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
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Capital Improvements Program before City Council and Planning Board Oct.3

The City of Dover's Capital Improvements Program (CIP) for fiscal years 2020 through 2025 will be presented to the City Council and Planning Board at a joint workshop on Wednesday, Oct. 3, 2018.

Following the presentation, the Planning Board and City Council will continue to review the CIP over the next several weeks. The City Council is expected to vote on the proposed CIP in November or December.

The CIP outlines a schedule for the next six years of capital projects and purchases over \$25,000 that maintain and improve community infrastructure.

"Each year this program brings together people from diverse segments of the community interested in meeting





Community Services and Eversource partner for Freon Appliance Disposal Day

Community Services has partnered with Eversource for free recycling of old household appliances containing Freon on Saturday, Oct. 13, 2018 at the Recycling Center on Mast Road.

Residents will be allowed to dispose of up to two Freonbased appliances during the disposal day during regular hours, 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Items allowed include

refrigerators, freezers, dehumidifiers, and air conditioners. Residents will be required to complete a short form with their name, address, product make, model, and serial number. Recycling Center staff are required to cut the electric cords on all of the appliances to ensure they are not reused.

Eversource will reimburse the city for the disposal expense of all appliances collected.

This is a one-day event only.

Crews to begin citywide hydrant flushing Sept. 30

The Community Services Utilities Division will begin flushing fire hydrants throughout the city on Sunday, Sept. 30, 2018. This phase of hydrant flushing will occur on dead-end streets and is expected to take one week.

Crews will work at night from 9 p.m. to 5 a.m.

Hydrant flushing is essential to maintain water quality and allow adequate fire flows throughout the distribution system. No disruption of water service is expected. Residents may notice some discoloration of the water. This is temporary and does not pose any threat to public health.

COAST seeks input on future of public transit system

The Cooperative Alliance for Seacoast Transportation (COAST) is excited to announce that over the next 22 months it will be taking a comprehensive look at its entire public transit system to potentially discover new opportunities to better serve the region as it is today and into the foreseeable future.

"There has been tremendous change across COAST's service area in the past 10-plus years," said Rad Nichols, COAST Executive Director. "COAST has also undergone incredible change, effectively doubling in size since 2009. COAST is at a point in its life cycle when a

comprehensive, deep dive of how we provide services, and a discussion of whether those current services best meet the needs of the region, should be undertaken."

Key to the process, stakeholders (including riders, elected officials, the business community and community service organizations), are all being strongly encouraged to 'join the conversation' and take an active role in helping COAST determine how to best meet the changing needs of their current and future customers.


COAST will be offering multiple opportunities for public conversation and input through public forums, meetings, and hearings, as well as through in-person and online surveys. The first round of public forums are being scheduled through the month of October and will be held across COAST's service area.

The work of the Comprehensive Operations Analysis (COA) will be a repetitive process occurring over the course of the next 22 months, including extensive data collection, soliciting of public input, analyzing data patterns, forming new concepts for improved service, analyzing those concepts, and repeating this cycle until COAST identifies an improved network. The organization intends to launch any revised or new services resulting from the COA by July 2020.

Nichols added, "Throughout this process, we are committed to achieving our organization's stated goals of actively engaging our stakeholders in collaborative efforts to be responsive to the region's changing needs, promoting fiscal stewardship of public transportation, and conducting ourselves with fiscal integrity and transparency that respects the taxpayers and municipalities that we serve."

The Cooperative Alliance for Seacoast Transportation (COAST) has provided public transit service to the Seacoast New Hampshire region since 1982. COAST is a public, non-profit transit system that relies primarily on federal and local government support to operate. COAST is governed by a board of directors representing the communities served, two regional planning commissions, and many local and state agencies.



National test of emergency alert systems scheduled for Oct. 3

The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), in coordination with the Federal Communications Commission (FCC), will conduct a nationwide test of the Emergency Alert System (EAS) and Wireless Emergency Alerts (WEA) on Oct. 3, 2018. The WEA portion of the test commences at 2:18 p.m., and the EAS portion follows at 2:20 p.m. The test will assess the operational readiness of the infrastructure for distribution of a national message and determine whether improvements are needed.

The test was originally planned for Sept. 20, 2018 but was postponed until Oct. 3 due to ongoing response efforts to Hurricane Florence.

