

Planet Fitness donates \$25,000 to new high school

Planet Fitness on Wednesday pledged \$25,000 to Dover's new high school, now under construction. Planet Fitness CEO Chris Rondeau presented a check to City officials during a ribbon-cutting ceremony marking the firm's 25th anniversary and renovations and grand reopening of its Dover location.

The \$25,000 is the first donation to the Building it Brighter initiative, which aims to provide a financial boost to school resources and programs not included in the current budget. This initiative follows the formation of a fundraising panel by the High School Joint Building Committee, which tasked the group with seeking funds for enhancements to complement the new school. The three members of the fundraising subcommittee – Deputy Mayor and JBC member Robert Carrier, School Board Chair and JBC member Amanda Russell and City Councilor and JBC member Sarah Greenshields – all attended Wednesday's ceremony.

City Manager J. Michael Joyal, Jr. said to the City Council on Wednesday the donation from Planet Fitness is another example of the company's continued generosity to Dover. "Planet Fitness has been a very good corporate neighbor," Joyal said. "The original Planet Fitness was started here in Dover. They've donated fitness equipment to the schools and to our public safety folks in the past, and also made some surplus equipment available to the Recreation Department. We certainly very much appreciate their continued involvement in supporting Dover."

Greenshields thanked Planet Fitness for the significant donation and said the panel will soon be speaking with other corporate neighbors about the Building it Brighter initiative.

"Our new high school will be the pride of Dover for decades," Greenshields said. "This school is the community's investment in the future of our children and our city. We know it will be an amazing and innovative school. Building It Brighter is a way for us to provide additional resources, programs and assets that take full advantage of the school's potential from day one."

Russell said Building It Brighter will also help bridge the school's excellent programs and talented students with the community at large.

"Our new school will be a true community center," Russell said. "Our students are active members of the community and our future leaders. But this school is also where we all can share in the experience of guiding these young leaders, whether by attending special events at the school's auditorium, town square, athletic fields and courtyard, or visiting the Career Technical Center for a meal at the culinary program's restaurant, having a car serviced by students in the automotive program, or a manicure by students in the cosmetology program's salon."

Carrier added Building It Brighter allows the group to pursue programs the construction budget does not afford.

"The JBC has been diligent in making sure that our new school is built on time and on budget," Carrier said. "At the same time, we are working very hard to make sure our new school reflects the community's clear vision for the future, to fullest extent of our budget. Like any project of this size, not everything we want is possible. Building It Brighter is a way for members of the community to provide additional support for the programs they value most."

Building It Brighter seeks additional support for a variety of enhancements, including technology, athletics and athletic fields and facilities, landscaping, the performing arts, an animal science barn, new programs, media center and more. The group is seeking in-kind and monetary donations, including contributions from businesses and organizations interested in directing support to specific facilities or programs.

"We know there are people and organizations who are passionate about particular programs and facilities," Greenshields said. "This is a wonderful opportunity to have a direct impact on the future of education in Dover."

Parking restrictions, road closures in place Sunday for 5K race

Dover Police Chief Anthony F. Colarusso, Jr. announces the following:

On Sunday, Sept. 17, 2017 at 9 a.m., the following street closures will be in effect for the Horne Street School 5K Run and 2 Mile Walk event, part of the Dover Race Series:

- Sixth Street, closed in the northerly direction from Whittier to Grove, 9 to 9:30 a.m.
- Horne Street, closed in both directions between Glenwood and Redden, 8:45 to 10 a.m.
- Whittier Street, closed in both directions between Sixth and Glenwood, 9 to 9:45 a.m.
- Glenwood Avenue, closed in the easterly direction from Sixth to Whittier, 9 to 9:45 a.m.

Motorists should expect detours or delays on Sixth Street, Whittier Street, Horne Street and on Glenwood Avenue between 9 and 10 a.m. Dover police personnel and a number of event volunteers will be on hand to help manage the flow of traffic along the race route. The start and finish point for this event is the Horne Street Elementary School.

