

# Railroad work at Central Avenue crossing to close road for three days

Pan Am Railways, which owns and operates the railroad tracks used by the Amtrak Downeaster and various freight trains, has determined the immediate replacement of the Central Avenue (Route 108) grade crossing rails is necessary to maintain the safety and integrity of the rail corridor. Because of the length of these rails and the scope of work, a complete closure of Central Avenue in both directions is required.

The work will begin at 7:30 a.m. on Tuesday, Oct. 30, 2018 and will last approximately three full days, with the possibility of extending to a fourth day, through Friday, Nov. 2, in the event of adverse weather conditions. Once the work begins, the Central Avenue crossing will be closed day and night to all traffic until the work is complete. Pedestrians may still be able to pass across the tracks while the work is being performed, but pedestrians with walking disabilities will not be able to cross. Additionally, the intersection of Fourth Street at Central Avenue will be closed to allow room for the work.

Traffic detours will be in effect in both directions. Additional traffic congestion should be expected on nearby downtown streets, and motorists who do not need to travel downtown should avoid the area entirely. From the north, the primary

detour will be Chestnut Street. A secondary detour not available for trucks and buses will be in effect via Pierce Street and Broadway. From the south, the primary detour will be Third Street to Chestnut Street. A secondary detour not available for trucks and buses will be in effect via Broadway and Pierce Street. Drivers are reminded that no vehicles exceeding 9'6" in height can pass under the Broadway railroad trestle.

The City of Dover Community Services Department will assist in performing some of the work to repair or upgrade some of the underground utilities that pass beneath the rails.

Businesses is the immediate vicinity of the tracks, including Dover House of Pizza and Dunkin's Donuts, will remain open and accessible. Access to the Holy Rosary Credit Union parking lot from the Central Avenue side may be limited on Tuesday, Oct. 30.

COAST and Wildcat Transit routes will be adjusted, but commuters are encouraged to check the status of current routes during the work.

#### Drug Take Back Day is Saturday

On Saturday, Oct. 27, 2018 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., the Dover Police Department and the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) will give the public another opportunity to prevent prescription drug and opioid abuse and theft by ridding their homes of potentially dangerous expired, unused, and unwanted prescription drugs. Medications can be brought to the Dover Police Department at 46 Chestnut St. for disposal. The service is free, anonymous, and no questions will be asked.

Dover, like communities across the state, continues to see the tragic effects of the opioid epidemic.

According to the National Institute on Drug Abuse 80 percent of people who use heroin abused painkillers first. This initiative addresses a vital public safety and public

health issue. Medicines that languish in home cabinets are highly susceptible to diversion, misuse, and abuse. Rates of prescription drug abuse in the U.S. are alarmingly high, as are the number of accidental poisonings and overdoses due to these drugs. Surveys show one in five New Hampshire high school students have used a prescription drug that was not prescribed to them.

Dover has participated in the take back initiative since 2010 and has collected over 2,000 pounds prescription drugs.

Americans are now advised that their usual methods for disposing of unused medicines - flushing them down the toilet or throwing them in the trash - pose potential safety and health hazards. The DEA states that unused prescription drugs thrown in the trash can be retrieved and abused or illegally sold. Unused drugs that are flushed contaminate the water supply.

If unable to attend a collection event during the national take-back day, a permanent takeback box is available at Wentworth-Douglass Hospital. This summer, the hospital installed a disposal box in the main lobby of the the hospital, providing the community with an additional disposal option. The box is available seven days a week.

## This week in DOVER HISTORY

The following events are recorded in "Notable Events in the History of Dover, New Hampshire: From the First Settlement in 1623 to 1865," by George Wadleigh, and several other historical sources.

For more on the history of Dover, settled in 1623 and the oldest permanent settlement in New Hampshire and seventh oldest in the country, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street; and the Woodman Museum, Central Avenue. The Public Library also maintains an online collection of historical information, located here.



Oct. 27, 1647 - It was ordered that Mr. Ambrose Gibbons, William Pomfrett, Anthony Emery, Richard Waldron and Thomas Layton treat with Mr. Hatevil Nutter and Company of Elders, concerning the erecting and setting up of a saw mill at Campron river, and as the parties should agree it would be the act of the town. By the agreement which follows, the "Company of Elders" aforesaid, which seems to

have consisted of Elder Nutter and Elder Starbuck, were granted a commodious and fit place at the upper or lower fall, for the setting up of a saw mill, with what timber and wood should be necessary for that purpose. They were allowed to fall either oak or pine for sawing, and were to pay for every tree six pence to the town, either in boards or plank.



**Oct. 30, 1703** - Christopher Patrick, a soldier, was slain by the Indians between Quamphegan and Salmon Falls, about half an hour after sunset. He had five guns discharged upon him, and was shot with many bullets.



Oct. 29, 1727 - An earthquake occurred of which it is recorded that "the shake was very hard, and was attended with a terrible noise, something like thunder. The houses trembled as if they were falling; divers chimneys were cracked and some had their tops broken off."



**Oct. 26, 1786** - At a town meeting held for the purpose of taking the minds of the people on the plan for emitting a paper currency agreeably to the requisition of the General Court, 17 voted for accepting the plan as sent out, two for not having any paper currency, and one for having 100,000 pounds emitted to redeem public securities at 20 shillings on the pound and said money to pass in all payments.



Oct. 31, 1846 - A dwelling house and barn with a yoke of oxen, a cow, and a large quantity of hay, belonging to Moses Whittier on Academy (Waldron) street, were burnt. The same night another barn belonging to the same person, a mile distant, at Whittier's Falls, was burnt. Both fires were caused by incendiaries, for the detection of whom the selectmen were authorized to offer a reward of \$500.
