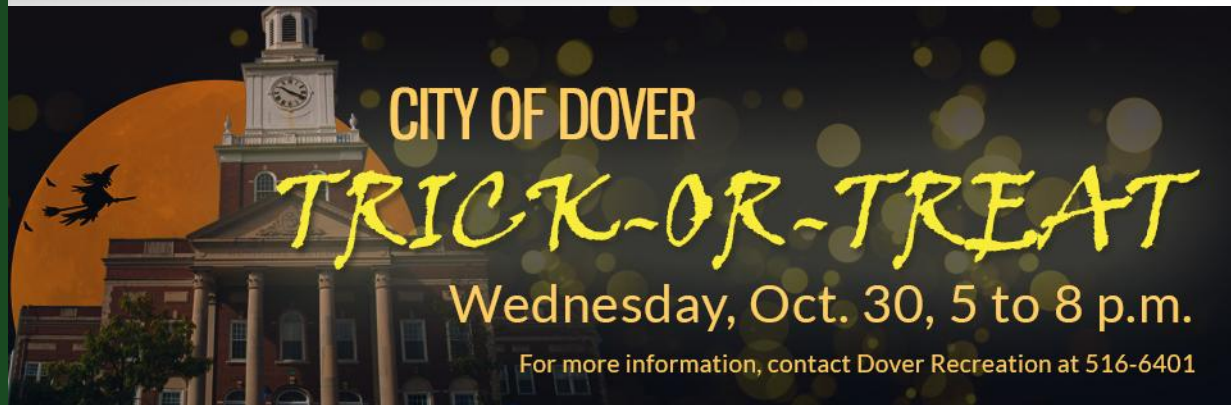

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## Road closures and parking restrictions in place Saturday for Pumpkin Dash

Dover Police Chief William M. Breault announces the following road closures and parking restrictions for the Dover Middle School Pumpkin Dash 5K run/walk event, organized by and benefiting the Dover Middle School Parent/Teacher Association. This event is part of the 2019 Dover Race Series, but is a completely new course that replaces the former Trick or Trot 5K.



On Saturday, Oct. 26, 2019, at 9 a.m., the following road closures will be in effect to accommodate the course:

- Bellamy Road will be closed to northbound traffic, away from Route 108, but remain open one-way to southbound traffic, 9 to 9:45 a.m.
- Cataract Avenue will be closed to all traffic between Bellamy Road and Rutland Street, 9 to 9:45 a.m.
- Rutland Street will be closed to through traffic - open to local traffic only - between Silver Street and Central Avenue from 9 to 10 a.m.

Between 8:30 and 10 a.m., motorists should expect lane shifts along Route 108 between Rutland Street and Bellamy Road, and potential delays at the intersection of Route 108 and the Route 16 Exit 7 Southbound on/off ramp.

Parking restrictions will be posted along Daley Drive, which connects the Dover Middle School to Alumni Drive. Event parking will be available in the Dover Middle School and Dover High School parking lots.

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## River Street to remain closed through Oct. 29

River Street will remain closed to all traffic through Oct. 29 while crews excavate the area to install a gas main. The gas main will cross the Makem Bridge and Cochecho River, connecting River Street with Washington Street. River Street will remain closed to all traffic on weekdays between 7 a.m. and 6 p.m. through Oct. 29 while crews excavate the area to install a gas main. The gas main will cross the Makem Bridge and Cochecho River, connecting River Street with Washington Street.

While the work is ongoing River Street will be closed completely, between Washington Street and Henry Law Avenue.

Parking permit holders who need access to the River Street parking areas can do so via the Washington Street side, through the construction zone. Traffic control personnel are on site to help manage traffic.

This work was originally scheduled to be completed by Oct. 18, but additional excavation is necessary.

River Street is expected to open on Wednesday, Oct. 30. Washington Street, from Main Street to River Street, will remain restricted to one lane through Nov. 1.

## Central Avenue traffic restriction in place beginning Oct. 25

Beginning Friday, Oct. 25, a portion of Central Avenue will be reduced to one lane during underground utility work adjacent to the Cochecho Mill Courtyard.