The WEA test message will be sent to cell phones that are connected to wireless providers participating in WEA. This is the fourth EAS nationwide test and the first national WEA test. Previous EAS national tests were conducted in November 2011, September 2016, and September 2017 in collaboration with the FCC, broadcasters, and emergency management officials in recognition of FEMA's National Preparedness Month.

The EAS is a national public warning system that provides the President with the communications capability to address the nation during a national emergency. The test is made available to EAS participants (i.e., radio and television broadcasters, cable systems, satellite radio and television providers, and wireline video providers) and is scheduled to last approximately one minute. The test message will be similar to regular monthly EAS test messages with which the public is familiar. The EAS message will include a reference to the WEA test:

"THIS IS A TEST of the National Emergency Alert System. This system was developed by broadcast and cable operators in voluntary cooperation with the Federal Emergency Management Agency, the Federal

Communications Commission, and local authorities to keep you informed in the event of an emergency. If this had been an actual emergency an official message would have followed the tone alert you heard at the start of this message. A similar wireless emergency alert test message has been sent to all cell phones nationwide. Some cell phones will receive the message; others will not. No action is required."

Cell towers will broadcast the WEA test for approximately 30 minutes beginning at 2:18 p.m. During this time, WEA compatible cell phones that are switched on, within range of an active cell tower, and whose wireless provider participates in WEA should be capable of receiving the test message. Some cell phones will not receive the test message, and cell phones should only receive the message once. The WEA test message will have a header that reads "Presidential Alert" and text that says:

"THIS IS A TEST of the National Wireless Emergency Alert System. No action is needed."

The WEA system is used to warn the public about dangerous weather, missing children, and other critical situations through alerts on cell phones. The national test will use the same special tone and vibration as with all WEA messages (i.e. Tornado Warning, AMBER Alert). Users cannot opt out of receiving the WEA test.

Thom Hindle Collection
"Images of the Past" on display at
the Art Center

The Art Center at One Washington Street Mill in Dover will feature "Images of the Past... the Thom Hindle Collection," during the month of October. The Thom Hindle Collection is a 50-year collection of original glass plate negatives taken by early twentieth century New England photographers using large wooden plate cameras mounted on tripods.

The exhibit will feature many images that have never been on exhibit and cover topics related to transportation, steam trains, street cars, vintage bicycles, motorcycles, automobiles, an old Jenny airplane at Hampton Beach, original 1950s Hampton toll booths, and single-bay gas stations; "On the Beach" with early swimming costumes, Rye Life Saving Crew, Short Sands at York 1910, Old Orchard Beach, original Farragut Hotel at Rye, Nubble Light with Bell Tower and 1930s Ogunquit Beach; "camping and fishing" with old fashioned camps, fisherman and hunters; "portraits" both in studio using skylight windows and outdoor family groups to include the family horse, children, a WWI soldier and 1910 nurse; "travel," the original Plymouth Rock Monument; Appledore House at Isles of Shoals, 1939 World's Fair, Washington DC in the 1920s, the steamer Mount Washington at Alton in 1905, Fish shanties at Ogunquit, Clam shacks at Joppa Flats in Newburyport, Mass., Cold Spring Park Fair Gate at Rochester, Paul Revere Home in Boston, plus vintage images of Dover, Rochester and Portsmouth.

Photographs on exhibit are reproduced from the original negatives representing the works of both local and Boston area photographers. Many photographs from the Thom Hindle Collection are displayed in the hallways at Wentworth-Douglass Hospital, local restaurants, banks, business and medical offices, private collections and on

many historic markers. Photographs can also be found in "DOVER, a Century of Change," published in 1994, Tri-City Memories published in 2014 and Factory on Fire published in 2017.

The Art Center exhibit opens on Friday, Oct. 5 during the monthly Dover Art Walk from 4-8 p.m.

Gallery hours are Monday through Friday, 10 a.m. to 6 p.m., Saturday 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., through Oct. 27.

September, 1912 - Dover High School opens for the year with 93 freshmen, 82 sophomores, 65 juniors and 65 seniors.


September, **1912** - A woman is confined at the pest house with smallpox and her home on Third Street is placed under quarantine and guarded by police.

Dover's water quality reports available online

Each year, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) requires community water systems to deliver a Consumer Confidence Report -- also known as an Annual Drinking Water Quality Report -- to their customers. These reports, which are mailed out to water customers by July 1, provide information about their drinking water quality including a summary of detected contaminants from the previous year, compliance, and educational information.
