A valid driver's license or passport is required at the time of filing. Candidates for City Council must be a resident of Dover for at least one year.

Parking restrictions, road closures in place Sunday for Horne Street 5K

On Sunday, Sept. 15, 2019 at 9 a.m., the following street closures will be in effect for the Horne Street School 5K Run and 2 Mile Walk event, part of the Dover Race Series:

- Sixth Street, closed in the northerly direction from Chestnut Street to Whittier Street, 9 to 9:30 a.m.
- Horne Street, closed in both directions between Glenwood Avenue and Redden Street, 8:45 to 10 a.m.
- Whittier Street, closed in both directions between Sixth Street and Glenwood Avenue, 9 to 9:45 a.m.
- Glenwood Avenue, closed in the easterly direction from Sixth Street to Whittier Street, 9 to 9:45 a.m.


Motorists should expect detours or delays on Sixth Street, Whittier Street, Horne Street and on Glenwood Avenue between 9 and 10 a.m. Dover police personnel and a number of event volunteers will be on hand to help manage the flow of traffic along the race route. The start and finish point for this event is the Horne Street Elementary School.

On-street parking restrictions will be in effect on the entire length of Conifer Commons and on portions of Sixth Street and Horne Street on Sunday morning. Limited event parking is available at the school. Those attending the event are encouraged to park legally on some of the surrounding neighborhood streets.

National Citizen Survey open to Dover residents through Monday

Residents in the City of Dover are encouraged to participate in the 2019 National Citizen
Survey, which provides a snapshot of the community



and helps Dover measure service performance and quality, and assess community needs. <u>The survey</u> is now available to all Dover residents online, through Monday, Sept. 16.

"Participation in the survey is very important," said City Manager J. Michael Joyal, Jr. "Feedback from this survey helps guide decisions that affect our City. I encourage all Dover residents to take the survey and help us chart our community's future."

The results of the National Citizen Survey, combined with other feedback, helps the City Council, various City boards and commissions and the City administration understand and respond appropriately to the needs of the community in the upcoming years, as well as make comparisons with peer cities.

Some residents were selected at random to receive the survey at home, by mail. If you received the paper version of the survey, please complete that version and return it, rather than choosing the online survey.

The city contracted with National Research Center, Inc. to participate in The NCS, an instrument that was developed in partnership with the International City/County Management Association (ICMA) in 2001 to provide cities with a low-cost, high-quality method to conduct market research.

The survey centers on community livability and includes questions about the quality of life in the community, local policies, demographics, rating of local government services and resident use of services.

Survey results will be made available after the survey concludes.

The National Citizen Survey was among the first scientific surveys developed to gather resident opinion on a range of community issues, and has been used in more than 350 jurisdictions across 46 states. The NCS is a high-quality cost-effective scientific survey of resident opinion and an important benchmarking tool that allows for comparison among communities. Communities using The NCS have reported that the tool helped improve performance, strengthen communications with community stakeholders, and identify clear priorities for use in goal and budget setting.



Road work in connection with a project to install a new city water main will affect traffic in the area of the Weeks Crossing intersection on Sunday night, Sept. 15.

Between the hours of 7 p.m. and 6 a.m. on Monday, Sept. 16, milling work in preparation for paving may occasionally block Indian Brook Drive during the evening. When this occurs, traffic detours will be in place through the adjacent intersections of Weeks Lane and Hotel Drive, where through traffic may be required to U-turn or follow a temporary detour.

Dover and New Hampshire State Police will be stationed in the area to help facilitate any required detours.

Paving operations on the city's north end, at the site of recent water system improvements in the area of Weeks Crossing, are planned as follows:

- Friday, Sept. 13: Milling and paving of all trenches, and milling at Webb Place
- Sunday, Sept. 15: Night work will include milling along New Rochester Road (Route 108) (see notice above)
- Tuesday, Sept. 17 through Friday, Sept. 20: Crews will raise covers and install loops across the work area

Final night paving of this area will follow on a date yet to be determined.