On-street parking restrictions will be in effect on the entire length of Conifer Commons and on a portion of Horne Street on Sunday morning. Limited event parking is available at the school. Those attending the event are encouraged to park legally on some of the surrounding neighborhood streets, or at the Hannaford plaza at 831 Central Ave., which is a short walk from the school.

Citywide hydrant flushing begins Sunday, Sept. 24

The Community Services Utilities Division will begin flushing fire hydrants throughout the City on Sunday, Sept. 24, 2017. Hydrant flushing is expected to take six weeks.

Crews will work at night from 7 p.m. to 5 a.m.

Hydrant flushing is essential to maintain water quality and allow adequate fire flows throughout the distribution system. No disruption of water service is expected. Residents may notice some discoloration of the water. This is temporary and does not pose any threat to public health.

Tick-related diseases topic of Lunch and Learn session at the Dover Library

Join the Public Library on Monday, Sept. 18 at 12 p.m. for a talk about diseases caused by ticks presented by Carolyn Fredette.

Fredette is the vectorborne disease epidemiologist for the New Hampshire Department of Health and Human Services. Each year, New Hampshire has about 1,500 case of Lyme disease, making it one of the highest incidence states in the country. Tick bites can cause other diseases besides Lyme disease.

In 2015, there were also 110 cases of anaplasmosis reported, which is caused by a bacterium, and 53 cases of babesiosis, which is caused by a parasite. There have also been two cases of the Powassan virus in New Hampshire residents, the first in 2013 and second in 2016, but it is not known if these were acquired in New

Hampshire. The majority of Powassan cases are seen in the Northeast and upper Midwest, which is similar to anaplasmosis, babesiosis, and Lyme disease. These diseases are all transmitted by the blacklegged (or deer) tick.

As part of a grant initiative, the state Department of Health and Human Services has developed tickborne disease prevention educational lessons and presentations with the goal of traveling around the state to present to various groups. Tickborne diseases continue to be a threat throughout the fall months (ticks are active any time the temperature is above 40 degrees and there is no snow on the ground).

Attendees are invited to bring a bag lunch to enjoy during the presentation, which should last about 45 minutes with a question and answer period at the end. There will be handouts available also.

Making Good on the Great War: Woodrow Wilson and the decision to take the United States into the First World War

One hundred years ago, President Woodrow Wilson faced a monumental dilemma about how to respond to the war in Europe, which had been raging for more than two years. In this illustrated talk at the Dover Public Library on Monday, Sept. 25 at 7 p.m., Kurk Dorsey, Professor of History at UNH and a specialist on US foreign policy, will



describe how Wilson tried to make something good from the Great War, first by trying to mediate a peace without victory and then by choosing to intervene in the war on the Allied side. His decisions continue to reverberate today, as the United States tries to figure how and whether to, among other things, make the world safe for democracy.

Kurk Dorsey holds the Class of 1938 Professorship at UNH, where he has taught history since 1994. His research interests include US foreign policy, and US environmental history. He is the author of "The Dawn of Conservation Diplomacy: US-Canadian Wildlife Protection Treaties in the Progressive Era and Whales and Nations: Environmental Diplomacy on the High

Seas."

Using concepts such as "reaching for the brass ring," "creating peacock moments," and "finding out what's under the iceberg," Kelly will teach some simple, easy-to- understand ways to help caregivers and family members effectively communicate and care for individuals with memory challenges.

McCarthy has been in the senior health industry for over 20 years. A graduate of Emmanuel College in Boston with a B.S. in Psychology and a concentration in Gerontology Rehabilitation Management, she is currently the Corporate Director of Memory Care and Resident Engagement at LCB Senior Living. She is certified as a Master Trainer for the R.I. Alzheimer's Association and was the keynote speaker at the 2016 Alzheimer's Caregiver Conference. She is also a Board Certified Dementia Educator for the National Institute for Dementia Education. Copies of Kelly's new book, "Brass Ring Memoirs" will be offered for sale after her presentation.

