## Filing period for municipal election closes today at 4 p.m.

The filing period for the City of Dover municipal election remains open through today, Friday, Sept. 20, at 4 p.m.

The municipal election is Tuesday, Nov. 5, 2019.

Candidates for City Council, School Board, and all ward positions, must be a registered voter in Dover and complete the necessary filing paperwork at the City Clerk's office, located at City Hall. A valid driver's license or passport is required at the time of filing. Candidates for City Council must be a resident of Dover for at least one year.

## Road closures, traffic restrictions for Sunday's Seacoast Cancer 5K

On Sunday, Sept. 22, 2019 Wentworth-Douglass Hospital will hold the fourth annual Seacoast Cancer 5K to benefit the Seacoast Cancer Center. Over 2,000 participants are expected. The event begins at 9 a.m. with a start and finish at WDH. Motorists should expect -- and give way to -- runners or walkers wearing numbered race bibs on any Dover roadways between 9 and 10 a.m.

There are several major street closures during this event, including:

- Central Avenue will be closed in both directions between Oak Street and Abbott Street, between 8:45 a.m. and 10 a.m.:
- Oak Street will be closed to all traffic between Broadway and Central Avenue, including at the Broadway and Rollins Road intersection, between 8:45 a.m. and 10 a.m.;





- Broadway will be closed to all traffic from Central Avenue to Oak Street between 8:45 a.m. and 10 a.m.;
- Chapel Street will be closed to all traffic between 9 a.m. and 10 a.m.
- Lane shifts and lane closures will be in effect on Central Avenue near Chapel Street.

Motorists should avoid Oak Street, Broadway, Chapel Street and Saint John Street between 9 and 10 a.m. Residents of these streets, as well as Oak Terrace, High Ridge Drive, Jefferson Drive, Brick Road, Rose Street, Winter Street and Durrell Street, will not be able to arrive or depart by car during the race. Please plan ahead to park outside of the race route.

Event parking will be available in the WDH garage and at the medical office parks off Old Rollinsford Road. Dover and Rollinsford police officers and event volunteers will be posted along the course to help manage traffic.

On-street parking restrictions will be posted in the following areas to accommodate the race course or related traffic detours:

- Broadway, entire length
- Central Avenue, easterly side, from Chapel Street to Broadway
- Mount Vernon Street

### Tuesday meeting

When the Cochecho Waterfront Development Advisory Committee (CWDAC) meets for its next regular meeting on Tuesday, Sept. 24, it will review and vote on the land disposition and development agreement between the City of Dover and Cathartes, the firm selected to develop the city's 29-acre waterfront parcel. The meeting will be held at 5:30 p.m. in Room 305 at the McConnell Center.

The land disposition and development agreement follows the approval of a term sheet by CWDAC and the City Council earlier this year. The term sheet spells out the parameters of the the proposed project, including the sale of the property to Cathartes for \$3,372,500; 500,000 square feet of mixed-use development consisting of residential, retail, office, restaurant and hotel space; and site plan approval to begin by the end of 2019. As part of the agreed upon terms, the City of Dover earmarked \$6.6 million in Tax Increment Financing funding to complete public improvements including bluff excavation, site grading, shoreline stabilization, a waterfront park, streets and public utilities.

The land disposition and development agreement will finalize the terms of the agreement between the City of Dover and Cathartes. The proposed agreement before CWDAC on Tuesday, Sept. 24, <u>can be viewed here</u>.

## City Council adopts architectural and solar zoning changes

At a recent meeting, the City Council voted to adopt the latest zoning amendments. These amendments include housekeeping revisions, along with changes to the zoning tables and text for architectural design standards and guidelines, including solar power in the Central Business District. These amendments were adopted after a yearlong project led by a steering committee appointed by the Planning Board, the Planning Department and their consultant, Resilience Planning and Design, LLC of Plymouth, New Hampshire. Public feedback was sought last fall through a visual preference survey, booths at Apple Harvest Day, stakeholder interviews, a citywide mailing, media releases, and public hearings. The Planning Board adopted the site review regulation amendments in March. Amendments to the

City's Zoning Code also requires adoption by the City Council.

City Planner Donna Benton thanks all of those who participated and contributed to the new amendments.

"It was nice to see over 900 respondents to the visual preference survey," Benton said. "Thousands stopped by the Apple Harvest Day booth and satellite office. Staff also visited and interviewed high school classes to gain their feedback on how the Central Business District should look and feel. Walking around the Central Business District, one will quickly notice there is a lot of in-fill development going on with all the building taking place. It is important to review the City's regulations from time to time and gain public feedback on Dover's direction."