The traffic restriction will remain in place on weekdays from 7 a.m. to 6 p.m. In addition, while the work is ongoing, four parking spaces will be unavailable on weekdays from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m.

The trench work will eventually cross Central Avenue from the courtyard to First Street and may require additional parking restrictions on First Street once the Central Avenue work is completed. The work, which is being conducted by an Eversource contractor, is expected to last about two weeks.

## Night utility work to affect downtown traffic and parking beginning Nov. 3

On Sunday, Nov. 3, at 8 p.m., work is tentatively scheduled to begin to install a gas main from Chapel Street to First Street. This work is expected to continue from 8 p.m. to 6 a.m. each evening, Sunday through Thursday, for approximately two to three weeks.

As the work progresses, traffic will be reduced to one lane on either a portion of Main Street northbound or on Central Avenue southbound. Initially, this work will require the temporary, complete closure of Chapel Street at Main Street, and the Franklin Plaza loop. Detours will be in effect to facilitate reverse direction traffic. The Janetos Plaza will remain accessible from all driveways except the southbound, left turn at the mouth of Chapel Street.

Additionally, parking will be prohibited in the westerly spaces along Central Avenue, from Second to Third streets, for the overnight hours from 8 p.m. to 6 a.m. only.

Once the work on Main Street and Central Avenue is complete, additional parking restrictions will be in place along the first block of First Street and the first 100 feet of Chapel Street.

## Drug Take Back Day is Saturday

On Saturday, Oct. 26, 2019 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., the Dover Police Department and the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) will give the public another opportunity to prevent prescription drug and opioid abuse and theft by ridding their homes of potentially dangerous expired, unused, and unwanted prescription drugs. Medications can be brought to the Dover Police Department at 46 Chestnut St. for disposal. The service is free, anonymous, and no questions will be asked.

For the first time, the DEA and local law enforcement will accept vape pens and e-cigarette devices in addition to the traditionally accepted unused or expired medications. Batteries must be removed by the consumer from all devices before disposal.

Dover, like communities across the state, continues to see the effects of the opioid crisis and youth vaping rates. Just last year, Dover experienced 12 fatal opioid overdoses in the city in addition to dozens of non-fatal overdoses. While the medical examiner is still investigating cases for 2019, the Dover Police Department suspects there have been six fatal opioid overdoses this calendar year.

Youth vaping is on the rise and a concern. The Youth Risk Behavior Survey shows that one third of all Dover High School students have used an electronic vapor product at least once in their life.

"Drug Take Back Days are an important part of the Dover Police Department's prevention strategy," said Dover Police Chief William Breault. "We know that teens are more likely to misuse substances if they are easy to access. This event provides the members of the public an opportunity to safely dispose of the medications and vape devices in their homes."

Americans are now advised that their usual methods for disposing of unused medicines - flushing them down the toilet or throwing them in the trash - pose potential safety and health hazards. The DEA states that unused prescription drugs thrown in the trash can be retrieved and abused or illegally sold. Unused drugs that are flushed contaminate the water supply. Vape devices thrown in household trash can be a fire hazard.

If unable to attend a collection event during the national take-back day, a permanent takeback box is available at Wentworth-Douglass Hospital. This summer, the hospital installed a disposal box in the main lobby of the hospital, providing the community with an additional disposal option. The box is available seven days a week.

Grass clippings, leaves, brush and yard waste are also accepted at the Recycling Center during regular operating hours, Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday, 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

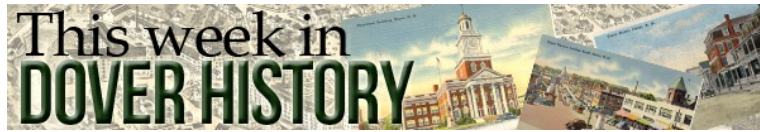

The following events are recorded in "Notable Events in the History of Dover, New Hampshire: From the First Settlement in 1623 to 1865," by George Wadleigh, and several other historical sources.

For more on the history of Dover, settled in 1623 and the oldest permanent settlement in New Hampshire and seventh oldest in the country, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street; and the Woodman Museum, Central Avenue. The Public Library also maintains an online collection of historical information, [located here](#).



