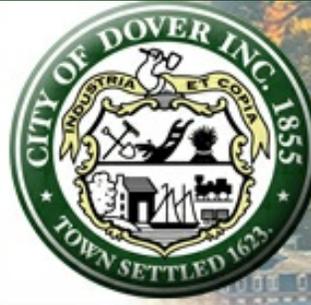

The Department of Planning and Community Development, along with the project's consultant, Resilience Planning LLC, kicked off a public engagement process recently with a Visual Preference Survey. A Visual Preference Survey allows citizens to rate visual concepts of building designs, landscape characteristics, architectural styles, streetscape features, and more. The feedback collected helps the city understand what the public envisions for the Central Business District.

Participating in the survey is one way for the public to help shape the future look of Dover, the design of public streets, open spaces, and site development of the Central Business District, and to offer input for future design guidelines. The results of the survey will be revealed Saturday, Oct. 6 at Apple Harvest Day, where a booth will be set up.





On Sunday, Sept. 16, 2018 at 9 a.m., the following street closures will be in effect for the Horne Street School 5K Run and 2 Mile Walk event, part of the Dover Race Series:

- Sixth Street, closed in the northerly direction from Chestnut Street to Whittier Street, 9 to 9:30 a.m.
- Horne Street, closed in both directions between Glenwood Avenue and Redden Street, 8:45 to 10 a.m.
- Whittier Street, closed in both directions between Sixth Street and Glenwood Avenue, 9 to 9:45 a.m.
- Glenwood Avenue, closed in the easterly direction from Sixth Street to Whittier Street, 9 to 9:45 a.m.

Motorists should expect detours or delays on Sixth Street, Whittier Street, Horne Street and on Glenwood Avenue between 9 and 10 a.m. Dover police personnel and a number of event volunteers will be on hand to help manage the flow of traffic along the race route. The start and finish point for this event is the Horne Street Elementary School.

On-street parking restrictions will be in effect on the entire length of Conifer Commons and on a portion of Horne Street on Sunday morning. Limited event parking is available at the school. Those attending the event are encouraged to park legally on some of the surrounding neighborhood streets, or at the Hannaford plaza at 831 Central Ave., which is a short walk from the school.

Spaulding Turnpike's Exit 5 now closed

The New Hampshire Department of Transportation (NHDOT) announces the permanent closure of the Exit 5 northbound on-ramp on the Spaulding Turnpike (NH 16) in Dover to facilitate the reconstruction of the Spaulding Turnpike between the Little Bay Bridge and the Dover Toll Plaza.

This permanent closure is part of the overall planned improvements to the Spaulding Turnpike corridor to allow for the safe flow of traffic from the northbound Spaulding Turnpike onto the new Exit 6 northbound off-ramp that will be opened in the fall of 2018.

Motorists seeking to access the Spaulding Turnpike northbound from Boston Harbor Road, Dover Point Road, and Wentworth Terrace will be required to take the Exit 6 southbound on-ramp onto the southbound Spaulding Turnpike, continue south to Exit 4, and reverse direction via Shattuck Way and the Exit 4 northbound on-ramp.

This work is part of the Newington-Dover improvement project on the Spaulding Turnpike. Severino Trucking Company, Inc. of Candia, New Hampshire is the prime contractor for the \$67 million project, which is scheduled to be completed in October, 2020.

The Children's Museum of New Hampshire and SEED will share proceeds from the Dover Ducky Derby.





This week in **DOVER HISTORY**



The following events are recorded in "Notable Events in the History of Dover, New Hampshire: From the First Settlement in 1623 to 1865," by George Wadleigh, and several other historical sources.

For more on the history of Dover, settled in 1623 and the oldest permanent settlement in New Hampshire and seventh oldest in the country, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street; and the Woodman Museum, Central Avenue. Sept. 15, 1667 - The grand jury presented the town for want of stocks, whipping post, standard weights and measures, a sealer of leather, a pound, a watch house, powder match and bullets. The Court enjoined the town to provide themselves with these accompaniments of civilization "by ye next court" or pay a fine of 5 Pounds and 2S 6d fees.



Sept. 17, 1707 - Capt. Samuel Chesley, his brother James Chesley, and six more stout young men, were slain by the Indians, as they were cutting and hauling timber, not far from Capt. Chesley's house. The Indian that killed James Chesley was slain upon the spot by Robert Torason. Phillip Chesley and three more escaped.



Sept. 18, 1724 - The town appointed Capt. Paul Gerrish and Capt. Benjamin Wentworth agents or attorneys to prosecute all actions of trespass upon the town's commons "already begun or hereafter to begin and to substitute attorneys under them as they see cause."




Sept. 14, 1821 - The commissioned and non-commissioned officers of the Dover military companies formed a volunteer association under the title of "Soul of Soldiery," and under command of Capt. Brewer made their first public appearance this day in a neat uniform. The numerous manoeuvres performed were principally of the Light Infantry Drill, and were executed with a correctness and rapidity highly gratifying to the numerous spectators: their firing in line, in square, and in chain, were admirably well done, considering this was their first effort in public. Sept. 20, 1853 - Gas lights were first used in Dover this evening, the mills and many stores having been supplied with it by the Gas Co., which was established this year.



Library discussion ponders connection between psychics and scientists

The Psychic and the Scientist: Finding the Common and the Uncommon Ground will be up for discussion at the Dover Public Library on Monday, Sept. 24 at 6:30 p.m.

Join Valerie Lofaso and Andy Kitt of the KRI Center for Consciousness Studies as they examine paranormal activity from the perspective of a scientist and of a psychic medium to try to find understanding of the strange things that happen in our world.