Clerk's office unable to process motor vehicle registrations during state computer upgrade, Oct. 6-10

The Dover City Clerk's office will be unable to process motor vehicle registrations from Friday, Oct. 6 to Tuesday, Oct. 10, 2017 while the state installs a new computer system. The new system is expected to be online beginning Wednesday, Oct. 11, and registrations will resume at that time.

The installation of the new system, known as VISION, by the New Hampshire Division of Motor Vehicles will affect vehicle registration processing statewide during this time.

Motorists registering a new vehicle, with a temporary plate, or renewing a registration are asked to be mindful

of the interruption in service, as the City Clerk's office will be unable to process motor vehicle registrations while the installation is under way.



Dover to host public hearing for Ten-Year Transportation plan

The Governor's Advisory Commission on Intermodal Transportation (GACIT) will hold 19 public hearings across New Hampshire to review and receive input on the update of the State's Ten-Year Transportation Improvement Plan (2019-2028). The public hearings will begin in September.

A public hearing in Dover is scheduled for Thursday, Sept. 28, 2017, at 4 p.m. in the auditorium at Dover City Hall.

The purpose of the public hearings is to receive public comments and testimony on transportation projects and priorities included in the draft 2019-2028 Ten-Year Transportation Improvement Plan as recommended by the New Hampshire Department of Transportation to GACIT.

Those not able to attend the meetings can submit written testimony within 10 days of the completion of the public hearings. (no later than Nov. 6, 2017 at 4 p.m.)

The following events are recorded in "Notable Events in the History of Dover, New Hampshire: From the First Settlement in 1623 to 1865," by George Wadleigh, "Historic Rambles About Dover," by Robert A. Whitehouse, "Port of Dover: Two Centuries of Shipping on the Cochecho" by Robert A. Whitehouse and Cathleen C.

Beaudoin, and several other historical sources.

For more on the history of Dover, settled in 1623 and the oldest permanent settlement in New Hampshire and seventh oldest in the country, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street; and the Woodman Institute Museum, Central Avenue. Sept. 18, 1679 - The union of New Hampshire with Massachusetts was dissolved at this time by royal proclamation. John Cutt was appointed President of the Province with a council of six of the principal inhabitants, of whom Richard Waldron of Dover was one. Agreeably to the royal direction they chose three other gentlemen into the council, of whom Job Clements of Dover was one. The President nominated Major Waldron to be his deputy or vice-president and John Roberts, marshal.



Sept. 19, 1781 - At a town meeting held for raising soldiers, it was voted "that nine men now to be raised for three months be given ten silver dollars each as bounty and paid fourteen bushels of merchantable Indian corn per month by the town in Jan. 1782."



Sept. 14, 1821 - The commissioned and non-commissioned officers of the Dover military companies formed a volunteer association under the title of "Soul of Soldiery," and under command of Capt. Brewer made their first public appearance this day in a neat uniform. The numerous manoeuvres performed were principally of the Light Infantry Drill, and were executed with a correctness and rapidity highly gratifying to the numerous spectators: their firing in line, in square, and in chain, were admirably well done, considering this was their first effort in public. (Strafford Register)



Sept. 21, 1842 - Died, Hon. Jeremiah Smith, aged 83, formerly of Exeter, but for the last years of his life a resident of Dover. He was a representative in Congress during Washington's administration, for many years a Judge of the United States and State Courts, and Governor of the State. Few citizens were more widely known as a Statesman and Jurist, and none ever left behind them a more enduring reputation.



Sept. 17, 1857 - In digging the cellar for a house on Nelson street, the foundations of a chimney and part of a cellar wall were disinterred, which are supposed to be the remains of the garrison house of the son of Peter Coffin, or of that of the first tavern opened in Dover, which it is known stood in that vicinity. Within the abutment were

also found human bones judged to be those of a female, and a spoon differing entirely from anything that had been in use for more than 150 years. (Dover Enquirer)