**Oct. 27, 1647** - It was ordered that Mr. Ambrose Gibbons, William Pomfrett, Anthony Emery, Richard Waldron and Thomas Layton treat with Mr. Hatevil Nutter and Company of Elders, concerning the erecting and setting up of a saw mill, and as the parties should agree it would be the act of the town. By the agreement which follows, the "Company of Elders" aforesaid, which seems to have consisted of Elder Nutter and Elder Starbuck, were granted a commodious and fit place at the upper or lower fall, for the setting up of a saw mill, with what timber and wood should be necessary for that purpose. They were allowed to fall either oak or pine for sawing, and were to pay for every tree six pence to the town, either in boards or plank."



**Oct. 25, 1665** - The selectmen, in view of the fact that "many persons do fall timber and make staves without order, whereby the town and the settled inhabitants are much injured," empowered John Roberts, Thomas Nock and Philip Chesley, or any two of them, to make diligent search into all the woods for such transgressors of the town's order, and to seize their spoil for the use of the town, the informers to have one half for their pains.



**Oct. 30, 1703** - Christopher Patrick, a soldier, was slain by the Indians between the Cochecho River and Salmon Falls, about half an hour after sunset. He had five guns discharged upon him, and was shot with many bullets.

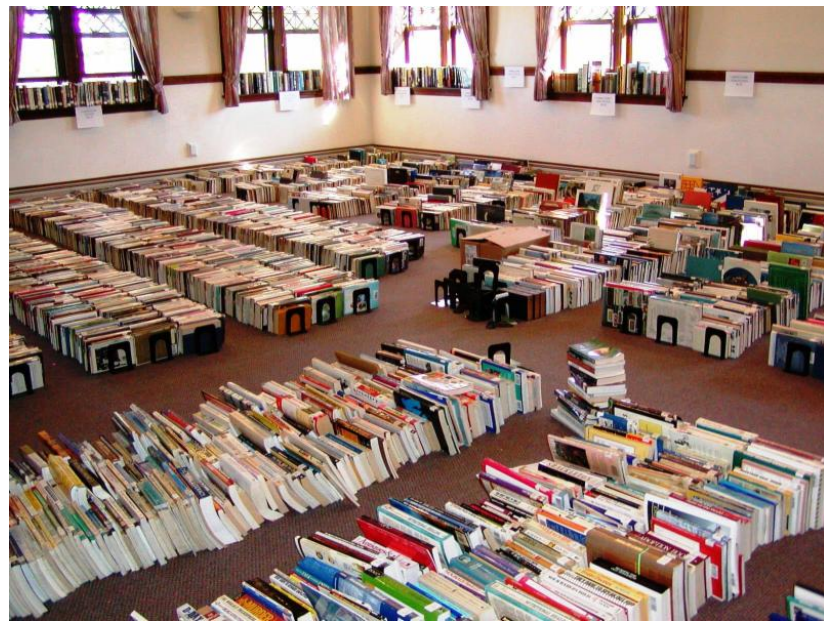


**Oct. 29, 1727** - An earthquake occurred of which it is recorded that "the shake was very hard, and was attended with a terrible noise, something like thunder. The houses trembled as if they were falling; divers chimneys were cracked and some had their

tops broken off."



**Oct. 31, 1846** - A dwelling house and barn with a yoke of oxen, a cow, and a large quantity of hay, belonging to Moses Whittier on Academy (Waldron) street, were burned. The same night another barn belonging to the same person, a mile distant, at Whittier's Falls, was burned. Both fires were caused by incendiaries, for the detection of whom the selectmen were authorized to offer a reward of \$500.



## Friends of the Library annual booksale begins today

Doors open at 9 a.m. on Friday, Oct. 25 for the Friends of the Library's annual, two-week-long, gigantic fall booksale at the Dover Public Library. Only library cardholders will be able to purchase items on the first day of the sale so be sure to bring your Dover borrower's card with you on the 25th. The sale opens to non-cardholders and the general public at 9 a.m. on Saturday, Oct. 26.