Valerie Lofaso has been researching all things paranormal for over 20 years and has been investigating with KRI since 2010. Valerie helped co-found the KRI Center for Consciousness Studies where she facilitates many groups including Empath Support Gathering, Writer's Group, and Life on the Fringe. She also founded the Portsmouth Paranormal Research Society to help train new paranormal investigators, and is co-founder of Seacoast Saucers of New England, a group dedicated to helping those with ET and UFO encounters and tearing down the social stigma around such topics. She is an Empathic Medium, a Reiki Master/Teacher, and is the author of the paranormal fiction series "Tangled Web of Friends".

Andy Kitt is the founder of the KRI paranormal investigative team and the KRI Center for Consciousness Studies in Stratham. He has a BA in journalism from the University of New Hampshire, is a member of Mensa, and is currently a PhD candidate at UNH studying psychology with a focus on visual psychophysics. His goal is to find better scientific methods to study consciousness, souls, and all things paranormal. He is also a published author of both fiction and nonfiction.

Forum considers future protection of migratory birds and endangered species

The Dover Democratic Committee's Energy and Environment Action Group will host "Shot Down: A Forum," a discussion about the challenges to long-held interpretations of both the Migratory Bird Treaty Act and the Endangered Species Act. The event will take place Tuesday, Sept. 25 from 6 to 8 p.m., on the second floor of the Dover Public Library.

The nonpartisan forum may be of interest to proponents of wildlife and migratory bird protection, as well as individuals with general concerns about the prospects of degradation of environmental protections in general.

The event will focus specifically on the Migratory Bird Treaty Act, a century-old law that is just now drawing

negative attention, as well as the 45-year-old Endangered Species Act. In the case of the Migratory Bird Act, the government is reinterpreting the law to allow bird deaths from industrial activities. Likewise, the Department of the Interior has proposed sweeping changes that may weaken the law that has saved bald eagles and grizzly bears from extinction.

State Sen. David Watters will moderate the session, which will feature distinguished panelists with strong backgrounds in the protection of endangered species and the preservation of laws designed to protect them. Sen. Watters has served as the University of New Hampshire's Senior Vice Provost for Engagement and Academic Outreach. In addition, he also served as an English professor, attaining the level of professor emeritus.

The three panelists will each address a different aspect of the issue.

Dr. Kurk Dorsey will highlight the history of the Migratory Bird Treaty Act, a sterling example of how science, economics and sentiment were able to come together 100 years ago to create a monumental piece of environmental legislation. Dr. Dorsey is the chair of the history department at UNH.

Dr. Carol Foss will discuss the implications for New Hampshire wildlife protection of recently enacted changes in the rules for implementing the Migratory Bird Treaty Act, as well as rule changes for the Endangered Species Act. Dr. Foss is the New Hampshire Audubon Society's senior advisor for science and policy.

Dr. Clay Mitchell will shed light on the broader implications the weakening of the Migratory Bird and Endangered Species Acts could have on environmental legislation in general. Dr. Mitchell teaches at UNH and has been a city planner, government consultant and renewable energy entrepreneur.

"Shot Down: A Forum" is open to the public. Ample time will be provided for questions and discussion.

Author to present program on White Mountain hiking deaths

Julie Boardman, author of the book, "Death in the White Mountains," will present a program based on her book at the Dover Public Library on Wednesday, Sept. 26 at 6:30 p.m.

Published by Bondcliff Books of Littleton, New Hampshire, Death in the White Mountains is the first book to focus on

fatalities in the entire region. Boardman points out that "a great deal has been written about deaths on Mount Washington, yet in recent years, more people have died elsewhere in the White Mountains. I wanted people to realize that dangers exist in many areas."

Boardman wrote "Death in the White Mountains" in the belief that by studying past fatalities and identifying the mistakes that caused them, we can learn how to be safe in the mountains.

Using a variety of sources, she compiled a list of 219 hikers, climbers and backcountry skiers who have died. She categorized the fatalities according to cause of death and determined what fatal errors were made by the victims.

"A majority of the deaths didn't have to happen," Boardman stated. "They were the result of an oversight or one or more bad decisions."

For example, a lack of preparation was one of the most common mistakes made by hypothermia victims. Forty-six people have died from hypothermia, and 34 of them were not properly attired or lacked some necessary gear. Many of the summer hikers were lightly dressed and had no extra garments that would have kept them warm when they ran into foul weather. Some of the winter hikers equipped themselves adequately for a day hike but weren't ready for an emergency overnight in frigid conditions. Other common mistakes made by hypothermia victims were failing to turn around when the weather deteriorated and hiking alone.

Each of the first nine chapters of the book is devoted to a cause of death. These include falls, hypothermia, natural causes, avalanches, drowning, lightning strikes and freak accidents, lost hikers who were never found, hyperthermia, and murder. The fatal errors that caused the fatalities are illustrated through stories of some of the victims. Each chapter includes short summaries of all the deaths in each category along with advice on mountain safety.


Boardman is the author of *When Women and Mountains Meet*, a book about the women who shaped the interesting history of the White Mountains. Her work has appeared in *Appalachia* (the journal of the Appalachian Mountain Club), *Sierra* (the magazine of the Sierra Club), *Connecticut Audubon* and many other publications. Since moving to New London, New Hampshire in 1990, she has hiked extensively throughout New England and climbed all the peaks in the region that are over 4,000 feet high.

Boardman will have copies of her book *Death in the White Mountains* published in 2017 for sale at the event for the special price of \$15. She will be pleased to inscribe books also.

The program is free and open to the public.

Dover's water quality reports available online

Each year, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) requires community water systems to deliver a Consumer Confidence Report -- also known as an Annual Drinking Water Quality Report -- to their customers. These reports, which are mailed out to water customers by July 1, provide information about their drinking water quality including a summary of detected contaminants from the previous year, compliance, and educational information.
