## Apple Harvest Day: A Guide

The 39th annual Apple Harvest Day festival takes over downtown Dover on Saturday, Oct. 7, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. The family-friendly event features live entertainment, food, kids' activities, vendors, contests and more.

## Apple Harvest Day 5k Road Race begins at 8:30 a.m.

Apple Harvest Day will continue its tradition of kicking off the Seacoast's premier fall street festival with a 5k road race. The <u>USATF certified course</u> winds through historic downtown Dover and is perfect for advanced runners as well as beginners and families. Once you finish the race, be sure to stick around for some North County Cider! Each runner over the age of 21 will receive two complimentary beverages, with non-alcoholic apple cider available for minors. Saturday: 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. **Opening ceremonies, Rotary Arts Pavilion at 9 a.m.** Representatives from the City of Dover, Greater Dover Chamber of Commerce and event underwriter, First Seacoast Bank, will gather for the ceremonial "first bite" of an apple, kicking off the day. The Dover High School Marching Band finishes the Opening Ceremony with a rousing performance.

## Parking and traffic restrictions in place Saturday for Apple Harvest Day

Dover Police Chief William M. Breault announces the following street closures and parking restrictions for the Greater Dover Chamber of Commerce's 39th annual Apple Harvest Day festival on Saturday, Oct. 7.

On Saturday, Oct. 7, from 6 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., the following streets will be closed to all traffic:

- Central Avenue southbound, from Fourth to Washington streets;
- First, Second and Third streets between Chestnut Street and Central Avenue;
- Henry Law Avenue, from Washington to George streets;
- Williams Street;
- Saint Thomas Street, from Chestnut to Atkinson streets.

Southbound traffic on Central Avenue will be diverted through the Third Street lot to Chestnut Street. Motorists should expect delays in the downtown area. See the map at the bottom of this email for downtown traffic flow.

## Additional road closures for Apple Harvest 5K Road Race

There are additional road closures for the Apple Harvest 5K Road Race, which begins at 8:30 a.m. on Saturday, Oct. 7. The Apple Harvest 5K course starts and finishes on Saint Thomas Street in front of the Dover District Court. Post-race activities will occur on the adjacent McConnell Center front lawn.

The following roads will be closed for the race:

- Saint Thomas Street, from Chestnut to Belknap streets (8 to 10 a.m.)
- Rutland Street, from Silver Street to Cataract Avenue (8:30 to 9:30 a.m.)
- Cataract Avenue, from Bellamy Road to Rutland Street (8:30 to 9:30 a.m.)
- Silver Street, between Belknap and Elm streets (8:30 to 8:45 a.m.)

The closure of Silver Street is expected to be brief to allow race participants to cross Silver Street early in the course. Traffic delays should be expected, however. Additional delays may occur on Bellamy Road near Cataract Avenue, where traffic is restricted to a single, alternating lane while runners are present. The course utilizes a portion of the Dover Community Trail between Fisher and Folsom streets.

## **Parking restrictions**

On-street parking will be prohibited during the overnight of Friday, Oct. 6, and all day on Saturday, Oct. 7, at the following locations:


- Central Avenue, from Third to Washington streets;
- Henry Law Avenue, from Washington to George streets;
- Third Street, from Chestnut Street to Central Avenue;
- Portions of Second Street;
- Portions of First Street;
- Saint Thomas Street, from Chestnut to Atkinson streets.

# City Council seeks public comment on variety of topics

## Public hearings include traffic ordinance changes, budget adjustments, committee structure

The City Council will hold eight public hearings on pending resolutions at the Council's meeting on Wednesday, Oct. 11.

There are two public hearings on two pending changes to the Boards, Commissions and Committees ordinance. One is a proposal to dissolve the City Council's ad-hoc Committee for Graffiti Management and create a permanent standing committee. The other is a minor change to the membership makeup of the Dover Business and Industrial Development Authority.

One public hearing regarding a number of proposed changes to the Vehicles and Traffic ordinance. Some of the proposed changes include:

- Clarifying that non-electric vehicles cannot park in EV-designated spaces in the Orchard Street Parking Garage. A related amendment would impose a \$100 fine for violations.
- Clarifying the rules for parking in the McConnell Center lot.
- Introducing new stop signs at the intersections of Cranbrook Lane and Old Rochester Road, Maplewood and Old Rochester Road, Emerald Lane and Littleworth Road, and Emerald Lane and Emerald Lane Circle.
- Amendments to the No Parking section.

There are two public hearings on fiscal year 2024 appropriations. One is a budget amendment to appropriate an additional \$40,100 to the city's workers' compensation fund. The other is an FY2024 Capital Improvements Program appropriation of \$25,000 to replace the waste oil furnace used to recycle motor vehicle waste oil; the current one dates to 1985.

There are also public hearings on proposed changes to the city's fine schedule, compensation to election workers, and imposing a special assessment on 4 Jackson Brook Terrace related to publicly funded emergency sewer improvements.

Also on the agenda are resolutions to:

- Authorize and fund a sidewalk assessment study that would undertake a condition assessment of all the city's sidewalks to support the sidewalk improvement program, similar to the pavement condition assessment.
- Authorize capacity analysis of the New Rochester Road and Central Avenue sewer line north of Morin Street.
- Award the bid contract to replace the Dover Ice Arena cooling tower that provides cooling for the refrigeration system for the ice rink for \$61,890.
- Award the bid contract to replace the Dover Ice Arena's rubber roof for \$90,900.