Thousands of paperbacks, hardcover books, and media items for all ages will be available at prices from 50 cents to \$2. Many of the sale items are books donated to the library, while others are items discarded from the library's collections. Booksale prices will be further reduced on Wednesday, Oct. 30, and during week two of the booksale, Nov. 4-10, the remainder of the items will be sold for the bargain price of just \$1 per bag or

boxful. Any leftover books will be given away for free beginning Tuesday, Nov. 12.

The library requests that no further book donations be made. Donations will again be accepted after Nov. 18.

All proceeds benefit the Friends of the Library, a 501(c)3 charitable organization which last year donated over \$15,000 to the library for museum passes, children's and adult programs, furnishings and equipment. Applications to join the Friends of the Library are available at the library's circulation desk. Membership is \$15 annually or \$10 for seniors. Friends who work at the booksale receive a 50 percent discount on purchases.

## King Tide photo contest seeks Dover entries

The New Hampshire Coastal Adaptation Workgroup (NHCAW) invites Dover residents to grab their cameras and document extreme high tides during its King Tide Photo Contest to raise awareness of New Hampshire's rising tides. The contest begins Sunday, Oct. 27 and continues through Wednesday, Oct. 30.

A King Tide occurs when the moon, Earth, and sun are aligned, and the sun's gravity helps tug on the oceans a little more, causing the tides to be higher. These extreme high tides give us a glimpse what sea-level rise will look like in our region.

Photographing King Tides is an effective way to help coastal communities identify areas prone to flooding, visualize potential impacts of sea-level rise, and start planning for the future.

Dover is one of several tidally influenced communities, and

NHCAW is looking for entries that show the effects of tidal conditions in Dover.

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## View Dover maps and property data online

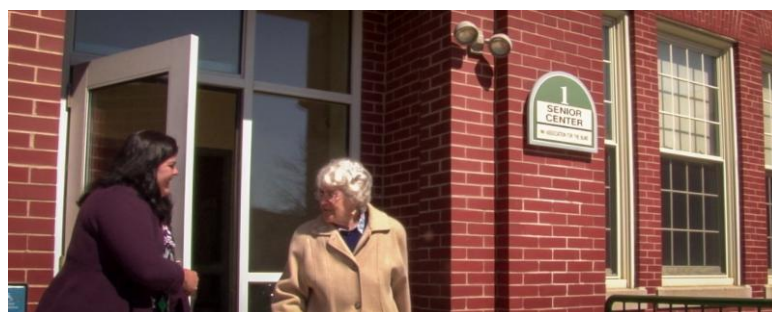
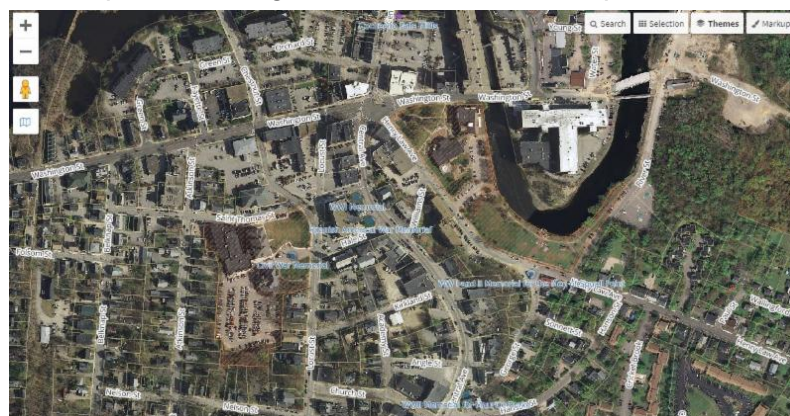
The City of Dover offers online access to City maps and property records through a web-based mapping platform. Explore neighborhoods and access local property data including:

- When is trash pickup at this address?
- What ward is this address and where do I vote?
- What zoning district am I in?
- What is the valuation of properties on this street?

To begin, find the area of interest by zooming in on the map or clicking on the "Search" button to search by address. Next, click on the "Themes" button to find select information such as wards and polling places, conservation and recreation lands or zoning maps.

Maps may be customized using "Markup" draw and measure tools. Save and share maps via a link or print.