The following events are recorded in "Notable Events in the History of Dover, New Hampshire: From the First Settlement in 1623 to 1865," by George Wadleigh, and several other historical sources.

For more on the history of Dover, settled in 1623 and the oldest permanent settlement in New Hampshire and seventh oldest in the country, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street; and the Woodman Museum, Central Avenue. The Public Library also maintains an online collection of historical information, located here.



Sept. 26, 1666 - The selectmen gave orders that Thomas Turner be warned out of the town by Ensign John Davis and John Bickford, and that he depart according to law. Also, that the wife of William Risley be warned out of town by Anthony Nutter. Henry Kerk was appointed to keep an Ordinary, and to "stand till the next County Court upon his good behavior." Many inconveniences and damages coming upon the town in consequence of the practice which had been adopted by the inhabitants of "taking in several persons both men and women," the selectmen gave orders that none should henceforth admit or entertain any inmate or sojourner or servant to be hired or taken into their houses without giving notice to the selectmen within 30 days, upon the penalty of 19 shillings fine to the town, besides making good all other damages which the town might suffer. The town at this early day had become somewhat crowded, or inhabitants had been taken in who could not be accommodated, whereupon it was voted that no more persons should be admitted until all former grants had been laid out and duly recorded on the town's book, and a list made out of all inhabitants so that "the town may see how many we are to take care of." At this time the whole number of taxpayers on record was:

There was a total of 133 families in Dover, or a population of about 530, according to the estimate of the present time, when four voters or polls are usually found in every 15 to 20 inhabitants.



Sept. 21, 1842 - Died, Hon. Jeremiah Smith, aged 83, formerly of Exeter, but for the last years of his life a resident of Dover. He was a representative in Congress during Washington's administration, for many years a Judge of the United States and State Courts, and Governor of the State. Few citizens were more widely known as a Statesman and Jurist, and none ever left behind them a more enduring reputation.



**Sept. 20, 1853** - Gas lights were first used in Dover this evening, the mills and many stores having been supplied with it by the Gas Co., which was established this year.



**Sept. 20, 1853** - Also on this day, a gold medal was presented to Dover's Hon. John P. Hale by the sailors of the U. S. Sloop of War Germantown, as a testimonial for his success in procuring the abolishment of flogging in the Navy.



**Sept. 21, 1843** - The new Freewill Baptist Meeting House on Washington street was dedicated this day. (This was the building afterwards converted into the Freewill Baptist Printing Establishment, which had an office in the basement when originally built.)

Documentary film exploring characters of Mount Washington to be shown at the Library

Stories from Mount Washington, a 40-minute documentary film by Bill Millios, based on journalist Dan Szczesny's 2018 book "The White Mountain," will be shown at the Dover Public Library on Monday, Sept. 23 at 6:30 p.m. After the screening, the filmmaker, Bill Millios and the author, Dan Szczesny will discuss the film with the audience.

The film narrated by Szczesny, includes various video footage, interviews and photos compiled during the book's research period. Interviews include rare footage of legendary AMC Hut Girl Barbara Hill Richardson and George Etzweiler, a 97-year-old ultra-runner. In addition, Stories from Mount Washington features music by composer Jeff Rapsis as well as poetry by Mike Morin, Skyler Jaye Rutkowski and Rob Greene.

Over the course of one calendar year, journalist Dan Szczesny explored the history and mystique of New England's tallest mountain. From dressing as Walt Whitman and reading poetry up the mountain to spending a week in winter cooking for the scientists at the observatory, the mountain became Szczesny's muse. In "The White Mountain," Szczesny turned a veteran journalist's eye toward exploring 6,288-foot Mount Washington's place in the collective consciousness of the country and how this rugged landscape has reflected back a timeless history of our obsession and passion for exploration and discovery. Millios' film is a back-stage look at the characters and personalities that have contributed to the mountain's history and mystery.

Bill Millios has written and directed the feature-length films, Old Man Dogs (1997) and Dangerous Crosswinds (2005). His company, Back Lot Films, produces corporate videos. Millios has taught digital video production and film history at Southern NH University and is also co-author of the book, "The Digital Filmmaking Workshops: Producing, Marketing, and Screening Your Independent Feature-Length Film." Dan Szczesny is a long-time author and journalist living in the New Hampshire. His books include travelogues on Nepal, Alaska, and the White Mountains. He has traveled widely throughout the country speaking about adventure travel and the importance of getting kids into the outdoors.