## City offices closed on Indigenous Peoples Day

City administrative offices, including City Hall, will be closed on Monday, Oct. 9, 2023 for Indigenous Peoples Day. Regular hours will resume on Tuesday, Oct. 10, 8:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m.

The Public Library is also closed on Indigenous Peoples Day.

Indigenous Peoples Day is a parking holiday in Dover. Metered parking is not required on parking holidays for most public parking, except for the Parking Garage, which is metered parking at all times.

Trash pickup and curbside recycling are not affected by the holiday and will follow a regular schedule.



## City now accepting Community Development Block Grant applications

The City of Dover Department of Planning and Community Development is now accepting applications from public service agencies, qualified individuals and eligible organizations for funding through the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program. The fiscal year spans July 1, 2024 to June 30, 2025.

Applications are available online at <u>www.dover.nh.gov/government/city-operations/planning/community-development/</u> and at the Planning and Community Development Department, located at Dover City Hall, 288 Central Ave., Dover, NH 03820. The application submission deadline is 4 p.m. on Friday, Nov. 17, 2023, and must be submitted via email to Dave Carpenter at <u>d.carpenter@dover.nh.gov</u>.

The City of Dover may reject incomplete or late applications.

Eligible CDBG activities include but are not limited to property acquisition, development or improvement of public facilities, clearance or demolition, public services, and special economic development activities.

To be eligible for funding, applicants must meet specific requirements. They include but are not limited to:

- Submission of a complete and timely application.
- Consistent with the FY2021-25 Consolidated Plan.
- Meet one of the following U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) national objectives:
  - Benefit low and moderate-income people;
  - Prevention of slums or blight;
  - Meet a particularly urgent community development need.

The City of Dover has been a CDBG entitlement community for more than 25 years. The HUD program provides annual grants on a formula basis to entitled cities and counties to develop viable urban communities by providing decent housing and a suitable living environment and by expanding economic opportunities, principally for low- and moderate-income people. HUD awards grants to entitlement community grantees to carry out a wide range of community development activities directed toward revitalizing neighborhoods, economic development, and providing improved community facilities and services. Entitlement communities develop their own programs and funding priorities. The entitlement grant is expected to be available in the summer or fall of 2024. The amount to be received by the City of Dover has yet to be determined by Congress.



## Foraging rights, update on active land conservation projects on Conservation Commission's Oct. 10 agenda

At its Tuesday, Oct. 10 meeting, the Conservation Commission will consider whether to endorse a resolution that would recognize traditional forging rights on the city's public conservation lands.

The draft resolution states, in part, "It shall be the policy of the Dover Conservation Commission to recognize and support foraging rights as outlined in the guidelines presented in the background material."

The background material provides six subsections of guidelines, including that "foraging must be done in a non-destructive manner" and that "hunting, trapping, fishing, and timber harvesting" would not be considered foraging within the meaning of the proposed guidelines.

If endorsed, the resolution will be brought forward to the City Council for adoption.

Also on the agenda is a presentation by Resilience Manager Jackson Kaspari on the active land conservation projects in the city. The presentation is included in the agenda materials. The Commission will also consider a permit application for a Gerry's Lane property.



# Repair underway for faulty traffic sensor on city's north end

The traffic signal at New Rochester Road (Route 108), Hotel Drive and Willand Pond Road is not working efficiently due to a malfunction of signal equipment that senses vehicles. The equipment has been sent out for repair.

When this malfunction occurs, the traffic signals default to a fixed-timing interval until the equipment is fixed. This may mean motorists will temporarily wait at red lights when there are no other vehicles waiting to enter the intersection.

## 'Voices of Dover' series: Robert Steele

Voices of Dover, Dover400's oral history series, continues this week with an interview with longtime Dover resident Robert Steele as part of the city's 400th anniversary celebration.

The Voices of Dover project aims to preserve the stories and memories of Dover residents.

In his interview, Steele reflects on his time as Dover's city manager from 1978 to 1988. He shares his philosophy of being actively engaged with the community and building relationships with city employees. Steele discusses several major initiatives during his tenure, including closing the Tolend Road landfill, contracting garbage collection services, and downtown revitalization efforts.

The "Voices of Dover" series captures personal stories and recollections from current citizens about Dover's history, culture, businesses, and people.


**Oct. 12, 1648** — A grant of 1,500 oak or pine trees was given to Richard Waldron to accommodate a new sawmill at the lower falls of the Cochecho River. According to the grant, Waldron would pay three pence per tree.

**Oct. 10, 1659** — It was ordered that Huckleberry Hill, laid out for a sheep pasture, be a public training place for the township of Dover. Huckleberry Hill is located on Dover Point, in the vicinity of Saint Thomas Aquinas High School, and has long been known for its commanding views of the Cochecho River.

**Oct. 8, 1849** — Snow blanketed Dover and much of the state on this day during an early snowstorm.

**Oct. 7, 1852** — Five people were killed and many more badly injured in a train collision near the Weirs. Among the victims were John H. Smith, who died in the crash, and Richard B. Cater, who was injured and died two days later. Both men were from Dover.

**Oct. 6, 1925** — Foster's Daily Democrat in Dover announced it would publish a play-byplay account of the World Series between the Pittsburgh Pirates and Washington Senators. At 2 p.m. the following day, the paper began announcing the games from the office, play-by-play, through a megaphone. Hear more about this story in next week's Dover Download podcast.