Weather permitting, the following paving operations are scheduled for paving or paving preparation (shimming, reclamation, shoulder gravel, driveway trimming, grading and milling) the week of Sept. 16:

- Indian Brook Drive, from Members Way to Sixth Street
- Rochester Neck Road, from Covered Bridge Lane to the city line
- Whittier Street, from Regent Drive to Tolend Road
- Arch Street, from Silver Street to Washington Street

- Rutland Street, from Silver Street to Central Avenue
- East Watson Street, from Central Avenue to Court Street
- South Watson Lane, from Stark Avenue to East Watson Street

The following events are recorded in "Notable Events in the History of Dover, New Hampshire: From the First Settlement in 1623 to 1865," by George Wadleigh, and several other historical sources.

For more on the history of Dover, settled in 1623 and the oldest permanent settlement in New Hampshire and seventh oldest in the country, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street; and the Woodman Museum, Central Avenue. The Public Library also maintains an online collection of historical information, <u>located here</u>.



Sept. 18, 1679 - The union of New Hampshire with Massachusetts was dissolved at this time by royal proclamation. John Cutt was appointed President of the Province with a council of six of the principal inhabitants, of whom Richard Waldron of Dover was one. Agreeably to the royal direction they chose three other gentlemen into the council, of whom Job Clements of Dover was one. The President nominated Major Waldron to be his deputy or vice-president and John Roberts, marshal.



Sept. 14, 1837 - A ship of about 600 tons was launched from the shipyard of Robert Rogers near the Gulf this day.



Sept. 17, 1857 - In digging the cellar for a house on Nelson street, the foundations of a chimney and part of a cellar wall were disinterred, which are supposed to be the remains of the garrison house of the son of Peter Coffin, or of that of the first tavern opened in Dover, which it is known stood in that vicinity. Within the abutment were also found human bones judged to be those of a female, and a spoon differing entirely from anything that had been in use for more than 150 years. (Dover Enquirer)



Sept. 13, 1860 - A man named Alfred Varney attempts to jump from the cars at the train depot and is fatally injured. He dies five days after.



Sept. 15, 1864 - The quota of Dover (149) was reported to be more than full, the number furnished being 160 - 60 of whom had enlisted in the Navy, 32 in the Heavy Artillery, 20 in the 18th Regiment and 48 furnished by enrolled men with the excess from the last call.



Walking tours of historic Dover


The Greater Dover Chamber of Commerce is again hosting walking tours of historic Dover through September.

Documentary film exploring characters of Mount Washington to

be shown at the Library

Stories from Mount Washington, a 40-minute documentary film by Bill Millios, based on journalist Dan Szczesny's 2018 book "The White Mountain," will be shown at the Dover Public Library on Monday, Sept. 23 at 6:30 p.m. After the screening, the filmmaker, Bill Millios and the author, Dan Szczesny will discuss the film with the audience.

The film narrated by Szczesny, includes various video footage, interviews and photos compiled during the book's research period. Interviews include rare footage of legendary AMC Hut Girl Barbara Hill Richardson and George Etzweiler, a 97-year-old ultra-runner. In addition, Stories from Mount Washington features music by composer Jeff Rapsis as well as poetry by Mike Morin, Skyler Jaye Rutkowski and Rob Greene.

Over the course of one calendar year, journalist Dan Szczesny explored the history and mystique of New England's tallest mountain. From dressing as Walt Whitman and reading poetry up the mountain to spending a week in winter cooking for the scientists at the observatory, the mountain became Szczesny's muse. In "The White Mountain," Szczesny turned a veteran journalist's eye toward exploring 6,288-foot Mount Washington's place in the collective consciousness of the country and how this rugged landscape has reflected back a timeless history of our obsession and passion for exploration and discovery. Millios' film is a back-stage look at the characters and personalities that have contributed to the mountain's history and mystery.

Bill Millios has written and directed the feature-length films, Old Man Dogs (1997) and Dangerous Crosswinds (2005). His company, Back Lot Films, produces corporate videos. Millios has taught digital video production and film history at Southern NH University and is also co-author of the book, "The Digital Filmmaking Workshops: Producing, Marketing, and Screening Your Independent Feature-Length Film." Dan Szczesny is a long-time author and journalist living in the New Hampshire. His books include travelogues on Nepal, Alaska, and the White Mountains. He is a Hemingway Foundation finalist for short fiction and has also written collections of short stories and poetry. He has traveled widely throughout the country speaking about adventure travel and the importance of getting kids into the outdoors.
